The Congress may be taking a giant step forward as announcements are being made daily over the airwaves in Texas, eastern Iowa, central Illinois, and western Wisconsin, such as:

"It's the fastest growing game in America. In fact, it's been said to be the best two-handed game in the world. speaking of the game cribbage. The American Cribbage Congress, a nonprofit organization, says, let us help you start a local cribbage club in your area. Once your local club has been formed and has joined the Congress, your club members can then play in local, state and national tournaments, thus earning a Each member will national rating. receive monthly the CRIBBAGE WORLD magazine, plus more. Sound like fun, go For your free informational packet, simply dial toll free 1-800-ZZZ-ZZZZ. That's toll free. Call today and your free informational packet will be on the way."

As a non-profit organization, we qualify for public service announcements (PSA), as this program aims to help people enjoy their favorite game. We cannot solicit membership or attendance at tournaments because that would come under the classification of advertising.

Texas was chosen as one of the states in the pilot program because we have less than 30 members in the entire state. In eastern Iowa there are few people on the rolls, as there are in central Illinois and western Wisconsin.

Fifty cities were included in the radio project in the first mailing of July 15. The deadline for magazine news is on the 20th of the month, so there will not be a follow-up report until September.

This writer has received dozens of letters from new members, all asking the same questions: "Why don't you advertise the Congress? Why don't you get articles in magazines and newspapers? I just heard of the Congress a few days ago. Where have you been?"

There are 5,000 radio stations in the United States. If 40% of them air our messages, we could be on the way to doubling or tripling our membership. Jeff Monroe, the new Secretary-Membership, says that he is ready for a sudden increase. Please note that the ZZZ-ZZZZ in the 800 number is a dud, so

The percentage of return was 13.58%, triple the percent that the large mailers of magazine and soap/detergent advertising realize. These companies are happy when they receive a 3.6% return.

# **MASTER POINT PARADE**

HOW MASTER POINTS ARE EARNED:

TOURNAMENT MUST BE SANCTIONED BY THE AMERICAN CRIBBAGE CON-GRESS.

Qualifying Round: Top 1/8 earns one-quarter points, i.e., 100 players, top qualifier earns 25 points, 2nd earns 23, etc.

Main Tournament: Top 1/8 earns full points, i.e., 100 players, champion earns 100 points, 2nd earns 92, 3rd earns 84, etc. If 40 or more players, BONUS POINTS are earned: 1st earns 40 bonus points, 2nd earns 20, 3rd earns 10 and 4th earns 5. In this example, No. 1 earns 140 points (100 + 40).

Consolation Tournament: Top 1/8 earns one-half points, i.e., 64 players, 1st earns 32 points, 2nd earns 28 points, 3rd earns 24 points, etc. BONUS POINTS are earned: 1st earns 20 bonus points, 2nd earns 10 points, 3rd earns 5 points and 4th earns 3 points. In this example, No. 1 earns 52 points (32 + 20).


#### EDITORIAL

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#### RADIO PROMOTION

I wanted to keep the membership posted on the project of radio promotion. Here are the next moves:

#### July

 Cassettes were mailed out to stations in eastern Iowa, Illinois and Wisconsin. They went to 25 selected cities and areas that have few, if any, Congress members.

In addition, we will spray Texas with 25 cities to test a dry area. We have only about 23 members in the Lone Star State. However, so many people from the northern climates have migrated there with the attraction of jobs, this should be fertile territory.

- In #1 above, we get the attention of cribbage players. In #2, they must respond by calling the 800 number and giving us their name and address.
- We mail out an application form for membership with the entry of "rad" as the recruiter, to monitor the pugram. The application is returned to Jeff Monroe in Napa, CA.

Also in this mailing will be a page to sell the person on the membership and our program. The third enclosure will be Jerry Dickinson's introduction of the Grass Roots Club idea. The mailing will be from Hillsboro, Oregon. (Some calls will be from people who will want to organize a club;

other calls will be for information on the Congress' programs.)

 If the person professes interest in forming a club, Jerry will give the swers.

#### Comments:

By these tapes playing on the radio, thousands of people will become aware the American Cribbage Congress exists; this should help in bringing the players out of the woods.

At first we will be concentrating on states with fewer members.

There are about 5,000 radio stations in the United States; and we haven't even considered Canada yet.

Iowa has been chosen as the #2 target for the radio attack. There are various reasons for this choice. Des Moines is on the western edge, and little or no promotion has yet been done in the rest of the state.

At Marshalltown, Rassmussen's home, a summer tournament has drawn 300 to 500 players a number of times. Also, there is a tournament at the State Fair every year.

Then, too, Iowa is surrounded by Minnesota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Missouri, Illinois and Wisconsin. The airwaves do not stop at state lines. Our message for cribbage will spill over into these other states.

And, finally, Iowa has about 160 Congress members, and the Annual Tournament at Des Moines has difficulty getting enough locals to make a 100-player tournament.

How clubs in existence can be helped:

Upon application we will cut tapes with the club's local message and where to call for information. The tournament directors or publicity persons will receive the tapes from our headquarters; the tapes are to be taken directly to the local stations. By this method they will meet the people at the local radio station and will get a good reception if someone there plays cribbage. We will also provide the local publicity person with a form to use in approaches to the newspapers.


Here is a message that will be put on one of the tapes:

The fee for this service will be \$10. We supply enough tapes with varied lengths of time, 15, 30, 45 and 60 seconds. This gives the station some leeway to fill some blank spots.

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#### CRIBBAGE CORNER

#### PEGGING POINTERS Dan Barlow

Ever since Bob Plourde's letter appeared in the January CRIBBAGE WORLD, supporting the lead of the 5 from 5-J-Q-K, my opponents have been leading 5s against me, right and left. It's almost reached the point where I'm shocked any time my opponent DOESN'T lead a 5.

Point 1: The identical chart that Bob uses to show that the 5 is the best lead from 5-J-Q-K could also be used to justify leading the 5 from 5-K-K-K.

Point 2: Even if the chart WERE valid, a similar chart could easily be constructed to "prove" that a face card is the better lead:

Point 3: When you lead the 5 from 5-J-Q-K, your hand becomes a virtual open It won't matter all of the time, but occasionally opponent will scrape an extra hole or two out of his/her knowledge that you can play only faces. For example, holding 2-5-8-8, opponent sees you lead a 5. He/she deduces that you have three faces and rather than take the safe two holes for pairing your 5, he/she plays an 8, outpegging you 5/0. Had he/she paired your 5, you'd have been outpegged by only 3/1 (had you led the King, it might have been 5/0, but it also might have been 3/3). example: holding 5-6-7-9, opponent sees you lead a 5. He/she deduces your exact hand and plays the 9, outpegging you 6/0. Had he/she paired your 5, you'd have been outpegged by only 4/1.

If we truly wish to settle this question, we could program every reasonable pegging sequence of every possible opponent's hand into a computer and see which lead pays off most often.

All of this misses the point, however. No one leads a 5 to guard against opponent having 4-5-6-6. They do it because they have 9/7 odds in favor of counterpegging, should opponent peg on the 5 (in other words, because they usually get away with it).

I'm not trying to discourage leading the 5 from 5-J-Q-K (Personally, I think it would be hilarious if players started leading 5s all the time, from any kinds of hands, hoping to trick their opponents into thinking they hold 5-J-Q-K.) I merely wish to show that there are two sides to this coin. And even those who are convinced they shouldn't lead the 5 from 5-J-Q-K will have to admit there's at least one exception to the "never lead a 5" rule: 5-5-5-5.



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
