RALEIGH & THE NAT'L OPEN

It was at the National Open in July of 1979 that the American Cribbage Congress had its genesis. Sitting around a breakfast table on Monday, August 6, 1979, at the 6th Annual National Open was a group of about 10 players from various parts of the country who thought it might be a good idea to form a national organization to promote and engender the great game of cribbage. Among those in the group were Jim Arplaster of Kissimmee, Florida; Dick Graham of Denver, Colorado; Tom Miller of St. Louis, Missouri; Bill Campbell of Andrews AFB, Maryland; Nick Pond of Raleigh; Arnold Crews of Jacksonville, Florida; and Joe Wergin of Madison, Wisconsin. In less than six months after that meeting, the ACC was geared up and operating. For you history buffs in the ACC, the first formal meeting of the ACC Executive Committee was held on January 11, 1980, in the board room of the U.S. Playing Card Company in Cincinnati, Ohio.

The ACC's Annual Meeting is held in Raleigh on the Friday before the National Open begins. This year's Annual Meeting will be held at 11 a.m., Friday, August 7, at the North Raleigh Hilton. Though it's difficult to predict, ACC President Joe Wergin believes there's a good chance that all 32 officers and members of the ACC Board will be present for the meeting on the seventh.

There are many members of the ACC who for one reason or another have never attended the National Open. CRIBBAGE WORLD urges all of its readers to give serious consideration to attending this year. In this connection, if you're not on the National Open's mailing list, please contact National Open Tournament Director Nick Pond, and he'll provide you with all the information you need to consider about going to Raleigh this year. The 14th Annual National Open Cribbage Tournament, to be played at the North Raleigh Hilton & Towers in Raleigh, North Carolina, August 8-10, is expected to draw a national field in excess of 350 players and will be awarding somewhere in the neighborhood of \$30,000 in prize money in the various competitions.

In the 13th Annual National Open last July, a total of \$24,987 was awarded to the winning contestants who emerged from a field of 342 players.

The event is co-sponsored annually by Capital Broadcasting Company (WRAL-TV & WRAL-FM) in Raleigh and the U.S. Playing Card Company in Cincinnati, Ohio. The Tournament Grand Patron is

Budweiser Beer.

This year's Championship Tournament purse will be augmented with \$4,000 added (\$3,000 from Capitol Broadcasting Company and \$1,000 by Budweiser). The Tournament is unique in the United States in that it is a double-elimination tournament, making it the largest such formatted event of any type in the country. Head-to-head matches in each round consist of the best four-of-seven games, and a player must lose two matches before being eliminated.

The defending champion of the National Open is Tom Salyards of Mundelein, Illinois. Other defending champions in vari-

ous competitions held at the National Open are Jim Arblaster of Kissimmee, Florida; Buster Forbes of Raleigh; and Art Boulette of Surfside, Florida.

Last year's field of 342 players represented 32 states and 2 Canadian provinces. Since its inception in July 1974, the National Open has awarded a total of \$128,507, making it by far the highest-paying cribbage tournament in the United States.

One thing CRIBBAGE WORLD will promise any ACC member who attends the National Open--you'll play a lot of cribbage for a lot of prize money, and you'll have one whale of a time.

PRESIDENTS' COLUMN

Joseph Petrus Wergin

GRASS ROOTS: REFLECTION, THE PRESENT AND FUTURE

For some time I have been wanting to correspond with all you dedicated officials of the Grass Roots Program as well as the Congress itself.

RAPID GROWTH: We started with five clubs back in the first year, 1985. Last year we had about 20 active clubs, and now we have more than doubled that figure. We don't dare to speculate on the number that will be playing by December.

KEEPING RECORDS: Right from the start I tried to keep records and reports to a minimum for both the local director and for headquarters. We had complaints that the smaller clubs could not compete on an even basis with the larger ones on the Rating Charts. In order to give the members of the small groups a chance to receive national rating, we added the "Rating averages" or winning percentages last fall. That brought more work for everyone.

INNOVATIONS: The Commissioner and I are studying suggestions from the membership to add other items that will be interesting to everyone. Some ideas have to do with further records and charts, while others are suggestions on the relationship of guests to a program. All suggestions will be given great consideration, with the view of adopting plans of great merit.

REPORTS FROM HEADQUARTERS: When there were 20 clubs, I found some time to prepare the Rating Chart and to edit some sidelights and happenings around the circuit. Some days I sat at the typewriter about 10 hours putting this material in print. But with 46 clubs, the Commissioner is swamped with work, and the reports of Rating Points and now Winning Percentages make it impossible to make mailings of the standings every two or three weeks. Furthermore, he absolutely has no time for "Grass Root Sidelights," which I always liked to put out.

REPORTS FROM LOCAL DIRECTORS: I can't understand it, but there are a few

directors who like to make the reports their own way. Headquarters must do a new report and then write a letter to the individual asking for compliance with the form. One director does not use the Individual Rating Card that such records should be kept on; we copied the form from the bowling leagues. During the summer we shall prepare a new chart for Rating Points and reduce the number of decimals. We shall do all we can to make your computations and reports easier. We have one big request--let's all play on "the same sheet of music."

