The 17th Annual National Open, Granddaddy tournament of the Eastern Region, and one of the ACC's most prestigious, will be played once again in Raleigh, NC, July 28, 29, and 30.

This unique tournament is a double elimination, best 4 of 7 matches, with skunks counting two games, and "muggins" allowed.

Another unique feature is the quality and space of the playing area. Each match has ample "elbow room," complete with white linen, and is well managed by director Nick Pond.

Attesting to this tournament's popularity is the huge field of 417 peggers who attended last year's meet.

A full weekend of cribbage is scheduled: Championship, Consolation, Loser's Losers, and the Last Roundup, which should give the players ample opportunity to be a winner.

This well organized tourney will be played at the North Raleigh Hilton in Raleigh. See the "Tournament Trail" in the back of this publication for more details.

The President's Column Joseph Petrus Wergin

Our WONDERFUL WORLD OF CARDS includes the games that ordinary people play in their local tournaments or card parties. We call them the Grass Roots games.

In between the sessions of the major tournaments, our Knights of the Peg indulge in these other games to relax and to forget the pressures of tournament play.

At the Madison Masters Classic in early May, several members of the Milwaukee contingent--Warren Sondericker, Bob McCabe, Martha Fingleton, along with Joe Bernard of Illinois, and several others-- engaged in a game of gin rummy. If you don't know it, gin is a rival of cribbage for being the most popular two-handed game in America. Gin is a game that requires an excellent memory or a good bank account, while cribbage requires very little memory.

This scribe put a question to the above mentioned players. Why don't we try something big? Why not a cardplayer's OLYMPIC TOURNAMENT. Bob McCabe said: "It sounds good to me. We can call it the OLYMPIC PENTATHALON."

"Great Idea!" interrupted Warren Sondericker. "And be sure you include the game of "hearts." As we talked about other games to include, it appeared that besides the three games mentioned above, sheepshead and euchre be included.

It was mentioned that if players don't know all the five games listed, they have a year to learn them

The point in promoting something like this is that one game helps another. Cribbage will benefit from the entire arrangement. Now we need help to formulate plans for the Pentathalon of Cards.

About every two years, farmer Ray Wileman makes this column. Ray is probably the best cribbage player in Rock County, Wisconsin, and plays weekly at the Madison #1 Metro Club.

His latest accomplishment is the nine-for-nine series plus 216 spread points that he posted in a recent session. Ray is still farming and specializing in beef cattle. Incidentally, he received his early training while attending Edgerton High School. And he became a star end on the football team as a result of the great coaching that he received from this columnist. He is also being schooled every Thursday evening when he tries to win a game from the coach. Good thing for Ray that on the nine-fornine night, they were on different tables.

The Grass Roots season ends June 30th and local directors are urged to send their reports promptly to headquarters. When one person, who volunteered, delays doing a job on time, the whole system suffers. So, you-all, get on the ball!

Madison Players are going to the dogs! With the opening of the first dog track in the state, the local Grass Rooters are headed to Wisconsin Dells Dog Track. Mason, Stendlund Score 29's Kooistra Wins Masters Classic

With a record setting crowd of 188 peggers, Scott Kooistra, Yankton, SD captured the Masters Classics in Madison, WI. Scott nosed out Barbara Moritz in the deciding game. Barb hails from West Allis, WI.

With this win, Scott roared into the lead for this year's Master Point honors. His total to date (1,615) is some 300 points ahead of second place Gary Motley, Gresham, OR.

Kelli Mason, a new ACC member playing in her first tournament, had the thrill of a lifetime by holding a 29 hand. Kelli's father, Dave Niehoff, is a past winner of this meet. A second 29 hand was held by University of Wisconsin student, Don Stendlund.

Director Gaylord Matti was elated with the turnout, and stated the Madison club has recruited 40 new members during the last two years and another 26 via the Masters Classic. Director Matti says the local club has some exciting plans for the 1991 meet (to be released in Cribbage World soon).

Todd Anderson has 16th 28-hand Oops! ACC Open Had 16 28-hands

Our May issue stated that the ACC Open in Reno had a record 15 28-hands. A phone call from Todd Anderson, Portland, OR, increased the total to 16. So, if any of the 15 players reported this to the Guinness Book of Records...please send a correction.

Jay DeJaynes Tarheel Champ

Fayetteville pegger Jay DeJaynes captured the North Carolina Open by besting Henry Douglass, Reidsville, NC in a tough final. Jeff Raynes, Raleigh, NC, was 3rd, followed by LaRue Lanier, Jacksonville, NC.

This tournament drew 84 tough peggers to Southern Pines, NC. The consolation (44 players) was won by William Bright, Virginia Beach, VA, besting Bob Moore, Reidsville, NC.

