

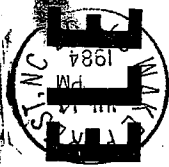

MONTANA OPEN CRIBBAGE TOURNAMENT
APRIL 28-29, 1984 MISSOULA, MT

Tournament director DeLynn Colvert reported all went well at this first-time effort in Missoula. He welcomed 84 contestants from 5 states to the main event on Saturday and 30 "die-hards" to the consolation tournament on Sunday.

First place was captured by Charlie Clark of Missoula over fellow-Missoulan John Hill. Bill Dunn from Prineville, OR took third with Jean Jackson, Helena, MT coming in fourth. The consolation victor was Burton Bertsch of Missoula. Second place went to Larry Timm of Baker, OR. Kingsley Rush also of Missoula and Pat Sharp from Spokane, WA were third and fourth.

George Johnson of Missoula was dealt and played a "28" hand.

RHODE ISLAND CRIBBAGE OPEN
APRIL 29, 1984 WARWICK, RI

The Valley Country Club was chosen by director John Chambers to host this third annual event attended by 128 vigorous competitors representing 5 states. He felt that everyone had an even more enjoyable time than in the past.

Certainly Harry Palmer of W. Springfield, MA would agree as he won first place over Al Lefebvre of Warwick, RI. Coming in third was Joe Seigle from Mansfield Depot, CT followed by Bob Schlifer of Springfield, MA.

The consolation tournament attracted 72 players and was won by John Marshall of North Providence, RI. A "28" hand was held and played by Ed Weber of Warwick.

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP CRIBBAGE TOURNAMENT
MAY 5, 1984 QUINCY, CA

The Plumas County Fairgrounds was the site of the 13th annual WCCT event, the longest running tournament in the world. This years winner, Kaley Erickson, a Quincy resident, took advantage of a second chance for the title. In 1977 he played his way into the finals only to suffer an ignominious defeat by mistakenly pegging backwards in the the playoff match. This year he correctly pegged his way to victory over Jerry Olsen of Sparks, NV. Gene Norman also of Quincy tied Jack Nelson of Fountain Valley, CA for 3rd place.

In addition to providing an exciting day of competition for 334 cribbage enthusiasts from 12 states, this event provided \$5,500 to the charities of the Quincy Rotary Club. Ev Bey of the ACC and Rich DeMars represented the Rotary Club are to be commended for their efforts in handling this large tournament.

Gene Baumann of San Bruno, CA and Mike Smith of Quincy, CA each held and played "28" hands.

WORLD MASTERS' CRIBBAGE CLASSIC
MAY 19-20, 1984 MT.HOREB, WI

Co-directors Charlie Steinhauer and Joe Wergin were delighted to have their tournament officially opened on Saturday morning by Wisconsin Governor Anthony Earl. After welcoming the 164 participants, Gov. Earl, an eager cribbage enthusiast himself, sat down and played several games before he had to leave. The remaining competitors representing 7 states played 21 games to determine the qualifiers for the "one-on one" playoffs on Sunday.

Battling head to head through 42 qualifiers, Don Rhode of Marinette, WI emerged victorious over Joe Bernard of Libertyville, IL. Another Illinoisan, Jim Fabian of Naperville was third over Russel Beisenstein of Colgate, WI.

Sunday brought 94 players together for the consolation event. It was won by Tom Gleason of Milwaukee, WI defeating Gaylord Matti of Madison, WI. Third place went to Leo Lawrence from West Allis, WI and fourth went to Earl Henze of Rushford, MN.

Six "28" hands were recorded at this event. Five were held by Badgers: Michael Barrett, Wisc. Rapids; Diane Harvey, Sturtevant; Don Helt, Waunakee; Bob Julian, Milwaukee; Leo Lawrence, West Allis and the sixth by Viking Joan Rein of Carver, MN.

Every participant in the tournament received a certificate signed by Governor Earl commemorating the occasion. Charlie and Joe continue to make the Masters a memorable and outstanding event. Our compliments to the Karakuhl Inn for their fine service and their excellent facility. Plans are underway for next years Masters Classic and your comments are solicited by the committee.

MAY 20, 1984 NORTH WINDHAM, CT

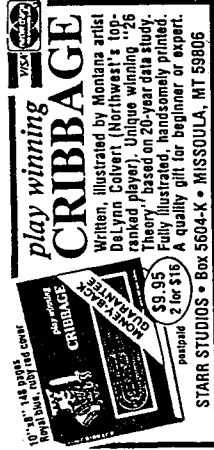

Only one 28 hand was registered in the 2 day event. The lucky man was Jack DaRosa from Lincoln, RI.

