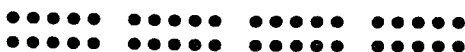

296 in Des Moines

Clay Collier Wins Grand National

Ray Boesel Cops Consolation

A huge crowd of 296 peggers were on hand at the beautiful Hotel Fort Des Moines pegging for the 1990 Grand Master title. Working his way through this tough field, Clay Collier from Beatrice, Nebraska claimed the championship.

Karen Grisim, Northfield, MN, finished a strong 2nd, followed by Gary Motley in 3rd. Gary was named to the All-American team for 1990 the day before...and appears to be on his way again in 1991. Gary hails from Gresham, OR. Jack Shaw, Lincoln, NE, finished 4th.

Master player Ray Boesel, Glenbuelah, WI, won the 210-player consolation, followed by Don Jurgens, St. Paul, MN, in 2nd. Larry Good, tournament director from Seaside, CA, took 3rd, and Cathy Perkins...North Carolina's premier player from Bear Creek..took 4th.



Early bird and Saturday night action saw Robert Sommer, Excelsior, MN, win with a 20GP +193 card Friday, and newly crowned Master player Sundae Webb took Saturday's special with a 17GP +131 card.

And, alas, once again a 29-hand was scored on Friday by Frank Trojan. This New Brighton, MN, pegger was one day early on the draw, missing out on the \$100 for a sanctioned "29."

MIND SPORTS OLYMPIAD

The mind sport games will have their initial World Tournament in 1993 in Great Britain and this writer is in contact with the committee to help set up the program. The Olympiad will be staged every two years.

There are five skillful card games which will be included in the games--cribbage, skat, bridge, poker, and gin rummy.

Besides card games, there are about 21 other mind sport games and listed herewith are the more common ones: backgammon, chess, chinese chess, dominoes, checkers, fantasy and war games, go, mah jong, monopoly, scrabble, and trivial pursuit. Players may compete in more than one game if schedules permit.

The players will pay for their own travel accommodations, and pay a registration fee. There will be related activities to occupy the competitors such as lectures, demonstrations by great players, antique collections, seminars, and electric screens displaying games in progress.

The prizes are gold, silver, and bronze medals, and there will be cash donated by sponsors.

Madison, Wisconsin, which has a world-wide reputation of being an intellectual center, is considering making a bid for the 1995 MIND SPORTS OLYMPIAD.

The company has under production, a series of board games related to cribbage, which are slanted for use in home and schools. These games teach math skills through cribbage, and geography and other subjects.

Professor Karl Grube is assisted in the development of games by two other retired professors of Michigan University. There are several other people in the organization which is slanted to the educational development of the individual child.

All members of the Congress are urged to teach their children or grandchildren to play our unique game and be a part of the CRIBBAGE GENERATION. There are several books authored by leading educators which emphasize the value of card playing by children.

Robert McCabe, Scott Kooistra Elected to Cribbage Hall of Fame

Needing 24 votes to be elected to the Cribbage Hall of Fame, both Robert McCabe and Scott Kooistra received exactly that many votes to become the 12th and 13th persons to be inducted.

Robert McCabe, Brown Deer, Wisconsin, has proved his skill on the playing table, earning Master and Grand Master status, and has won 7 sanctioned tournaments. His contributions to cribbage do not stop there. Bob has contributed hundreds of hours to the American Cribbage Congress in his capacity as Statistician, and tournament director. A charter member of the American Cribbage Congress, Bob was recently unanimously elected Executive Vice President of the ACC.

Scott Kooistra, Yankton, South Dakota, has also proven his merit on the table. Scott was crowned national champion for 1990 with a record Master Point total, and has a string of impressive championships under his belt, the 1990 National Open as one example. A six-time All-American is another example of his fine play. And like Bob, his contributions to cribbage do not stop there. Scott has also contributed hundreds of hours service to the ACC, as chief judge, tournament director, and myriad other jobs helping others and the ACC. Scott is currently Executive Vice President, Operations, in the ACC.

Jim McManus 11th Grand Master

Milwaukee's Jim McManus became the 11th player to earn Grand Master by qualifying 9th in the main event, and finishing 4th in the consolation at the Dells September 8.

Jim is a veteran pegger and has had many top finishes over the past few years.

Syl Lulinski Takes a Breather Bob McCabe New Executive Vice President

President Joseph Petrus Wergin was reelected and remains the only President ever of the American Cribbage Congress in the recent elections at the Des Moines Board of Directors meeting.

