Play smart, play fair, play fast-but mostly play nice

I started publishing the ACC's membership tally in the August 2011 *Cribbage World*. This feature floated around for a few months but in the December issue it found a permanent home on page 5 of every issue. The first published number was 6,641, and our membership now stands at 6,142—a loss of 499 members in nearly seven years.

Play with passion

While losing six members a month on average is not terrible, it is atrocious when you consider that we are playing the world's greatest card game.

This problem reminds me of a piece of dialog in the 2016 hit movie *La La Land*, where two jazz aficionados are discussing the impending demise of their beloved genre. Jazz great **John Legend** (in his role as Keith) says to Sebastian Wilder, the character played by **Ryan Gosling**:

You say you wanna save jazz. How are you gonna save jazz if no one is listening? Jazz is dying because of people like you. You're playing to 90-year-olds at The Lighthouse [a Los Angeles jazz club]. Where are the kids? Where are the young people? You're so obsessed with Kenny Clarke and Thelonious Monk. These guys were revolutionaries. How are you going to be a revolutionary if you're such a traditionalist? You're holdin' on to the past, but jazz is about the future.

The ACC has the same problem: cribbage is played by a bunch of old folks (present company included). While I admire, applaud, and buttress the efforts of **Dan Zeisler** and **Don "Grumpy" Howard** to build our Youth Program, that program is geared toward the long view. In the meantime, we have to find ways to make cribbage great again in the immediate future.

One solution to stagnation and decline (in any endeavor) is variety. Toward that end, I am happy to announce a new *Cribbage World* column entitled "Variations on a Theme." This occasional column (see *continued on next page*

This hand occurred in North Conway NH against the very tricky opponent Lana Newhouse. I was dealing needing 4, and Lana needed 6 with her first count. I had a pretty cut and dried discard: hold 3-4-5-10 and discard Q-K. The cut card was a Queen. Lana led a 9 into my 3-4-5-10. Normally when my opponent is six pegs or fewer from going out, I will play full out offense, especially if I am within five, but how am I going to peg four on this hand with a 9 lead? If I break up my 3-4-5 combination the cause might be lost, so I play my 10. It is quite possible Lana will score three or four points on this play, but I have to keep myself open to the possibility of trapping a 5 or 6 on the next pegging sequence. Much to my chagrin, Lana played a 6 to make it 25. So now I have a 3, 4, or 5 to play. I'll give you a whole month to think about how to navigate these choppy pegging waters; the conclusion of this hand will appear next month.

page 22) will feature minor variations on the grand old game that you might try after you've memorized the values of all 12,994,800 distinct cribbage hands. These ideas are intended to be enjoyed at home or in a bar.

To provide some variety in sanctioned play, the BOD recently approved three modifications to consolations. See pages 18–19 for what you can expect next season.

Ruling Points ...

Last month we put out a call and have spoken to several judges about a unique mistake recently at a Grass Roots club. Here is the scenario that followed the turn of the starter card: the pone leads, the dealer plays a card, the pone plays a second card, the dealer grabs the starter card and plays it as one of his cards, the pone plays a card, the dealer starts to play a second card when the pone notices, saying, "Hey, isn't that the starter card you played?"

After consideration, the simplest solution seems to be rule 6.1c: the nonoffender picks two cards blindly from

the dealer's hand and chooses which will be the starter card, and there is a two-point penalty. We don't agree with the idea of rule 4.4 c seeming to apply, as there would be, in our opinion, too much incentive if a player had a bad hand to grab the starter card and stick it in their hand to enable a simple redeal. Fortunately, we have heard of this happening only once, so hopefully a specific rule covering it may not be necessary.

ACC Cribbage Code of Congeniality

During a new player's trial period (four weeks or until they earn points—whichever is longer) . . .

- We pledge to welcome new players warmly and make them feel wanted.
- We pledge to not penalize new players for violating tournament rules. (We will, instead, gently tell them what the rule is and what the penalty would be.)
- We pledge to not let new players underpeg points or undercount hands. (We will, instead, explain errors and then allow new players to take all points they are entitled to.)
- We pledge to not make new players feel inferior if/when they miss points or make a bad play. (We will, instead, let them know that all cribbage players do this and that it is part of the learning process.)
- We pledge to not force new players to play a game in fifteen minutes. (We will, instead, be tolerant and not complain, remembering that we, too, started slow.)
- We pledge to allow new players to play for free or at the minimum cost of club expenses.

After the trial period is up . . .

• We pledge to continue to make all players—new and existing—feel welcome and comfortable at our club.

CONSOLATION VARIATIONS

The Board of Directors has approved three variations to spice up consolations: (1) bad-beat scorecards, (2) minimum consy attendance, and (3) Consy Lite.

• The term "bad beat" entered common parlance from poker tournaments, and basically it means a strong hand that loses to an even stronger hand (for example, four Aces losing to a royal flush). Beginning on August 1, 2018, the ACC will pay \$100 to the two best consolation scorecards (one in eight-game consy and one in nine-game consy) that do *not* qualify for playoffs each cribbage season.

