SONDERICKER TOPS 826

Ken Richmond Captures TOC

Richard Nielsen, Bill Seymour Take Consolations

Life Master Warren Sondericker, Greenfield, WI has added new laurels to his many cribbage exploits by winning the record-setting American Cribbage Congress Open in Reno February 2. Warren bested a record field of 826 peggers, easily topping last year's 736. His final match was with slick-pegging Bill Medeiros, South Easton, MA. Leading 3-2 in the best of seven match, Warren cut the jack of diamonds to peg out and win his fourth game and the match 4-2.

With the record crowd came record prizes...and Sondericker picked up a nifty \$10,000 for the championship, while Medeiros pocketed another \$6,000 for his second place finish.

Reno has been very kind to Sondericker, as he also won in 1987, besting a then-record crowd of 454, edging Rex Reid of nearby Quincy, CA for that title.

Don Hilton, Hood River, OR finished 3rd and picked up a sizeable \$3,600, while professor Russell Adams, Minneapolis, MN took 4th and \$2,800.

Idaho's Roy Carlson (tournament director of Idaho's October championships) finished 5th (\$2,350), Don Abbott, Incline Village, NV took 6th (\$1,950), Hall of Famer Bob Madsen took home \$1,600 for a 7th place finish, and Morris Schiffman, Portland, OR took home \$1,325 for his 8th place finish.

And the prize money for the "Q" pools were sizeable as well...as Richard Harper, Ashland, OR, burned up the track in the qualifying round and posted a 41-GP score to take home the top "Q" prize of \$1,750.

The marquee outside the Sands Casino proclaimed to the world that this was "The World's Largest Cribbage Tournament" and that held true for the ACC Open's consolation event as well, as 644 peggers signed on for a second chance at the richest tournament ever. Richard Nielsen, Omaha, NE, came up roses by edging Canadian Egon Koch (Surrey, BC) for the title. Nielsen pocketed \$3,000 for the largest consolation prize ever...and Koch took

Rocking Boards

It is so irritating to mark scores on the special long boards that are in vogue, only to find a warped table where the boards are rocking. It is so simple and inexpensive to secure pads to eliminate this dilemma. For 89 cents you may purchase a display card which has 46 green pads of three sizes. The small, as well as the large size, eliminates the problem of rocking boards. The hanging card is labeled "PROTECTIVE PADS."

How about another tip for the keeper of the boards? According to Nick Pond, broken plastic pegs may be removed from the board by heating a needle and sticking into the stub.

The final tip on board care: replaceable metal slides for the storage compartment are available through this column. Maybe the source of securing more pegs should be mentioned. If you cannot locate a place to order pegs, a couple thousand red and blue ones are stored in a cabinet behind this typewriter.

The Lottery and Cribbage

Knights of the Peg love to get a little diversion from pressures of the skillful crib game, so they play the lottery. Win by getting skunked? In Vermont, when playing a scratch card and a skunk appears on a winning ticket, the prize is doubled. Hence a \$500 win is doubled to \$1,000. It pays to get skunked. This card is the closest the lottery officials have come to advertising cribbage in lottery games. Yes, you guessed it. Someone on the staff plays cribbage. This column has already submitted an idea for incorporating a part of the crib game on a scratch card. It did not fly. But we are still trying to come up with something.

Wheel in a Cribbage Nut With the Meals

Every volunteer who delivers a "meal on wheels" to 705 No. Midvale must answer the question: "Do you play cribbage?" If the answer is "No," the rule should be that the meal is free. Regardless of the response, the person leaves here with some literature. And this service saves on dishwashing for three nights a week.

Unknown Player Authors Small Miracles

Jim Culliney, who was born in New York city and learned cribbage there, scored two consecutive 9 for 9 series in play last spring in a session of the Madison 99ers. In the session following the second Grand Slam, he won 7 games before suffering a defeat...25 straight games! On January 30th, he visited the Madison Metro Club No. 1 and took first place. During play that evening, he scored 29 points in the pegging series of a hand. Jim held 3-3-2-2 and his opponent also held 3-3-2-2. Jim pegged pairs on the twos and threes and then scored 12 on making four-of-a-kind on both the twos and threes. The "go" made the total 29!

home \$2,130 for 2nd. Jim Fabian, Naperville, ILL edged closer to his Grand Master rating by finishing 3rd (\$1,400) and Master pegger Dick Graham (Colorado's premier tournament director) finished 4th and pocketed a cool \$1,000.

