

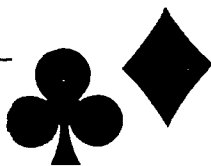

198 Peggers **Paul Petit Cops Rhode Island Open**

One of the largest one-day tournaments in the USA was played at the Omni-Biltmore in Providence, RI May 26...and after the last peg was cased and the cards laid away, Paul Petit, Pawtucket, RI, came away the winner. In besting some 198 peggers, Paul claimed a nifty purse and some 200 Master Points.

In 2nd, Barry Spadea, Riverside, RI also picked up a nifty 188 MRP's. 3rd and 4th were claimed by Lois Deslauriers, South Kingstown, RI, and Joe Cornelisien, Halifax, MA.

The hot hand in the qualifying round was held by Roger McGillicuddy, Stoughton, MA.

In the large 142-pegger consolation, John Rooney, Randolph, MA took home all the marbles with a close-fought win over Jack DaRosa, Lincoln, RI. David Clemmey, Mansfield, MA took 3rd, and Joe Lasorsa, Nashua, NH finished 4th.

Director Joe Ramos reported \$538 was donated to the MDA charity, and once again, Joe handled the large crowd in fine style.

National Open Looks for Record Crowd

With a deadline of July 19 fast approaching (and perhaps this issue will be delivered too late for some members), the 18th Annual National Open, Raleigh, NC, may set another Eastern attendance record this year.

Nick Pond, director, has the North Raleigh Hilton as the pegging site...and is looking forward to another huge crowd. As an example, at least five peggers from the state of Washington will make the long trek to Raleigh...another first!

Dufur, Oregon Pegger Tops Field of 154 Joyce Gearin Wins Cascade Classic VI

Joyce Gearin, a veteran pegger from the small town of Dufur, OR, topped the huge field of 154 peggers at the recent Cascade Classic VI in Bend, OR. And this time, she collected a trophy she can use...a handsome cribbage board (Joyce won a man's belt buckle in her last high finish).

In second was Mike Kuvaas, a fine pegger from Medford, OR...and with this high finish, easily went over the 2,000 MRP mark to earn his Masterrating. Mike was hot all weekend, as he took top qualifying honors as well. Bill O'Malley, Salem, OR, finished third, with Roy Hofbauer, Washougal, WA, in fourth. Roy also qualified 4th, earning a total of 182 MRP's, to run this season's total to an unofficial 1,126, pulling him into a virtual tie with Butch Reynolds, Santa Maria, CA. Both players

remain in the 1991 title chase. DeLynn Colvert, Missoula, MT, maintains a slim lead, and with a 9th place finish, stands at an unofficial 1,373 MRP's.

In the 98-pegger consolation, Keith Jespersen, Spokane, WA, claimed the title, edging out Jack Holt, Portland. Harvey Honeycutt, Beatty, OR, continues his fine scoring this year with a 3rd place finish. Clancy Schwarz, Prineville, OR, took 4th.

In the early bird doubles, J. C. Turner teamed with George Rasmussen to win this event. The Hi-roller was claimed by perennial winner Gary Motley, Gresham, OR, and the Saturday night special was won by veteran pegger Ken Cochlin, the Kennewick, WA, king who has a habit of winning the satellite events.

Special Summer Edition Richard Frost Freezes 'Em Out At the Polish Open

Directors Frank & Ginny Danielski organized a special summer edition of their famous Polish Open, partly to aid the plight of Paul Weber, who has a cancerous brain tumor. Part of the purse was donated to Paul. Some 134 peggers signed on, and when the pegging came to a close, only Richard Frost, Berlin, WI, was undefeated in match play, taking home a unique "Polish" trophy and a sizeable check. The trophy has a pole mounted on a board, with an unlocked padlock..."Pole Lock Open."

Richard had to pick up the championship the hard way...playing Grand Master Joe Bernard for the title. Joe hails from Libertyville, IL.

Third place went to DeLynn Colvert, Missoula, MT, and 4th was claimed by Rosemary Daun, Chilton, WI.

The consolation crown was claimed by Gerald Danielski, Green Bay, WI...and he also had to win the hard way. His final opponent was Life Master Mick Michaelis, the Marinette, WI perennial winner!

Local Keith Paulson has come "out of the gate" two years in a row as top qualifier. Another quirk of the cribbage gods made Dean Jeffers

the "hero" to Robbie Robson, San Jose, CA, and Ted Hokenson, Marquette, MI, as he dealt the two players "28" hands...worth \$28 to each (but Dean comes up empty!). Three others also collected the \$28.

The early "birdski" was won by Walt Raczynski, and the early "bathski" was nailed down by Grand Master Duane Toll.

