Reno's Sands Hosts Record Summer Crowd William McCammon Bests 314 Peggers At Independence Day Classic Otmar Bourchard Takes 200-Pegger Consolation

The Sands Hotel and Casino is fast becoming a mecca for cribbage players, thanks to the hospitality of this facility, and the management of tournaments by Bill and Dorthalee Irons, and Barbara Woodward of the Sands staff. The summer edition of this veteran's benefit drew a record 314 peggers, and another 200 stayed around to play the consolation event.

After some six hours of intense pegging, with another five rounds of playoffs tacked on for Saturday night's play, William McCammon, Incline Village, NV, finally emerged the champion with a tough 4-3 win over Jim Hornbacher, Bothell, WA. Jim held a 3-1 lead in the best of 7 match, and narrowly missed winning the 5th game, pegging but five on the

last hand and losing 121-120. With that break, William won the last two games going away for the title.

Tom Markham, Mt. Lake Terrace, WA, qualified in the 78th and last spot, but took a hot run of cards in the playoff to finish 3rd. Greg Schleusner, Truckee, CA, was HOT both Saturday and Sunday, finishing 4th in the playoffs, and qualifying FIRST with a fine 39 16 +347. Greg picked up 338 total MRP's to earn his Master rating.

In the 200-pegger consolation, veteran pegger Otmar Bourchard, Scio, OR outlasted the field to win this event. Russ Rummelt, Manteca, CA was 2nd, followed by Dennis Bay, Clovis, CA, in 3rd, and Ron Logan, veteran pegger from

But the top prize went to Bob Bodine, Antioch, CA, with yet another grand slam, winning 10 for 10 with one skunk. Tournament director, Bill Irons, picked up third place, to help reward him for the long weekend's hard work.

The veteran's of American all benefited from this tournament, as 15% will be used for their benefit.

Master Players 86 & 87 Bill Seymour Greg Schleusner

Bill Seymour, Warwick, RI, recently scored his 2,000th + Master Rating Point, and becomes the 86th ACC member to attain the Master rating honor. Bill is currently ranked 38th in the Eastern Region with 338 MRP's.

Greg Schleusner, Truckee, CA, nailed the recent Independence Day Classic in Reno with a super top qualifying score of 39 GP's, 16 wins, +347 to earn 96 MRP's, and completed his weekend with a fine 4th place finish (and 242 more MRP's) to easily wing it over the 2,000 MRP plateau to earn his Master rating...and make a strong move up from his 91st spot in the Western Region. Next month's issue will find Greg in the top 15 in the west.

Michaelis Duplicates 1990 Lewis & Clark Win

Mick Michaelis, Life Master player from Marinette, WI, won his third sanctioned main event in 1991...and duplicated his win one year ago at Yankton, SD's Lewis & Clark Classic. An exact duplicate in the final match...winning 3-0, as he did one year earlier.

This time around, it was Ron Hamilton, recently elected member of the ACC's Board of Directors, who took Mick's annual waxing. However, Ron's 2nd place finish was a fine showing, indeed, in this 122-pegger event.

Frank Trojan, New Brighton, MN, finished a strong third, followed by the Central Region's MRP leader, Buzz Railsback, Syracuse, NE. Buzz picked up some 100 MRP's to hold on to his Central MRP lead, and stands at the 900 mark for the year...possibly earning him a spot on the 1991 All-American team. His wife, Helen, had that honor in 1990.

Joe Bernard, Grand Master from Libertyville, IL held the "hot"hand in the qualifying round, picking up a nice "Q" prize with his 38 17 +242.

In the 86-player consolation, Verne Nielsen, Portland, OR, qualified with a "grand slam" (9 for 9), but after the smoke had cleared in the playoffs, veteran Gil Slote, the Nebraska King was crowned champion. Henry Popham, Missoula, MT, finished 2nd. Henry has had a fine year in the MRP race, despite mssing some six months recovering from a broken hip...standing with some 500 MRP's.

In the Friday Night Special, local Guy Larson scored a "grand slam" 9 for 9, with his biggest win a +15 win. In the Saturday Night Special, it was Sharon Halac, Bellevue NE coming up roses with a 16 7 +146 victory.

The Cry Baby event was won by Helen Railsback, Syracuse, NE, as her last opponent held enough to win the game...but pegged short!

And as usual, Scott and Linda Kooistra ran a first class tournament...and Scott, innovative as ever, ran a "Super Q" with a combination of the three events (Friday and Saturday night's games combined with the qualifying round: 40 games) used to determine a winner. DeLynn Colvert, Life Master from Missoula, MT, edged out Joan Rein and Norb Upton (two Minnesota players) by ONE game to take home all the marbles.

Another of Scott's innovations was his "duplicate" cribbage match he organized in Minneapolis years ago...68 players with 34 vs. 34 with the EXACT same cards. The results were astounding! Players with the SAME CARDS would finish a game + or - some 40 points!

In the 68-pegger consolation, Pat Sass outpegged the field to claim the title. Pat has been on a roll lately, and your editor was eliminated by her steady play. In fact, as she turned on the after-burners in the 2nd game, she asked "Are your intimidated yet?" The answer should have been "Yes!" Pat edged out David Jacobsen (Minneapolis). Gary Paulson (Minneapolis) finished 3rd, and Al Bailey, Nerstrand, MN, took 4th.

The "hot" hand in the qualifying round was held by Don Meyer with a fine 35 16 +246 to rake in the "Q" prize.

The Friday Early Bird was taken by perennial winner Emil Lubinski, Crystal, MN (19 +56), and Life Master Mick Michaelis, Marinette, WI, knocked 'em dead Saturday night with a 16 +98.

