With some 586 invitations mailed, the upcoming Tournament of Champions to be played Friday, February 1, promises to be a record-setting affair. Last year's meet drew 280 of America's top peggers, with Gene Mikulsky of Sobieski, WI coming away with the championship. Gene is expected back at the Sands in Reno to defend his title.

This one-day tournament will have a 14-game qualifier, with best 3 of 5 playoff (final 2: 4 of 7), and muggins WILL be played.

Time is short with an entry deadline of January 15. Directors Joan Rein and Syl Lulinski are predicting the best ever tourney...despite that no Master Points will be awarded in this by invitation only meet. Cribbage Goes to School

The University of Wisconsin has sponsored THE BADGER STATE GAMES for five years to raise extra funds for the College's athletic program. Every summer 26 different physical sports are offered for participation to Wisconsin residents. The popularity of the program attracts about 20,000 people who compete for the gold.

This writer has filed a petition with the Badger State Games officials to attach the Mind Sports Olympiad Committee to the 1991 Games to make this type of participation to people who are unable to compete in strenuous physical activity.

About 44 states have similar State Games, so here is a chance for new leaders to emerge in the land of Cribbage.

Many elementary school children will have the opportunity this winter to learn cribbage as Sandra Christensen, a 4th grade teacher in the Madison Public Schools, is working with this scribe and 30 fourth grade teachers to implement the teaching of cribbage in order to help the pupil's math skills.

The Segoe Center, an adult group, are also setting up a Saturday cribbage program for children.

Cribbage goes to college: a cribbage program is scheduled for March and April, 1991, at Edgewood College of Madison in their Adult Education Program. As you may suspect, this columnist is involved.

Mickey Griffin Joins George Webb

In the past month a new leader has emerged from the Congress ranks in the person of Mickey Griffin, a resident of Lincoln, Nebraska. True, he has been a Director for a couple of years as he first received an appointment from the President and was elected last year.

Mickey saw the chance to provide recreational/material for the military and he responded with the idea of sending cribbage boards overseas.

With this announcement, Mickey is now a member of the President's Public Relations Committee along with George E. Webb. When a member performs a special service to a Congress program, he is named to the Committee to help in advertising and promoting Congress activities.

Congress officials have tried for ten years to get some national advertising by trying to get famous people to play in our tournaments, to join, or even have a cribber on a talk show, but to no avail. All we have received heretofore are newspaper stories.

Griffin's program advertises the Congress not only in America, but in other parts of the world.

Justin Gorman Captures Florida Open

Some 82 peggers converged on the beautiful Ramada Resort in Kissimmee, Florida November 9, 10, and 11, and after these three days of pegging, Justin Gorman of Englewood, FL claimed the championship.

John Blowers, Casselberry, FL, came close, but finished 2nd, followed by Dale McGuire in 3rd, and Larry Aronson 4th. Dave hails from Winter Haven, FL, and Larry from Maitland, FL.

Floridians continued their winning ways in the 64-player consolation, with Pierre Dagenaism of Sarasota winning the event, edging out Al Lokitz of Ormand Beach. Ray Poirier, Hialeah, took 3rd, and Cal Storment, Winter Springs, finished 4th. Doris Perkins of Quincy, MA, was the highest finisher from out of state, with 5th.

Larry Aronson set the pace in the qualifying round, and shared an equally split "Q" pool.

Directors Jim Arblaster and Dave Fournier had a 104% player's benefit payback, considering \$185 in door prizes. But another "prize" should be awarded to Jim and Dave. To date, their tournament report stands alone at the top for readability and completeness. Your Cribbage World editor (and statistician Bob McCabe) certainly appreciate tournament reports of this quality.

So this Prineville match was like "old times" as Anne took 2nd, and Ken finished 3rd. Wendell Rush, Baker City, OR, finished 4th (no, he wasn't in the motor home).

Marty Symons, Redmond, OR, won the consolation, followed by Gil Johnson (Spokane, WA), Merl Mulkey (Salem, OR), and Irma Symons (Redmond, OR).

Director Bill Dunn handled the inaugural crowd in fine fashion, and will repeat this charity match again next year.

Russ Adams Has Some Statistics

Russ Adams is a tough pegger from Minneapolis...and the reason must be he has done his homework!

Russ has been doing some serious analysis of the game and has come up with these numbers:

Total points: 60% from hands, 24% from pegging, 16% from cribs.

Dealer wins: 55.1%

Non-dealer wins: 44.9%

Blank cribs: 17.5%

Your editor ran through these numbers some ten years ago...and Russ and I are awfully close on these numbers. I wrote "Play Winning Cribbage" after a thorough analysis...perhaps Russ should get out his pen and take a crack at publishing, too! The only point we disagree is his statement: "...as a strategical matter, it might be wise for the 2nd dealer to play "tight" defensive discarding and pegging to prolong the game toward a near equality of outcomes." In my study, I felt it was wise for the 2nd dealer to play offensively from hand one, in order to win the average game of nine deals with first count on the 9th deal.

Has anyone else in cribbage land compiled data on this great game?

Inaugural Crowd of 132 Kah-Nee-Ta Open Wows Players

The Kah-Nee-Ta Open, played in the confederated tribes resort in the foothills of the Cascade Moutain range, drew rave comments from the sizeable inaugural crowd of 132 peggers.

