GRASS ROOTS BEGINS 5TH SEASON

The Grass Roots program had a humble beginning. The idea of having local community clubs could not get any support as officials concluded that major tournaments were what the Congress was all about.

Madison Metro Club #1 began the season alone back in 1983, and then came John Swett's Crystal Lake Club, followed by Butch Reynolds' Santa Maria Club and Bob McCabe's Milwaukee group. Hargy Hargesheimer of Hamburg's Western New York Club jumped on the bandwagon as the year 1983 ended?

Ford Weeks got the Columbia, South Carolina, club rolling with the assistance of Al Odom. Jeanie Hill of Hermiston, Oregon, activated her club and then things began to happen. Jeanie sold the idea to leaders in Bend, Prineville, and Baker, and cribbage Grass Roots began to sprout in other places. As the 1988-89 season opens, there are 61 charters.

Purposes of Grass Roots

The slogan of the Grass Roots is "Take tournaments to the players and eliminate travel." The other ideas include:

- Organize clubs at the local hometown level, the small communities. Have clubs from 12 to 40 players. When clubs get larger, divide into two clubs.
- Awards should be on the basis of 1 to every 5 players. Since then, it is

recommended that prizes be on the 1 to 4 ratio to keep more people happy and eliminate the dropout problem.

- Club play provides a social activity two or four times a month.
- 4. Have a rating point schedule that is equitable: 1st receives 100% of the number of entries; 2nd, 80%, 3rd, 70%; 4th, 60%, 5th, 50%, 6th, 40%, etc. No bonus of any kind.
- Help the inexperienced players to improve their game by giving them tips.
- 6. Players become familiar with the round robin movement and the scoring of game points. When they enter a major event, they are comfortable and do not make costly mistakes. Grass Roots is the "farm system" for the majors.

Membership and Financing

From the start, everyone had to be a member of the Congress to play in the Grass Roots. In addition, a fee of \$2 must be paid annually for general expenses. Guests may play twice and must then take out a membership. In the event a guest wins an award, he/she immediately becomes a member. The dues are taken out first, and the remainder of the award is given to the new member. What could be fairer?

Grass Roots is self-financing and doesn't receive help from the Congress nor does

it make a monetary contribution. In order to raise the necessary funds, a national tournament is held once a year, with each club playing 18 games at home and sending in the entry fees and scorecards to headquarters. One prize list is made. \$4 out of each entry goes into the Grass Roots treasury.

Commissioner System

Two years ago your President turned over the program to Jerry Dickinson and named him Commissioner of Grass Roots. He, in turn, names the directors /commissioners of the local programs—the people who start the local club and receive the charter. This director forms his/her own cabinet, as he/she alone is responsible to Dickinson. If a cabinet member isn't doing a good job, he/she can be replaced easily. This is not true if local groups want to elect secretaries and treasurers.

Divisions

In the first years, there were two divisions: clubs playing 20 nights a year and those playing 40 nights. Competition was not fair because of the size of clubs. Jerry came up with his system of classifying the clubs according to the possible number of rating points that could be earned in the entire year. So, now there are six divisions and six champions.

The next article will show how the system operates.

LETTER TO CRIBBAGE WORLD

One of my long-time college friends, Bruce Hegge, and I have thought of a small variation on the game of cribbage that we like to play, even though we now live 400 miles apart. In order to pursue our favorite pastime of cribbage and keep in touch at the same time, we play cribbage by mail.

To start the game, the dealer mails the opponent his six cards and then the opponent mails back his two cards that go in the crib and the first play. Obviously, you must be able to trust your opponent not to "peek" when he deals, but then it IS a gentleman's game. At this point, we usually have a neutral party cut the deck for the starter card. Play continues back and forth with each card that has been played mailed back each time. After the play is over, the opponent counts his own hand and mails all the cards back, and then the dealer counts The next round is his hand and crib. started with the new dealer's own deck of cards. We keep track of our progress on a sheet of paper that travels with the cards and our own boards at each house.

As you can see, the game takes quite a long time to play. In the two years we've been playing, we have finished one game (I got skunked) and just started another. If you know someone who you'd like to keep in touch with and who is one of your favorite cribbage players, you might give this long-distance game a try.

SYNOPSIS OF ACC BOARD MEETING

Raleigh, North Carolina July 29, 1988

21 Board members present; 9 absent; numerous visitors.

Minutes of previous meeting approved with minor change.

Treasurer Fred McGibney presented final financial statement for fiscal year 1987-88 (ending June 30, 1988), showing net income of \$2,588.01 for the year, including \$174.75 in Cribadier General fund earmarked for junior cribbage promotion. Cash on hand at beginning of 1988-89 year, \$6,146.50. Report approved as presented. Next year's budget will be submitted for approval at the September 25 Board meeting in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Franklin A. Wurman, Philadelphia attorney, submitted a written report on denial of ACC membership, suspension or expulsion of members allegedly involved in cheating episodes. As was requested, he will review present ACC By-laws for procedural conformance in such instances and will report at the next Board meeting if any amendment is necessary.