Karen Trojan, New Brighton, MN scored a super 21 Game Points in the 9/game qualifying round to nail the top "Q" prize of \$820. (See story about Karen, this issue).

Other highlights of this record-breaking tournament include Floyd "Al" Whitsett's (Sparks, NV) 29-hand, and at least three ACC members earned their Master rating. They are Ray Meade, Las Vegas, NV; Ray Van Orsow, Portland, OR; and Roy Banducci, Arroyo Grande, CA. Twenty-eight hands? Too many to count.

Tournament of Champions

Ken Richmond, Portland's other king of cribbage (Ray Van Orsow is the other) walked away with the championship of the by-invite-only Tournament of Champions. This meet also set a new standard for numbers of peggers...drawing some 330, easily beating last year's then-record 306. Richmond pocketed a record \$6,100 for this event (but NO Master Points). The few Canadians who played in this three-day cribbage fest showed very well, indeed, as George Saari, Kamloops, BC, took 2nd and a sizeable \$4,650. Master pegger Luis Lizarribar, Ballwin, MO, continued his winning ways by taking 3rd (\$3,550), and Patrick Barrett, Wisconsin Rapids, WI, took 4th and \$2,750. Patrick had a horrible run of cards the next day in the ACC Open...but he was still smiling!

Stuart Stromberg, West Springfield, MA, took top honors in the "Q" and walked away with \$1,325...but this "top 25" player could have used some Master Points for his fine qualifying card to move up a notch or two...but in this by-invitation-only meet, NO Master Points are awarded.

Some 202 peggers signed on for the consolation TOC. Master pegger Bill Seymour, Warwick, RI took home the title and \$2,065. Jim Hartung, Richland, WA is no stranger to high finishes as he has consistently walked away with the Grass Roots prizes in the Tri-Cities (WA) and, once again, finished a lofty 2nd, picking up \$1,600. Jim Morelan, a Master pegger from Little Canada, MN took 3rd, while Dave Stratford, Napa, CA took 4th.

Tournament directors Joan Rein (TOC), along with Martha Fingleton, Bob McCabe, Scott Kooistra, and Warren Sondericker all did a superb job of managing the huge crowds, and play went smoothly in all events. Jeff Shimp did a wonderful job with his judging crew...and of course the Sand's Barbara Woodward managed the entire weekend with her usual expertise...and all the 826 players had all the coffee and danish they wanted! If the crowds keep increasing, the Sands may have to build on once again, as a rumor has it they can only accomodate about 950 players.

And to all the 826 players who attended this meet...you may all write to the Guinness Book of Records! This was, indeed, the largest cribbage tournament in the history of the game!

Warren Sondericker Ray Van Orsow Set MRP Pace

After the smoke has cleared from the ACC Open, and the record Master Point total tabulated, winner Warren Sondericker (Greenfield, WI) and Ray Van Orsow (Portland, OR) are setting the pace in the annual MRP race with 800+ each. Ray finished in the 9-16 (q. 23rd) to keep up his torrid pace. Phyllis Schmidt, Williamstown, MA, and Larry Samet, Wellesley Hills, MA are in the 650-700 range and are within striking distance.

292 Peg For Oregon Championship

Westerlund Wins Oregon Title

Dorothy Westerlund, a veteran pegger from Sherwood, OR outlasted a huge field of 292 peggars to claim the Oregon Championship for 1992. After getting by newly crowned Grand Master Gary Motley, Gresham, OR, in the 5-8 round she continued on with wins over Fred Kimball, Walla Walla, WA, and in the finals, Rosalee Bradley, Janesville, CA. Rosalee came away with a fine 2nd place, with Fred taking 3rd after edging Eileen Shine, Bend, OR (4th).

Frank Ornie had the hot hand in the 22-game qualifying round, taking honors with a very fine 36 GP's, 17 wins, +243.

Crooked River Ranch's famous pegger--Paul Dyer--captured the consolation crown (180 peggars), edging newly crowned Master Ray Hanes, Walla Walla, WA in the final match.

