GRASS ROOTS REPORT

Dottie Sets Pace For Rooters

After ten weeks of play, Dottie Schwedrsky of national prominence has regained the lead in the ratings of the Grass Roots Program which is being promoted out of Madison, Wisconsin.

Dottie scored 23 match points by winning 9 out of 9 games in the November 17th outing. Husband Leo placed second with 8 wins and moved up to 9th place in the standings.

Root Ratings are separate from the major tournaments and are based solely on the number of entries and the prizes won. There are 67 different people who are competing in the Madison area. Several of the nation's top stars such as Norman Wright, Larry Rowley, Vic Lyngaas, and Vince Meicher have been shutout in the first ten sessions. The top 13 as of November 17th are:

On December 29th after the 12th session, the top 16 who have competed in at least 8 of the meets will have a playoff for the first-half championship. All others will compete in a consolation tournament. Several other clubs are expected to join the program after the first of the new year.

MEET THE RALEIGH CHAMPION

Cathy Perkins has competed in the last eight National Open Tournaments and reached the pinnacle of her career by capturing the tenth annual championship last August in Raleigh, N.C. She is the first woman to wear this prestigious crown.

Born in Boston and raised mostly in nearby Milton, Mass. Cathy is the middle of seven children. Her parents enjoyed cribbage and taught each of them this family game when they reached seven or eight years of age.

Cathy has a B.S. degree in Psychology and a M.A. in Special Education. At present, she teaches young handicapped children and others who have developmental disability at a mental health center.

The new champion resides on a farm about fifty miles from Raleigh with her husband Russ and adopted son Lancel, who frequently accompanies them to the tournaments. In their lifetime the couple has also lived in Alaska, California, Florida, Hawaii, and Australia.

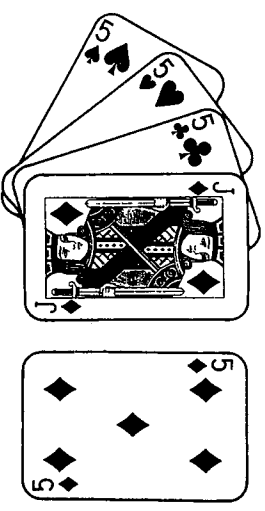
Many players have met the other members of her family including brothers Richard and Stephen Dacey, brother-in-law Eddie Bowes, and sister Mary of Mr. and Mrs. Cribbage fame.

Asked about her cribbage career, Cathy replied, "I enjoy tournaments because of all the nice people I meet. The opportunity of establishing new friendships is appreciated and I hope to play in tournaments for many years to come."

After her victory in Raleigh Cathy was awarded the Order of the Long Leaf Pine by North Carolina governor James B. Hunt, Jr.

ACC AMERICAN CRIBBAGE CHAMPIONSHIP

SANCTIONED BY THE AMERICAN CRIBBAGE CONGRESS



The 3rd Annual American Cribbage Championship will be held on the 4th & 5th of February, 1984, at the new Paper Valley Hotel & Conference Center, in Appleton, Wisconsin. The Paper Valley is a new, modern, family concept hotel, offering much more than just a room and a restaurant. Their large pool is open 24 hours a day, along with the indoor miniature golf, saunas, game room, etc. There are two restaurants in the hotel, a large lounge with nightly entertainment, along with shopping stores and hair stylists. The Paper Valley is located on College Avenue in the heart of Appleton's Downtown Shopping Mall. A covered parking ramp, connected to the Paper Valley Hotel, is free to those staying at the Hotel. The Paper Valley Hotel is the perfect facility for the 3rd American Cribbage Championship. (See the enclosed brochure for additional information.)

The Tournament is open to anyone 18 years of age or older. Entries must be limited to the first 600 received, due to other commitments already made by the Hotel. Don't wait--enter early!

The Tournament will begin promptly at 8:00 A.M. on Saturday. All players will play 21 games of qualifying on Saturday. The top qualifiers on Saturday will play in single elimination, best out of 5 games, on Sunday, to determine the winners. The ratio of entrants qualifying for Sunday's single elimination will be approximately 1 in 4. There will be a special "2nd Chance" Tournament on Sunday for those players not qualifying for Sunday's Finals. An "Early Bird" Tournament on Friday evening beginning at 7:30 P.M. is also scheduled in the main tournament room.

The entry fee is \$37.00 (includes lunch on Saturday) and must accompany the entry form. All entries must be sent on the form attached below, or a photocopy of the form. ONLY ONE NAME PER ENTRY BLANK! Any entry received without the properly filled form will be returned. All entries must be received by January 24, 1984. To eliminate having to play a spouse or a friend, the entries must be received in the same envelope. The committee cannot guarantee not having to play a friend or spouse, though every effort will be made to do so.

The prize list will be determined by the number of entries received. With 600 entries, first place will be \$3000.00 with 128 prizes awarded.

A special no smoking room has been reserved for people wishing to play the qualifying rounds on Saturday, in a no smoking atmosphere. If you wish to play in the no smoking room, check the box on the entry form. This room will only hold 120 people, and only the first 120 entries requesting the special room will be placed in the no smoking room.

Payback percentages for each of the entry fees will exceed 85% guaranteed.

The Paper Valley Hotel and Conference Center has blocked off 125 rooms for cribbage players for Friday and Saturday nights, February 3rd & 4th, 1984. Please use the enclosed reservation form to make your reservation, or call (in Wisconsin) toll free: 1-800-242-3499. You will receive a confirmation of your reservation from the hotel. The daily room rate at the Paper Valley Hotel is \$64.00, but they have agreed to lower the rate to only \$42.00 per night for the cribbage players. This is the lowest rate they have offered to any group since the hotel opened! And wait 'till you see the nice rooms! There is a small \$5.00 per person charge for each person over two staying in the same room. When sending in or calling for reservations, you must state that you are coming for the Cribbage Tournament, or you will be charged the \$64 rate. Make sure to fill in all of the blanks on the reservation form to insure the \$42.00 charge.

Don't wait to mail your entry! 600 entries is the limit. All entries received after the first 600 will be returned. There will be an additional entry fee for late entries.



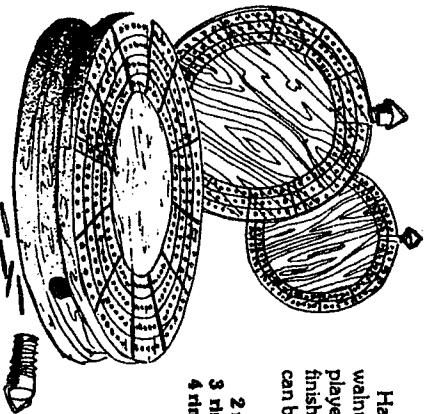

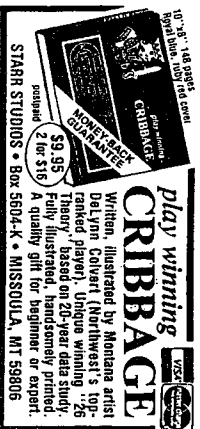
