All Time High

American Cribbage Congress Membership Hits 5,441

With two months to go in the 1990 cribbage season, the American Cribbage Congress's membership has swelled to an all-time high 5,441 members.

Records have been set for individual tournaments in the Western (ACC Open: 634) and Central region (Green Bay's MGM: 572) this season. And in the Eastern region, a record crowd is a possibility later this month at the National Open in Raleigh.

California is leading the membership parade with some 841 members, closely followed by Oregon with 709. Wisconsin (508) and Massachusetts (395) are other "hot beds" of cribbage action. Just lately, the Rhode Island Open drew 266 players for a one-day tourney (see page 5).

Cribbage World is receiving record numbers of upcoming tournaments to begin the 1991 year. All projections are for an even bigger and better year in 1991 than 1990.

In 1990, the ACC will crown at least 3 Life Masters, 3 Grand Masters, and 22 Master players. And a record fifteen 29-hands have been scored this year, earning the recipients \$100 and a framed award, to be presented at this year's Grand National in Des Moines, Iowa.

Remember President Joe Wergin's exhortations in the early 1980's to "think big!?" Let's not sit on our laurels. Everyone...sign up a friend today...let's keep rolling!

Antique Cribbage Boards

There are a number of our members who collect cribbage boards, and, as I remember, Robert A. Read of Florida and John Blinn of Ohio, are two of them.

Most vintage boards that I have seen, have no dates upon them.

There is before me a unique board patented June 11, 1940, by a Kalamazoo, Michigan, company. It is unique in that it is made up of two four-sided strips of wood, nine and one-half inches long. These two sticks of wood are slightly over one-half inch in width with 30 holes, one street, on each side of the stick. The latter rotates as the game proceeds along.

The no. 1 side has imprinted on it "start" with an arrow showing direction. When the score rises to 31, the stick is turned for second street. At the end of second street is the number "60." At the end of fourth street, one is greeted with the word "HOME."

Apparently, this board was manufactured for shipment to the military. At the VFW someone remarked that 40,000 boards were shipped overseas during World War 2. The cardboard case accompanying the boards survived in good condition.

The second board of interest was patented by C. W. LeCount in 1879 in South Norwalk, CT. That is a heavy board about 11 inches long, 3 inches wide, and 1 1/4 inches high. On the side of it is a slide to place a deck inside. The entire top is of metal and drilled holes.

The owner of this board states that it has been in his family over 75 years.

Members who have antique boards should send their stories in.

The big news out of Madison this past week was the annoucement by Gaylord Matti that Grass Roots Commissioner Jerry Dickinson will be his co-director for the 1991 MADISON MASTERS CLASSIC. The entire committee met a few weeks ago and detailed plans were made. The tournament dates are April 19, 20, and 21, 1991.

In announcing that Dickinson accepted the offer to co-direct, Matti said: "I am delighted that Jerry decided to help. He is a proven administrator and in addition to his military career, he has served on civic committees in Dane County."

In closing Matti added: "Madison is a great location, it is a beautiful city, and Jerry and I and the members of Grass Roots #1 are determined to make it the best run tournament. second to none, in the United States. That is why our committee is already working on ways to improve the 1990 meet."

"Onion Awards"

U. S. Senator Bill Proxmire used to give out the famous "onion awards." There are several Grass Root record-keepers who have qualified for that award in the past season.

It has been called to our attention that in a few cases, individuals who volunteered to keep club records, certainly did that. But they also agreed to send them in weekly reports of a night's play. One southern individual did not send a thing in and when members demanded the records, the answer was: "I did not keep them." Net result, a few members of the club will not get invitations to the Tournament of Champions!



Western Region Players Lusignan, Waldorf, **Hofbauer Crack** 1,000 MRP Barrier

With two months remaining in the 1990 season, three Western Region players have recently earned 1,000+ Master Rating Points for this cribbage year, giving them a shot at All-American honors and the 1990 national championship.

Joseph Lusignan, Salinas, CA--a regular on the California circuit--vaulted into 7th place with 1,074 MRPs, by winning the Superbowl V consolation title.

Jim Waldorf, Madras, OR, does his pegging in the Northwest, and with a recent 7th place finish at the Cascade Classic (155 players) moved into 8th place with 1,055 MRPs.

Jeanne Hofbauer--another Northwest player-has been scoring steadily this year, and with a 9-16 finish at the Oregon Coast Classic, has a lock on 9th with 1,045 MRPs.

With some 155 peggers in the competition, Mitch Bourland, Prineville, OR, emerged the champion by winning the final match over tough-pegging Betty Capper (co-director of the Greater Hermiston Open). Mitch also has an Oregon Championship under his belt and can now add this Cascade Classic title to his laurels.

Pat LaBrasseur--one of Oregon's finest peggers from Albany--claimed 3rd over Dorothy Mickow. Dorothy is a fine pegger from the Portland area and is getting her name in the winner's column more frequently, having finished in 11th place at the recent Greater Hermiston Open (194 peggers).

