# 1991 Cribbage Year Begins With a Bang!

#### Memberships at All-Time High

Newly elected Executive Vice President Bob McCabe takes over his new duties with the American Cribbage Congress on a roll. Three attendance records have fallen in sanctioned tournaments in the Western Region, and the 1991 season is barely a month old. And nationally, the ACC is at an all-time high with some 5,624 members as of September, 1990.

California is leading the "charge" with 926 members on the roster, followed by Oregon's 712 peggers. And in California, the 9th Annual Wine Valley Open in Napa, set a new high for that tournament with 208 players, while two Oregon tournaments also set new highs to begin the new season. The Blue Mountain Open in LaGrande drew 150, while the Capitol City Classic in Salem had 198 (see stories, this issue).

Players are now able to pick and choose tournaments, as sanctioned tournaments are also scheduled in record-setting numbers.

With 1991 being a "short" 11-month year, due to a unanimous vote of the Board of Directors to begin play every year on August 1, instead of September 1 (allowing time to organize the Grand National programs, awards, etc.), the new year, nevertheless appears to be on a banner course.





# The President's Column Joseph Petrus Wergin

#### Sir John Suckling's Numbers

Sir John Suckling, the great gamester, had to be a keen student of the magic of numbers. Why did he choose 15 as the spot where 2 holes were awarded?

In our research of card games, there has been no explanation of why certain numbers were set as goals.

Let's take a look at the single digit numbers of a deck of cards--9--8--7--6--5--4--3--2--1. Sir John had to be aware of arranging the numbers in a square which, when totaled horizontally, vertically, and diagonally, add up to 15.

Every result obtained adds up to 15. Hence, this number was accepted as the mark where 2 points are awarded for this accomplishment.

In the case of the 31-point count for the "go," it was probably derived from the game of Noddy, the forerunner of cribbage. The scoring mark for Noddy was 21. The early cribbers determined that 31 should be the "go" point. The original game of cribbage was played with five cards. In fact, the five-card game is still popular in England.

With the advent of six cards being dealt to eac, player and the crib making up an extra hand for the dealer, innovators set the "go" mark at 34 instead of 31. This change failed to get much support and was soon dropped.

#### Cribbage Clinic at the Mall

The two Madison Grass Roots clubs, Metro #1, and the 99ers, staged a "Cribbage Clinic" at the Hilldale Mall for the purpose of contacting new players. The clinic was held on Friday and Saturday, the week before the Grand National.

Places for six games were set up in the mall, and the public was invited to play the club members one game. If a newcomer won, the Chocolate Shoppe gave a free chocolate sundae. In addition, the guests registered for a drawing for gifts donated by the clubs and by merchants. A pamphlet of 12 pages containing tips on cribbage and schedules of Grass Roots clubs were given to everyone.

About 100 newcomers registered for the drawing and most of them had the time to play a game at the busy mall. They learned that there is a national organization and that they are welcome to join a Grass Roots club.

And as usual, Jack Monroe ran a fine tournament, ably assisted by our membership secretary, Jeff Monroe.

In the 60-player consolation, Ray Warner, Madison, WI, took the title, with Leo Schwedrsky, Lyndon Station, WI, taking 2nd.

## Hall 'O Famer Jim Arblaster Wins Gold Coast Classic

Hall 'O Famer Jim Arblaster, Kissimmee, FL, took the title in the recent Gold Coast Classic, played in Pompano Beach, FL, besting some 58 peggers.

Richard Bett, from Lackawanna, NY, took 2nd, followed by Jeanne Daesch, Miami Springs, FL, in 3rd, and Dave Ritchey, Orange City, FL, in 4th.

# 4 Months Minimum Planning a Sanctioned Tournament? START EARLY

Cribbage World's "Tournament Trail" section has many entries from tournament director, that are LATE!...and fail to give the ACC membership adequate notification.

Your first application should be at least four months prior to your tournament, if you wish to have adequate notification.

The ACC is not as bad as the pentagon...but almost. First, you apply to your region's commissioner and receive forms of application (week or so). You forward the forms (another week). The commissioner forwards the approved application to Cribbage World (another week). Cribbage World type sets the column (along with other copy) and forwards to the printer (1 to 3 weeks). The printer takes up to 7 days. Next comes the labeling (2 days). Then mailing 3rd class bulk (1 to 3 weeks). Enough said? START EARLY! FOUR MONTHS MINIMUM!





# Ace of Spades What Next? Stadium Cribbage

The Ace of Spades is a curious type of playing card to most serious card players. The card seems to excite a great deal of emotion in players. Taxes, Death, Strength, Power, Gypsies, and Fortune Tellers are just a few of the emotional images that the Ace of Spades produces.

During the American Revolutionary War, the Ace of Spades was selected to be imprinted with a one farthing tax on playing cards sent to the colonies. Thus everytime a colonist dealt a hand of cards they were reminded of the King's tax on pleasure. Perhaps thats why Ben Franklin printed Revolutionary decks of playing cards that featured George Washington's head on the Kings, Martha Washington's head on the Queens, and Jefferson, Franklin, and others on the Jacks. King George VI was so upset with the Declaration of Independence by his unloyal subjects that he ordered all English packs of playing cards to carry (REX 2 Farthings) tax and a date of July 4, 1776.

Past history and practice seems to continue with the Ace of Spades. American and Canadian card manufacturers still use the Ace of Spades for their logo imprints; and the legends and stories of the mystique of the ACE OF SPADES continues!

Give me the FIVE OF SPADES!

Have you ever played Stadium Cribbage? Several years ago when my nephew attended college, he belonged to a fraternity that from time to time came up with very original ways of entertaining themselves.

One year about two hours before game time, two fraternity members solicited the help of four pledges and proceeded to play Stadium Cribbage.

The two players sat at a table on the football field's 50-yard line. The four pledges positioned themselves in the upper deck, two at the far left side of row five and two at the far left side of row ten. As play progressed, a megaphone was used to relay the number of seats ("holes") to be moved.

Play continued until the winning set of "pledges" (pegs) reached the far right side of the upper deck. No one bothered to count off 121 seats. In some stadiums the game could easily go past 500 points. Has anyone else found other ways of playing?

#### When in Doubt, Vote!

There are many controversial issues regarding tournament play which are at the discretion of the tournament director. These include scoring systems, Q-Pool distribution, muggins, dealing, tie-breaking, playoff format, etc. Some players want them all standardized, others don't. The ACC makes recommendations. There are studies, surveys, committees, and sub-committees. There is a lot of arguing. There is a lot of politicking. There is a lot of complaining.

George Bickford has found a way to cut through all this. George is from East Longmeadow, MA, and runs the Dante tournament in W. Springfield. He has been doing so for 14 years. For the last two of those years, he has done something I have never seen done before and would strongly recommend to all tournament directors.

Each year George chooses a different one of those controversial issues, and calls for a vote on the TOURNAMENT APPLICATION. He tallies the votes and acts accordingly, even if it means abandoning something he's done for a long time (not easy for many people).

What a practicle, simple, beautiful idea! Think about what it accomplishes. It ensures that a tournament is being run, not the way the director wants it, not the way the BOD wants it, not the way the ACC members 2,000 miles away want it, but the way the players at that particular tournament on that particular day want it run! Isn't that what this is supposed to be all about?

Nice going, George. Thanks for thinking.
