

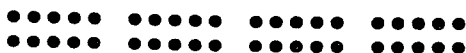

10th Annual Grand National **Fort Lauderdale Ready** **for Grand National** **Clay Collier Defending Champion**

The 10th Annual Grand National, to be played at the beautiful Bahia Mar Hotel in Fort Lauderdale, Florida, is gearing up and raring to go...according to Director Harry Stoops.

With an entry deadline of September 20, time is short if you wish to enter. The Bahia Mar Hotel has a September 13 deadline for reservations (which may be too late for readers of this issue...but plead "innocent" if you wish to reserve a room. CW received word too late to inform our ACC members on this reservation date).

Last year's champion Clay Collier, the Bearice, NE king is expected back to defend his title. Clay bested some 296 peggers in last year's meet in Des Moines, Iowa.

And this year's championship, with Florida's tourist's attractions, and the Bahia Mar's proximity to the ocean, yacht basins, tennis courts, pools, etc., should draw another sizeable crowd. And with the novel Awards Ceremony scheduled for a cruise boat should add to the size of the crowd.

The awards program will feature our 5th Life Master (Warren Sondericker, Greenfield, WI) and our 11th and 12th Grand Masters (Jim McManus, Milwaukee, WI, and Jeff Shimp, Shelbyville, MI), along with our All-American team, our 29 awards (11 to date), out All-Regional team awards, and our 28 or so new Master player awards.

Paul Woytovich and George Taylor were playing game one in the consolation championship. George needs but one peg to win, with first count, and Paul needs 13 to win. George picks up K Q 10 6 3 1, and tosses the K Q. Paul is drawing to a possible 29-hand with a J 5 5 5 8 3, but decides to try for the game, and discards 5 5. The starter was a J. The play went Q 5 (15-2), 6 J (31 for 2), 3 3 (a pair for 2), 1 8 (15 for 3). Poor George held a blank and failed to peg a point. Paul won the game, noting afterwards that he only considered playing defense and was unaware that he could have played a 29!

But did George give up? Nope...even with this horrendous luck, he won three of the next four games, and the championship.

San Franciscan Bob Shimoff Wins National Open

415 Peggers Set Eastern Region 1991 Attendance Mark

Californian Bob Shimoff made a trek across country to Raleigh...and he made it pay off to the tune of \$4,600. In winning the 415-pegger National Open, Bob took home roughly 10% of the entire purse of \$43,749.

Kevin Fabian, Naperville, IL, also took home a bundle (\$2,700) in taking 2nd place. Third was captured by Brenda Palmer, W. Springfield, MA. Her accumulation of Master Points will vault her into the Eastern Region's top 50 for the 1991 cribbage year, earning her an invitation to next year's Tournament of Champions. Bob Hanes, former Grand National champion, took 4th, and paid for his trip east with his \$1,375 check. Bob hails from Ankeny, Iowa.

In the sizeable consolation (235 peggers), George Taylor, Swansea, MA, won going away...and collected a sizeable \$1,450. Paul Woytovich, Hickory, NC took 2nd, with local Ted Dick in 3rd, followed by Harry Palmer, W. Springfield, MA in 4th. The Palmers were the big winners in this year's meet, and both Harry and Brenda will make the Eastern Region's top 50 for the 1991 year.

The Last Roundup event was won by Ed Horigan, Virginia Beach, VA, edging out local Jeff Raynes. This event drew 130 peggers.

The Losers Losers paid \$600 to Pat Kolebas, Dunwoody, GA, for winning this 172-pegger event. And Earl Luton, Elizabeth City, NC, went home a winner in finishing 2nd.

After many years drought, TWO 29 hands were scored: Bill Campbell, Ft. Walton Beach, FL, and the other by Howard Baum, Fayettev-

ille, NC. Eight 28 hands were scored: Jack Morris (NC), Frank Moore (NC), Bob Blackford (NC), Holly Sanders (PA), Cal Storment (FL), Majorie Pistone (MA), Johnnie Wheeler (GA), and Lawrence Brech (GA).

Once again, Nick Pond and his staff ran a first class tournament. And Nick says that of the 415 entrants, 331 went home with prize money.

Gene Sissel First Master in 1992 Bob Brumley Wins Huge Portland Open

Bill Becker Scores 1992's First 29-hand

Portland's summer event drew a record 212 peggers, even surprising the tournament directors, as score cards were in short supply...but Bob Brumley, a fine pegger from Sunnyside, WA, got his scorecard early, recorded some fine numbers, and came away with the championship.

Bob edged out Otmar Bourchard, Scio, OR, for the title. Otmar also nailed the consolation in Reno's Summer Classic to continue his high finishes. Ken Richmond, Gresham, OR, was hot all weekend. He qualified in the top spot (41 19 +282), and almost won it all, but finished third.

Gene Sissel, Baker City, OR, claimed fourth, and a bundle of Master Points to claim 1992's first Master award. Gene is the patriarch of the Sissel clan in Eastern Oregon...all fine peggers. Gene was also recently elected to the ACC Board of Directors.

In the 152-pegger consolation, the Pittsburg, CA flash, Jesse Jarrell, took the title...and a fine start for his perennial try for All-American honors (Jesse finished 2nd nationally in 1989 and 1990). John Gearin, Dufur, OR, put aside his shotgun for a day to pick up 2nd (John is an expert trapshooter...but maybe cribbage will become his number one sport after this fine 2nd place finish). Local Gary Motley is off and running with a 3rd place finish, followed by Irene Shine's 4th place finish.

Bill Becker, Bend, OR, finally scored his first 29-hand in over 50 years of trying in the main event. He wasted 26 points, however, as he only needed three to win the game! Bill's gem is the first of the 1992 season.

