THE INVITATIONAL TOURNAMENT OF CHAMPIONS

The Tournament of Champions, which was held on January 31, 1986, in Sparks, NV, at Karl's Silver Club, was a tremendous success. It drew 110 of the top-rated players from all over the country, with 22 states being represented. The tournament was won by Frank Schweig of Carpentersville, IL. In a hotly contested 6th game of a best of 7 match, Frank pegged out to beat Dick Graham of Englewood, CO. First prize was worth more than \$3,000. A beautiful trophy was awarded to Frank by Karl Burgee, the host of the tournament and the owner of Karl's. A perpetual trophy will also be displayed at the club with the champion's name engraved. Congratulations to Frank and his wife Roberta, his most avid fan. Third place was won by Duane Toll of Milwaukee, WI. Finishing fourth was Bob Plourde of Unionville, CT.

There were two 28 hands during the day. Al Dinwoodie of Slocum, RI, and Walter Lewis of Solvang, CA, were the recipients. This was the most successful Tournament of Champions in the four-year history of the event. We wish to thank the entire staff at Karl's and especially Bill Abshire. Our thanks also to Bill Irons for his efforts.

During the afternoon, a consolation tournament was held for 72 people who did not qualify for the Tournament of Champions. The event was won by Bob McCabe of Brown Deer, Wi. In second place was Danny Mitchell of Crescent City, CA. Mary Cornwell, Sunnyvale, CA, took third over Betty Carrera of Sparks, NV. None of the winners of this tournament or the Tournament of Champions will be awarded master points because they were closed tournaments.

Names of potential nominees are being solicited by the committee. In addition, any person not nominated can submit his or her name on a petition signed by at least 5 active members of the ACC. Only 4 members from any one state can serve on the Board of Directors.

For the time being, I can no longer put tournament flyers (inserts) in Cribbage World. I had promised lke Rutherford and Scott Kooistra I'd place the Capitol City Cribbage Open in the February Cribbage World, and I had to let them down because their material came in two boxes, four and seven days, respectively, after I had to go to the printer. Ike is mad at me for life, and Scott isn't speaking to me; they went to a great deal of time and expense to get their material to me, and the end result was zero.

After I get some experience under my belt and I'm able to work out the time constraints and the one-ounce mailing weight restrictions of Cribbage World, I'll give stuffing inserts positive consideration. In the meantime, I hope you'll bear with me.

So it is with the Tournament of Champions. in 1982, the first year of the meet, 66 champions answered the call and assembled at the Riviera in Las Vegas to vie for the title. The next 2 years, the numbers fell off to less than 40 players.

With a change of scenery and an enthusiastic host, Karl's Casino in Sparks, there is an upswing. The players enjoyed Karl's hospitality, and many voiced their desire to return on January 29, 1987.

We met with the Casino staff and have tentatively agreed on additional player benefits as well as the dates. Karl said: "We will block off the entire hotel for cribbers."

ANOTHER SWING OF THE PENDULUM

The total vote in 1995 for Congress Directors was at the low point of 446. Watch the pendulum swing the other way this year. Election observers predict a record vote over the 1,000 mark.

MANAGEMENT OF TOURNAMENTS

Mel and Betty Carrera, popular players in the Sparks area, want to gain experience in directing a major tournament before moving to British Columbia.


Mel will be selling his warehouse business sometime this summer and, as he is a cribbage buff, he wants to promote the Congress and organize tournaments in the Canadian province.

THE CRIBBAGE CORNER

by John E. Chambers

Whenever it is a players crib, it's only natural to try to salt it. Of course, there are times when salting a crib will mean breaking up one's hand. In this case you would not salt the crib. However, there are other times when a different approach and different thinking will be needed if you are to get into position or win the game. Take the following example:

You are dealing with 28 holes to go and your opponent needs 20 holes. Not a very good position for your three counts.