Diane Harvey, Albany, OR finished 3rd, and Otmar Borchard, the Scio, OR bomber is back to his winning ways with a 4th place finish. Otmar cleaned up in Reno last year!

Francis Lake took home the high-roller marbles Friday night, besting a field of 48 peggars, and pocketing a nifty \$1,120.

The Friday doubles were won by locals Jordy Simmons and Dave Isaacson.

Director Joe Nelson once again hosted a huge group of peggars. And once again, his trophies were the talk of the tournament. He had hand-painted ducks sitting over a hidden deck of cards perched on his oval boards. These trophies are a new wrinkle in this field.

When The Bell Rings, Marani Answers It!

John Marani, Quincy, MA, was one of the record 826 peggars in Reno recently...and he proved to be one of the luckier ones!

A reliable source reported to *Cribbage World* that John hit the crap tables for a nifty \$12,000 Friday night, and then retired to get some rest for the upcoming ACC Open the next morning.

At 2:40 AM, someone tripped the fire alarm and the entire hotel was roused from their beds. Most of the peggars went back to bed when they found out it was a false alarm...but Marani figured it MUST be a siren call from the crap tables. He dressed and went down for some more dice action...and picked up another \$6,000!

Grass Roots Awards Back-Logged

William Seymour, Warwick, RI, is now the Grass Roots Director of Awards...and he reports that there is a back-log of "Grand Slam," "28-Hand" and "29-Hand" awards.

Bill reports that he hopes this situation will be cleared up in the not too distant future. Grass Rooters...remember, patience is a virtue!

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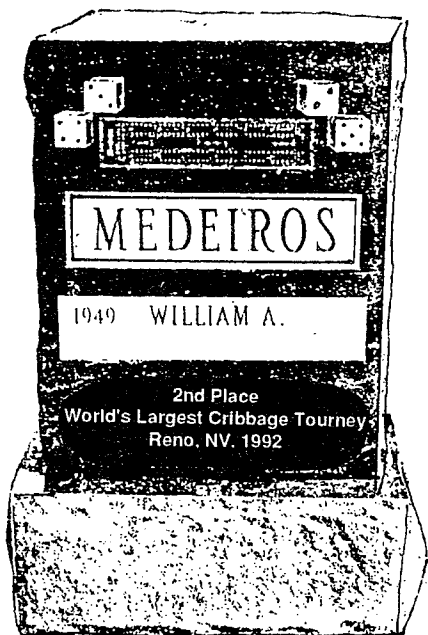

Jeanne Hofbauer Earns Master Rating

Jeanne Hofbauer, Washougal, WA, and tournament director of Oregon's coastal region, recently became the ACC's 108th Master pegger with a fine 9-16 finish at the huge Oregon Championship in Prineville (292 peggers).

On the road to this honor, Jeanne also recently took the Kah-Nee-Ta Classic title (besting 154 peggers) in December, and her MRP streak continues. Her 1992 MRP totals are well over 400 for this cribbage year.

Qualifications of Judges

I have read and heard fault finding commentaries regarding the competency of Judges. To the players who are having problems with Judges I would like to direct the following:

All Judges have been certified by taking and passing the ACC's Judges (open book) examination and I believe all are qualified to make decisions. However, some are deficient in experience. My recommendation to all Tournament and Grass Roots Directors, is to use all certified Judges (not always the same ones) and team them up the lesser with the greater experienced. This suggestion will improve the quality of Judges.

At this time I would like to encourage additional members to take the examination and applaud those Judges who volunteer their services on behalf of the ACC.

Paul Petit, a slick pegger from Pawtucket, RI recently scored his 2,000+ MRP to earn the 104th Master rating in the ACC. Paul has earned over 300 MRP's this year and is among the leaders in the annual race for the top ten All-American award.

The huge ACC Open in Reno (826 peggers) awarded buckets of MRP's to the players...and at least three players cashed in and earned their Master ratings. They are:

105-Ray Van Orsow, Portland, OR. Ray has been on a binge lately and is unstoppable. By finishing as the ACC Open's 23rd qualifier (of 826) and in the 9-16 bracket in the play-offs, Ray easily winged it over the 2,000 MRP plateau.

