Ray Hanes Cops Winter in Portland Don Grieve Wins Consolation

Ray Hanes recently became the 103rd ACC player to earn his Masters rating...and he added another 180 MRP's towards his next goal of Grand Master by winning the recent Winter in Portland tourney. Ray hails from Walla Walla, WA, and has been "knocking on the door" for several months, coming close to several titles, and finally broke through in besting the 169 peggers at this meet.

His final match was with tough-pegging Willie Evans, Washington State's tournament director from Richland, but Ray's cards stayed "hot" and he won going away 3-0.

Portland's Roger Frederick finished 3rd, and personable Gale Kimball, another fine pegger from Walla Walla, finished 4th.

The qualifying rounds saw three fine cards scored. Ken Cochlin, Kennewick, WA, nipped Ken Capper, Hermiston, OR, by an eyelash for top honors as they both scored 40 GP's. Right behind was Denny Van Orsow, Culver, OR, with 39 GP's.

In the 110-pegger consolation, local Don Grieve took the title, edging Salem's Jim Thomas. Frank Lake, LaPine, OR, finished 3rd, and Todd Anderson, Portland, finished 4th.

The satellite events were won by Roy Hofbauer (high roller), Washougal, WA, Clarence Van Orsow & George Rasmussen (2-person teams) with Clarence winning individual honors (Culver and Estacada, OR), Wes Rice teamed with Doug Jensen to win Friday's doubles, and Bob Nunamaker won the last, but not least, Cry Baby event.

Master pegger Otto Bartholow, Boise, Idaho will remember his 24-minute, 3-skunk waxing in the playoffs by George Rasmussen (Estacada, OR), and Jeanne Hofbauer will covet her fine 22 GP 9/game qualifying round in the consolation event.

Kate and John Furler ran a first-class tournament, helping to keep Portland one of the nation's "hot spots" in the cribbage world.

Jack Howsare, a Virginia Beach, VA pegger, bested some 98 peggers at the recent Fayetteville Cribbage Classic. His match for the championship was with another Virginian...Bob DeAngelo from Fredericksburg.

Johnnie Wheeler, Riverdale, GA, finished a strong 3rd, and Buster Forbes, Raleigh, NC, took 4th.

Perennial winner Bob Gombatz, Raleigh, topped the field in the qualifying round to pick up 37 MRP's and added another 14 with a 9-16 finish to move up a notch in the Eastern Region's MRP standings.

76 peggers stayed for the consolation event...and Dick Corbin, another fine pegger from Raleigh, took the title, besting Eric Davis, West End, NC, in the final match. Betty Schaffer, Kissimmee, FL, finished 3rd, and Ed Horigan, another slick pegger from Virginia Beach, VA, took 4th, adding 31 MRP's to go over the 200 mark for the year.

Director Lois Lam reports this tournament will be held again next October or early November.

Phylllis Schmidt, Larry Samet Set MRP Pace

Phyllis Schmidt (Williamstown, MA) is once again a front-runner in the Master Point race. In the 1991 season Phyllis was on a point-scoring tear in the first half of the season but passed up the huge MGM Open in Green Bay in favor of a bowling tournament...but she confided to *Cribbage World* she WILL be in Green Bay this year. Her 660 MRP's have her, once again, in the national lead.

Tearing up the track, and hot on Phyllis's trail is Lawrence Samet (Wellesley Hills, MA). Larry has won consecutive titles in the Eastern Region (one by being top qualifier, too), and has also confided to CW that he plans an all-out effort to win national honors in 1992. Larry is but a slim 30 MRP's behind Phyllis, standing at 630.

Joe Lusignan, the Salinas, CA bomber is once again off and running to another great season, and is close in the national race with 599 MRP's. Another Californian in the race is perennial winner Jesse Jarrell from Pittsburg. Jesse is one of 7 Life Masters in the ACC and is expected to make the annual race an exciting one.

Two Northwest players in the hunt are Roy Hofbauer (Washougal, WA) with 545 MRP's, and the streaking Ray Van Orsow from Portland. Ray has garnered 529 MRP's and is unbeatable lately.

In the Central Region, Milwaukee's Jim McManus has 522 MRP's...with Life Master Joe Bernard (Libertyville, IL) and Grand Master Duane Toll (West Allis, WI) a pair of peggers to watch.

The 1992 Season is off to great start, with many other players within shouting distance!

