

564 Peggers Set Central Region Record Joe Beaster Wins MGM Open

Green Bay's MGM Open set a Central Region record for attendance last year, with some 560 peggers. This record lasted but a single year, as this tournament drew a new-record 564 players.

Only a handful of Michigan players were on hand, but they came up roses. Joe Beaster, Kingford, MI claimed the title and a handsome \$3,000 prize, in addition to a bundle of MRP's. Two other Michigan players finished in the top four: Tom Borkowski, Bay City, MI finished 3rd, and Jeff Shimp claimed 4th...and Grand Master rating. Jeff hails from Shelbyville.

Local Michael Rozmiarek took 2nd (and \$2,000) to keep a few greenbacks in the local economy.

Veteran pegger Gene Mikulsky, Sobieski, WI, held a hot run of cards during the qualifying round, and took top honors with a fine 39 GP +295 card, winning a sizeable "Q" pool prize. In the huge 256-player consolation, Life Master DeLynn Colvert, Missoula, MT, continues a 4-month run by winning the title. Grand Master Duane Toll finished 2nd. Duane hails from Milwaukee, WI. Jeff Clark, Antioch, IL took 3rd, followed by John Hiland, W. Allis. WI in 4th.

Doubles play is very popular in northern Wisconsin, attested by the 604 players attending the Friday night session (302 teams). Locals Sharon Jordan and Joe Moreau won the 10game match with a super 20GP +123 card. Another doubles match was played Saturday night, with locals Sis Asman and Marion Lenz taking home all the marbles in this 232-team event. Their card was an excellent 21GP +203 in this 10-game event.

Directors Tom Gallagher, Bob Miller, and Jerry Lemke once again did a great job in managing the huge crowd, ably assisted by Sue Miller, Judy Lemke, and Sally Gallagher.

Solitaire Games

Woodie A. Palmen is a fanatic on solitaire cribbage. He has probably played every type that has been published, and of course, he has his favorites. Recently he wrote to this columnist and explained several of them.

In our cribbage classes we have given the students one game in which decisions have to be made in placing almost every card. The end product is that the student counts five hands in a short period of time. The type we recommend can be seen at almost every midwestern tournament.

THE NEED IS GREAT, BUT THE WORK-ERS ARE FEW (this text is probably taken from the Bible). The need for teaching our youth, cribbage, is overwhelming, but the volunteers are few.

My position on a Youth Program has always been to teach more children how to play as well as conduct tournaments for kids who already know how to play. Anyone who is desirous of doing something for the community, should contact the Day Care Center of a local middleschool. The Center begins its program after school is out in the afternoon, about 2:30 or 3 o'clock. The kids are kept there until parents pick them up after work, 4:30 to 5:30. Kids are tired of all other table games and cribbage would be an ongoing activity and educational.

Here in Madison we arrange to go to a school and take along a team of six to ten players the first few times. Then we can start with a one-on-one or one-on-two or four kids per instructor. After several sessions, we leave two instructors on a regular basis and move the others to another school.

The kids are anxious to learn and really like the senior citizens as most of them have little or no contact with dedicated elders. There are about 1,800 children in the Madison Day Care Program.

I am involved in teaching cribbage three afternoons a week and I play cards three nights a week. So, I am not a problem on my kids. They say that I am never home.

Bo Van Orsow Bo Don't Know Diddley, But Bo DOES Know Cribbage

Bo Van Orsow of Oregon's famous Van Orsow pegging clan claimed the 14th Annual Northwest Open in Baker City, OR March 10, keeping alive a hot streak that has earned him his Masterrating and, with this win, a major championship.

The Van Orsows (Clarence, Ray, Denny and Bo) recently tearned with Phil Symons to shatter all team records (5-person team event) played in the Northwest at the recent Oregon Championship in Prineville. The lowest score posted by this team was 32 GP's in the 22-game qualifying round.

Carol Holt, Portland, had the misfortune to walk into this hot streak...but she managed to finish 2nd in this 112-pegger event. Carol has also been on a streak lately and has consistently finished "in the money."

Keith Jesperson, Spokane, WA finished 3rd, and veteran pegger Verne Nielsen, Portland, took 4th.

An astounding 92 players signed up for the consolation (vs. 112 in the main event), pointing out that this crowd had only serious peggers. Ken Capper, Hermiston, OR, took all the marbles, edging out local Murv Scarbrough. Tom Markham, Mountain Lake, WA, took 3rd, and Jack Holt finished 4th. Along with Carol's 2nd in the main event, the Holt's had a profitable weekend.

În the "early bird" time passer 62-pegger event, local Sterlin Owens edged out Verne Nielsen to get the weekend off to a good start. In the high-roller event, local Murv Scarbrough claimed the grand prize, while the doubles saw Pat Ward, Kirkland, WA team with John Ward, Mill Creek, WA to win that event.

George Mackie, Seattle, finished with a fine 16GP's in the Saturday night 7-game match to win this event.

Paul Dyer set the qualifying round standard with a fine 37 (18) +141 card.

The junior set also pegged in a match...and all won a fancy barrel-shaped board. Director Rob Palmer had a full range of events, including the juniors, and did a fine job in conducting this longest-standing tournament in the Northwest.

And the locals were hospitable...tournament manager Marvis Reynolds, with hubby Ralph's help, invited scores of players for a wonderful Sunday breakfast.

Syd picked up the grand prize in the ACC Open (501 MRP's) to join the race.

In the Eastern Region, Phyllis Schmidt, Williamstown, MA maintains the lead with 700+ MRP's, and in the Central Region, Norbert Upton, Eagan, MN, and Buzz Railsback, Syracuse, NE, are setting the pace with 600+ MRP's.