106-Ray Meade, Las Vegas, NV. Ray recently won the consolation at the 10th annual Grand National in Fort Lauderdale, and by another fine finish in the recent ACC Open, earned his Master rating. Ray is also co-director of Grass Roots club 59 in Las Vegas, and he reports pegging action is picking up with many newcomers stopping by to play (see Jan. CW).

107-Roy Banducci, Arroyo Grande, CA. Roy scored 58 MRP's at the recent ACC Open, and winged it over the 2,000 MRP mark with 3 points to spare (2,003) and becomes the ACC's 107th Master player. Roy is a veteran pegger and always a threat to win at any time.

Bo Van Orsow Finally Wrong

A few years ago in Baker City, OR, a bird flew into the playing hall and Bo Van Orsow, Redmond, OR, predicted the bird would "dump" on DeLynn Colvert's opponent, as this would be one of his "trick" plays. Gary Motley, the Gresham, OR bomber needed but 19 MRP's to become the ACC's 16th Grand Master when he signed on for the recent Oregon Championship in Prineville...and with a fine 5-8 finish (292 peggers), he picked up a nifty 220 MRP's to easily wing it over the magic 4,000 MRP plateau.

Gary is a two-time All-American, finishing a lofty 3rd in the nation in 1989, and 5th in 1991.

Floyd "Al" Whitsett Scores 7th 29-Hand

Of the 826 peggers in Reno, only Floyd "Al" Whitsett came up with the 216,580 to 1 29-gem!

Cribbage World estimates that some 900,000 hands (cribs NOT included) of cribbage were played in the main event, and consolation (plus playoffs)...and with the old law of averages at work, there should have been at least four 29-hands scored! Could it be that the competition is getting tougher? (Please DO NOT write CW about that statement!)

Whitsett's gem is only the 7th scored this cribbage year. Four have been in the Western Region. Floyd and his wife, Marge recently moved to Sparks, NV from Baker City, OR ...and the move seems to have improved their luck!

New Criteria for Taking Judges Exam

New requirements imposing a criteria for ACC members desiring to take the Judges exam were approved by the Board of Directors at its recent Reno meeting.

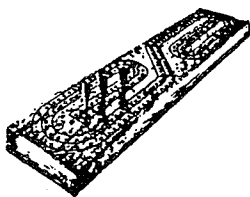

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New Rule Changes

At the ACC's Board of Director's meeting (Raleigh, NC) August 26, 1991, several rule changes were adopted. These rule changes will be published in *Cribbage World* in a form that will allow members who have Rule Books to simply cut and paste these changes in their books. These changes will be effective April 1, 1992.

Members are instructed to clip out the Rules changes and insert them in the proper position in their Rule Book, deleting the corresponding changed Rule(s). Rules, Sections, and Sub-Paragraphs that are not affected below, remain unchanged. The current Rule Book changes include:

Clip & paste in your Rule Book

RULE I, Section 7-b (fourth paragraph on page 6, insert the following new language):

b. A Jack turned as a Starter Card is "His Heels" and merits the dealer two (2) points.

RULE I, Section 9, (fourth paragraph on page 7, insert the following new language):

Muggins -- The scoring of certain points that one's opponent fails to claim and peg.

RULE I, Section 9, (on bottom half of page 7, add 2 definitions listed below and delete one titled "Showing"):

Score -- Any points earned by a player.

Scoring -- The earning of points.

~~Showing -- Exposing the Hand and counting the values.~~

RULE IV, Section 4-b-(2), (on bottom half of page 11, change last 2 lines of 4-b-(2) only, as follows):

counted. If these specified Hands or Crib have already been pegged, the points shall be retracted.

RULE IV, Section 4-d-#12, (on bottom portion of page 14, replace entire wording of #12, as follows):

12. Play stops and any points pegged during play are retracted. The required number of cards are taken from the top of the pack and placed in the short Crib. Correct Hand and Crib are counted; the Pone's Hand is dead.

