Duane Toll Wins MGM, Earns 8th Life Master

Huge Crowd in Green Bay

Duane Toll, perennial winner from West Allis, WI, became the 8th player to earn a Life Master rating...and he earned the rating in grand style by winning the huge MGM Open in Green Bay, Wisconsin February 23, besting some 534 peggers.

In 1987, Toll set a new high mark for earning Master Rating Points, finishing the year with a then-record 1,971 MRP's in taking the National Championship for that cribbage year. In addition, he earned All-American honors in 1990, finishing the year 10th.

With this win, Toll picked up some 410 MRP's (and \$3,000) to easily wing it over the 6,000 MRP plateau to join the ranks of Life Masters. In addition, Toll's 1992 MRP total approaches the 800 mark, giving him a shot at this year's crown.

Al Schaefer from nearby Milwaukee finished 2nd, picking up 331 MRP's and a sizeable \$2,000.

Local Howard Nowak kept some green backs at home by finishing 3rd, while Glen Gauthier, DePere, WI came home 4th.

Two Milwaukee brothers had a field day in the qualifying rounds of the main event and the consolation. Steve Steinmetz took home the "Q" money in the main event, and brother Wayne Steinmetz followed suit by taking honors in the consolation qualifying round.

The consolation drew a sizeable 232 peggers with Frank Choate taking the crown...and keeping the prize money in his home town of Green Bay. Rich Hanfler, Waukesha, WI took 2nd, followed by Ronald Koziol, Rosholt, WI in 3rd, and Marsha Mahan, Appleton, WI in 4th.

A huge crowd played doubles Friday night (302 teams), and two Green Bay players came up roses (Jim Pokorney and Jim Van Bellinger). Saturday night's double's action saw Jesse Jarrell (Pittsburg, CA) and Robbie Robson (San Jose, CA) walk away winners.

The President's Column

The advertising program has crossed the high seas. Recently, a letter was received from Rita Liepina, an English language teacher and organizer of the English Language Club in Latvia. She noted that she is also the mom of five children.

Rita saw our ad and got interested in it. She said that they are looking for new forms to further their work and would like to secure more information on English there. Instructions on how to play cribbage and a suggestion to request help from Americans and/or Britains in the club were made.

Another letter was received from overseas. Stan Kimmel and wife Tsipi, who have been members of the Congress for several years, held hands similar to Jim Culliney's which was reported last month. The Kimmels reside in Israel and are representatives of our government.

Stan dealt his wife 2-2-3-3-7-8, and the same combination to himself. Both players discarded the 7-8 combination and a 6 was cut. By his great pegging of 29 points, Stan was saved from getting skunked. However, she pegged out and he could NOT count the delicious 24 crib. Their house rule is: "The loser does the dishes."

Dick Kurz and his VFW Post 10301 claims to be the greatest booster of cribbage among service organizations in the United States. In the March issue of their bulletin, Kurz devoted one-half the booklet, 15 pages, to cribbage activities. He tells of the scheduled activities, why certain rules are in the book, and even gives lessons in playing. In the early days of the Congress, Dick signed up over 100 members, receiving awards for that accomplishment. Phil Babcock, our Advertising Chairman, should name Kurz to his Committee.

CRIBBAGE in the CLASSROOM...Don Doyle and this writer received a request to teach seventh graders cribbage during the spring.

The first class was held at Jefferson Middleschool for a few hours daily during one week and the second request was a call from RSVP for eight hours of instruction over a four-week period.

At the Jefferson school, we had two classes, one of 14 students and the other of 16. At LaFollette high school we had students who were 16 years old and probably sophomores or juniors. This class was held in a "school within a school" and we had only six students. It was a special group of intelligent students who did not have enough to do and were inclined to sluff off. They accepted the challenge of learning a new game and Doyle felt good that we interested them in a wholesome activity.

We are slowly getting school officials to realize the benefits of teaching cribbage in the schools. We should have 100 students a day for a couple of months.

Most crib players from Wisconsin should be happy about what is being related here because they also play sheephead. This author over-estimated the number of books to print on Sheephead/Skat games when published in 1975. Our books on cribbage as well as other games are usually financed by the authors as the publishing houses estimate that there will not be sufficient sales. So, we go it with our own funds.