Veteran pegger Frank Ingels, Dufur, OR, claimed the consolation title, and taking 2nd was another journeyman pegger--Frank Symons, Madras, OR.

The doubles crown was claimed by Dixie Morken, Sisters, OR, teaming with Dottie Richmond, a smooth pegger from Woodland, OR.

Jim Brooks went home to Crescent City, CA, with a nice profit after winning the Friday night "high roller" event.


And Phil Symons, Ashwood, OR, also went home a winner after picking up the Saturday night special crown. The Symon's clan have a habit of always being in the thick of the action.

Roy Hofbauer, the ACC's Western Region Tournament Commissioner, was high qualifier, winning 18 of 22 games, and making off with the "Q" money.

Director's Bill Dunn and Rob Kirkpatrick did a great job, despite their controversial one-point scoring system (no bonus for skunks). This rule had little effect on the outcome, except for a handful of players, some benefiting, some not. And their "no smoking while playing" rule drew applause from the non-smokers.

Tops Field of 266 John Marani Wins Rhode Island Open

The Omni Biltmore Hotel in Providence, RI, was home for a day for some 266 peggers, all of whom were in quest of the 1990 Rhode Island Open Title.

When the smoke had cleared in this one-day tourney, John Marani, Quincy, MA, had captured the title by besting Cal Calabro, Warwick, RI, in the final match. Third was taken by K. C. Finley, Enfield, CT, and fourth by Arthur Martin, Northboro, MA.

Louis Caccia won over a sizeable field of 178 peggers in the consolation match. Louis (a Newtonville, MA pegger) edged out Alphonse Lefebvre, Warwick, RI. D. Carl Deyette, E. Hartford, CT, claimed 3rd, followed by Mike Woodell, Holyoke, MA, in 4th.

William Medeiros, Easton, MA, moved up a notch or two in the Eastern Region top 50 standings with a fine 8th place finish, picking up some 257 Master Rating Points.

Also picking up a sizeable number of MRP's and moving up in the standings was Emil Chrabaszcz, Ware, MA. Emil finished 6th and added some 279 MRP's to this year's total.

Tournament director Joe Ramos reported that a beneficiary of this tournament was the Muscular Dystrophy Association. This charity received \$897.50 from the players.

Hall 'O Famer Pendergast Keeps 'Em Pegging!

Nelson Ira Pendergast--recently inducted into the Cribbage Hall of Fame--has the veterans in Albany, NY pegging. Ira conducted 7 tournaments in April alone. Ira is famous in the VA hospital for his cribbage "fever."

Illinois State Cribbage Tournament Celebrates 10 Years

Director Bob Madsen says that this 10th Annual Illinois State Cribbbage Tournament, to be played August 25th and 26th, will be the biggest and best ever. It will be played at the Marriott Oakbrook Hotel, which is located just west of Chicago off the East-West Tollway, I-88, and just west of the Tri-state Tollway, I-294. Exit off the East-West Tollway I-88 at the first exit and you will see the Marriott.

Nick Ayoob is "World Champ"

Nick Ayoob, Quincy, CA, a former two-time World Champion, won the title again May 5, beating William Bell of Sherman Oaks, CA, in the finals of the 19th Annual World Championship held in Quincy, CA.

Ayoob, the WCCT's first winner in 1972, repeated in 1973. He joins Bernard Rubin of San Mateo, CA, ('74-'75-'76) as the only triple champs.

The World Championship event, hosted by Quincy Rotary Club as a charity benefit for its community improvement fund, attracted 200 peggers. Total prize and trophy distribution topped \$10,000, according to Mike Taborski, chairman.

Bill Sands, Chico, CA, held the first ever 29-hand in the 19-year run of the WCCT. Alas, it was in a losing effort in a match with Goldia Rogers of Sonoma, CA. Goldia went on to claim third place. Sands is not an ACC member, and is not elgible for the ACC's \$100, but Ev Bey, founder of this tournament, has had a standing prize of \$100 for a 29-hand, so Bill did not go home empty handed.

John Cullen, Quincy, CA, and Bill Kemp, Chester, CA, teamed to win the "early bird" doubles event.

Bill Irons, director of two annual Reno tournaments, claimed the Kozlowski Memorial award--a \$200 prize for the best tournament record by a Nevadan. Bill finished 4th.

Gudauskas Scores a 29 Dick Amos Wins 10th Annual Connecticut Championship

Dick Amos, a smooth-pegging Texan, won the 10th Annual Connecticut Championship, by outlasting a field of 108 players. Frank Cummings, Chelmsford, MA, claimed 2nd, followed by Pat Frattalone in 3rd and John Marani in 4th. Pat hails from South Windsor, CT, and John from Quincy, MA. With his 4th place finish, John continues his "hot" scoring pace for the 1990 season.

86 of the 108 entrants played the consolation (an extremely high percentage). Paul Gallagher claimed the title, with 2nd going to last year's Eastern Region champion Al Miller. Paul is from Avon, MA, while Al hails from Nashua, NH.