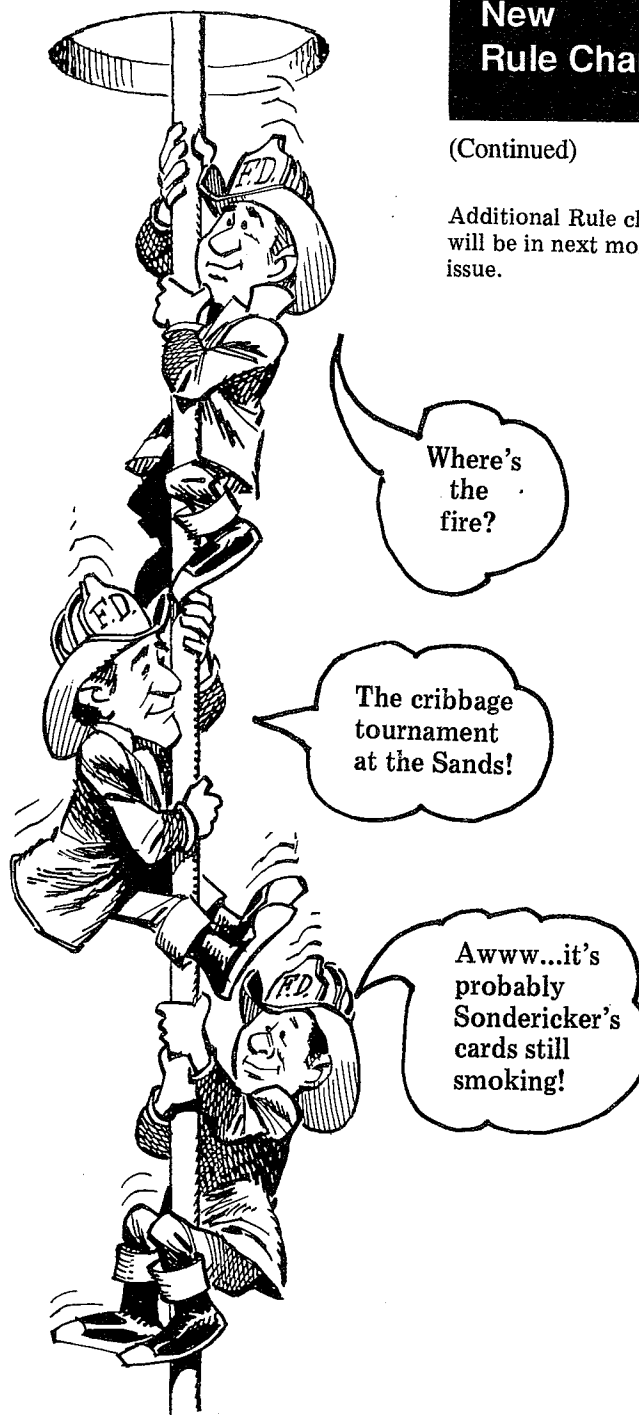
RULE VI, Section 3-c, (bottom of page 16, insert the following new language):

c. If the Dealer plays a card before pegging the two (2) points, the Dealer forfeits them.

RULE VII, Section 2-a-(1) & (2), (bottom half of page 17, insert three new paragraphs as follows):

a. A player who calls a Go or pegs a point on his opponent's call when the player has one or more cards that could be properly played, may correct that error up to the time the opponent plays a card. Thereafter, upon discovering the error, a Judge shall be summoned and the opponent shall select either of the following options before normal play resumes:

(1) Any cards played after the incorrect calling or pegging of a Go shall be retrieved by both players and points pegged retracted. The play of the Hands shall then be resumed as if no error had occurred.

(2) The non-offender may take two (2) penalty points for each card that should have been played before the Go was called or pegged, and those cards become dead (i.e., left exposed and not playable by the offending player). However such cards are counted in the showing of the Hand.

RULE VII, Section 2-b & c (replace sub-paragraph "b" at top of page 18 and add new sub-paragraph "c" immediately following):

b. If a player announces an incorrect cumulative count, he may voluntarily correct it prior to his opponent's playing of his next card or calling a Go; thereafter the incorrect count is accepted for the rest of that series and any points pegged as a result are considered earned.

c. If a player's incorrect count announcement is not corrected voluntarily but is challenged by his opponent before his opponent plays his next card or calls a Go, then the count shall be corrected. Also, if the offending player pegged points he would not have earned with the correct count, he is considered to have overpegged and the provisions of Rule VIII Section 4 apply.