Projected Record Crowds for ACC Open, Tournament of Champions

With printing deadlines not permitting an accurate count of players for the upcoming Tournament of Champions, and the ACC Open, nevertheless, projections are for record crowds.

TOC director Joan Rein counts 334 players signed up for this prestigious meet...easily beating last year's 306 peggers. The Sands Casino is adding \$3,500 to the prize fund, and the prizes should, once again, set records (last year Milwaukee's Walter Krentz won \$5,725 in taking the title).

And standing by in the wings are four junior players who have qualified, but must wait until they are 21 to play. They are: Brian Heroux (Woonsocket, RI), Matt Kacer (Altoona, IA), Tom Sissel (Baker City, OR), and Carl Stromberg (W. Springfield, MA).

The ACC Open, with one week to go in registration has well over 500 signed on...and the projection is for another record crowd, possibly going over the 736 peggers in last year's match (Syd Balows, Santa Rosa, CA took home the \$10,000 first prize!).

The March issue of Cribbage World will cover this premier event in detail.

Polish Open

198 peggers pegged for the crown at the popular Amora Villa Lodge in Appleton, WI in early November, and Boyd Lundquist, Lakeville, MN took home all the marbles, including a sizeable bundle of 200 MRP's. Pete Momsen, New Berlin finished a strong 2nd and also garnered a nifty 188 MRP's. Doug Page, Little Chute, WI, took 3rd, and co-director Tom Gallagher of the upcoming MGM Open in Green Bay (and the Grand National) finished 4th.

The 112-pegger consolation had a who's who finish, as Life Master Warren Sondericker (Greenfield, WI) edged Grand Master Duane Toll (West Allis, WI) for the title.

An exciting feature of this Polish Open (and others) is the \$28 for scoring a 28-hand...and no less than 8 players cashed in.

Jesse James Follow Up

Some 70 peggers were on hand at the Chaska, MN VFW club in late November and Sharon Pedersen, Shoreview, MN took the title...with her final match with Grand Master Duane Toll, West Allis, WI. Marsha Mahan, Appleton, WI took 3rd, and Master pegger Ray Boesl, Glenbeulah, WI finished 4th.

Martha Fingleton, America's No. 1 pegger of the fair sex took the 44-pegger consolation, nipping Norm Lindman, Eagan, MN, in the final match. Frank Trojan, New Brighton, MN, took 3rd, and Debbie Schisel, Mt. Prospect, IL finished 4th. Bernie Nelson, from Pacific City, OR, was a long way from home, being in Minnesota to watch his Vikings get waxed once again...but he did manage to pick up one MRP to make his trip worthwhile.,

American Legion Post 82 Open

Gene Mikulsky, Sobieski, WI, once again took honors at this 57-pegger event, played at Port Washington, WI. He almost had to play his spouse Aggie for the title, as she finished a fine 8th. John Hiland took 2nd. John hails from West Allis, WI.

No consolation MRP's were awarded, as the event did NOT have the required playoffs.

Potawatomi Peggers Pow-Wow

Grand Master Jeff Shimp and tournament co-director decided to get paid for all his work in organizing this tournament...and won the main event, picking up another 65 MRP's on his way to Life Master. Jeff edged Rod Sweet, Allegan, MI (Jeff's old stomping grounds before moving to Shelbyville, MI) in the title match. Jim Goss (Bay City, MI), Don McEwen (Ypsilanti, MI) and the everpresent Duane Toll (West Allis, WI) took 3rd, 4th and 5th.

1990 All-American Helen Railsback, the Syracuse, NE flash, won the 22-pegger consolation.

Eastern Region Roundup Larry Samet Tops Field of 166 at Holiday Classic George Edge Wins Yankee Classic

Holiday Classic

The Millerville Men's Club in Blackstone, MA was alive with 166 peggers December 15...and veteran Master pegger Larry Samet, Wellesley Hills, MA came away with the top purse, just in time for some Christmas shopping! Larry picked up a sizeable number of MRP's (184) to run his lifetime total to the 3,400 mark, moving him into the "top 25 lifetime."

George Johnson, Fitchburg, MA, took 2nd and also picked up a nifty 181 MRP's. Charles Rapoza, Brocton, MA, and perennial winner Master pegger George Bickford from W. Springfield, MA, took 3rd and 4th.

Another Master pegger--Arthur Martin, Northboro, MA--had the hot hand in the qualifying round, earning 60 MRP's.

