ACC GRAND NATIONAL

Planning is already underway for the 7th Annual Grand National Tournament to be held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, on September 23-25, 1988, at the Red Carpet Hotel on Howell across from the Airport.

Directors Bob McCabe and Gene Biegler will leave no stone unturned in order to make your cribbage weekend an enjoyable event.

Milwaukee hosted the first Grand National Tournament in 1982, and in subsequent years it has been held in Springfield, Massachusetts, Chicago, Denver, Minneapolis, and Hartford. Future locations are Prineville, Oregon, in 1989 and Des Moines, Iowa, in 1990.

A NEW CRIBBAGE TOURNAMENT FOR BOSTON

Word is in that a new weekend tournament is set for Boston on March 18-20, 1988.

Co-directors Harry Molloy and Larry Samet promise lots of cribbage and excitement, including a Friday night Early Bird, a Saturday Qualifying Round, and a Saturday night choice of a Pairs Tournament or a High Rollers singles event. Sunday will feature the Championship Playoffs, a Consolation Round Robin and a Last Chance.

The tournament will be held in the Boston theater district at the Quality Inn-Downtown (formerly the Hotel Bradford), and it is within walking distance of the Freedom Trail and shopping.


Lisa attended and competed in several tournaments for part of her 17 years and was known to many of you.

The American Cribbage Congress Open will be held Saturday and Sunday, February 6-7, 1988 in Reno, Nevada at the Sands Regent Hotel/Casino. This tournament will be held the day after the Invitational Tournament of Champions.

MAIN TOURNAMENT (Saturday & Sunday):

The entry fee is \$46 with an optional Insurance (Q) pool of \$15. Entries must be received no later than 6 P.M., Friday, February 5. It is highly recommended that you mail your entries early to ensure receipt by the Sands Regent before the deadline. ENTRIES CLOSE AT 6 P.M. FRIDAY. On Saturday at 7:00 A.M. the tournament will begin with drawing for seats, orientation, rules, and then play. Play will consist of 22 games (2 games vs. 11 opponents with alternate deals). The top 25% (max. 128) will advance to Sunday's playoffs which will be elimination matches, best 3 of 5 (first 4 positions, 4 of 7, dealers provided). Pay back: Over 100%, Q Pool 100% (graduated, to approximately 1 out of 8 entrants).

If you peg too many points and your opponent calls you on it, your front peg is moved back to the proper place and your opponent is awarded the number of points you took in excess.



SIGNING UP NEW MEMBERS

Attempting to sign up new members during the weekend that a tournament is being held is at best a haphazard event. The tournament directors and helpers have their hands full with last-minute details and arrangements and, at the very least, they are trying to answer questions coming at them from all directions. Someone usually stands up and invites non-ACC members to join the organization -- some do, some don't. Membership applications may or may not be available and, more often than not, someone volunteers to make a list and collect from the few people who happen to wander up to the head table. Heaven forbid if some prospective member has a few questions to ask prior to parting with \$5 (soon to be \$7). Picture if you will a prospective new member who has been invited to attend a tournament by a neighbor, friend or business associate. We don't know from looking at all the faces in the crowd who a non-member is: the non-members wander about, with coffee in their hands, trying to figure out what's going on. They've just been told that if they're not a member of the

ACC and they happen to get a 29 hand or if they cash, they'll receive neither a 29 hand cash award nor any Master Points. Here are a few people attending perhaps their first or second tournament now facing this terrible threat hanging over their heads. "What to do?," they ask.

Doesn't it make a lot more sense to increase the entry fee for non-ACC members and give them an automatic membership. No fuss, no bother, it's all taken care of beforehand. Some tournament directors are already doing this, but most are not. If the non-ACC member feels this is coercion and chooses not to attend that particular tournament, what has the ACC lost?