An oversupply of almost 2,000 Sheephead books have been taking up space in my basement for 16 years. So, I contacted the Wisconsin Library Association and offered to donate one book to every public library in Wisconsin. This offer was accepted and 500 books were picked up. However, I pasted in an insert telling about cribbage. I just had to tell about where information on the best two-handed game in the world could be secured.

Calvin Rinaldi is a tough pegger from Fairfield, CA, and he was in Reno to make a try at winning the Tournament of Champions. He should have pointed about eight inches lower...for that is where he finished. A very fine 7th place (and a neat \$1,300).

123 Peggers in Minneapolis

Master Pegger Jerry Gruber Wins Minnesota Open

The beautiful Northwestern Inn in suburban Minneapolis hosted some 123 peggers February 14, 15, and 16, and after the pegs had been laid away, two local peggers came away with the championship...and 2nd place.

Jerry Gruber earned his Master rating last year, and continues his winning ways by winning this Minnesota XII championship and a nice batch of 140 Master Rating Points.

Professor Russell Adams, another local pegger who has been studying his cribbage numbers, and contributing to Cribbage World with his analyses, proved playing with the numbers pays off by finishing a fine 2nd. Russell also finished 4th at Reno's mammoth ACC Open (826 peggers) last month and continues to pile up MRP's. His yearly total is in the 600 range, giving him a shot at the national title for 1992.

Jim Hogan, North St. Paul, finished 3rd, and Ginny Danielski, the personable Polish Open tournament director from Appleton, WI took 4th.

Norm Lindman, Eagan, MN, bested some 70 peggers in the consolation event. Gene Bristol, Mound, MN came in 2nd, followed by Frank Trojan, New Brighton, MN in 3rd.

The ACC Open winner in Reno slipped a bit in Minneapolis, but settled for 4th. With these 25 MRP's for this 4th place finish is just added gravy for Warren Sondericker. This Milwaukee pegger is among the MRP leaders for this cribbage year.

Tournament directors John Williams and Joy Jerdee continue to conduct well-run tournaments...as this Twelfth Annual at- tests.

Rookie Scores 33 GP's in 18 Games to Claim Regional Grass Roots Title

Ray Woods Wins Northwest Regional Title

A newly enrolled player from Club 108 in the Seattle area recently scored 33 game points in an 18-game match to claim the Northwest Regional Grass Roots title. Rookie Ray Woods is off to a nice start in the Grass Roots program with this win, and took home \$400.

Last year's winner, Albany's Don Hansen, nearly duplicated his win, but had to settle for 2nd, scoring a nifty 30 GP's.

According to Regional Commissioner, Jack Holt of Portland, a total of \$1,990 was paid out in prizes to the 50 players entered in the meet. These 50 represented 13 Grass Roots clubs.

Will Lea Hornbeck Win His Next Grass Roots Game?

Lea Hornbeck recently won \$10 for being the only player to win exactly half of his Portland, OR, area Grass Roots games. At the halfway mark for this season, this ACC Board of Directors' member has won 81 of 162 games.

Will Lea win number 163 and become a winner...or lose and be in the red ink?

ACC Board of Directors Meeting Reno, NV, January 31, 1992

All directors present except Arblaster, Cambell, Pond, and Wergin.

Executive Vice President opened meeting at 1:20, introduced guest attorney at law Ellen Winograd.

Motion made to expell M. K. Reynolds. Carried.

Appreciation extended to Ellen Winograd for her services as attorney to the BOD.

Kudos extended to Sands Hotel/Casino for hors d'oeuvres.

Minutes approved from the September 1991 meeting.

DeLynn Colvert reported his new computer saving time and money for ACC in publishing *Cribbage World*.

Pegging out rule (#27AA) readdressed. Tabled until Raleigh meeting in order to thoroughly reassess rule.

Treasurer's Report approved. Treasurer McGibney noted tax returns have been filed for a 2nd year in a row, and on time.

Auditor Barbara Buntrock presented report indicating everything going smoothly. She recommended a continuation of expense and income documentation as we have been doing.

Babcock made motion to expend \$1,500 for Hall of Fame photo display. Photos partially displayed at the Sands. Carried.

Bey discussed Licensing Agreement. Tabled until Raleigh meeting.