104 peggers stayed around for the consolation and James Cundy, W. Warwick, RI took home the marbles, edging Robert Drukman, the Eastern Region 's MRP frontrunner from N. Easton, MA. Pat Frattallone, S. Windsor, CT, and Eastern Region Tournament Commissioner George Webb, Halifax, MA finished 3rd and 4th. George recently earned the 14th Grand Master rating awarded by the ACC...and he continues to pile up the MRP's.

A highlight of this tournament was John Schuch's 29-hand...only the 4th scored nationally this cribbage season. John hails from New London, CT.

Director Gloria Dyndur reported \$350 was donated to the Milk Fund. She also reports this meet will be played again next year (December 13, 1992).

Yankee Classic

George Edge edged the field of 134 peggers at the recent Yankee Classic, played in Manchester, CT, picking up a sizeable purse and 140 MRP's. George hails from W. Warwick, RI (this city has produced a bevy of winners lately).

Jim McDonald, Monson, MA came within an eyelash of winning, but settled for 2nd. In third and 4th was John Croce, Cranston, RI, and tournament director Gloria Dyndur, Woonsocket, RI.

Irving Torrey (Mansfield, MA) set the pace in the qualifying round, picking up 47 bonus MRP's.

Bernard "Brownie" Lusis (Bristol, CT) nailed the crowd of 90 peggers in the consolation. Jack Gauthier (New Britain, CT), Jerry Bernier (Wales, MA), and Robert Bradley (E. Hartford, CT) finished 2nd, 3rd, and 4th.

Directors Rit and Mimi Alkas are planning another edition of this meet next November 29, 1992. Mark your calendars.

Larry Samet Wins Again

Larry Samet is burning up the track in the Eastern Region, winning the Bay State Classic December 8 in Sumerville, MA, a week before capturing the Holiday Classic. Larry also took qualifying honors, picking up a nice bundle of 160 MRP's in this 118-pegger event. This two-week exhibition of cribbage is one of the best streaks in the history of the ACC. Larry edged Bob Benes, Bellingham, MA for the title. Sharlene Szaban, Ludlow, MA captured the 74-pegger consolation, edging slick-pegging K. C. Finley, Enfield, CT, in the title match.

13 th Annual Cleo Feamster Wins Florida Open

The recent 13th Annual Florida Open had 84 peggers taking time-out from the sunshine...and when the pegs were laid away, Cleo Feamster from Clearwater came away with the title. Al Odom, a veteran pegger from Cayce, SC, came up the "bridesmaid" with a fine 2nd place finish. Atlanta's George Bright finished a strong 3rd, and Marlyne Arblaster took 4th.

Marlyne's husband, Jim, took 5th in the consolation event. Jim Arblaster has been a keystone in the operation of the ACC for years, and a member of the Cribbage Hall of Fame, an ex-editor of Cribbage World, longstanding BOD member, and one of the ACC's founding fathers. But the big winner in the consolation event was Tom Horigan, Largo, FL, with Russ Fisher, Orange City, FL in 2nd. 3rd and 4th were captured by Russell Cook, Punta Gorda, FL, and J. J. Gella, Fruitland Park, FL. J. J. recently had his hands full as co-director of last year's Grand National in Fort Lauderdale.

The hot hand in the qualifying round was held by Ted Depizol, Winter Springs, FL. Three 28hands were held, but, alas, no 29's.

Director Dave Fournier ran a first class tournament and will once again hold the 14th Annual next November 13, 14, 15.

Harold Buckley is one of Alaska's best peggers...but at the recent Winter in Portland tourney the cribbage gods turned on him with a vengeance.

Alas, he won but 4 games of his last 30!

End Game Odds by Russell Adams

When both players are on fourth street, and even earlier, they usually assess their winning chances according to board position. Dealership, of course, is critical. The dealer may be leading but at a locational disadvantage, and vice versa. The strategies (of discarding and pegging) depend upon how far each player needs to go out or to better one's position; and how lucky they feel. In this short piece, the End Game refers to situations where both players need 36 or fewer points, that is, in hole 85 (6 points from fourth street) or closer to home.

Based upon "normal" play and cards (9.5 points for the non-dealer and 16.0 for the dealer), the following table of equal chance is suggested from test runs at scaled positions. The chances are referred to increments of the non-dealer's "holes to go" and may be read either way. They are not exactly equal, but are believed to fall within a 45-55% range of likelihood.

