McManus, Toll Take MRP Lead

Nohrden in Reno Phyllis Schmidt Wins Consolation

Reno. NV, July 5- Denver pegger James Nohrden came away the winner in the Independence Day Classic at Reno, besting some 316 peggers at the huge Independence Day Classic played at the Sands Regency Casino and Hotel. And with the 287 Master Rating Points, Nohrden vaults into the top 50 (regionally) and by winning will earn an invite into the Tournament of Champions for the 1992 season.

Fairfield, CA, pegger Calvin Rinaldi finished 8th at the recent ACC Open February 1, and continues his Reno "charge" by finishing 2nd this trip.

Dan Zeisler, the Sonora, CA Junior High teacher who has been teaching cribbage to his students, finished a nifty 3rd, which should give some credibility to his cribbage classes, edging Phil True, Richland, WA. Phil will move up in the Western Region's standings with his 4th place 187 MRP's...moving into the 700 MRP range.

Ray Van Orsow, Portland, OR, has been flirting with the national MRP lead all year, and with his 16th place qualifying score, coupled with his 17-32 finish, scored some 150 MRP's to move into the 1,200 bracket...and the top five nationally.

But the big story in the national MRP race is the finish of Duane Toll, West Allis, WI, who ran a hot run of cards for top qualifying honors (42 GP's, 19 wins, +347) and a 14th place finish for a total 269 MRP's to run this season's total to 1,279 MRP's. However, Jim McManus, the Grand Master from Milwaukee, WI, maintains a slim MRP lead with 1,298.

Phyllis Schmidt, the Williamstown, MA pegger, has been on a roll all year, and continued her run with a win in the 220 pegger consolation event. Before the playoffs, Phyllis was bemoaning the fact that her top qualifying score in this event did NOT award any MRP's...but by finishing 1st, the 110 MRP's kept her near the top in this year's MRP race...standing at nearly 1,200 for the year.

Susan Chambers, Corvallis, OR, came close to winning all the marbles in the consolation event, but settled for 2nd place.

The Friday "early bird" event was won by William Ryan, Gilroy, CA, followed by Mike Hayden, Campbell, CA. Ryan took home \$490, and Mike paid for histrip with a \$440 2nd place purse.

Raggedy Ann

The Raggedy Ann doll recently celebrated her 75th birthday in Norwalk, CT. The doll was created in 1917 by Johnny Gruelle, an author and illustrator, to entertain his dying daughter, Marcella, age 14.

The publisher of Gruelle's books asked him to create more Raggedy Ann dolls to illustrate children's books. The doll immediately became a great hit. Raggedy Andy came along in 1922 to be a playmate.

What has this all got to do with cribbage?

A number of years ago we named a cribbage hand "Raggedy Ann" because the doll was mistreated in many homes, kicked into the corner, chewed on by the dog and mistreated in other ways. So, it is with this cribbage hand-A-A-8-7-6. This combination is constantly being counted wrong by players who rack up 11 holes instead of 13. Raggedy Andy--2-2-8-7-6 scores 11.

Many Grass Roots clubs honor the hand by giving a special prize of three or even five dollars to the first person to hold the hand in one of the sessions.

Some Grass Roots Nostalgia

The program actually took off in December 1984 when this writer met Jeanne Hill for the first time. Noting the enthusiasm and spark for cribbage, the Hermiston, OR native was told of plans for a national network of cribbage clubs in villages, towns, and communities.

She was so excited about the possibilities that she signed up "Oregon's First" on the spot, which entitled her club to receive Charter #2.

Named as charter members were: Jim Zellars, Ken & Betty Capper, Leonard & Marcia Sailor, Bert Rosema, Jim & Linda Cain, Marge McClenahen, Clarence & Faye Gandy, and Bill & Jeanne Hill. The Madison group of players were experimenting with club cribbage starting in 1979 and the plans for the national network were already in place.