Frank Ingels, Dufur, OR, went home a winner by nailing the Friday "High-Rollers."

74 teams played for the doubles crown, and two Washington players-Louis Prince and Sue Anderson- won this event.

Life Master DeLynn Colvert, Missoula, MT had a grand slam 9/9 to pick up the Saturday night game, and local Bruce Wridge took the Sunday "Cry Baby" event.

25 juniors played for the Junior crown...and Baker City's Eric Hutton came away with the top trophy.

Director Leslie Hein, with help from co-directors Jeanne and Roy Hofbauer did a fine job in handling the large crowd,

David Warheit Can't Lose at Walnut Creek

The 140-pegger 2nd Annual Devil Mountain Caper played at Walnut Creek CA, was won by David Warheit, Livermore, CA...and David also won the FIRST Devil Mountain Caper last year. David had to win the hard way, as he had to play perennial champion Butch Reynolds, Santa Maria, CA a best 4 of 7 match for the title. David dealt Butch "walnuts" four straight games to win going away 4-0.

Tournament co-director Jesse Jarrell was overheard telling David his entry fee for the Third Annual Caper would be \$500!

Mary Vincent, Carson City, NV took third, with V. T. McGuigan, Concord, CA taking fourth.

Two top-ranked players from the Northwest scored a bundle of Master Points to maintain their All-American pace for the 1991 year. Paul Hatcher, Salem, OR, was top qualifier with a fine 38 16 +216, and finished 7th in the playoffs for 135 Master Points, and probably earning him a fine 4th place finish nationally for the 1991 cribbage year. Roy Hofbauer, Washougal, WA, won the 60-pegger consolation event, and with this fine finish will probably finish 3rd nationally this cribbage year. By finishing in the top ten, both players will be named to the 1991 All-American Cribbage Team.

Jones Hom, a veteran pegger from Fairfield, CA, took 2nd in the consolation, followed by Jackie Doppelt, Napa, CA, and Evelyn Gilmore, Concord, CA.

Mike Hayden teamed with Dan Kizer to score a grand slam 9/9 in the doubles event to take home the bacon. Both players hail from club #48 in Cupertino, CA.

DeLynn Colvert, Missoula, MT, editor of Cribbage World, ran a hot streak last winter (winning three of four sanctioned tournaments), and followed that with a steady early summerrun of 1st, 3rd, 7th, and 9th place finishes to win honors in the annual Master Point race. Competition for this honor is getting tougher as our ACC membership grows. Colvert won in 1986, playing in 16 sanctioned tournaments, scoring some 820 MRP's. This year, it took 28 tournaments and 1,650 MRP's to best perennial winner Butch Reynolds, Santa Maria, CA. Butch finished a strong 2nd.


Playing with Bonnie Jennie, Gene Bristol, and Elroy Wolf in a doubles game, we all cut sixes to begin the game. What are the odds of that? If the card is specified BEFORE the cut is made, then the odds are:

$4/52 \times 3/51 \times 2/50 \times 1/49 = 24/6,497,400 = 1/270,725$, or 270,725 to 1.

But we could have cut four of anything. The first card has to be something, so it doesn't affect the odds. It's only necessary that the other three cards match it. Now the odds are lowered to:

$3/51 \times 2/50 \times 1/49 = 6/124,950 = 1/20,825$, or 20,825 to 1.

So, if you chose 20,825 to 1, give yourself a pat on the back.

You Can Do Something About It

I am mad as I can be and I'm not going to take it anymore. There has been too much name calling and sexually oriented suggestive language in our cribbage tournaments.

We have men whose cribbage playing wives will no longer attend a cribbage tournament with them because they have been demeaned and embarrassed by a leading player's sick language coming across the table. Recently that same player at a tournament we attended called an opponent "a damned liar" after calling judges to solve a problem of play. Two months ago we attended a tournament where one of our old and frequent players called another "an old asshole." NO ACTION WAS TAKEN.

The fact is that there is no written policy established on how to handle these situations. Because the Tournament Director is busy and cannot be all places at once, I suggest the Judges be given the authority within established guidelines to handle players that go so far out of line. Think of all the players that have had to listen to this and have their own matches disrupted.

But even without giving judges this authority to take action, individuals are not entirely helpless. They can write the Tournament Director and the Regional Tournament Commissioners describing the offending player and incident. If enough of these complaints are received, perhaps the ACC will realize that they have a few players causing embarrassment and problems at tournaments and have grounds to cancel their membership.

If you have paid your money and have not enjoyed your day...get your protest in. It CAN make a difference.

Miss Many 15's?

We have all undercounted our hand from time to time, and nothing can be more upsetting than missing a few points, especially if playing Muggins. Most of the time the missed points are fifteens. Here is a surefire way not to miss any by first adding the pip value of the cards, deducting fifteen, and looking for the resultant figure. Examples: K322A, K = 10 and $10+3+2+2+1 = 18$; $18-15 = 3$. Now look for threes; there are 3, 2A, and 2A; therefore there are 3 fifteens. 66432 = 21, $21-15 = 6$; there are 3 sixes, 6, 6, and 42, therefore there are 3 fifteens. If you always use this means of checking your count, you should never again fail to count a Fifteen.

A contributor recently mentioned the variety of playing cribbage with the objective of losing, i. e. first to 121 loses. This is, indeed, an amusing variety, but to be truly enjoyable it is necessary to add one additional rule, borrowed from checkers: if, during the play, a player can make a scoring play, he MUST make a scoring play; if he has a choice of scoring plays, he need not choose any one in particular.
