Al Grantz Scores 29-Hand **Terry Nelson Wins** **Oregon Coast Classic**

Terry Nelson, rookie player from Lebanon, OR, bested a huge field of 193 peggers at the recent Oregon Coast Classic, played at Lincoln City, OR May 3, 4, and 5. Veteran player, and tournament director from Crescent City, CA, Dan Mitchell finished a strong 2nd. Another tournament director, Ken Capper, Hermiston, OR, finished 3rd, followed by Clarence Van Orsow, Culver, OR, in 4th. The Van Orsows take turns winning. Last month Denny Van Orsow won the Northwest Open, followed by Ray Van Orsow taking the Red Barn Open...and now Clarence almost made it a trifecta!

In the 150-pegger consolation, veteran pegger Lee Chambers, Corvallis, OR, took all the marbles, winning over another veteran pegger, Dorothy Mickow, Portland. Vern Ward, Crescent City, CA, finished third, and improved Crescent City's reputation as a cribbage "hot-bed," joining Dan Mitchell in the winner's circle. Stu McIntyre from the fishing port of Astoria, OR took 4th.

Al Grantz, Kelso, WA, scored the ACC's 8th 1991 29-hand in the qualifying round.

In the opening "early bird" high roller's event, Oscar Elf, Everett, WA, got the weekend off to a fine start, and in the large doubles satellite event (70 teams), Harold Heer (Beaver, OR) teamed with Wilma Fleming (Pacific City) to bring home the bacon.

Steve Hofbauer, son of front-running MRP leader Roy Hofbauer, took top qualifying honors with a fine 37 (15) +288 card. Roy should start giving lessons to our general ACC membership, judging by Steve's fine score.

Directors Bernie Nelson, Rollie Heath, Roy and Jeanne Hofbauer ran a first class event, in their 2nd annual, with entries up a solid 25% from last year. Their fair paybacks, and no-smoking in the playing hall drew many favorable comments.

Vern Kennebeck writes that his Grass Roots club of Magalia, CA helped put that state over the 1,000 mark in membership. Ken had over 60 players signed up as Congress members when he applied for a charter.

What do you think of 1,000 members competing in a tournament this year? Commissioner Jerry Dickinson of Grass Roots says the Grass Roots National Tournament may draw that many in the tournament in progress. Each club plays an 18-game meet and sends results in to Jim Arblaster, the tournament director, for auditing. Jim says first prize may be \$500. Not bad for an \$11 investment and no hotel or travel expenses. What could be fairer?

This scribe has invited David N. L. Levy, London, England, to the Congress Open at Reno, January, 1992, to witness our method of conducting a tournament for over 700 players.

Levy is a top English official staging the first MIND SPORTS OLYMPIAD, and he is an International Chess Master and former Scottish chess champion. Thirty mind sports will be included in the Olympiad. In the 1993 competition there will be five card games--cribbage, skat, poker, contract bridge, and gin rummy. If time schedules permit, a person may enter more than one event. Madison, WI, is interested in having the 1995 Olympiad.

Harry Stoops, chairman of the 1991 Grand National, spent a little time in the hospital during the winter and is now back in topnotch condition working on the details of the gala event.

Congress members are requested to support the event by contributing \$5 to the BOOSTERS PROGRAM, \$8 for a married couple, and have their names listed in the official program. States and individuals will be listed alphabetically.

Mark Searcy Wins Greater Hermiston Open

Mark Searcy, Bend OR, took a hot run of cards and went all the way to the Greater Hermiston Championship, played in Hermiston, OR April 26-28. Mark had a tough final match with Eldon Schwilke, Spokane, WA.

Bend, OR, had the winning combination, as Bill Becker (from Bend) took third place. Canadian (Lethbridge) Ed Bastedo took fourth. Ed has been on the Northwest circuit lately...and winning.

Eldon had his "personal" dealer during the qualifying and playoff rounds...Jason Jespersen, a 10-year old from Spokane, WA. Medical problems force Eldon to have a dealer, and he picked a good one!

The consolation was won by Ed Armstrong, Grand Island, NE, with Willie Evans in 2nd (Richland, WA). Willie is tournament director of the Washington Championship. Todd Kimball, Walla Walla, WA took 3rd, and '89 Grand National champ Harvey Honeycutt, Beatty, OR, was 4th.

Directors Ken and Betty Capper conducted a first-class tournament, attested by the large 184-pegger field in the main event, and another 148 in the consolation. In addition, a banquet and calcutta auctioning the final 32 qualifiers was well received.

