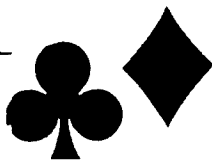

Inaugural Massachusetts Event Draws 170 **Paul Welch Wins Holiday Classic**

Christmas came early for Paul Welch, as he earned 180 Master Points and a cool \$1,000 in winning the Holiday Classic, played in Blackstone, MA, December 16.

This inaugural tournament drew an amazing 170 peggers, attesting to New England's recent surge in tournament attendance. Director's Eric Corriveau and Gloria Dynour reported \$340 donated to the Milk Fund (a charity for underprivileged children)...to underscore the Christmas spirit.

Marion Quackenbush, a veteran pegger from Lawrenceville, PA, claimed 2nd, with Ford Jewer, Wakefield, RI taking 3rd. John Metrano, Mansfield, MA claimed 4th.

The cards were hot for Dennis Cousens, Windham, ME, in the qualifying round, finishing with 23 GP's in the 12-game round, earning some 60 MRP's, running his yearly total to nearly 400...earning front running status nationally.

The large 110-pegger consolation saw Bernard Lusis, Bristol, CT, claim the title, followed by George Johnson (Fitchburg, MA), Joe Ramos (W. Warwick, RI), and Bill Rafferty (Woonsocket, RI).

National MRP leader for the 1991 campaign, Phyllis Schmidt, Williamstown, MA, added to her front-running total, by scoring some 39 MRP's, pushing her yearly total to nearly 700.

Walter Prytko Scores 6th 29-Hand

Local Walter Prytko scored the 6th 29-hand of the 1991 cribbage year November 25, while pegging at the Yankee Classic in Manchester, CT.

This gem is worth a cool \$100, since it was scored in a sanctioned meet.



George Webb Designs New Scorecard

Director George Webb of Massachusetts has a great idea for the improvement of the scorecard. This new record sheet will eliminate errors by restricting the amount of illegible numbers and initials that appear on a completed card. There is a large enough space for a contestant to sign his/her surname.

Webb's first sketch is being worked over by a Madison graphic arts specialist. Upon completion, several Grass Roots clubs will put the new scorecard through the test.

Breaches of etiquette have long been the bug-a-boo of tournament directors. Dale Munroe, the director hailing from Connecticut, is concerned about the number of happenings reported to him in the last year. Unethical conduct and play must be defined and tournament officials as well as Congress officials must report breaches to headquarters.

It is this writer's opinion that a three-person ETHICS COMMITTEE be established immediately for the purpose of receiving reports from players and directors, to investigate, and to make recommendations to the Executive Committee for penalties. A scale of penalties must be created to guide officials.

WINTER IN PORTLAND DRAWS RECORD CROWD

The Winter in Portland cribbage championship was aptly named, as an ice storm had vehicles bouncing around on the freeways and an icy wind had a chilling effect on the natives...but the cards were "hot" inside the playing hall for DeLynn Colvert, as he claimed yet another title, the third in his last four tournaments. "Hot" cards were also held by Harry Kantas, a veteran local pegger, who nailed down the qualifying top spot with a fine 36GP +242 22-game card.

2nd place went to Doug Brown, an excellent pegger from Pasco, WA, while 1990 All-American Gary Motley finished 3rd on his home turf. Barrett Mace, White City, OR, finished 4th.

Local Gene Goodell took the consolation crown, followed by Don Hansen (Albany, OR), Harold Foster (Bothell, WA), and local Rick Merck.

Despite the nasty weather, this tournament drew a surprising 167 players, and 110 stayed around to play the consolation.

Former All-American Ed Blecker, from Kenai, AK, or Denver, CO (depending on the mood he's in) claimed the High Roller event, while George Rasmussen (Walport, OR) and J. C. Turner (Roseburg, OR) teamed to win the doubles event.

Director's John and Kate Furler conducted an outstanding tournament, attesting to the increase in attendance from last year, and the paybacks were fair and well distributed. And the trophies were unusual and of a high quality.

Kim Eluik Wins Again

Kim Eluik, Washougal, WA, won the Junior Tournament at the recent Winter in Portland meet, with a fine 11GP +99 7-game card.

Junior peggers beware...Kim duplicated her win in last year's match.

Jason Hofbauer (Washougal, WA) claimed 2nd with a 10GP +46 card, with Robert Parker (Portland) 3rd (10GP +35), and in 4th Ben Pritchard (10GP +7). The competition was intense, attested by the close scores.

Dick Cornwell Rides Again

Once again, Dick Cornwell, our Sunnyvale, CA, chairman of the Rules Committee, is swinging into action.

The ACC is planning a re-print within a year or so, and will incorporate any minor changes that are needed.

Dick took a survey of members of the Board of Directors concerning the one rule that has never been resolved satisfactorily...the failure to peg out rule. The results of his survey:

Define when forfeiture occurs: 3

Eliminate requirement: 2

Require reminder: 15

This one rule has caused more hard feelings and disruption of the game than any other. It's time the rule is resolved. But in the meanwhile...ALWAYS PEG OUT!

Jack Marani Captures Yankee Classic

Jack Marani, Quincy, MA, has added another championship to his list of laurels by winning the Yankee Classic.

This Manchester, CT, meet fielded 112 peggers, and another 80 played in the consolation match.

