The popular O'Connors received 102 first place votes which was more than triple the amount received by any other couple. They received votes from all over the country but the majority were from Massachusetts and NY.

There was a major recruiting effort in and around the Dedham area by the many cribbage friends of the honored couple. During the last two weeks in June over 80 new members were signed-up from the Bay State and just about every one a vote for the O'Connors.

What do we know about this O'Connor couple? Do they play cribbage? You better believe they do and so do their seven kids, that is correct, seven kids. Even the youngest won a trophy playing in a summer league. That was young Joe and he was only seven years old at the time. Eleven year old Marjorie also is the proud owner of a junior trophy.

Mom & Dad are no push-overs when it comes to playing Sir John Suckling's game. Big Tim won the New England Open earlier this year and he has collected twice in the National Open in the last three years. Patricia had a second place in the Marshfield Classic back in 1977 and she and Tim won the doubles that same year.

The O'Connors are very active in the Marshfield Cribbage Association where they have

leagues and tournaments coming out the ears. They even fly a special crib-flag when crib-bage events are in session. At the end of the season they sponsor and take part in a cribbage parade in the downtown streets honoring the Association champions. Tim has been asked to chair the committee which will set up our Junior Program. It was the third and final game of what was billed as the Bicentennial Higgins Beach Independence Day Cribbage Classic. My dad, Bob Gribbin and his partner Bill Mooradian were the dealers, but were 20 points away from the finish line. They seemed to have a very slim, if any chance to take this game and the title that went with it. The opponents Pat Sesto & Bill Burke were only eight points away and had first count.

After most of the cards had been played, my father's team needed 15 points as my father was about to lead. He had two cards and each of the other players had one. He led a three, followed by Burke's seven, to make the count 10. Partner Mooradian then paired the seven for two points, making the count 17. Sesto came in with the third seven, making it 24 for six points. This put the opponents in the deadhole and apparently ensured them the 1976 championship.

My father had the last card and his team was 13 points away from victory. Of course it was a seven, making it 31 for 14 points and the championship of Higgins Beach.

Somehow, it does not seem as exciting as I read it in this letter, but at the time, with everyone crowded around for the last hand of the last game, it was spectacular.

This will take place sometime in February 1981. A special trophy, the Sir John Suckling Cup, will be awarded to the winning team. The Three Oaks Pub team is headed by Roy Bentley, a sports writer for the London Sun. The Orlando Elks team will be led by Jim Hodgskin who was recently elected vice president of the Florida Cribbage Association.

AWARDS PROGRAM - We received several letters, seven to be exact, pertaining to the awards program. That's the most mail received on any subject since we started the newsletter. Anyway, the writers sounded rather excited about the program. They liked the idea of a plaque "BEST in U.S.A" and where the next nine best players will be awarded "TOP TEN" framed certificates. They asked that the system get off the drawing board and into the program for the coming crib-year 1980-81. They all agreed the program, as a whole, was quite generous.

DIFFERENT GAME - The English, at least in most parts of England, while playing head to head games, deal out five cards to each player with the next two cards being dealt to the crib. Each player then discards one card to the crib. Chances of a 29 hand in jolly ol England are much greater than the odds of 649,740 to 1 in the U.S.A...

POT FOR THE 29 HAND - Ralph Wood of Ft Knox, Kentucky writes that at the National Open tourney there should be a 29 hand committee of two or three players. He thinks every participant would gladly put up \$1.00 in a special pot for the 29 hand. If no one gets it this year, add another \$256.00 next year. The committee would have to bank the money between tournaments. It could add up to a tidy sum for some lucky player. Ralph says it is possible to have two 29 hands at one meet, so be sure the first player doesn't get it all and leave #2 holding an empty bag.