Syl Lulinski declined to run again for Executive Vice President, having served long and hard in this very time-consuming position. Bob McCabe was unanimously elected to fill this position. The ACC is fortunate to have a person of Bob's capabilities to replace Syl.

Scott Kooistra was elected Executive Vice President, Operations, and Ev Bey was elected Executive Vice President, Policy.

Martha Fingleton will assume the position of National Tournament Commissioner, and will remain as the Central Region's commissioner.

Tie Breakers Finally Resolved

The controversy concerning ties on score cards has been resolved by a majority vote of the ACC's Board of Directors in Des Moines.

All sanctioned tournaments will now break ties by the following method:

- 1- Game points
- 2- Games won
- 3- Spread points
- 4- Positive spread points

Positive spread points are simply the number of points in the plus column. For example, a score card with +56 in the + column will beat a card with a +43 in the + column.

Record Crowd in LaGrande, OR George Rasmussen Wins Blue Mountain Open

George Rasmussen, Waldport, OR, took home the "bacon" at the record setting 7th Annual Blue Mountain Open in LaGrande, OR.

In besting the field of 150 peggers, George began the 1991 season with a nice bundle of 160 Master Points (using the new scoring system). Bob Heriza, Baker City, OR, took 2nd, with tough pegging Bill Becker, Bend, OR, in 3rd, followed by local Vern Moore in 4th.

16-year old Tommy Sissel, Baker City, OR, won the consolation, besting Betty Morehouse, Walla Walla, WA for 2nd. All-American Gary Motley finished 3rd, followed by Betty Capper, Hermiston, OR, in 4th.

Ernest Standard set the standard in the qualifying round. This Island City, OR, pegger picked up 53 Master Points, using the new scoring system, some 15 more than the old system.

As usual, Ron Lesley ran a first-class tournament. Well run tournaments, with fair paybacks usually result in increased attendance, as was the case in LaGrande.

Gene Sissel, Dorothy Rourm Strike it Rich at Last Chance Gulch

In the 1880's, prospectors worldwide flocked to Last Chance Gulch in Helena, Montana, and many of them struck it rich in the gold fields.

In 1990, Gene Sissel and Dorothy Rourm trekked over two mountain ranges to play a little cribbage at Last Chance Gulch and they struck it rich...both for the first time.

Gene Sissel, Baker City, OR, has been runner-up many times, but finally won the championship at the 5th Annual Capital City Classic, and Dorothy Rourm, Joseph, OR, repeated in the consolation...a winner for the first time.

Steve Daer, Hamilton, MT, finished 2nd in the main event, followed by Amos Olmstead, Helena, MT, and Ray Hanes, Walla, Walla, WA.

Dorothy edged out local Shirley Schill in the consolation.

Tana and Walt Conell waxed the field with a grand slam in the doubles. Ken Cochlin, Kennewick, WA, went home a winner by winning the Saturday night special.

ACC On The Move!

This October, sanctioned tournaments are up a solid 50% from last October!. Peggers can choose from some 18 October tournaments this year. Last year, only 12 were sanctioned in October!

Sir John's Descendents Honored at the Grand National

Becky and Sara Suckling, 11th generation descendents of Sir John Suckling, British Knight and poet who invented cribbage, were honored guests of the American Cribbage Congress at the recent Grand National in Des Moines.

Becky and Sara competed with the 296 peggers and held their own in the competition. They were honored with framed awards honoring Sir John's membership in the Cribbage Hall of Fame at the Awards Banquet.

Short Season in 1991 Idaho On The Move

The ACC's Board of Directors voted unanimously to change the cribbage year beginning with the 1991 year. The "pegging action" will start every August 1, and end on July 31.

The reason for the change is the hectic pressure put on the statistician, the awards chairman, and the staff of the Grand National in preparing for the tournament and awards ceremony. Three weeks was simply not enough time to reasonably get all the necessary tasks completed.

So, peggers, get your act in gear early this year...you have only 11 months to get those Master Points!

Idaho will, for the first time, host two sanctioned tournaments. And both are in October.

Tournament Director Ron Stark will hold his first tournament in Sandpoint October 19, 20, and 21. Sandpoint, on the banks of beautiful Lake Pend Oreille, is a picturesque mountain town, with tourism and timber the main industries.

And tournament director Roy Carlson will host his 10th annual Idaho Championship in the quaint silver mining town of Wallace October 26, 27, and 28. This is always a "fun" tournament, as you are "shoe-horned" into a small, homey, tavern in downtown Wallace.