This resort is some 15 miles from the small town of Warm Springs, but the facilities were outstanding. Complete with hot springs, large swimming pools, golf course, tennis, horseback riding, restaurants, and lounge, and excellent playing facilities for cribbage, players were predicting a huge increase for next December's match.

DeLynn Colvert, Missoula, MT, checked into room 13...and checked out with his 13th sanctioned win, edging John Furler, Tigard, OR, in an extremely close final 7th game. John needed but 8 points to win the match, but alas, drew to A-K-Q-J and cut a 3, finishing only 2 points short of the championship.

Jeff Monroe, Napa, CA (the ACC's membership chairman) took third place, edging out Liz Brandon, Bend, OR. Liz has been on a "roll" lately, claiming the recent Prineville, OR, match, for her 2nd sanctioned championship. A rumor circulating around the playing halls has it that Liz was caught on the dance floor recently rocking and rolling, and chanting "I'm a two-time winner!" (And very nearly a 3-time winner!)

In the large consolation match (100 players), the "King of Consolation", Gil Johnson, Spokane, WA, claimed yet another, edging out Ray Hanes...the pride of Walla Walla, WA. Local Denny Van Orsow claimed 3rd, followed by Jim Danaher, La Pine, OR, in 4th.

DeLynn Colvert was on a "roll" for the weekend, and also won the "high-roller." The doubles event was claimed by Paul Hatcher, Salem, Or, teamed with Merl Mulkey, Keizer, OR. Bill Dunn won the Saturday night special with a perfect 7 for 7. Bill hails from Prineville, OR.

Co-directors Jim Waldorf and John Hatfield kept the large crowd well organized, and their inaugural meet went off without a hitch...with a great deal of credit due to Marvis Reynolds..the northwest's expert in managing tournament play.

Two Huge Tournaments Slated for February

February will be a busy month for cribbage players. In addition to the ACC Open and Tournament of Champions in early February, two other large meets are scheduled.

The first is the 11th Annual Oregon Championship, to be played in Prineville February 15, 16, and 17. Director Joe Nelson has consistently had large crowds at this "granddaddy" of Oregon tournaments. A "high-roller" and doubles match will kick off the tournament Friday, Feb. 15, and will be played downtown at the Cinnebar Restaurant. Saturday's main event will be played once again at the fairgrounds. Director Nelson feels that a possible 350 peggers may be in the competition.

The other huge tournament to be played in February is Green Bay's MGM Open on the 22, 23, and 24th. Director's Tom Gallagher, Jerry Lemke, and Bob Miller have consistently fielded the largest group of peggers in the midwest (1989's crowd was a record 572). Doubles are played Friday and Saturday night. Additional events are also scheduled. Check the center-fold of this issue for additional entry information.

Dale Munroe Resigns

Hall of Famer Nelson Pendergast Wins More Awards



Can We Handicap Players?

Bob McCabe and Jeff Monroe should be congratulated for developing the master points and national rankings on annual membership cards. It is something that most ACC members are interested in and serves to give us commonality of interest not previously available.

Even more fortuitously, McCabe and Monroe have opened the door to providing more equitable tournaments. By giving a better chance to newcomers, to infrequent tournament players, to grass roots players and to less capable players, a chance to at least qualify, there will be a better chance of maintaining interest in ACC membership. We all know players who become discouraged after being trounced regularly by superior players in tournaments and even in grass roots; they stop coming to tournaments and drop out of league play.

Master Point availability means graded tournaments are now possible. We can all play our peers. Each tournament could be graded into three divisions, for example, with a low entry fee for the lowest division, a higher entry fee for the "average" division and a larger fee for the "expert" division. Payoffs would be on the basis of entry fees. Divisional play would be in effect for the qualifying round only. Random seating would be in effect in the playoffs. The integrity of the existing master point system would be preserved.

In a study done in the Northeast a year ago, 50% of ACC members had no master points, 27% had 150 or fewer, 13% had over 150 but less than 450, 10% had over 450 master points. I have enjoyed vying with the country's best players such as DeLynn Colvert, Scott Kooistra, Al Miller, Harry Palmer, Bob Michaelis, and Butch Reynolds. As our present tournament format permits these experts, and others, to meet new players, novices and infrequent tournament players two games in a qualifying

round, we almost assure such experts four to six points for each easy opponent. What a treat it would be to see these six players play each other in a qualifying round. They would, I suspect, draw spectators, rare indeed.

The annual Tournament of Champions is the only one that provides parity for all entrants. We can bring a semblance of parity to every tournament by grading entries in the qualifying round, thus eliminating early mismatches and giving less experienced players a better opportunity to qualify. Some grass roots clubs apparently are using a version of graded play.

Hopefully, the Connecticut Championship tournament in May, 1991, will use this technique and serve as a nationwide model. ACC membership will suddenly become more appealing and our numbers should swell.


Joe's handicapping of players certainly is interesting and deserves consideration, but I'm afraid he (and other tournament directors) must get an interpretation from the ACC Board of Directors before giving this method of qualifying a try.

At the September 21, 1990 Board of Directors meeting in Des Moines, mandatory random seating for sanctioned tournament play was unanimously passed for immediate adoption. I may be interpreting this incorrectly, but Joe's proposal of grouping (and seating) players by their lifetime Master Point total is NOT RANDOM!

Perhaps the January 31, 1991, BOD meeting in Reno can clarify if handicapping will be acceptable in sanctioned play.
