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## "Jungle Queen" Awards Ceremony Huge Success Joy Barnes Wins Grand National Ray Meade Takes Consolation

Joy Barnes, a fine pegger from DeLand, FL, didn't let a boat ride up the New River in Fort Lauderdale distract her pegging ability...and she came up roses in the 10th Annual Grand National. Her final match was a 4-2 win over veteran pegger Rex Paddock, Missoula, MT in this 216-pegger event.

Both Joy and Rex, with this fine showing, have thrown their "hat" into the ring in the 1992 Master Point race. Rex won a consolation event in Oregon three weeks ago, and is one of this year's front runners in the MRP race.

Neil Friets, Master pegger from Keene, NH, came close, and finished third. An unusual playoff format caused him grief, as the final four played 4 of 7 with skunks counting two games. Neal won two games in the final four playoff, but, alas, was skunked twice and had to settle for third. Al Tenenbaum, a fine pegger from Cranbury, NJ took fourth.

Richard Horvath, Milwaukee, WI, had the hot hand in the qualifying round, finishing with 41 GP's.

Ray Meade, a veteran player from the northwest won going away in the 148-pegger consolation. Ray hails from Las Vegas. Ray didn't have easy pickings, as he had to get by Larry Samei, a Master pegger from Wellesley Hills, MA. Lucinda Johnson wasn't very far from home (Sarasota) and finished a very fine 3rd. Another Floridian, Danny Fournier (Orlando) took 4th.

The two Friday early birds were captured by Master pegger Luis Lizarribar, Balwin, MO, and the "hi-roller" was won by Pierre Dagenais, Sarasota FL.

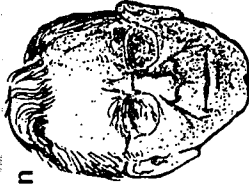

### Grass Roots Rises to a Higher Level With Awards Program

The Grass Roots Commissioner, Jerry Dickin-son, has announced that an Awards Program has been approved and players who have reached certain plateaus will receive valuable gifts. Joe Ramos, Statistician Region IX, has spent months updating everyone's record of winning since Day One of 1983 when Grass Roots was an experimental project of President Joe Wergin.

All rating points of the old system has been converted to the new system which was adopted last year. The present system has eliminated the number of participants as a factor in computing points. In order not to be confused with Master Points of major tournaments, the Grass Rooters will be classified as Gold, Silver, and Bronze.

It was Ramo's idea of an Awards Program and some of the awards may have a value of \$200. The primary financing of the program will come from the Roots Benefit Tournament which was concluded on June 30th.

This scribe predicts that the Awards Program will stimulate more regular attendance at local clubs and an immediate rush to form new clubs. Dickinson reports that as of August 1st there were 145 clubs chartered. The program started in 1983 with five clubs.

A brochure describing the Awards Program and other pertinent information will be distributed to all Rooters and interested individuals.

### Membership Drive

Phil Babcock has joined the Public Relations team. Phil hails from Alexandria, VA, and he has suggested a plan of advertising the Congress extensively.

When asked what he had in mind, Phil said: "There are 32 million subscribers to a certain retirees' magazine. They are all over 50 years of age and this group is the largest in the country with time and spendable dollars."

Phil went on to say that the Congress' advertising has been limited all these years. Babcock stated that the cost of an ad is about a dollar a player based on our present membership and that the ad considered is 2 1/2 x 1 inch for one issue.

The Public Relations Committee is studying ways in which a large influx of members may be handled by our present machinery. This is food for thought...it certainly merits discussion.

Paul Petit won the 198-pegger Rhode Island Open last May 26...and lightning has struck twice! Paul nailed the huge 218-pegger Massachusetts Open September 15 to add to his laurels. And with the 220 Master Points, Paul is off and winging in the new 1992 season!

Bob Drukman, a fine pegger from Easton, MA, finished 2nd, and garnered 207 MRP's...almost half as many as his 1991 total of 468. Neil Matheson, Fairhaven, MA finished 3rd, and Ken Vetterline, Saco, ME is off to another great season with a 4th place finish (Ken finished 11th in the Eastern Region in 1991 with 589 MRP's).

Jim McDonald, Monson, MA, took top honors in the qualifying round, picking up 73 MRP's.

134 peggers stuck around to play the consolation...and veteran pegger Paul Gallagher, a fine pegger from Avon, MA won going away, topping another fine pegger, Tony Del Tufo, Bridgewater, MA in the final playoff match. Elaine Thieme, Tewksbury, MA took 3rd, and Joe Murdock, Highbridge, NJ finished 4th.

Tournament Director Edward Donahue handled the large crowd in fine fashion...and the players donated \$300 to the K of C Children's Fund.

138 peggers gathered in the shadows of Blue Mountain in LaGrande, Oregon September 6, 7, and 8, and when the pegs were laid away, George Rasmussen, veteran pegger from Estacada, OR, came away the winner.

Ron Morgan, Quincy, CA, made the long trek north, finishing a strong 2nd, edging out two other veteran northwest peggers...Al Grantz, Kelso, WA (3rd), and I. V. Graham, Libby, MT (4th).

Portland pegger Charles Vance had the hot hand in the qualifying round with a high 34 16 +226 in the 20-game round.