1991 Title Race

With a short year in 1991 (September 1 thru July 31), the 1991 Master Point race heads for the finish line. Cribbage World goes to press in mid-July, final results of the MRP race will be reported in the September issue.

Once again, it appears the national title will be decided at the National Open in Raleigh, NC, July 27-29. Last year Scott Kooistra (Yankton, SD) and Butch Reynold (Santa Maria, CA) were neck and neck coming into the Raleigh match, with Scott prevailing by winning the National Open AND the national MRP championship. Butch made a valiant try by finishing 7-8th, and finished the 1990 year in 2nd place.

This year, Butch once again comes into the Raleigh match with an excellent chance of winning the crown. DeLynn Colvert (Missoula, MT) and Butch are in a virtual dead heat, with Roy Hofbauer (Washougal, WA), Gary Motley (Gresham, OR) and Paul Hatcher (Salem, OR), having an outside chance of winning.

In the Eastern Region, a 3-way dead heat for that region's honors is between Phyllis Schmidt, George Webb, and Dennis Cousens. All are at the 800 MRP level, and have an outside chance of taking all the marbles nationally.

In the Central Region, Buzz Railsback is leading the pack with 900 MRP's, followed by Grand Master Jeff Shimp, Aggie Mikulsky, Russell Adams, Norbert Upton, John Syftestad, Gene Mikulsky, and Dave Bartlett in the 600 MRP range.

In the All-American race, our new scoring system appears to have lowered the yearly scores, with 900 MRP's possibly garnering this honor. Last year 1,200+ MRP's were required to attain top-ten All-American status. The Western Region is dominating this year's race, possibly due to the 3 large Reno tournaments, and the larger regional membership (42% of all ACC players are from the Western Region).

Cape Cod Extra... for Rit Alkas

Rit Alkas, recently crowned Master player from Manchester, CT, proved his rating is no fluke, as he nailed the recent Cape Cod Extra for the championship, and, in addition, qualified a fine 4th of 114 players. This one day tournament was played in E. Wareham, MA June 23.

Arthur Martin, Northboro, MA, has been on a roll this cribbage year, also, and with a fine 2nd place finish picks up another 109 MRP's to move into the Eastern Region's top ten, running this season's total to the 600 mark.

Leo Horigan (Stoughton, MA) finished 3rd, and in an unusual playoff, Bill Packard (Franklin, MA) and Bob Waltzer (Woburn, MA) tied for 4th.

In the 94-pegger consolation, Charlie Finley, the Enfield, CT flash took home the marbles, edging Bill Seymour, Warwick, RI, for the title. Margaret Torrey (Mansfield, MA) took 3rd, and Joyce Vanelli (Quincy, MA) finished 4th.

Director Jim Clemmey reported \$114 was donated to the Boston Children's Hospital, and 3-28 hands were scored: John Schuck, Edward Donahue, and K. C. Finley all scored these gems.

Jersey Jaunt Switches to a 2-Day Game

Director Dan Moore reports that the annual Jersey Jaunt Cribbage Tournament will now be a 2-day affair, instead of the usual 1-day format.

Bill Wright Wins Alaska Cruise Tourney

Bill Wright, from sunny El Cajon, CA, boarded the Sun Viking cruise ship and headed north to Alaska...and some cribbage. The weather was cooler than his El Cajon home, but his cards remained "hot" as he won this inaugural 34-pegger sanctioned tourney. Thelma Weber, Vacaville, CA, took 2nd. Mary Herrmann, San Ramon, CA took 3rd, and Grand Master Jesse Jarrell, Pittsburg, CA captured 4th.

In the consolation, Ron Morgan bested Canadian George Saari for the title. Ron hails from Quincy, CA, and George from Kamloops, BC.

Director Butch Reynolds, Santa Maria, won the "hi-roller" event and reported a FUNTAS-TIC time was held by all...with one 9-game match beginning at 1 AM and winding up at 4 AM. Butch says "Guess that's life in the fast lane."

Statistics

Bob McCabe, ACC Executive Vice-President and Chairman of our Master Point System, recently ran an analysis of our Master Points of all our Master players.

A few observations: Scott Kooistra, Yankton, SD, is the toughest lifetime head-to-head player in playoffs...scoring some 6,398 MRP's. Butch Reynolds, Santa Maria, CA, has scored a lifetime 1,377 MRP's in the qualifying round to lead in that category. The consolation crown (lifetime MRP's) is a virtual tie between Robert Michaelis, Marinette, WI (1,055), Bob McCabe, Provo, Utah (1,050), and Warren Sondericker, Milwaukee, WI (1,034).

An anomaly is Jeff Shimp, Grand Master from Michigan. Jeff has scored a miniscule 121 MRP's in the qualifying round, and a whopping 3,498 MRP's in playoffs. Could this be the adrenalin factor?

Novice Players Win Big at Connecticut Championship

The Connecticut Championship always draws a large number of veteran players from the New England area, and this year was no exception.

A field of 128 peggers gathered May 19 at North Windham, including 14 Master peggers.

Bob Horrigan, Largo, FL, bested Jim Clemmey, Rochester, MA, for the championship. Bob and Jim, both excellent players, are relatively new to the ACC. In fact, 9 of the 10 finishers in the playoffs possess less than 500 MRP's.

A new feature of this tournament was "graded win pools," an optional side pool that allowed contestants to compete for final placement according to their lifetime Master Points, intending to provide the novice player an opportunity to compete with his or her peers for some extra prize money. The less experienced players took all the top prizes. Tournament directors Joe Seigle and Bill Shoemaker termed the win pools a great success, and will try to include them in next year's championship event.

Grand Master Rating No. 13 Poxed

Syl Lulinski, LaGrange Park, IL, has been sitting on 3,993 Master Points for quite some time, needing but seven to earn his Grand Master rating.