Marani edged Paul Dextraze for the title, while 3rd went to Mary Satula, and 4th to Gene Gorlewski. Paul hails from Marlboro, MA, Mary from Pawtucket, RI, and Gene from New Britain, CT.

Master player Neal Friets won the consolation event and continues his winning ways. Neal recently won the Jersey Jaunt event, and with this consolation win, remains in the thick of the Master Point race. Neal hails from Keene, NH.

Another veteran pegger--K. C. Finly, Enfield, CT--took 2nd, with Joe Lambaise Jr., Canton, MA, in 3rd, followed by Al Satula, Pawtucket, RI, in 4th.

Jim Law, Longmeadow, MA, set the standard in the qualifying round.

Directors Mimi and Rit Alkas will once again schedule the Yankee Classic in November, 1991.

When a slow player is one full game behind, the next player, instead of a short game or other penalty, can simply agree to play the game AFTER the qualifying round is complete, thereby speeding up play for ALL the players at their table...and only two players will be inconvenienced...the slow player and the considerate other player.

Cribbage World Working to Improve Mailing

Cribbage World has been making efforts to secure a 2nd class publication permit in Missoula, MT, but regulations concerning membership records prevented a permit being issued.

Ev Bey to the rescue! Our Vice President, Policy, inquired about the possibility of securing a permit in Napa, CA, where our membership records are kept, listing Missoula, MT, as an "additional office of entry." In this manner, regulations concerning annual checking of our membership records and circulation figures can be accomplished by the Napa Postmaster.

The mailing can be accomplished in Missoula by filing the required mailing statement each time, when postage is paid. Incidentally, our postage bill is some \$800 per month, and is scheduled to increase within a few months with projected higher rates.

According to Ev Bey, second class publications are entitled to the same delivery service as first class mail, and, in addition, we get corrected addresses returned to Jeff Monroe, Membership Chairman, in Napa, CA.

So peggers, keep your fingers crossed. Perhaps we CAN get reasonable delivery service...especially to you long-suffering New Englanders.

Two Northwest Tournaments Upcoming One Old, One New

Two of the better Northwest tournaments will be played in March. The first is the 14th Annual Northwest Open, to be played in Baker City, OR March 8, 9, and 10. And the other is the Third Annual Washington State Championship, to be played in Richland, WA March 22, 23, and 24.

Director Rob Palmer has a full range of events scheduled for his Northwest Open...including a "time-passer" 3 PM Friday, then the pegging gets serious at 7 PM, with a "high roller" and doubles events. And on Saturday comes the main event, with a juniors tourney thrown in for good measure. This tournament has a long history of fair paybacks, and, indeed, is one of the longest standing tournaments in the USA.

Directors Willie and Jo Evans are off to a good start with their 3rd Annual Washington State Championship, with the first two played being very successful. And this year, they are moving to more deluxe surroundings, with play scheduled for the beautiful Shilo Inn in Richland. Play begins with a doubles match Friday at 7 PM. The main event will be played Saturday, and playoffs Sunday. The Saturday Night Special moves to the friendly Towne Crier for a \$100 "high roller" event. The Evan's also have a history of fair paybacks, and the natives are very hospitable.

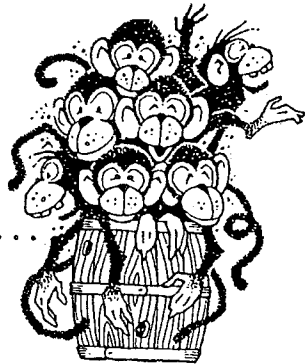
Elgin, Illinois to Hold TWO Tournaments This Cribbage Year

Suggestions for Facilitating Random Seating

Effective September 21, 1990, all sanctioned events must have random (blind draw) seating.

Tournament directors, in many cases, struggle with time-consuming methods to accomplish this blind draw (especially with late consolation event entries). Numbering chairs, tables, drawing numbers from a container, etc.

One method that originated in the midwest and is gaining favor for quick and easy random seating is the shuffling of score cards (collected at the sign-up desk) and simply placed sequentially down the line of boards. Players quickly find their table with a minimum of fuss.

Two collection boxes at the sign-up desk--one for smoking, the other for non-smoking--also quickly segregates players according to their preferences, and are efficiently seated after shuffling the score cards and placed sequentially at the tables.

And, of course, tournament directors should shuffle the score cards in full view of the players to insure that randomness is creditable.

Slow Play OK? Maybe Not

Comments on slow play Nov. issue Cribbage World, prompts these thoughts:

Are major tournaments for slow pokes and beginners? I think not, and find it silly for anyone to encourage those types to play in major tournaments BEFORE they are ready. What's ready? 15 minutes.

All major athletic events, sports and/or games must have practical time elements which are properly enforced to be successful. If a person does not have the skill, ability and experience to complete their share of a cribbage game in qualifying rounds...15 minutes...they shouldn't be encouraged to enter.

And they wouldn't enter IF they weren't being encouraged and misled by a minority of our membership who aren't realistic. I find no fault with the unskilled and slow because others can't say "You just quite aren't ready yet, let's practice some more." Somebody has to be up front with beginners/slow pokes and our tournament directors hands are being tied by our own members who are asleep at the switch.

Wouldn't it be nice during tournaments if you could make periodic PA announcements like "Jerry Price is the slow player on table C and he's sponsored by Pete Smith and the Oahu, Hawaii group. Come on gang, remember, 15 minutes is the magic number!!"

Peer Pressure. Love it. Do we need it? I think so.