Suppose further that in your hand you have the following:

Okay, you say, it's my crib. I've three counts and I'm a long way from home. What should my strategy be?

- You can do the obvious by keeping the As, 2h, 3c, and 4d, throwing the 10c and Kh to the crib.
- 2. You can keep the 2h, 3c, 10c, and Kh, throwing the As and 4d to the crib.
- You can keep the As, 4d, 10c, and Kh, discarding the 2h and 3c to the crib.

Let's examine our options.

Option 1 is the obvious play, but is it the best? After all, the best you can hope for in your hand is ten points, with very little in the crib, unless you are extremely backy.

Option 2 is better, but is it the best? There is still a possibility of ten points in your hand, with a possibility of ten more points in the crib. But you could throw the 2 and 3 into the crib to set up a possible run with a chance for twelve points.

Option 3 is the best. You are still holding a potential ten hand, plus you are discarding a 2 and 3 in which you may not only fifteens but set up a run possibility. If an ace or four is the starter, it will help both the hand and crib; if the starter is a two or three, it will help the crib; and if the starter is a tenth card (10, Jack, Queen or King), it will help both the hand and the crib.

With the above diseard, there is more potential for a ten hand and a twelve crib.

Let me clear up a point or two: first of all, I wasn't serious about making such a change and, secondly, I haven't the authority to make changes in the rules even if I wanted to.

It's fun to jockey these questions about, and I appreciate the time taken by the membership to respond. I hope you'll do so in the future.

I am printing the response from Keith W. Boyles of Summerville, SC, as being representative of the letters I received.

"I claim no personal relationship with Sir John Suckling, nor has he spoken to me from the grave. However, I feel that when he invented the game, he specifically designed 31 as a stopping point. The count can go no further than 31. If the players run out cards before 31 is reached, the person playing the last card gets 1 peg for a 'Go.' Likewise, if the players run out of cards as one of them attains a count of 31, that player gets 2 pegs. I can understand that if the players run out of cards as one player reaches a count of 15, that player should get 2 pegs for the 15 and 1 peg for a 'Go,' because the count would have continued past 15 had the players had more cards to play. But no matter what happens, the count will never go past 31; hence, 2 points for a count of 31 and no more. I say 'No' to any such proposed rule change."

THE MILLION DOLLAR CRIBDAGE TOURNAMENT

The Board of Directors has informed Jack Wunderlich that Cribbage World can no longer allow advertising space for the Million Dollar Cribbage Tournament. A majority of the Board members were of the opinion that allowing further advertisements implied the American Cribbage Congress endorsed the tournament. The ACC, as an organization, does not now nor has it ever endorsed the Million Dollar Cribbage Tournament.

As a matter of clarification, it should be pointed out that many members of the ACC, including Board members, have entered the tournament and as individuals have hoped for its success; they continue to do so. Jack Wunderlich, the President of the tournament, is a respected member of the ACC, and his character and integrity have never been in question.

PERSONAL EDITORIAL COMMENT:

In reality, the Million Dollar Cribbage Tournament's objectives have fallen far short of its goals, and it would appear that a realignment of those objectives is in order. It is, perhaps, time for a reevaluation and a more realistic approach should be considered.

I submitted \$35 to Jack Wunderlieb over a year ago, and I don't feel my entry fee is in any way in jeopardy. It is my personal opinion, however, that a good idea just hasn't materialized; I don't know why, and I'm not going to hindsight now. I've received two letters and one phone call in reference to the Million Dollar Tournament since I became editor of Cribbage World two months ago. I answered all inquiries to the best of my ability and urged those making inquiries to contact Jack. During late January and early February I travelled approximately 7,000 round-trip miles to attend three tournaments. I point this out only to make the point that if I survived the Million Dollar Cribbage Tournament elimination rounds, I certainly wouldn't object to travelling to Nebraska to play for the prize money that now exists. Unless I'm misinformed, it would still be the largest cribbage payoff ever.
