In downtown Des Moines, Iowa, the beautiful hotel Fort Des Moines will host the 9th Annual Grand National to be played September 21, 22, and 23.

Directors Larry Loupee, John Crouch, and Bob Hanes are planning a full weekend of cribbage, with the National Awards Banquet Saturday night culminating the 1990 season. Players who have earned Life Master, Grand Master, and Master ratings during the 1990 season will be honored, as well as recipients of 29-hands, new Hall of Fame inductees, the 1990 All-American team and other awards will also be on the agenda.

Last year's champion-Harvey Honeycutt, Beatty, OR--is expected back to defend his title. Harvey's win last year at the Crook County Fair Grounds in Prineville, Oregon will be long remembered as one of the most unique and successful tournaments ever staged. Oregon director Joe Nelson had a record 442 players playing on a dirt floor...and loving it!

And this year's meet will certainly have its own uniqueness, as players from throughout the USA and Canada will gather at 10th and Walnut Street in downtown Des Moines for a run at this 9th Annual Grand National.

## The Object of Cribbage is to Win the Game

Back in January, 1979, when I developed the scoring system for tournament play, I goofed!

An attempt was made to create a system in line with cribbage as generally played, with one exception. The custom of "double game for skunk" was not logical. So, the skunk value was arbitrarily set at one-half game. The game-point schedule initially chosen was 2, 3, and 4--the latter for a double skunk was soon dropped.

The need for game-point tie breakers was recognized, and without giving much thought to the consequences, spread points were arbitrarily given priority over games won. It soon became apparent that the player, who had already been rewarded with a one-half game advantage for a skunk, was being rewarded a second time with a spread-point advantage for the same accomplishment.

This fallacy was really brought to my attention one evening in our own Madison Metro #1 Grass Roots club, when four players tied for first place, each with 18 game points, as follows:

Rowley 9 0 1.000 +147 18GP Evenson 8 1 .888 +175 18GP Schultz 8 1 .888 +160 18GP Tilker 7 2 .777 +202 18GP At a glance, one might conclude that Rowley, with a perfect record, might have finished first, but take another look! Tilker, with the least impressive "win" record of the four, was awarded first place, followed by Evenson and Schultz in second and third. Using "net spread points" as a primary tie-breaker, Larry Rowley was relegated to fourth place. Is there any rhyme or reason for perpetuating this ill-advised inequity in our system?

In order of priority, most players concentrate on winning the game before aiming at a skunk. The same order of priority should prevail in the use of game-point tie-breakers.

In the Grass Roots program, the consequences of this inequitable procedure for breaking gamepoint ties are not as serious as major Congresssanctioned tournaments. From the beginning tie breakers were not used in the award of rating points for Grass Roots play. Instead, the total points associated with the position(s) for which two or more players tie are equally divided between the tied players. Based on the belief that the prize structure employed by a club is of local rather than national concern, club directors have the option of deciding the order of priority in the use of tie breakers. The hierarchy of the Grass Roots program strongly advocates the "games won" be utilized as the primary tie breaker in the award of cash prizes for reasons believed to be obvious.

MAJOR TOURNAMENTS--In the qualifying round of sanctioned tournaments, the same problem exists, and is of even greater significance because of the large amounts of money, the large number of players in the qualifying round, and the inherently inadequate method for cross-checking scorecards. Furthermore, it involves the award of Congress Master Points.

A 1989 study by director Jim Arblaster confirmed the belief held by many that "net spread points" is probably the least reliable statistic that one could choose for breaking ties because players are so erratic in recording spread points. In one tournament checked, the plus and minus totals failed to balance by 113 points.

It was found that, because of the unacceptable length of time it would take to cross-check all scorecards, many cards are not subjected to the cross-check process. To further illustrate the point I am trying to make, the following is a comparison of two players with identical game-point totals:

Anderson 13 8 .619 +126 26GP Wilson 11 10 .524 +130 26GP

Considering the fact that Anderson has a five to one net game advantage over Wilson, there seems to be little justice in allowing Wilson to qualify instead of Anderson, on the basis of 4 spread points. There certainly isn't any logic in it.

Many people fear to make changes. Some of you will recall the furor that developed when a few card manipulators robbed the prize funds of 10 to 15,000 dollars, and the Board of Directors found it necessary to make cutting the pack mandatory. It took about a year for people to accept the fact that it was necessary.

