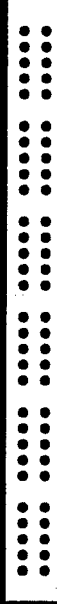

## AMERICAN CRIBBAGE CONGRESS

### *Unique Doubleheader Draws Large Crowds* **Morlock Tops Treasure Island Rein Breaks Ice at WI Dells**

With a controversial mid-week format, the recent Treasure Island Open in Red Wing, MN drew a sizeable 166 players in their inaugural event at the Treasure Island Casino/Hotel. The added prize money undoubtedly contributed to the numerous players on hand...and Elmer Morlock from nearby Minneapolis came away the winner. His winner's purse was a whopping \$2,700 and 196 MRP's. Minneapolis is also the home of Life Master Russell Adams, and he nailed down 2nd, a huge prize and 147 MRP's to add to his lofty lifetime total (nearing 9,000). Grand Master Aggie Mikulsky (WI) and local Patricia Smith finished 3-4 and were also well-rewarded for this effort.

Minnesota Arnold Groskreutz posted 18 wins in the 22-game qualifying round to take honors (38 18 +219).

Marlon Jones (IA) posted 4 skunks in the 9-game Consolation qualifying round to take honors (16 6/9 +74), but it was Al Gunderson (MN) coming home the winner in the playoffs. Jones finished 2nd (and took home an aggregate 60 MRP's). Master Gloria McLeod (MN) and Mike Moyer (IA) finished 3-4.

Director Jerry Gruber had two matches to welcome the players on Wednesday, and the 7-game welcoming match saw three grand slams scored: Sherry Slife (WI) 15 7/7 +150; Brad Bartholomew

(MN) 15 7/7 +115; and Vern Ness (MN) 14 7/7 +106. Wednesday night the action picked up as 124 players played this early bird and Grand Master Joan Rein (MN) smoked the field with a great 20 9/9 +191. Local Bruce Smith came close with another grand slam 19 9/9 +189, but had to settle for 2nd.

According to director Gruber this was a very successful event, considering the mid-week format. He estimated that some 50 new players were on hand, with 25 joining the ACC. The casino contributed \$6,000 added prize money, making the Main Event payoff a whopping 150%. Gruber is considering this mid-week doubleheader format in conjunction with next year's Grand National in Eau Claire, WI. He invites our ACC membership to make their wishes known to their Regional BOD Directors, pro or con.

**Rein Tops Wisconsin Dells**  
Grand Master Jim Rein, Carver, MN, has had many top finishes over the years, but a Main Event win has eluded him...until he broke the ice at the Wisconsin Dells Classic on October 17. His victory came the hard way, being down 0-2 in the best 3 of 5 match, to Master Jerry Fischer (WI). With three

straight wins, Rein came home the winner, picking up a sizeable purse, 196 MRP's, and bragging rights. His lifetime totals have him knocking on the door for his Life Master rating (5,900+).

Fischer's 2nd place finish added some 147 MRP's as he, too, continues to pile up the MRP's.

Life Master Roger Wilson (CO) snapped a lengthy cold spell by knocking down 3-4, winning the All Events with a great 67 GP's (in the 40-game format), and scoring well all weekend. His good fortune continued on his flight home, getting bumped and taking a \$400 voucher for use at a later time. Green Bay's Al Karr tied for the 3-4 spot, and this pair each took home 105 MRP's.

The hot hand in the qualifying round belonged to Cyril Schmidt (WI), winning 17 of 22 (37 17 +307).

Bob Jackson was a long way from his Pennsylvania home, but it paid off with a Consolation win (118 players). The win also gave Jackson an invite to the upcoming Tournament of Champions. Joy Shimp (IN) came close in taking home 2nd. Master John Syftestad (WI) and Bob Brown (WI) finished 3-4.

Dauph Plummer (AK) has been terrorizing the Northwest on his latest sojourn from Alaska, and this time around came home 2nd. Sherri Albrecht (WA) and newly-crowned Grand Master Todd Malmgren (OR) finished 3-4.

Tom Markham (WA) recently rolled over the 2,000 MRP mark and Master. He continues to pile up the points by taking qualifying honors with a nice 37 17/22 +236.

79 peggers played the Consolation and Master George Mackie (WA) took home the top prize, followed by Canadian Harold Buckley (Master), local Bob Wikstrom, and Master Donna Hassett (OR) in 2-3-4.

## ***It's Miller Time!*** **Al Miller Wins Two**

### **Massachusetts Open, Sept. 26**

Al Miller, a Life Master from Nashua, NH is on an unprecedented roll! He won back-to-back events in New England in late September and early October. His first win came at the 108-player Massachusetts Open, with the final four all highly-ranked ACC players. Miller came out the winner with the streaking Paul Gallagher (MA) taking 2nd. One-Star Harry Palmer (MA) and Life Master George Bickford took home 3-4. Bickford also had the top qualifying score...a very nice 24 10/12 +235.

62 players stayed for the Consolation and Mike Azevedo (MA) took home the marbles, followed by Mary Agee (MA), Life Master David Clemmey (MA) and Wayne Hittle (MA) in 2-3-4. Edward Ciccone (MA) won 6 of 7 to take qualifying honors.

In his march to the title, Miller had help from Life Master George Webb in the 5-8 round. He allowed Miller to claim the game by mixing the cards together after viewing a 5-6-7-7 (3 cut). Miller had pegged 3-points, needing 16 to win!

Director David Clemmey, once again, reported this event with a neat, well typed report.

### **New Hampshire Open, Oct. 3**

Al Miller, once again, came home the winner in the huge 138-player New Hampshire Open. In winning back-to-back events, Miller scored a whopping 378 MRP's, vaulting him into the thick of the annual national MRP race. Miller edged David Statz (NH) in the final playoff match to continue his winning streak. Grand Master Lee Norris (RI) and Life Master Larry Samet (MA) took home 3-4. Life Master Bill Mederos (MA) nailed 24 GP's (12 games) to earn qualifying honors.

Wendell Woodard (NH) won the 80-player Consolation, with Frank Cummings (MA), Grand Master Neil Frieis (NH) and Fred Pierce (ME) in 2-3-4.

Director Al Miller reported two 28-hands showed: Carol Nadell and Pat Llewellyn.

## Tournament Directors, Do it Right!

Roy Hofbauer, our Western Region Tournament Commissioner, reports that many tournament directors are getting very lax in reporting their event. He asks that directors be very careful in noting the qualifying round scores for the top 1/8. Game Points are critical insofar as accurate posting of MRP's are concerned. Also, he asks that care be given in spelling names, making sure they are all legible. And, of course, timely reporting is essential to keep the ACC humming smoothly.