Executive Vice President Syl Lulinski presented a draft of proposed procedures for hosting future Grand National Tournaments and will present a final version for adoption at the Milwaukee Board meeting.

President Joe Wergin reviewed bids for reprinting the Tournament Rules Book, now out of print. Reprinting will be delayed until new rules changes are adopted; Chairman Dick Cornwell's committee is currently working on them; the September Board meeting is a target date for approval. By an 11-8 vote, the Board voted to charge new members for the new rules book (it has previously been given free to new members) and by

an 11-6 vote set the price for all members at \$1.

Two By-laws amendments presented by the Reorganization Committee were approved, correcting previous inadvertances: Art. III, d-5 -- "The Vice President-Policy shall also appoint committee chairpersons to deal with Constitution and Bylaws, playing rules, tourname regulations and guidelines..." (Esta) lishes a separate committee for tournament regulations and guidelines, formerly included in Playing Rules Committee.) Art. V, b--"The nominations for directors shall be from the members of the Congress and submitted to a nominating committee appointed by the Executive Vice President,..." (Previously the committee was appointed by the President.) Both amendments take effect August 1, 1988.

Following discussion by President Wergin, the Board voted to raise the life membership fee to \$60 at age 60 (previously \$40) and the spouse life membership fee to \$25 (previously \$16), effective August 1, 1988. The Board also voted to confirm a \$3 per year fee for junior members and eliminated the \$3 yearly fee for spouses of life members.

Secretary-Membership Jeff Monroe reported 5,171 members, with 417 being rebilled in arrears, subject to being dropped from the roll.

Wergin and Butch Reynolds, Santa Maria, California, Director, reported that the International Cribbage Association centered in the Los Angeles Basin is defunct and that efforts are underway to enroll those ICA members in the ACC.

Tournament Commissioner Lulinski announced future Board meetings at Grand National in Milwaukee, Wiscons, September 23, 1988, and at the Tournament of Champions in Reno, Nevada, January 26, 1989.

Harry Stoops of the Hialeah, Florida, Cribbage Club made a presentation to

host the 1991 Grand National at the Diplomat Hotel on September 27-29. The Board unanimously approved. (Besides the 1988 Grand National in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, September 23-25, the 1989 tournament will be held in Prineville, Oregon, and the 1990 tournament in Des Moines, Iowa.

Acting on a suggestion by Wergin, it was lecided to have the Board select future honorees for Mr. and Mrs. Cribbage World and the Guy Pence membership award, with DeLynn Colvert (Missoula, Montana, Director) to present criteria and proposed awards at the September Board meeting.

Wergin also suggested that the Junior Tournament program be replaced by a youth education program. He will present details at the September Board meeting.

After ten votes no one received an 80% majority for entry into the Hall of Fame.

A proposal by Joe Seigle (Coventry, Connecticut, Director) to modify regulations for one-day tournaments was referred to the new Tournament Guidelines Committee. (Scott Kooistra, Yankton, South Dakota, Director has been named chairman of that committee and will make a preliminary report at the September Board meeting.)

Another proposal by Seigle, to rebate 25¢ from each \$1.50 sanction fee for local, state, sectional or regional membership recruitment efforts, was defeated. (Both of the above on behalf of the Northeastern Cribbage Association.) Similarly, Wergin's suggestion that temporary weekend memberships be sold at a reduced price for tournament entry was rejected.

Wergin also suggested that CRIBBAGE WORLD publicize the annual total donated to various charities by tournaments, with a listing of those benefitting and the amounts given by the various tournaments. T/C Lulinski will compile the information for future publication.

T/C Lulinski announced a recent mail vote of the Board approved a new policy, effective May 9, 1988, by a 22 to 1 vote: "Tournaments may not be held on the same weekend if they are within 400 miles of each other." (This replaces the previous 2-week, 250-mile limitation.)

Wergin's suggestion that retiring members of the Board of Directors be given the title of Honorary Director or Director Emeritus, allowing Board attendance and courtesies but no vote, was referred to Colvert for criteria, to be submitted at the September Board meeting.

A Constitutional amendment proposed by Seigle to further change Article V, j (Expulsion and Replacement of a Director who misses 50% or more Board meetings) was defeated. (This section was adopted in Reno last February.)

Two other Constitutional amendments were submitted by the Reorganization Committee: Art. V, a -- (Changes term of office of appointed Directors) adding "Effective September 1989, terms for appointed members shall terminate on August 31 of the odd numbered years." (Previously limited to one year terms.) Approved. Also, Art. V, d--proposed amendment failed to get 2/3 required vote although winning 11-8 affirmative vote. As a result, the section's language is unchanged: "No more than four members of the Board shall be elected from one state." (The amendment would have deleted the word "elected" and allowed interstate moves.)