Bill Gudauskas, Rockville, CT, scored a 29-hand in sanctioned play and becomes the 15th member of the exclusive "Club 29" for the 1990 season. Bill also will receive \$100 for this rare hand.

Bard, Alkas, Finley Win 5th Annual Team Championship

Carl Bard, Manchester, CT, won 24 of 30 games to lead teammates Rit Alkas and Charley Finley to the 5th Annual Team Championship in Willimantic, CT, June 3. The Bill Shoemaker, Al Dinwoodie, George Blessing trio finished 2nd in the 11-team event. ACC VP Ev Bey stormed east from California to win 20 games and a share of the "Q" pool.

Tournament Mandatory Requirements

Effective September 1, 1990, new mandatory requirements for ACC sanctioned tournaments will go into effect. The Board of Directors approved the revisions at its Reno meeting, February 1.

- ACC rules for playing as outlined in the Official Rules Book must be adhered to.
- Payback percentages as calculated now must total at least 85% benefits for the player, in the main and consolation events.
 (Further definition of "benefits" are to be forthcoming.)

One-Day Tournaments:

- Minimum number of games for qualifying: 11.
- Percentage of players who qualify: 1 of 4 (1 of 6 allowable if indicated on entry form).
- Playoff round minimum: best 2 of 3 games

Two-Day Tournaments:

- Minimum number of games for qualifying: 20.
- Percentage of players who qualify: 1 of 4.
- Playoff round minimum: best 2 of 3 games for first round, 3 of 5 after.

Consolation Tournaments, One-Day:

- Minimum number of games for qualifying:
 7.
- Percentage of players who qualify: 1 of 4 (1 of 6 if indicated on entry form).
- Playoff round minimum: best 2 of 3 games for head-to-head matches.

Consolation Tournaments, Two-Day:

- Minimum number of games for qualifying:
 9.
- Percentage of players who qualify: 1 of 4.
- Playoff round minimum: best 2 of 3 games for head-to-head matches.

Following approval of the new requirements, the Board of Directors voted to allow Tournament Commissioners to permit exceptions to established formats, including head-to-head, round-robin, and double elimination.

Scott Kooistra was chairman of the committee recommending the new mandatory tournament requirements. Others on the committee included Jim Fabian, Jim Angell, Bernie Nelson, Al Miller, and Paul Woytovich.

A sub-committee to advise on One-Day Tournaments was headed by John Chambers. It included Lou Delu, Joan Rein, Gene Biegler, Jack Monroe, and Ruth Nielsen.

Ev Bey, VP-Policy, said he is now seeking volunteers to serve on a new Tournament Regulations committee, looking to establish mandatory standards for Round-Robin and Double-Elimination tournaments, as well as suggest recommended guidelines (non-mandatory) for ACC sanctioned tournaments. Definition of "player benefits" affecting tournament payback will also be sought.

Want to Find New Players?

Do you want to find cribbage players? Run a tournament where the public can see you. We held the Ben Franklin Open at the Franklin Mills Mall, advertised as the largest outlet mall in the country. The contest was placed in a large exhibit area, where shoppers were passing by. Many long-time cribbage players discovered organized cribbage and the American Cribbage Congress. The Middle Atlantic Cribbage Society is now inviting the newly found players to their meeting, and the mailing list for the Ben Franklin has grown substantially.

We did not experience any interference from the public, and noise was not a problem.

Because of a last minute cancellation, I, as codirector, entered the tournament. On Sunday afternoon I landed in first place in the 86player field. Oops!

Hey, Dealer's Sneak a Peek, Too!

I mentioned to many directors and Frank Zabrowski in 1988 when I took my first judges exam that there is no penalty for a dealer looking at the bottom card. He can look three times. I saw a dealer do it twice during one deal, when the pone wasn't watching.

There should be a 2-point penalty for each infraction.

There is a 2-point penalty for the pone...so why none for the dealer? Cheat...if you get caught, no penalty. Not fair.

The only protection the pone has in a case like this is to call the dealer on his "sneaking a peek" and then asking for a re-deal. If the dealer continues to peek, call a judge. If this does not stop the peeking, the player should be disqualified.

Slow Players, Shape Up!

Regarding Cribbage World's comments on being considerate to new or slow players, I agree, however, when you sit behind someone for 22 games who consistently takes 20 to 30 minutes to play each game...who's day lack enjoyment?

This problem will continue until the tournament directors either do not play or name a non-playing head judge to handle "slow play" complaints. Meanwhile each table with one slow player will wait and wait and wait 22 times. Many slow players are veteran players who cannot talk and play at the same time.

As a tournament director, I must agree whole-heartedly with Ray's comments. From past experience, notifying a slow player to speed up is one of the most difficult tasks in a tournament...especially if you don't want to lose a player through hard feelings. I beseech all tournament players to objectively analyze their play. If you consistently see an empty seat ahead of you in the rotation...you are probably playing too slowly. Perhaps you're shuffling too much, or not laying the cards on the next dealer's side after counting, or simply talking too much. As Ray points out, speeding up your play to match the other players speed is also being considerate on your part.