An interesting Friday "nightcap" tourney was the "Leastski" event...5 games of 61, with the "least" score the winner. Bill Cook was the champion of running in reverse, as he came up roses with a -12GP and -60 spread in this 60-pegger event. Alas, your editor finished 59th.

Frank and Ginny Danielski did a great job of directing the tournament, and the Amora Villa Motel proved a fine host facility.

Jerold Montgomery Cops 20th Annual World Championship

Topping a huge crowd of 214 peggers, Jerold Montgomery of nearby Red Bluff, CA, came away with the "World Championship." This event is one of the ACC's longest standing tournaments, and continues to draw a large field.

In 2nd was Dave Thorne, Sonoma, CA, with veteran pegger Bill Irons (Sparks, NV) finishing 3rd. Bill has finished "in the money" consistently in Quincy. Bill is the director of two annual tournaments in Reno. Thelma Weber, Vacaville, CA, finished a strong 4th.

Pat Schultz, another Sparks, NV, player took the consolation crown, edging out perennial All-American Jesse Jarrell, Pittsburg, CA. Sherman Hensell (Garberville, CA) and Al Mann (Greenville, CA) took 3rd and 4th.

Director Mike Taborski did a great job managing the huge field...and reports \$1,444.50 was donated to the local Rotary Community Service projects.

Eastern Region players Rit Alkas, Manchester, CT, and Joe Ramos, W. Warwick, RI, recently went over the 2,000 Master Point plateau to earn their Master rating. Both Rit and Joe are veteran peggers with many high finishes in sanctioned play.

Central Region players Jim Rein, Carver, MN, joins his wife Joan as the 2nd husband/wife Master Player combo (and both earned their rating the same year), and Frank Trojan, New Brighton, MN scored his 2,000+ point as 7th qualifier at the recent Iowa Championship. Bob Julian, Milwaukee, WI, earned his Master rating with a fine 5-8 finish at the recent Polish Open in Appleton. Bob is a former BOD member, and is a top recruiter for the ACC (he drives a van with a sign plugging the ACC on the back).

In the Western Region, two mainstays in the operation of the ACC also recently earned their Master rating. Mary Cornwell, Sunnyvale, CA, a veteran player and tournament director (and former BOD member) went over the 2,000 MRP mark recently, and Roy Hofbauer, Washougal, WA, Western Region Commissioner, has been burning up the track this year, scoring in excess of 1,000 MRP's in 1991 alone, and with his fine 4th place finish at the recent Cascade Classic VI soared over the 2,000 MRP plateau. Mike Kuvaas, Medford, OR, qualified first, and finished 2nd at the recent Cascade Classic VI in Bend, OR, to easily wing it over the 2,000 MRP mark. Mike averages about 100 MRP's per event, ranking him among the VERY best in the country.

Portland Summer Tourney Changes Sites

It will be the same date, but the Portland Summer Open will now be played at the Flamingo Motel on Sandy Blvd. instead of the Moose Lodge in Gresham.

The Flamingo has a well ventilated no-smoking banquet room for a playing area, with smoking allowed by the rest rooms and on an outside landing. The only change from an earlier flyer is the price of lunch...now \$5.95 instead of \$4.50. The Flamingo is accessible from I 205, with Sandy Blvd as the best exit.

Bob Gombatz, Raleigh, NC, edged out rookie pegger Jerriann Newsham, Fort Walton Beach, FL for 3rd. Jerriann's fine 4th place finish was an excellent showing for a newcomer to the tournament trail.

The results of this tournament, with the exception of the absence of Earl Luton, were almost a replay of the recent Columbia, SC final four.

The 34-pegger consolation was won by Bill Campbell, a veteran pegger from Ft. Walton Beach, FL. Michael Cape, Lawrenceville, GA, took 2nd. Michael Burnham, Acworth, GA took 3rd, and Herb Klebe, Norcross, GA took 4th.

Director Bobby Stuart was pleased with this inaugural tournament, and is looking for a larger crowd next year. Plans are for an April 11, 12 match in 1992.

Tournament Directors

Check the Score Cards!

National Tournament Commissioner Martha Fingleton, Milwaukee, WI, has printed a "How to Check Scorecards" information sheet. This is a "must" for a tournament director. Space is short in Cribbage World, so a summary is printed below:

The **ONLY** way to ascertain that the posted qualifiers in a tournament are, in fact, the **CORRECT** qualifiers is to check every scorecard for errors. While this may seem like an almost overwhelming task, it is not difficult and moves along quickly when approached in a systematic fashion. Bear in mind that allowing an entrant into the playoffs who doesn't belong there cheats **EVERYONE** at that tournament!