Wergin reported on the radio public service membership promotion now underway and asked for \$1,350 additional to underwrite its costs. He was instructed to submit it for budget consideration.

Grass Roots Commissioner Jerry Dickinson reported on continued expansion of the program, noting that a regional decentralization would take effect September 1, as recently reported in CRIB-BAGE WORLD.

MASTER POINT PARADE

HOW MASTER POINTS ARE EARNED:

TOURNAMENT MUST BE SANCTIONED BY THE AMERICAN CRIBBAGE CONGRESS.

Qualifying Round: Top 1/8 earns one-quarter points, i.e., 100 players, top qualifier earns 25 points, 2nd earns 23, etc.

Main Tournament: Top 1/8 earns full points, i.e., 100 players, champion earns 100 points, 2nd earns 92, 3rd earns 84, etc. If 40 or more players, BONUS POINTS are earned: 1st earns 40 bonus points, 2nd earns 20, 3rd earns 10 and 4th earns 5. In this example, No. 1 earns 140 points (100 + 40).

Consolation Tournament: Top 1/8 earns one-half points, i.e., 64 players, 1st earns 32 points, 2nd earns 28 points, 3rd earns 24 points, etc. BONUS POINTS are earned: 1st earns 20 bonus points, 2nd earns 10 points, 3rd earns 5 points and 4th earns 3 points. In this example, No. 1 earns 52 points (32 + 20).

LETTER TO CRIBBAGE WORLD

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE ACC BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Here are a few things I would like you to discuss at the next meeting.

- 1. In an attempt to eliminate the annual complaints that arise during the Last Roundup Tournament at the National Open, it should be made mandatory that the Q-Pool at any round robin tournament be dispersed BEFORE the beginning of head-to-head play. That the top qualifier can be knocked out of the Qualifying Pool is ridiculous. This isn't sour grapes -- I've been on both sides of the coin at this tournament. When two people who score 24 points in a 12-game qualifying match get nothing from the Q-Pool, while players who score only 15 points are rewarded with Q-Pool payments, there is something rotten at my favorite tournament.
- 2. Not all golfers are invited to the Masters. But all golfers CAN earn their way into this tournament. And the results of the Masters count toward such honors as Player of the Year and Leading Money Winner. Likewise, not every player is invited to our Tournament of Champions, but all players CAN earn their way into this tournament, even those who play only in Grass Roots. Yet the results don't count in the master point standing? Come on!

- 3. Additional criteria by which invitations to the Tournament of Champions should be extended: anyone who has ever won the T of C; anyone who has won the Grand National, National Open, or ACC Open in the past ten years (or perhaps ever).
- 4. I can think of no reason why all shouldn't have tournaments nonsmoking and smoking sections. The smoke at tournaments is often We cannot attract oppressive. younger members into the ACC if we force them to play in unpleasant surroundings. Round robin tournaments can have non-smoking tables. Headto-head tournaments can have nonsmoking pairings boards. Eventually, smokers and non-smokers will have to meet; but in the early stages of a tournament, they can be kept at opposite sides of the room. Smoke was a major cause of the dwindling number of bridge players in the ACBL the past couple of decades. and the ACBL has acted. We had better do the same; otherwise, when the smokers die (and most of them will die before their time), there may not be any members left.

ELECTION PROCEDURES NEED IMPROVEMENT

The 12 American Cribbage Congress Directors who were reelected in the recent election helped emphasize how difficult it is for someone not on the Board to be elected. Those ACC members who served on the Reorganization Committee, which resulted in major procedural changes, were aware of what the situation was and consequently, Article T.c. of the By-laws was adopted to have committee of ACC members to nominate a slate of Directors for the annual elections:..." It was hoped that this Elections Committee would propose for reelection those Directors who continued to make a significant contribution to the Instead, in the two subsequent elections, the Elections Committee's concern has appeared to center on the mechanical aspects of gaining a place on the ballot.

The evaluation process proposal has been completely ignored. Henceforth, 25 members of the Board will be up for election simultaneously. It is time we abandoned the "good fellow" approach and seek more quality among our Directors. We need appointment of an Elections Committee made up of Directors from all regions of the ACC. We need committee people who are willing to say "so-and-so is a dud"; or "so-and-so votes to table everything that proposes a change"; or "so-and-so is deliberately provocative"; or "so-and-so does not understand a Director's role."

This committee should then recommend by name those Directors it is nominating for reelection. Directors not so nominated would still have the opportunity to secure a place on the ballot by the petition procedure, which would also continue to be available to any ACC member desiring to run for the Board. The Elections Committee's recommendations would be so stipulated in CRIB-BAGE WORLD, as would the names of other qualifiers for a place on the ballot.

If the ACC is to develop into a viable, growing organization, it needs the reform indicated here. It is time for a meaningful Elections Committee to come into existence.