Tenenbaum and Sauer made a motion to pay Monroe (Membership Secretary) and Colvert (Editor, *Cribbage World*) \$100 per month barring technicalities. Tabled for further review at upcoming Raleigh meeting.

Bumper sticker discussed. Toll-free 800 number suggested. Carried.

Babcock discussed "Cribbage Anyone?" fliers. BOD voted to purchase 20,000 fliers.

Testing Examiner Miller proposed new guidelines for testing judges. Approved. Guidelines for new judges are: be a member in good standing for one year; played in Grass Roots for one season, or; played in a minimum of ten sanctioned tournaments.

A few fliers for the Green Bay Grand National (Sept. '92) were distributed.

Outdoor Grand National banner approved (3 1/2' x 18'). Cost split 3 ways; \$100 each to be paid by Green Bay, Missoula, and ACC.

\$1,000 approved for Grand National in Green Bay.

Discussion for 1994 Grand National tabled until Raleigh meeting at Hamilton's request.

Rule changes discussed (Log #66 and #48). Carried. Changes to appear in *Cribbage World*.

Motion to approve a change in the Constitution approved concerning BOD's term of office (to conform to our new 2-year term of office).

Change of By-Laws proposed to allow BOD meetings in June, July, or August, to be in conjunction with a tournament of major interest. This simply deletes the month of September as it now reads. Carried.

Tournament director Joe Siegle applied for tiered tournament variance. Not granted by unanimous vote.

Cribadier General Program and Awards Program will be on agenda at Raleigh.

Wergin's proposed changes to the By-Laws and Constitution will be on Raleigh agenda. Committee will review beforehand. Carried.

Wergin's resolution to require ACC membership to play in sanctioned tournaments tabled until Raleigh meeting to allow Wergin to present it in person. Approved.

Motion for the Tournament of Champions and ACC Open to remain at the Sands Hotel/Casino next year carried.

Meeting adjourned.

Closing In On Grand Master

Jim Fabian Wins Belle City Classic

Jim Fabian, veteran pegger from Naperville, IL, added another 120 Master Rating points in his drive for his Grand Master rating by winning the recent 110-pegger Belle City Classic in Kenosha, WI.

With this win, Jim has earned some 3,700 MRP's...needing but 300 to join the few ACC peggers who have earned this coveted Grand Master title.

Fabian edged Tom Thomsen, Waukegan, IL in the final match, with Harry Langman, Appleton, WI, in 3rd. 4th was captured by Jeff Lui, Racine, WI.

John Hiland, West Allis, WI took honors in the 60-pegger consolation event.

Russell Adams, Clyde Ault, Moose Biegler, Bill Medeiros Earn Master Rating

The ACC Open in Reno produced four Master players that were not reported last month.

Russell Adams, Minneapolis, MN, has been on a tear this cribbage year...and earned his Master rating in Reno. Clyde Ault, Lakeview, OR, is a veteran pegger in the Northwest, and with a fine 22nd qualifying score (of 826) and a 9-16 finish in Reno easily earned his Master rating. Gene "Moose" Biegler, the West Bend, WI tournament director, is always a threat to win, and winged it over the 2,000 MRP mark in Reno to earn his Master rating. Bill Medeiros, S. Easton, MA, finished a lofty 2nd in the ACC Open, picking up a bushel of MRP's to wing it well over the 2,000 level to also join this select group.

Four "Horse" Race

Van Orsow, Sondericker, Schmidt, Toll Set MRP Pace

With five months remaining in the 1992 cribbage year, the Master Point race is shaping up for an exciting finish.

Ray Van Orsow, Portland, OR has a slim 2 MRP (842-840) lead over Phyllis Schmidt, Williamstown, MA. And a mere 17 MRP's behind at 825 is Warren Sondericker, the ACC Open king. West Allis, WI pegger Duane Toll's numbers in this issue aren't up to date as the huge Green Bay MGM totals have not been posted, but Toll has well over 800 MRP's to his credit.

Other peggers in the "hunt" are Jesse Jarrell, Pittsburg, CA (750), Russell Adams, Minneapolis, MN (677), Jim McManus, Milwaukee, WI (664), Bill Medeiros, S. Easton, MA (645), Larry Samet, Wellesley Hills, MA (636), Kenneth Capper, Hermiston, OR (633) and Joseph Lusignan, Salinas, CA (604).