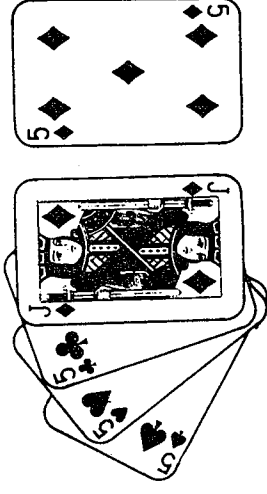
IT HAPPENED AGAIN!!!-ANOTHER "29" HAND

ILLINOIS STATE CHAMPIONSHIP



The fourth annual Illinois Cribbage Championship will be held on the 25th and 26th of August, 1984 at the Ramada O'Hare Inn in Rosemont, Illinois. The tournament is open to anyone 18 years of age and older. This tournament is sanctioned by the American Cribbage Congress and national rating points will be awarded.

Registration begins at 7:00 A.M. Saturday. Orientation and presentation of rules with a question and answer period at 8:00 A.M. The tournament begins promptly at 9:00 A.M. All players play 2 games against 11 opponents on Saturday. Qualifiers from Saturday's round play in single elimination, best of 5, on Sunday, to determine the tournament winners. The number of qualifiers for Sunday's finals will not exceed 64, and is determined by the number of entries.

The entry fee for non-A.C.C. members is \$36.00 and \$31.00 for members. Checks received without the properly filled form will be returned.

There will be an optional 'Q' pool for Saturday's qualifying round. The 'Q' pool prizes will be graduated. There will be a consolation tournament on Sunday for those players who do not qualify for the finals. Entry fee is \$15.00 including \$5.00 toward a 'Q' pool on Sunday with the same graduated prizes.

The committee will do its best to keep expenses down and guarantee at least 90% return of the entry fees in the championship tournament, as well as all 'Q' pools.

The Ramada O'Hare has set aside a block of rooms at reduced rates of \$40.00 per night, double occupancy. **If reservations are made by phone, you must mention that you are attending the Illinois Cribbage Tournament.** Toll-free reservations call 1(800) 228-2828.

The Ramada Inn has easy access from all tollways and courtesy buses from O'Hare Field every 15 minutes. The hotel offers restaurants, swimming pools, tennis, and free golf on their lighted golf course.

There will be a Friday Night Earlybird starting at 7:30 P.M. and a Saturday Special at 8:00 P.M.

Morning coffee and rolls will be available. Special luncheons have also been arranged for both days.

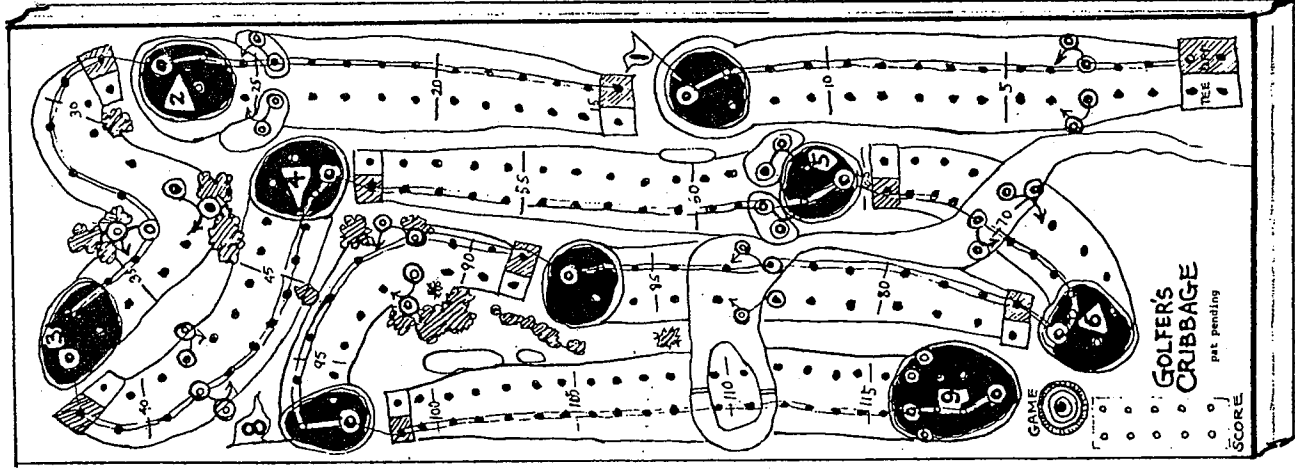