John Marani Wins New England Championship

John Marani, Quincy, MA, topped a field of 94 peggers to claim the New England Championship, played at Windsor Locks, CT., August 26.

Bill Seymour from Rhode Island claimed second, followed by David Harper, Ware, MA, in third, and Lee Norris, another tough Rhode Island pegger, in fourth.

Recently crowned Master player Phyllis Schmidt, Williamstown, MA, continues to show her cribbage prowess by claiming the 52-player consolation match. Phyllis edged out Corrine Moore, Westminster, MA, to claim the match. Third went to Dan Moore, Gibbstown, NJ, and 4th to Frank Gallo, Cranston, RI.

David Harper was "hot" in the qualifying round, and took top honors. David hails from Ware, MA.

On to Hollywood in 1991!

Now that the Grand National in Des Moines is history...it is on to Hollywood (Florida, that is) for the 1991 Grand National!

Harry Stoops--a new member of the Board of Directors--promises a gala affair in Florida, and also promises Cribbage World plenty of press releases to keep the ACC members informed.

Weird Night in Appleton

August 14th, 25 peggers had a weird night of pegging, according to Ginny Danielski of the Polish Open Grass Roots Club, Appleton, WI.

First Bob Goss got double skunked by Harry Langman by a whopping 75 points. This culminated a rather long losing streak by Bob...winning but one game in his last 18.

Then Bob Loch had a grand slam with 19 points, and topping off the evening, Carl Schroeder and Nancy Haas scored 28-hands!

Steve Reynolds 60th Master Player

Don't Like Slow Play? Then Don't Try This

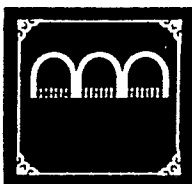

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Don't Penalize the Innocent!

While at a tournament at Tillamook, Oregon, I was following a slow player. He was young enough and had played enough cribbage to keep up with the best cribbage players.

The whole table was always waiting for him to finish his game. Finally he turned the corner and I had to play him. Before the game started, a judge was called again to speed up his play. The judge then ordered us to play a short game: 61 holes. He won the cut and went on to win the game. The next person to play the slow player was the judge who sentenced me to a short game. They played a long game.

I didn't make the play offs that day because I was so mad I couldn't see straight!

There is only one fair way to handle the slow player, after he/she has had a warning by a judge and he/she still plays slow holding everyone up. The answer is right there in the cards. He/she should forfeit the game and give the opponent 2 and +10 points the same as a forfeit.

I feel I was punished for his slow play and really believe that a short game should never come up. I know for myself I will never play a short game in another tournament no matter who says I have to.

I never did recover from the short game and never really came close to putting my game back together. I had a great chance to be in the money before slow play messed up my mind and game.

A Study in Averages

This is in reference to Russ Adam's findings in the February issue, which were of much interest. The difference between dealer's hand (8.1) and none-dealer's (7.4) is higher than one might expect, and must reflect the pressure on an educated non-dealer to break up his discard in order to minimize the dealer's crib, at the expense of reducing his own hand. In the distribution of hands shown, non-dealer has more poor 2's and 4's, is even on 6's, and low on 8's and 12's and up where you have to go in with something.

Adam's results do not include information as to what percent of the games were won by the original dealer, but his data may have this to extract. If each player holds average hands throughout a game (or more realistically, enjoys a reasonable balance between good hands and freezes) at the end of eight deals they will each be in hole 102.8 (4×25.7)

The original pone then gets his 9.7 to reach 112.5, and couldn't have won unless he gets great pegging and a good hand. Original dealer gets 16.0 to 118.8 and wins in the 10th deal.

As Adams noted, 10 deals is the most frequent, closely followed by 9. I once recorded the results of 600 games played against the same opponent (old navy man of about equal skill) and found that the original dealer won 55% of the games, showing the advantage of first deal. Does Adams or other ACC members have any confirmation of this?

I was interested in Adams' distribution of crib size which should reflect the random distribution of hand value in the 2,598,960 5-card hands in the deck. Here is the comparison:

(The theory does not reflect knobs and flushes.) Adams' holdings of 6's and 8's seem very low, and his 13+ very high. His average crib of 3.9 is lower than the random hand of 4.65, whereas I should expect it to be somewhat better since dealer loads in good cards.

I conducted a rather extensive study years ago, finding the first dealer winning 56%, the dealer's average hand being 7.9, the non-dealer's average hand being 8.1, and the crib average at 4.8.