The 108-pegger consolation found Montana Championship co-director Rex Paddock bringing home the bacon (and a nice trophy). Rex edged out Merl Mulkey, Keizer, OR (2nd), Bayard Literas, Coeur D'Alene, ID (3rd), and Jim Sime, Kennewick, WA (4th).

The early-bird doubles event was won by the tough duo of Betty Johnson, Spokane, WA, and Bill Becker, Bend, OR. The Saturday night event was won by Willie Evans, Richland, WA.

Once again, Ron Lesley ran an excellent tournament, with fair paybacks. Ron is the "extra" man at his tournaments...and was unlucky as the field was "even," and he did not play in the main event or the consolation.

## **Grand Master McManus Wins Wisconsin Dells Classic**

The cream rose to the top at the recent Wisconsin Dells Classic as Grand Master Jim McManus, Milwaukee, WI bested the field of 138 peggers. Jim has been on a hot streak lately, as he won the Northern Illinois Open in his last outing! Another fine pegger, John Syftinstructor, Mt. Horeb, WI took 2nd. Tournament director Patrick Barrett not only placed third, but earned the 95th Master Rating awarded by the ACC as a bonus. Veteran Tubby Dahl, Blair, WI finished 4th.

In the 82-pegger consolation, rookie Peter Ellenz, Chanhassen, MN took home the marbles, edging Jay Eggleston, Wessington, SD for the title. By winning this event, Ellenz qualifies for next year's Tournament of Champions (played in early 1993)...a rare feat to qualify in your FIRST sanctioned event (anyone winning a consolation event of 40 or more players qualifies).

Director Barrett played a "Super Q" event inaugurated by Yankton's Scott Kooistra last summer (combined Friday night game, Main event, and Saturday night game) and the combined 42 game event was won by Grand Master Joe Bernard, Libertyville, Ill. Joe won 30 of 42 with 6 skunks.

Other winners: Fri. singles, Dave Gustafson, Minnetonka, MN. Fri. doubles, Bonnie Jennie, Chaska, MN, teamed with Lew Foss, Minneapolis. Sat. singles, Jerry Dickenson, Mt. Horeb, WI. Sat. doubles: Marsha Mahan, Appleton, WI, teamed with Charles Parker, White Bear Lake, MN. Last Gasp, Roberta Schweig, Carpentersville, IL.

Top qualifier in the main event was Master player Bill Christofferson, DeForest, WI. Bill posted a fine 39 18 +308.

Nicky Kniech, Bonnie Jennie, and Dorothy Schroeder all scored 28-hands. Dorothy waited until the "Last Gasp" to score her gem.

Minutes of January meeting approved after three minor changes.

The Treasurer's report and budget were reviewed, with minor corrections, and approved.

Membership dues modified to \$8/couple (\$7 single) to help gain approval for 2nd class mailing permit. Carried unanimously.

Jeff Monroe reports 700 rule books on hand (about a year's supply).

Ron Hamilton discussed Tournament Guidelines and Regulations. Motion to publish distribution of entry fees on tournament flyers defeated 13 to 12. Motion carried 17-6 to list player benefits vs. expenses in Cribbage World.

Scott Kooistra reported All-Star Team contest set aside for lack of interest.

Fred McGibney moved Cribadier General Funds to remain in hands of Dave Proctor, with at least one yearly report forwarded to Treasurer.

Dave Proctor reported on the Cribadier General and Junior Program. Proposal for promotional program for Junior Tournaments tabled until September meeting.

Nick Pond reported the National Open is now a non-profit corporation, sponsored by US Playing Card Co. and the North Raleigh Hilton.

Harry Stoops reported the 1991 Grand National moving along smoothly.

Many minor rule changes discussed. Some passed, some shelved (returned to committee). Rule changes to be inserted in Cribbage World from camera copy prepared for new rule books.

Jerry Dickinson and Joe Ramos discussed the Grass Roots Program.

DeLynn Colvert proposed a "member" bumper sticker be produced for our ACC membership. Approved for design. Plans for distribution will be discussed at next BOD meeting.

Executive Vice President Bob McCabe extended a "thank you" for all Board members leaving the Board.

## Husband/Wife Combos Have Cribbage Fever

Six husband-wife combos have hit the cribbage trail with a vengeance...with both parties scoring in the top 50 in their regions (1991 cribbage year).

In the Central Region, four couples have scored well in the 1991 cribbage year. Eugene and Aggie Mikulsky, Sobieski, WI, knocked 'em dead, scoring 666 MRP's and 579 MRP's. ## Tournament of Champions: Invitation Criteria

There are 12 ways to earn an invitation to the Tournament of Champions (played annually in Reno in late January). They are:

1-Must be a member of the American Cribbage Congress.

2-Top 50 from each region each of last three seasons.

3-All individuals who earned at least as many points as the lowest point total of the 50th player in any region from last season.

4-Top 100 of lifetime accumulated master point standings.

5-Top 16 finishers from last season's Tournament of Champions.

6-All winners of main tournaments last season (sanctioned).

7-All winners of a sanctioned consolation event last season (minimum: 40 players).

8-Top 10% from each of the Grass Roots divisions (from last season).

9-Top 10% from last season of the Rhode Island League.

10-Anyone who has received a Masters rating.

11-You must be 21 to play the TOC. Anyone qualifying prior to their 21st birthday must notify the director of the Tournament of Champions in order to be given a deferment for invitation for the appropriate year(s).

12-All members of the Board of Directors.
