

Congress signs-up its first celebrity. Well, that is besides you of course.

Ken Keltner - 3B - Cleveland Indians. He's the player who gets credit for stopping the 56 game hitting streak established by Mr Coffee, Joltin Joe DiMaggio back in July 1941.

Ken played in the Wisconsin State Classic this month & he loves the grand old game, says it is a carry-over from his baseball traveling days. Welcome aboard Ken, we're proud to add your name on our rolls - keep pegging.

In November there were three major events on the cribbage tour; the Wisconsin State Championship at Milwaukee, the Western Massachusetts at Springfield and the Florida State at Orlando. AND after a couple of hours of tabulating and calculating Master Points a top ten list was finally established. We are showing the top eleven best because only .12 of a point separates tenth & eleventh places.

Arnold Crews, dean of Florida cribbage, is in the NUMBER ONE spot by virtue of a fourth place finish in Milwaukee and a third place finish in Orlando. Deano Crews plans to stay on top of the heap as he readies himself for the Rocky Mountain Championship Tournament scheduled for mid-January in Denver, Colorado.

Of the three major events this month, the Wisconsin meet drew the most contestants & therefore, the most Master Points. Of the top 16 finishers in Milwaukee only one was not a member of the Congress. In Orlando membership was 100 percent. However, this was not the case in Springfield where only three members were among the top finishers.

PEGGING POINTERS

In our previous columns, we have seen how we can sometimes gain a few holes, or at least minimize our losses, by looking ahead, and anticipating our opponent's play. This principle is not limited to special cases; it may be applied almost anytime.

Let's say you are leading from 3-4-7-8. You decide to lead either the 3 or the 4, since your opponent can only peg with a 3 or a 4 of his own. By assuming that your opponent will peg on your lead, you realize that the 4 is a better lead. If he pairs up your 4, you play your 7; 15 for 2. Had you been leading from 3-4-8-9, you would have led the 3 - if the 3 gets paired up, you have the 9 for protection.

You do not have to be leading to use this idea. Say you hold 5-6-7 and the count has reached 11. You play the 7, because if your opponent pegs two holes with a 7 of his own, you play your 6; 31 for 2. If the count is 12, instead of 11, you play the 6 or the 7, and if the card you play gets paired-up, you can make the count 31. Likewise, if the count is at 14, you can play your five or your six in complete safety, and if the count is at 15, you play the 5; the 6 is your insurance.

Whenever you have a choice from two or more cards, any of which may be played with reasonable safety, take a moment to decide whether one of those cards might be even a bit safer than the other. Often you can arrange things such that your opponent's only chance to peg will result in an equal amount of counter-pegging on your part.