LOCAL REPORTS TO THE MEMBERSHIP: The life of your club is the interest in the standings. Post the results of the previous week's tournament on the wall along with the accumulated totals of the "Top Ten" and/or "Sweet Sixteen." This is a must! It adds interest to your club and keeps people coming to earn their way up in the standings. Of course, reports and other items of interest should be posted. A director who throws the reports on a table for members to search out is not doing the job right. You may delegate the work to someone else.

VOLUNTEER TIME: You have my sympathy when some member of your club gets on your back and heaps a bunch of criticism on you. You are trying to do your best to give each and every one of your people a good place to play in, good cards to use, tables and chairs, and competition with the rest of the country. You are a VOLUNTEER. You are doing a great service. I am assured by Jerry Dickison, the National Grass Roots Commissioner I appointed last fall, that he will devote as much volunteer time as he can spare to our program. He is willing to consider the views of Grass Roots players everywhere, as long as they are presented as "Comments and Suggestions" rather than "Demands"; he hastened to add that the need for this stipulation applies only to several "advisors." We shall need some volunteers to assemble, correct, and forward to Dickinson come the new season.

ACC NOMINATING COMMITTEE FOR OFFICERS

Those who are members of the ACC Board of Directors are eligible to be elected by the Board to one of the four officer positions: President; Executive Vice President; Vice President for Operations; and Vice President for Policy.

The election of officers is slated to be conducted at the annual meeting of the Board on August 7 in Raleigh, North Carolina, in conjunction with the 14th Annual National Open Cribbage Tournament.

Those Directors of the 1987-88 Board who are interested in running for one of the four positions mentioned above are asked to write to the Chairman of the Election Committee, Jim Arblaster, P.O. Box 565, Kissimmee, FL 32741. The cutoff date for the arrival of these letters is July 24 at 1 p.m. The cutoff date will allow the members of the Election Committee to seek candidates in the event a state of nominees is not filled by volunteers.

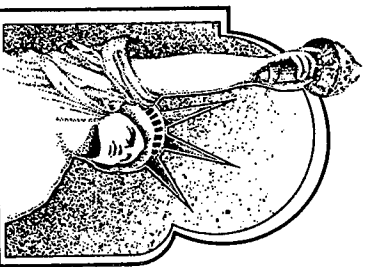
RULE CHANGES

In accordance with page 3 of the Minutes of the January 29, 1987, meeting of the Board of Directors, I have compiled the rule changes that, to the best of my knowledge, have been approved by the Board. (Ed. Note: included elsewhere in this issue.) Before compiling these, I requested and received some input from Bob Madsen, Joe Seigle, Ken Campbell, and Syl Lulinski. While the input varied substantially, I found no reason not to use the copy of the Minutes of the July 26, 1985, Board meeting (supplied by Bob Madsen) as the sole record of approved changes. The Board was working from two lists submitted by Ken Campbell. I had commented on these lists in the version distributed on July 1. Eight of the approved changes were from Kent's List 1, which had received the unanimous approval of the Rules Committee; three were from List 2, which received less than unanimous approval of the committee.

RULE CHANGES APPROVED BY BOARD OF DIRECTORS

RULE III Section 2 subsection b is replaced with the following:

"b. If both players cut a card of equal rank, the entire pack shall be reshuffled and they shall cut again."

RULE V Section 1 subsection d is replaced with the following:

"d. Cards placed in the crib, except for the situation in b above, may not be picked up again. The penalty for this violation is two points."

RULE VII Section 1 title is replaced with the following:

"The Order of Play"

RULE VII Section 2 subsection c is deleted and subsection d becomes subsection c.

RULE VIII Section 9 add new subsection c as follows:

"c. If a player scores his points by mistakenly moving his opponent's peg in the wrong direction, the peg shall be returned to its proper hole and the nonoffender shall score two penalty points (Section 7a, above). The offending player forfeits the points of the play, Hand, or Crib in question."

RULE VIII, add new Section 10 as follows:

"Section 10. Recording Score in Opponent's Track

If a player records his score but inadvertently places his peg in opponent's track, it shall be moved to the proper track without penalty."

RULE IX Section 4 subsection c is replaced with the following:

"c. If the pone commits the offense, he is penalized two points and the dealer is permitted to retrieve his Crib and count and score its contents. If there is disagreement on the cards, summon a Judge:

- (1) The Judge shall assist in the reconstruction of the Hands by recounting and scoring them in an attempt to determine which cards were placed in the Crib.
- (2) The cards which the players recall shall be retrieved, the Judge shall shuffle the remaining stock and cut out the number of cards required to constitute a full Crib."

RULE X Section 1 is replaced with the following:

"Section 1. When in Effect

- a. Muggins is the only optional rule.
- b. Officials in charge of tournaments, leagues, or other forms of organized play shall announce, prior to beginning play, whether or not the Muggins variation is in effect."

RULE X Section 3, add new subsection c as follows:

"c. Failure to peg the holes, including the Game Hole, when claiming the game."

RULE XI Section 1 subsection a is replaced with the following:

"a. Penalties are scored by the opponent of the offending player in every instance, except for the 15-point backward penalty as provided by RULE VIII Section 5 subsection a(2)."

RULE XIII is replaced with the following:

"RULE XIII. AMENDMENTS

Recommendations for amendments to these rules shall be submitted in writing to the Standing Rules Committee which will discuss, prepare, and present all rules amendments to the Board of Directors for final approval."

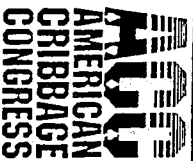