Note in the table how the dealer points increase irregularly. If the non-dealer needs 2 to 7 points, the dealer's chances barely change, if only 3 to 4 points are needed; he must normally peg out, with the occasional help of the jack cut. If the non-dealer needs 10 to 12 points, which is slightly above average, the dealer may play defensively and hope to count out with the required 10 to 15 points, respectively. At 13 points needed by the non-dealer, the dealer has an equal chance at 18 points to go, and another deal is quite likely. The **differences** in "holes to go" for equal chances continues to increase until about 20 points for the non-dealer (and 27 for the dealer). Thereafter, the differences decrease as a third deal becomes more likely and the first dealer gets a second chance to peg out.

The first is the Western New York Open. March 28-29 is the NEW date. For the \$6/ night rooms and other information, check "Tournament Trail."



New Rule Changes

At the ACC's Board of Director's meeting (Raleigh, NC) August 26, 1991, several rule changes were adopted. These rule changes will be published in *Cribbage World* in a form that will allow members who have Rule Books to simply cut and paste these changes in their books. These changes will be effective March 1, 1992.

Members are instructed to clip out the Rules changes and insert them in the proper position in their Rule Book, deleting the corresponding changed Rule(s). Rules, Sections, and Sub-Paragraphs that are not affected below, remain unchanged. The current Rule Book changes include:

RULE II, Section 1. (replace unnumbered paragraph at top of page 9):

The pack must be mixed at least three (3) times with the cards faces down or otherwise hidden from both players. The Dealer is not permitted to look at the bottom card after the last shuffle. Should a Dealer do so, Pone is to remind Dealer of the prohibition and score a two-point penalty. The pack shall then be reshuffled.

RULE III, Section 3, a-b-c. (replace "a" at bottom page 9; replace "b" at top of page 10; and add new sub-paragraph "c" as the second paragraph at top of page 10):

- a. A cut is required before each Hand is dealt. Dealer shall place the pack on the table for the Pone to cut. The Pone shall not look at the bottom card of the top packet. Should Pone do so, Dealer is to remind Pone of the prohibition and score a two-point penalty. The pack shall then be reshuffled and cut again.
- b. After the Pone's cut, the bottom packet shall be placed upon the top packet. It is not permitted to distribute the cards from a fraction of the pack. The Dealer shall not look at the bottom card of the pack at any time after the cut. Should Dealer do so, Pone is to remind Dealer of the prohibition and score a two-point penalty. The pack shall then be reshuffled and cut again.
- c. Should the cut be forgotten, before the Pone's cards are picked up, the Pone may remind the Dealer that the cut was not offered and the pack shall then be reshuffled and the cut made. There shall be no redeal after the Pone's cards are picked up.

RULE IV, Section 3-c (eliminate paragraph "c" near bottom of page 10 and refer to newly added wording for "RULE VI Section 1-d" in middle of page 16 -- see below.)

RULE IV, Section 4-c (replace "c" at bottom of page 11):

c. Table of Actions To Be Taken

The following table lists all combinations of the incorrect number of cards in both Hands and in the Crib, and the corresponding action to be taken. Columns (A) and (B) list the number of the action to be taken when the error is discovered, respectively, before and after the Starter Card is turned. The actions are defined in the following subsection d.

In double-page "TABLE OF ACTIONS TO BE TAKEN" on pages 12 & 13, the 8th line of "Correct-Too Few-Too Many" should read:

FAIR? LOGICAL?

In a written survey at our recent tournament, we asked the players to register their opinions and comments as to the scoring system we employed, that is one game, one point. We received a 1/3 response as follows: favoring 1 game, 1 point: 24 or 40.7%; favoring 3-2 rule: 35 or 59.3%. Comments varied from a very #@* to thoughtful statements on both positions.

Obviously our opinions are known. We believe, for instance, that a "Grand Slam" should only be beaten by another "Grand Slam" with a larger points spread, not by someone with less wins who runs a string of skunks to EXCEED the game point total of the "Grand Slam" where in the games-won-tie -breaker does not come into play.

So, we say, it's okay if one player scores 17 wins of 22 games with no skunks and another scores 16 with 2 skunks, the 17 game winner prevails. However, if the 16 game winner scores 3 skunks we do not have a game point tie and the 16 game winner prevails. FAIR? LOGICAL?

But "Tradition" says a skunk is worth one and one-half games. Of course this "Tradition" is only 12 years old, estimated 1979.