140 Peggers in Yankton

Russell Adams Wins Lewis & Clark Open, Takes National MRP Lead

Yankton, SD, July 12- Russell Adams, the professor from Minneapolis, MN, was bypassed for one brief week by Jim McManus (Milwaukee, WI) and Duane Toll (West Allis, WI) in the Master Rating point race. Both McManus and Toll scored sizeable MRP scores at the Recent Reno meet (see cover story), but Russell won the Lewis and Clark Open to regain his MRP lead. In besting the field of 140-peggers, he scored some 140 MRP's to go over the 1,300 mark for the year, and take a slight lead over the Wisconsin duo. In addition, Adams becomes a two-time winner of this event, joining Mick Michaelis (Marinette, WI) in this category.

Kevin Jellema, Sioux Falls, SD, came within an eyelash of winning the final match with Russell, having a two game lead in the best 3 of 5 match...and in the third game, Adams needed 17 to win on first count, and managed to win with a 16-hand (but NO pegs) to get into the stink hole and peg out the following deal. He then won the final two games to claim the \$1,600 prize, and the national MRP lead.

1991 All-American Buzz Railsback, Syracuse, NE, finished a fine 3rd to move into the 500 MRP range for the year. Emil Lubinski, Brooklyn Park, MN, took 4th.

Cribbage World editor DeLynn Colvert made a long trek east in hopes of continuing his record-setting streak of 7 successive All-American honors and won the 104-pegger consolation event, keeping his slim hopes alive. Bob Sommer, Excelsior, MN took 2nd, with Herm Jacobs (Omaha, NE) and Jim Nohrden (Denver, CO) in 3rd and 4th. Nohrden recently won the large Reno meet and is on a roll! (See cover story).

In the early bird Friday match, Rod Chovan took honors with an 18 GP, 8 wins, +97 in this 9-game match.

In the Saturday night special 9-game match, Sherrill Foote, Marshallton, IA, won honors with a 17 GP, 8 win, +120 card.

Director Scott Kooistra runs an all-event combination match (Friday, Sat. main event, and Sat. night) and some 63 players gave it a try. Ron Hamilton, St. Paul, MN, took home the bacon with a 58 GP combination (in 40 games).

The high qualifier in the main event was Bill Sperry, Maplewood, MN, with a 35 GP, 15 wins, +242 card.

Perennial winner Duane Toll took the Last Chance event, but, alas, no MRP's in his quest for the national championship.

Director Scott Kooistra, with able help from his wife Linda, once again ran a first-class event, attested by some 140 players from 15 states attending...a new high mark for the 5year history of this event.

Ira Deutsch Sets Torrid Pace In Ventura, CA

Ira Deutsch, Westlake Village, CA, is setting a torrid pace with the Ventura, CA, Cribbage Association. Ira has won 143 games, losing but 62 in some 18 meets with this club, for an outstanding winning average of 69.76%. Locals Terry Mixer with 66.67%, and Mitch Mitchell with 63.97% are hot on Ira's heels.

Tortorella Wins Nipomo Open

Salvatore Tortorella from nearby San Jose nailed the crowd of 68 peggers at the recent Nipomo Open...and his final match was with Grand Master Jesse Jarrell (Pittsburg, CA). In edging Jarrell, Tortorella picked up some 75 MRP's. Jesse earned some 67 MRP's with his 2nd place finish, keeping his chances alive for a spot on this year's All-American team.

John Dawes (Lakewood, CA) took 3rd, and John Mohler (Seaside, CA) finished 4th.

Ron Wrightman, Santa Maria, CA won the 36-pegger consolation event, nipping Vivian Hochstetler, San Luis Obispo, CA in the final match.

Costa Mesa pegger Gene Elliot was on a roll Friday night to take the early bird event. Tournament director Darrell Hunstad reported the crowd enjoyed an excellent Bar BQ chicken lunch...and the beautiful central coast of California.