It behooves tournament managers to use GAMES WON as the primary tie breaker.

The buck stops right here with the President. I, personally accept all of the blame for this goofup. It was all my fault. I didn't know any better in 1979 when the system was created. Despite all of my tournament-staging experience in other games, I did not forsee the problem that I was creating. I know better now, and am anxious to right a wrong.

Please help me in this effort!

The American Cribbage Congress has appointed a Tournament Regulations and Guidelines committee to make final recommendations to the ACC Board of Directors on matters such as scoring and tie-breakers. In the interim, we encourage tournament directors to strongly consider president Wergin's recommendations.

However, until the Board of Directors votes on final tournament regulations (after considering the committee's recommendations), tournament directors have the option of tie-breaking systems in tournament play. Players must be informed of the tie-breaking method BE-FORE PLAY STARTS.

Cathy Perkins, Bear Creek, NC, heads this committee. Other members are Ron Hamilton, Larry Samet, Mickey Griffin, Roy Hofbauer, Fred Dettling, and Ken Cambell.

#### Mick Michaelis Tops Crack Field in Yankton

Robert "Mick" Michaelis, recently crowned Life Master from Marinette, WI, proved his rating is no fluke by winning the star-studded Lewis and Clark Classic in Yankton, SD.

Of the 122 peggers on hand, 5 were former national champions, all 3 Life Masters, 8 of 10 Grand Masters, and most of the remainder of the field were veteran peggers...including 1989 Grand National Champion Harvey Honeycutt from Beatty, OR.

Buzz Railsback, Syracuse, NE, worked his way through this tough field to claim 2nd. Bob Deeds, Elgin, IL, had his work cut out for him and edged 2-time national champion Butch Reynolds, Santa Maria, CA, for 3rd place. In taking 4th (and top qualifying honors), Butch edged closer to the top in the Master Point standings for the 1990 season, gaining some 140 Master Points, and needing only 177 to regain the MRP lead.

In the consolation event, the ladies took the honors. Darlene Johnson claimed first in the 90-player event, edging Jeanette Nielsen...a smooth pegger from Portland, OR. Gloria McCloud from Denver went home a winner in taking 3rd over Charlie Fletchall, a veteran pegger from Grimes, Iowa.

In the Friday "early bird," Master pegger Martha Fingleton took honors with a 20GP +194 card in this 9-game match. Martha has been on a roll lately with a 5th in Minneapolis, and a consolation winner in Milwaukee.

In the Saturday night event, Tubby Dahl, Blair, WI took home the marbles with a fine 19GP +188 9-game card.

This event drew players from throughout the USA, and was expertly managed by directors Scott Kooistra and his wife Linda. A 26% increase in attendance from 1989 attests to their well-organized and fair play.

#### Cream Rises To Top In Illinois

At the recent Northern Illinois Open, the cream rose to the top in the consolation match. The 44-player event was won by Duane Toll, Milwaukee, WI, recently crowned Grand Master, 2nd place went to Walt Chowanec, Milwaukee, WI, currently ranked in the top 100, 3rd was claimed by Bob McCabe, Brown Deer, WI, Grand Master, and 4th went to Bob Michaelis, Marinette, WI, one of three Life Masters.

And the winner of the 80-player main event was another Grand Master--Joe Bernard of Libertyville, IL.

## Kooistra, Motley in Dead Heat for National Title

With less than a month to go in the 1990 season, Scott Kooistra, Life Master, 5-time All-American from Yankton, SD, and Gary Motley from Gresham, OR are in a virtual unofficial dead heat with 1,600+ Master Rating Points.

Gary climbed into the race by qualifying 7th (of 282) and a 17-32 finish in Reno recently.

Third place finds another dead heat, with Butch Reynolds and DeLynn Colvert having an outside chance at the national title. Butch is a 2-time national champion and Grand Master from Santa Maria, CA. Butch recently qualified first and finished 4th at Yankton (122 players) adding 140 MRP's, making a sizeable gain on the entire field. DeLynn is a 5-time All-American and Life Master from Missoula, MT. Both players have approximately 1,475 MRP's.