Another two dozen or so are but a hundred or so behind and have an outside shot at making the All-American team for 1992 (top ten). Every year, the competition becomes more exciting, and this year is no exception.

Myron A. May Wants Info

Arroyo Grande, CA pegger Myron May writes wanting information about our scoring system. Perhaps other members are curious about this subject also.

The most common (and recommended) methods of scoring a sanctioned tournament is 0 for a loss, 2 for a win, and 3 for a skunk win (including double skunks). These are "game points" and are the first tie breaker. The second tie-breaker is number of games won. If a tie still prevails, the 3rd tie-breaker is "spread points" (plus or minus points). And in very unusual circumstances, the 4th tie-breaker is number of positive (plus) spread points.

A few tournament directors are using other methods (0-3-4, or 0-1 with no skunk points, etc.) to score their tournaments with varying success. The ACC guidelines suggest the 0-2-3 method, however.

New Rule Changes

At the ACC's Board of Director's meeting (Raleigh, NC) August 26, 1991, several rule changes were adopted. These rule changes will be published in *Cribbage World* in a form that will allow members who have Rule Books to simply cut and paste these changes in their books. These changes will be effective May 1, 1992.

Members are instructed to clip out the Rules changes and insert them in the proper position in their Rule Book, deleting the corresponding changed Rule(s). Rules, Sections, and Sub-Paragraphs that are not affected below, remain unchanged. The current Rule Book changes include:

Additional Rule changes will be in next month's issue.

Clip & paste in your Rule Book

RULE VII, Section 2-a & b (new sub-paragraphs inserted in middle of page 17, changing current "2" to become "3", affecting two sub-paragraphs listed above which now become "VIII-3-b & c");

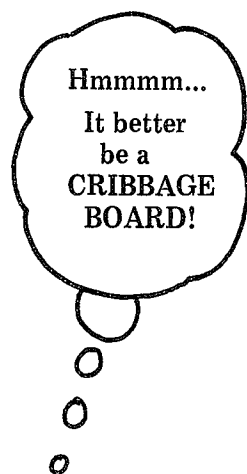
Section 2. Scoring

a. Points are earned during the play of the cards for the following single or combination of consecutive cards played. The player playing the last card that forms a combination earns the points (see Rule I Section 10 Scoring Chart).

- (1) Pair.
- (2) Three of a kind.
- (3) Four of a kind.
- (4) Straights of three or more cards in any sequence.
- (5) A cumulative count of 15.
- (6) The last card before player calls Go (i.e., can't play a card that would not make the count exceed 31).
- (7) A cumulative count of 31.
- (8) The final card played, not making a cumulative count of 31.

b. Points scored during the play of the cards normally must be pegged before the earning player plays another card or calls a Go, or a valid Muggins call is made, or the total count of the Pone's Hand is announced. However, when a player's opponent has no more cards or has called a Go, the player may play all playable cards in succession and announce the points scored by each one before pegging the total score at one time.

Current Section "2" in middle of page 17 becomes Section "3" and current Section "3" near top of page 18 is eliminated and deleted.

7-Get overly reckless on street one lest your sin giveth your adversary an unearned and perhaps game-deciding edge.

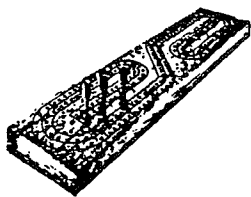
8-Forgeteth thy relative position at any time and strive always, offensively and defensively, to be in Eden when your time cometh to deal.

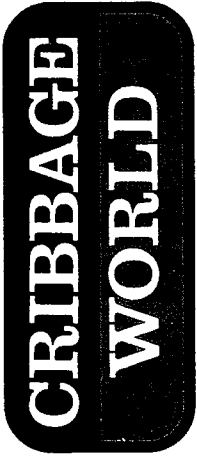

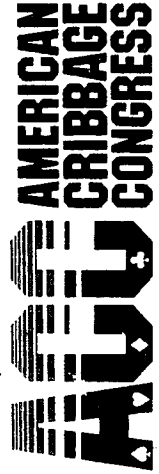