Inaugural Event Craig Ross Edges 78 Peggers at Nugget Classic

Rohnert Park pegger Craig Ross took the winner's purse at the recent inaugural Nugget Classic at Paradise, CA.. Gene Lewis from nearby Grass Valley finished 2nd in this 78-pegger event. Walt Halstead (Oroville, CA) took 3rd, followed by Jackie Doppelt (Napa, CA) in 4th.

44 peggers stayed the course and played the consolation event, with Ruth Rutherford, Meadow Valley, CA coming uproses. Veteran pegger Wayne Glashan finished 2nd. Wayne hails from Pittsburg, CA.

Grand Master Jim McManus, Milwaukee's pride and joy, reports that he defied all odds at the 1983 National Open. He was skunked four straight and was out of the competition! A skunk counts two games at the National Open, and in this best 4 of 7 competition, losing two matches you are GONE!

A Counter-Viewpoint on the Scoring of Skunks

I wish to sully these pages some more (see Dave Warheit's letter, page 12, May CW) regarding the almost universal practice of awarding extra credit for skunks. First I would protest the logic of David's argument that there is no more luck in winning by a skunk than simply winning. All players have lucky streaks, skilled and not-so-skilled alike. Skilled players usually score a few more points than the non and therefore would be expected to get a somewhat larger percentage of skunks. This result does not refute the logic of my claim that with even quite unequal players, a skunk usually is the result of the winner receiving much better cards.

His argument that there is merit to variety in the rules (he meant game-scoring system, not playing rules) I can agree with in general. DeLynn Colvert once championed the extra point for skunks as adding an interesting facet to playing strategies. That is, taking chances in order to squeeze out a skunk adds to the playing enjoyment. While I agree that it can, I feel that this argument only makes the best of an existing situation rather than demonstrating its logic. I know of no other sport or game that has seen the need of variety to the point of adding rewards for badly beating an opponent. Why not a love game in tennis counting as two games?

I would argue for the logic of this scoring system: All wins count 1, losses 0. The loser's point differential is recorded as it actually is. The winner's differential-score is recorded as it actually is up to +15. For wins by more than 15, 1 point is subtracted for each additional point up to an actual differential of 30. In other words, to win by 30 or more gives a recorded

differential-score of 0. Thus (so I would argue) the relatively unskilled player that's lucky getting good cards most of the day might not be the high qualifier. And Dave and DeLynn (and even I) could have a ball assessing the risk of throwing away scores to get wins by about 15 points.

Be Considerate!

This reminder should not be necessary, but unfortunately it is.



18-Hand Odds

Your editorial comments and flattery are appreciated. I'm nearly deluged by readers of Cribbage World, of which there are quite a number in the Twin Cities. In response to your suggestion regarding the hands of Bob McCabe and Paul Ferrigno of two 18 hands, here is what I've come up with,

The odds calculations are complex if any 18 hands are considered. 18-hands are indeed unusual and two on a deal are very rare. There are at least 10 different holdings, irrespective of suit: 4-5-6-9 flush with a 4 or 5 cut (Bob's hand); the face-card run with a 5-nobs (Paul's hand), the 2-2-3-4-4; the 5-6-7-8 or 7-8-9-10 flush with a 7 or 8 cut; the 5-9-10-J flush with a 10 or J cut, the 3-4-5-6 flush with a 3, 4 or 5 cut, the 3-6-6-6-9, the 3-3-3-6-6, and the 10-J-Q-K flush with a 5-nobs. Have I missed any?

The joint probability (odds) of any two of these hands in one deal is about 1 in 156,000, far commoner than the 29-hand, but rarer than a 28-hand. However, if Bob and Paul want to feel really unique: McCabe's 4-5-6-9 flush and Paul's 5-J-Q-K, with the nobs-5 cut are, separately, 1 in 11,000 for Bob's, and, assuming Bob's discards were none of Paul's holdings, Paul's hand and the right 5-cut is 6,950; thus, the combined holding as a product is about 1 in 77,000,000! And if they want to be suit-specific, clubs and spades as reported, the chances are 1/16 of that.