Eligible scorecards must be submitted to *Cribbage World* (cwed152@gmail.com) by the tournament director, who thereby certifies (a) that the scorecard was crosschecked according to ACC rules and (b) that the player did not qualify for playoffs. The frontrunners will be published in *Cribbage World* each month so that players will know what the target is.

This proposal was sponsored by David Aiken and passed on a 22–2 vote (one abstention).

2 The minimum attendance for a con-

solation to qualify as a sanctioned tournament was reduced from 17 players to 12 (the minimum for sanctioned mains remains 17). Given that each season we lose several consolations (see nearby table) because attendance did not reach 17 players, the BOD voted to lower the minimum to 12 players, effective August 1, 2018.

This proposal was sponsored by **Paul** Gregson and passed on a 20–5 vote.

€ The biggest change to the traditional consolation format is "Consy Lite" (see next page). This proposal was sponsored by **Paul Gregson** and passed on a 24–1 vote. It is effective on a one-year trial basis.

Between these three adjustments to the consolation format, the BOD hopes that both consy attendance and enjoyment will increase.

Don't Overthink!

Here is note from Master **Richard Hinrichs** (Redding CA): "I am pone out 12; the dealer is out 10. My best keep is 2-5-8-X, looking for a 5-cut and then peg 2. The cut is a 7, so it looks like I am toast. I lead my 2, and the dealer puts an 8 on it. Now I have a choice: play the 5 for 15-2 or pair the 8. If I stop and think, it will be obvious that I had this choice. So, I quickly play the 5. The dealer thinks and thinks and is obviously counting the loser cards. Finally the dealer plays an 8, which I pair for 31-4 and giving me enough to win the game! The dealer's hand was 6-7-8-8 so my 5 "scared away" the 6 or 7. And since I didn't hesitate when the dealer player an 8, it looked like I didn't have an 8 to consider!"

CONSY LITE - by Paul Gregson

In all forms of competition, organizations look for changes that inject excitement. Be it the wildcard round in baseball, moving back the extra point in football, or playing Canadian doubles cribbage, organizations always try new things, see how they are received, and keep the things that work well.

For the 2018–19 cribbage season (i.e., effective August 1), the ACC will be trialing a new consolation format at some one-day tournaments (tourneys where the main and consolation are played on the same day).

Originally proposed by ACC member Terry Cushman (Gray ME) on the ACC's Facebook group, this idea was refined and presented to the BOD by Paul Gregson (Antioch CA).

Rather than having a qualifying round followed by the playoffs, as is traditional, a one-day consolation may optionally use a playoff-only (lite) format, where all players signing up are placed directly into a single elimination (best two-of-three) bracket.

Why try something new? Several reasons:

- 1. The percentage of people who stay and play the consolation at one-day tournaments is declining.
- 2. Playing a second qualifying round after having just played a qualifying round can be a slog and may dissuade people from playing.
- 3.A playoff-only consolation lets new players experience playoff matches even if they don't qualify in the main.
- 4. It shortens a consolation and lets people get home more quickly, hopefully mak-

ing them more likely to stay and play in the first place.

One highlight of the new format is how players are placed into the bracket. Scores during main qualifying will determine byes in the consolation bracket, so if you just miss qualifying in the main you will likely be rewarded with a bye in the consolation. This incentivizes people to continue trying in a main even after it looks like they have been eliminated from contention.

Master Rating Points will be awarded for the Consy Lite format on a similar scale to regular consolations, just with slightly fewer points awarded as slightly fewer games are played. To earn MRPs you must reach the third round of the lite playoffs. Full details may be found at **cribbage.org/ about/consy_lite.asp**.

Since variety is the spice of life, CW will use this occasional column to introduce some variations to our grand old game. If you have a cribbage variation that you think the cribbage world should know about, send email to cwed152@gmail.com.

The two cribbage variants presented this month involve the cut card. Both of these variants follow all of the standard rules of cribbage—except one. In the first variant, after the six cards have been dealt but *before* you discard, turn the starter card. You'll probably find that knowing the starter card before you discard does not always influence how you hold the hand, but if it is your crib and you deal yourself 5-5-6-6-J-J, it's kind of a big deal to know if a 4 is going to cut!

In the second variant, submitted by **Jack Fiske** (Stayton OR), do not turn the starter card until the pegging is over. That is, you deal, discard, peg, and *only then* turn the starter card. Sometimes you'll be pleasantly surprised to learn that a four-point hand turned into twelve points!

As stated earlier, these variants are for entertainment only and should not be used in tournaments. But they can be used to spice up your cribbage life! CW

Youth Teaching Tip

It's one thing to teach a group of kids the great game of cribbage, it's another to get them hooked so they continue to play after taking your course. The best way to do this is end your class with a tournament in which everyone walks away feeling like a winner. Give raffle tickets for nobs, heels, and hands that earn 16 or more points. Have a prize for the last 24-hand recorded during qualifying play. This keeps the participants engaged regardless if they are winning games or have a string of pearls. Prizes can include decks of cards, gift cards, candy bars, dollar store goodies. I present trophy boards and/or certificates to the top finishers. A tournament can be as simple as a four-game event (six games is better), with the top two playing a championship match (two out of three games).