Jin Danaher (La Pine, OR) teamed with I. V. Graham (libby, MT) to win the doubles event, and local Denny Edwards won the "High-roller." Bruce Wridge, Portland won the "cry baby" last chance event. The "hot" hand during qualifying was Lucille Endicott, Prineville, OR, with a 35 GP card.

Al Dinwoodie Wins Again

Al Dinwoodie, veteran pegger from N. Kingston, RI, has won again. This time he adds the inaugural Eastern States Championship to his laurels, that include winning the Western New York Open, the Vermont Open, and the Greater Boston Classic.

In besting the 144-pegger field in Chicopee, MA, Al proves he is the "king" of the Northeast (but he may have an argument with director Emil Chrabaszcz, George Webb, and Phyllis Schmidt, among others). Al bested rookie Charles Lask, a first-time player from Ware, MA, in the final match. Tony Del Tufo, W. Bridgewater, MA took 3rd, followed by Ken Vetterline, of Bar Mills, MA. Ken's bundle of 4th-place Master Points will improve his 5th place Easter Region position, and gives him a chance to make the 1991 All-American team (top 10 nationally).

Consolation winners: (1) Bob Olthoff, Longmeadow, MA, (2) Nelson Bakken, Chapin, CT, (3) Lou Caccia, Newtonville, MA, and (4) Joe Kral, Mattapan, MA.

Rookie Francis Stanley, in his first tournament, was top qualifier, with 22 GP's and +173. Francis hails from Greenfield, MA.

Despite a late start in advertising this event, the "grape vine" in New England spread the word, along with director Emil Chrabaszcz's hard work, this inaugural Eastern States Championship drew a large crowd.

Consecutive Grand Slams

Al Giles, Grass Roots club 95, Norwood, MA, scored consecutive Grand Slams (winning 9 of 9) February 19, and again on February 26 at their local meet. Winning 18 in a row approaches 250,000 to 1!


Utah now has three members (with Bob's addition)...and if Bob's son joins him, the membership will double.

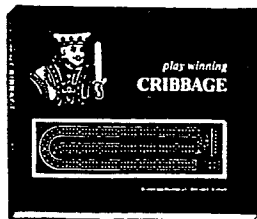

Raleigh, NC, will once again host the National Open...for the 18th annual, and director Nick Pond is expecting another record crowd.

Last year, the National Open set a new record with 434 peggers (an Eastern Region record). This prestigious event is played in first class surroundings. The North Raleigh Hilton will once again be the host facility, and with Nick's expertise in managing tournaments, players can expect a well-managed affair, complete with "elbow room" and linen tablecloths.

Who can forget last year's event? Scott Kooistra was holding a slim Master Point edge over Butch Reynolds coming into this event...and by winning the championship in the 19th round, Scott assured himself the 1990 National Championship.

This meet has the unusual format of double-elimination, best 4 of 7, with a skunk counting two games. Other events are played in the ACC's more common format...the consolation (qualifying round with playoffs), Losers-Losers, and Last Roundup.

Bob Lock Cops Madison Master Classics

With a large crowd of 170 peggers pegging for the title, only Bob Lock, the Appleton, WI flash came away with the roses. Bob's final match was with veteran pegger Jack Miller, Northfield, MN.

The winner of the 112 pegger consolation was local Grass Rooter George Verbeski, with Grand Master Duane Toll in 2nd. Duane--the pride of Milwaukee--has made a career playing the Masters consolations. In the last four years he has two wins, a second, and a fourth.

In the satellite tournaments, three grand slams were scored. Pat Barrett won them all on Friday night, John Williams repeated the feat on Saturday night, and in the last chance event, former Grand National champion Grace Cummings garnered 17 points in seven games (and on the first hand of the 7th game against tournament director Gaylord Matti, she began the game by pegging 10, counting 24 in her hand, and added 12 in the crib to make the "slam" easy! 46 point start! Wow!)

Arlene Barrett (Pat's mother) had the hot hand in qualifying...a fine 38 GP's!

The Madison Masters Classic has the distinction of being the "father" of the ACC's most popular tournament format...begun by President Joe Wergin some 13 years ago.

Robert T. Bradley Hits No. 7 29-Hand

On March 24, 1991, Robert T. Bradley, E. Hartford, CT, hit the ACC's 7th 29-hand of the 1991 season while pegging at the South Shore Open in Randolph, MA.