Breathing down their necks are Jesse Jarrell, Pittsburg, CA (1,350), Helen Railsback, Syracuse, NE (1,200), Joseph Lusignan, Salinas, CA (1,100), Jim Waldorf, Madras, OR (1,100), Jeanne Hofbauer, Washougal, WA (1,050), Bill Christofferson, DeForest, IL (1,050), and Anna Abbott, Incline Village, NV (1,010).

With but a handful of tournaments remaining, this 1990 season is heading for the tightest race in years. The National Open in Raleigh (434 players) offers the greatest opportunity for a player to grab the title.

#### Cliff Clark Scores \$1,000 29-Hand Ralph Hart Cops Independence Day Classic in Reno

Reno's Sands Casino was home for a 3-day weekend for some 282 peggers playing for the Independence Day Classic title. Ralph Hart from Roseburg, OR came away with all the marbles (and a sizeable purse) by edging out Beatrice Olyer, Fairfield, CA, in the final match.

Frank Ornie, the Modesto, CA kid, knocked off Wayne Glashan, Pittsburg, CA for third place. Wayne finished in the money with a fine 4th. Charlie Clark, Missoula, MT, finished 5th to keep a "hot" streak alive, and will move up considerably in the Western Region's top 50.

In the sizeable consolation match (176 players), Fred Dettling took the honors, and perennial winner Jesse Jarrell, Pittsburg, CA, took 2nd. Fred hails from Aurora, CO.

Sundae Webb began the weekend on a tear. She waxed the field in the Friday "early bird," scoring a 20 GP card in 9 games...and continued her streak in the qualifying round the next morning. Her top qualifying round score of 39 GP's topped the field, and insured a profitable weekend. Sundae hails from San Ramon, CA.

Cliff Clark, a Union City, CA pegger finally collected the \$1,000 the Sands Casino has been offering for the past few years for a 29-hand. Alas, Cliff is not an ACC member...and missed out on another \$100.

#### It's Not As Tough As Cribbage World Thinks

I'm entering my first ACC tournament and I'm pumped up about it--it's the National Open. I thought about entering others over the past two years but conflicts always came up. I guess it doesn't hurt to think big.

The BIG number printed on page 7 of the June 1990 Cribbage World is why I am writing. It is true that  $52 \times 51 \times 50 \times 49 \times ...3 \times 2 \times 1 = 8.0658$ x 10 (67), but since cribbage only uses the first 13 cards, the arrangement of the last 39 does not matter, 52 x 51 x 50 x ... 41 x 40 is approximately 3,954 x 10 (21), but even this much smaller number is still too large since it doesn't really matter to the play of the game whether the five of spades was the first card, or the seventh, it will still appear in the opponent's hand. Mathematically, we have to talk about combinations, or combinatorics. The number of ways you can choose 6 cards from 52 is 20,358,520, for the first hand. The number of ways to choose 6 cards from the remaining 46 is 9,366,819. There are 40 ways to pick a card for the cut. Combining these, there are 7,627,782,877,915,200 "starting positions" in cribbage. This is a LOT smaller than the number printed in Cribbage World, but it is large enough that the comment still holds: "you will never in a hundred lifetimes play the same game twice." (In theory, there are 576 different ways to lay down two hands in pegging, and 36 different ways to discard to the crib, but a great many of them would be unnatural, and probably never occur.)

See you at the tournament? Anyway, keep up the good work.

Let's go to tournaments to have fun and enjoy the great game of cribbage and the fellowship of those who also enjoy the game. I think that can be done without causing anyone any embarrassment by making them feel inferior because they are not quite as fast as their opponent. LET'S BE SPORTSMEN!!!

Qualifying Round: Top 1/8 earns one-quarter points, i.e., 100 players, top qualifier earns 25 points, 2nd earns 23, etc.

Main Tournament: Top 1/8 earns full points, i.e., 100 players, champion earns 100 points, 2nd earns 92, 3rd earns 84, etc. If 40 or more players, Bonus Points are earned: 1st earns 40 bonus points, 2nd earns 20, 3rd earns 10, and 4th earns 5. In this example, No. 1 earns 140 points (100 + 40).

Consolation Tournament: Top 1/8 earns one-half points, i.e., 64 players, 1st earns 32 points, 2nd earns 28 points, 3rd earns 24 points, etc. Bonus Points are earned: 1st earns 20 bonus points, 2nd earns 10 points, 3rd earns 5 points and 4th earns 3 points. In this example, No. 1 earns 52 points (32 + 20).