Two 29's Within 5 Minutes!

In the "early bird" of the recent Hawkeye Classic, played in Des Moines, Iowa, TWO 29 HANDS WERE SCORED WITHIN 5 MIN-UTES! The first was scored by Kay Griffin, Des Moines, and the second by Lew Foss of Minneapolis.

Kay and Lew are just a little too fast on the draw. The next day these perfect hands would have been worth a cool \$100! And membership in our ACC's exclusive "29 Club."

Marinette, WI, Pegger Robert Mick Michaelis Earns Life Master

Robert Mick Michaelis, Marinette, WI, became the third player to earn Life Master on April 22, 1990. Mick reached this 6,000 Master Rating Point plateau by finishing 7th in a record-breaking field of 188 players at the Masters Classic in Madison, WI.

Mick is a perennial winner, having earned All-American honors five times, and was the national champion in 1984. In addition, Mick finished the 1989 season as the number one lifetime scoring leader with 5,555 MRPs...not a bad number for a cribbage player!

Mick is also director of the annual Tri-Cities Open in Marinette, WI. In this year's meet, he finished 2nd in a field of 152, earning 164 MRPs, and combined with the 140 MRPs earned in Madison, pushed him over the magic 6,000 mark.

Qualifying Round Oddities

In the qualifying round of the Point Classic I, Stevens Point, WI, Patrick Barrett, director, reports a couple of oddities:

Arlene Barrett, Wisconsin Rapids, WI, had a hot match with Marsha Henderson, Forestville, WI. The first hand of the game Marsha holds JIJK and cuts a jack. The next hand Arlene holds 8886 and cuts an 8. The next hand Marsha holds 4445 and cuts a 4. Wow! Three "case" card cuts in a row!

Now it's Patrick Barrett's turn. Patrick is the director and he picks on his poor wife. The last 4 deals he counts 16 each time. That finishes off his wife, then in the next game, his first hand is another 16. Five in a row! Directors should be a little more discreet. But no, he goes on to win his own tournament!

ACC Warhorse Dale Munroe Earns Master Rating

Dale Munroe, Cribbage World's editor for the past five years, and a real workhorse for the American Cribbage Congress, recently earned his 2,000 Master Rating Points and became the ACC's 51st Master player.

Dale Munroe, Bob Plourde, and their staff in Connecticut, certainly deserve a pat on the back from all the members of the American Cribbage Congress for their work in preparing and mailing Cribbage World for the past five years or so. Two other co-directors--Jeanne and Roy Hofbauer--reported the event went smooth as clockwork, so much so that 62 players stuck around for a "last chance" crybaby tourney.

Four 28 hands were scored, but they were overshadowed by a 29 hand, scored by ACC board member Jim Angell, Concord, CA. Jim is excitedly looking forward to receiving his 29-award at the Grand National in Des Moines this coming September.



The "Maris Syndrome" In Cribbage (It's time to indroduce the *)

In 1961, baseball, like cribbage, the great American pastime, had to resort to the infamous asterisk (*) when Roger Maris hit 61 home runs. Why? Simply because extra games were necessary for him to accomplish the feat of surpassing the immortal Babe Ruth's 1927 record of 60.

Today, I see the hierarchy of Master Points embellished by a few players who have had the opportunity to participate in extra games. While I don't like to use unsupported "statistics", I have nothing else to use. I only hope I'm not too far off base. I visualize about 90% of tournament players, playing and earning the bulk of their Master Points within their own geographical division.

The other ten percent travel the tournament trail all over the United States which results in many more times at bat than the average player. Under the present practice, A Master or Grand Master of the game could be acheived without earning a Master rating within a single division. Average players probably look to a four to six year period of time to reach the "Master" classification. Global players can acheive this or higher in less than half the time.


Is it fair? I don't believe it is. Can the problem be resolved without leaving bad feelings and/ or degrading personal accomplishments? I believe it can be done. How? By introducing the asterisk (*) and creating a new division to accomodate this group. In addition to a geographical "home" division, qualified players (those amassing Master Points in two or more divisions) would become members of an "Asterisk Division" wherein their global participation can be documented and achievements recorded. This select and distinguished group of players could still maintain the ardent pursuit and love for the game they currently demonstrate. I'm also sure that the division would accumulate a wide following of many interested and envious "cribbers."

In all fairness, and for more meaningful statistics and records, only Master Points earned within a specific division should be used to determine standings in that area. Without this (*) division, the Championship of the three current divisions, Eastern, Central, and Western, and the selection of the ALL AMERICAN TEAM will be monopolized by the Maris' of cribbage.