Why should the non-member be given the same benefits, be allowed to compete and sometimes cash and not to contribute to the organization that makes it all possible? Sure, the same entry fee was paid as everyone else, but where's the commitment that the rest of us have made?

Many Judges have written about special situations occurring at tournaments where they have officiated. (These situations have been written down and will be used as test questions when it comes time for renewal of certified judges.)

Many little problems have become big problems when judges violate section XV c of "General Tournament Guidelines" found in "The Official Rules and Regula-

tions." XV c states "When a contested play situation is not covered <u>specifically</u> by the rules, <u>three</u> Judges shall confer before a decision is rendered."

In our passout material for judges, this situation is covered. If judges follow section XV c, it would do away with many of the problems and make for a better tournament.

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MASTER POINT PARADE



HOW MASTER POINTS ARE EARNED:

TOURNAMENT MUST BE SANCTIONED BY THE AMERICAN CRIBBAGE CONGRESS.

Qualifying Round: Top 1/8 earns one-quarter points, i.e., 100 players, top qualifier earns 25 points, 2nd earns 23, etc.

Main Tournament: Top 1/8 earns full points, i.e., 100 players, champion earns 100 points, 2nd earns 92, 3rd earns 84, etc. If 40 or more players, BONUS POINTS are earned: 1st earns 40 bonus points, 2nd earns 20, 3rd earns 10 and 4th earns 5. In this example, No. 1 earns 140 points (100 + 40).

Consolation Tournament: Top 1/8 earns one-half points, i.e., 64 players, 1st earns 32 points, 2nd earns 28 points, 3rd earns 24 points, etc. BONUS POINTS are earned: 1st earns 20 bonus points, 2nd earns 10 points, 3rd earns 5 points and 4th earns 3 points. In this example, No. 1 earns 52 points (32 + 20).

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

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CRIBBAGE CORNER

PEGGING POINTERS Dan Barlow

In past months we've discussed endgame situations in which your opponent had only one card left. You had to decide which of your two cards was safe to play to your opponent, based on the board position. While it's true that these situations arise only at the end of the game, it's also true that the end of the game may be closer than you think. Don't be lulled into a false sense of security simply because your opponent needs 25 or 30 holes to go out and you need only 7.

You need 7, opponent needs 34, your deal.

What a nightmare! You knew pairing a 3 might be disastrous, but every play looked dangerous and you decided to gamble the pone didn't have a pair. Besides, the possibility that you might actually lose this game is only now occurring to you. Do you play the 4 or the 5? What would you play if he/she had needed 28 holes? 26? (Solutions at end of column)

Let's assume you're playing aginst Phyllis Schmidt. You needn't have seen three of her cards to solve these problems. Suppose you hold 6-8-9-10. The cut is a 5. Phyllis leads a Queen, you play your 9,

and she scores a go with another Queen. If she is now 24 holes from winning and you are 6, you might feel so confident that you carelessly lay down your 10. And if her last two cards are 5s, you've thrown away a game you should have won. You should have led the 6 or the 8. If she pegged on one of those, she couldn't possibly have had enough to go out.

Suppose you have enough to go out and Phyllis needs 31; the cut is a 5. Assume from a defensive point of view that she has a 29 hand and play accordingly until it's proven otherwise. If she leads a 4 to you, great; you now know she doesn't have a 29!! Now, still on defense, assume she has a 24 hand and play accordingly. By being pessimistic, you'll save a lot more games.

Solutions:

If Phyllis needs 34, you should play the 5. Her only hope of winning is if her last card is a 5 and you let her peg 3 more holes. If she needs 28, again you play the 5. True, she'll win the game, but you couldn't have prevented that. You can prevent a defeat if she's holding a deuce by playing the 5. If she needs 26 points, she's already won if she's holding a deuce or a 5. If, however, she has a 4, she has a 12 point hand and needs to peg three more holes. Play the 4 and Phyllis ends up in the dead hole where she ends up so often!! Play the 5 and she wins a game she should have lost.