In order to facilitate cross-checking, the tournament director must:

- 1-Assemble a crew of about 10 people, 2-3 of whom act as "runners."
- 2-Secure a private area, with 1-2 tables, 8-10 chairs.
- 3-Determine the number of qualifiers and notify the tabulators.

First, to make cross-checking possible, all players must be strongly advised to keep scorecards in ink **ONLY**, and they **MUST** turn in **ALL** cards for checking. Players should be seated so that players rotate around a "captain" at **ONE** table or so that one side moves/one "sits" at the **SAME** table. Avoid serpentine rotations that weaves around the entire room.

After collecting **ALL** scorecards, checkers separate cards (by game point totals) into 4 piles: losers, probable losers, probable qualifiers, qualifiers. Tabulators then check for game points only. For example, in a 22-game match, cards with 24 GPs or less go to the "dead" pile, 25-26 GPs have the game points **ONLY** checked and if they are correct, they go to the "dead" pile. Cards with 27 points have GP's and spread points checked and go into the "bubble" pile. Cards with 28 GP's or more have game points **AND** spread points checked and go into the qualifier pile.

Make sure you have **ALL** the cards. Count them. Remember how ties are broken:

- | | |
|---------------|---------------------|
| 1-Game points | 3-Net spread points |
| 2-Games won | 4-Positive spread |

When all cards are collected and checked, separate them into Qualifiers and Non-qualifiers. Keep track of the high Non-qualifier's card and re-check all cards. For example, if the high non-qualifier is 27 GP's, 12 wins, plus 76, make certain that all non-qualifiers have **LESS** than that.

Crosscheck the Qualifiers by table (in order) as well as the Non-qualifiers by table (in order). The tabulators team up in duos by specific tables. One tabulator takes the qualifier's card and the other the non-qualifier's. The qualifier's card is read to the tabulator with the non-qualifier's in this order: seat number, game(s), game points/spread points the non-qualifier **SHOULD** have. Example: "seat 3, games 1 & 2, 2 plus 27, 0 minus 29." If the other tabulator agrees, he says "yes" and checking continues.

When discrepancies are noted, follow these rules:

- 1-The disadvantage is **ALWAYS** to the apparent qualifier.
- 2-If disagreement on spread, the **LOWER** spread is accepted.
- 3-If spread not marked on one card, accept other spread.
- 4-Make sure GP's marked are correct.
- 5-"No harm-no foul." Qualifier says won by 16, non-qualifier shows minus 26, plus 16 stands.
- 6-Watch for **BIG** wins or losses last two games. Check to see if players are friends or relatives. Counsel players appropriately and **STERNLY**. Throwing a game is **CHEATING**.
- 7-If a mistake is found that alters qualifying position, a tournament director should personally advise the player(s) as soon as possible...with the scorecard evidence.
- 8-Finally, reassemble the qualifier's cards in **QUALIFYING ORDER** and post. For a 150-200 player tournament, the entire crosschecking process takes about 1 1/2 to 2 hours. You are now assured that everyone on the qualifier's list **DESERVES** to be there.

Grand National Director Harry Stoops Ready to Roll

Despite all of our setbacks, THERE WILL BE A 1991 GRAND NATIONAL! It will be held at the Bahia Mar Hotel & Resort, South Ft. Lauderdale Beach. September 27-28-29, 1991 (see centerfold, this issue).

There will be a Friday night "early bird" and Friday night hi-rollers. For your convenience, there will be a Friday afternoon check-in from 4-6 PM. Early registration will help eliminate the crush on Saturday morning. Coffee will be served Saturday and Sunday morning.

The Awards Banquet will be held on board the Jungle Queen! It is berthed one block south of the hotel. The capacity is only 175, so the banquet will be strictly on a first come, first serve basis. The cruise is up and down the New River (the trip is worth the price of admission alone). After a one-hour ride up the river, we arrive at Fantasy Island, have our banquet, see a vaudeville type show, then return to the boat for our ACC awards ceremony on the return trip. Four drink tickets are part of the package, and may be used on any part of the cruise, except on the return trip, as the bar will be closed to make room for the awards ceremony.

From the hotel, there is a walk-over walkway to the beach and the Atlantic Ocean. This six-mile beach is where the film "Where the Boys Are" was filmed.

The Bahia Mar is four miles from the Fort Lauderdale International Airport, and a special room rate will be given to cribbage players...\$50 single or double, slightly higher for three or more. Make sure you tell the hotel "cribbage" when making a reservation.

Fred McGibney & Ernie Chadderon will be your directors for the Friday "early bird" event. Ike Rutherford & Nick Pond will direct the Hi-rollers, and for the Main Event, it will be John "JJ" Gella and Harry R. Stoops at the helm. Lotsa fun, lotsa winners! See you in Fort Lauderdale!