Warren Sondericker Earns 5th Life Master



After a long session of pegging, it is easy for your concentration to slip a bit, as the following incidents illustrate:

Millie Coffey, one of those 4th Street Terrorists from Concord, CA, won her first 8 games in a 9-game match, and excitedly begins her 9th game, looking forward to a "Grand Slam!" Her cards are hot! In the 9th game, she scores a rare 29-hand! This will almost certainly give her the Slam! Alas, on the very next hand, she pegs two...and picks up her front peg! Oops, the front peg now becomes the back peg. A loss of 29 points! No Grand Slam!

Journeyman pegger Frank Lake, LaPine, OR, is one of the northwest's best peggers...but old man Murphy bit him, too. He picked up four 5's, and, alas, cut an ace. Getting late in the day, Frank begins arranging the 5's on the table, and being slightly embarrassed by this method of counting, says "Oh, I think this is a 20-hand." His opponent nods approval, and Frank pegs the 20...BACKWARD! His opponent begins to snicker, and Frank says "What's the matter...did I miss some?" "Only 40" came the reply, "you pegged backwards!" Actually, he only missed out on 22 points, as his pegs were two holes apart at the time. Did this shake Frank? Nope. He won the game, scoring 18 with first count on the last hand!

Tournament Directors...CW Needs About 4 Months Lead Time

Some tournament directors are still not giving enough lead time to have their tournament listed in "Tournament Trail" section of CW.

FOUR months advance notice with your initial paper work should get your tournament listed twice.

Bill Jensen, Los Altos, CA, scored 91 MRP's at the huge ACC Open in Reno to become the 68th ACC Master player. Bill is a veteran pegger, and has had may high finishes in sanctioned tournament action.

Lloyd Kraft, an excellent pegger from Seymour, WI, also recently went over the magic 2,000 MRP mark to become the 69th Master pegger.

One of those 4th Street Terrorists from Concord, CA, also hit the 2,000 MRP plateau. Her name is Pat Coffey, a veteran pegger who is always a threat to win.

And our newest Master pegger is Bill Becker, Bend, OR, who recently scored 179 MRP's in the Oregon Championship by finishing in lucky 13th place. Bill is one of the Northwest's toughest peggers, and has certainly earned this rating.

Always Complete Your Qualifying Round Games

When you sign on for a sanctioned event (or any other round, for that matter), you have entered into a contract of gamesmanship that you WILL COMPLETE THE ROUND, win, lose, or draw.

If you withdraw before the round is over, you have fouled the rotation, the scoring, and continuity of play.

In some rare cases (illness, emergencies, etc.) suspension of play is justified. The Tournament Director MUST be notified before you leave, in these cases.

Recently, two players failed to return after taking a lunch break, causing the tournament director difficulties in rearranging rotation of players.

A quorum of ACC Directors met shortly thereafter, passing a resolution that in the future, any player leaving play without permission, will be reported to the Regional Tournament Commissioners. These commissioners will then publish a "black list" for tournament director's information...giving them the option of allowing these players to play or not play in future tournaments

Be a good sport! Complete your round!

Reno was great! Was good seeing you there again.



The Expectation of a Cribbage Hand

If you were dealt 3-4-5-5-9 with no flush, what would be the best choice of discards? By best is meant the selection which would give the highest average count if you held the same cards a large number of times. This average count is called the EXPECTATION of the hand. Naturally, there may be other factors to consider, such as the control of pegging, the need for some minimum count, or minimizing your opponent's crib; these will not be considered in the following discussion. The best discards for the 3-4-5-5-9 hand are the 3-9, with an expectation of 12.891. The 5-9 discards give 12.457. If you chose the latter, you probably didn't give enough weight to the tencount cards in the deck.

The expectation of any hand can be calculated in a straightforward manner and it is informative to consider how it is done since you have to judge alternative expectations nearly every time you discard a hand. Since the expectation equals the average count for all possible starters, it can be calculated by summing the counts with all possible starters and dividing by the number of starters. We will consider only single's hands so the number of possible starters is 46. Never mind that your opponent has six cards that can't be starters; since you don't know what they are, the effect is the same as if they were still in the deck.

Let's take an easily calculated example: 2-2-2-8-K. Keeping the four dueces, what is the expectation? Since only sevens and nines can help the count, the number of starters that cannot help equals 46-8=38. So 38 starters give a count of 12, or a sum of 38x12=456. A seven gives 14 points, so add 4x14=56. A nine gives 20 points, so add 4x20=80 more. That's the lot, and the total is 592. Dividing by 46 gives the average of 12.870 for the expectation.

We can reduce the size of the numbers used in this calculation by summing only the increase in count due to a starter. Thus, 38 cards give a zero increase, four give an increase of two for a sum of eight, and four give an increase of 8 for 32 more. This totals 8+32=40, and dividing by 46 results in an average of 0.870. Adding the minimum 12-count back in gives the same value of 12.870.

Using either method, you can calculate the expectations of any hand. Of course the only reason for wanting to know the expectation is to compare alternative discards so you must make at least two such calculations. Making a tabular form would help avoid errors. Care must be taken when the hand includes jacks or a flush, since every starter of the suit(s) involved add extra points. This suit complication can be simplified as follows:

- 1- Sum the count without considering suit.
- 2- If the four cards held include jacks, for each jack count the number of cards dealt of that suit (including the jack), subtract that from 13, and add the difference to the sum in (1) above.
- 3- If a flush is held, make the same calculation as specified in (2). Note that if the flush includes the jack, you add the same (2) calculations twice.
- 4- Divide the total count summation by 46, as always, to get the expectation.

Although the procedure for calculating the expectation is quite simple, the counting of all those hands is tedious and opportunities for error abound. While some errors can be avoided by using the table "all possible combinations" in Wergin's book, those tables are not listed in a sequence convenient for calculating expectations.


