The President's Column Joseph Petrus Wergin

Received in the mail today a copy of the *Elderhostel*, A U. S. and Canada magazine. Apparently, one of our members sent in my name with the idea of making patrons aware that a crib board and a deck of cards be included in their baggage.

The *Elderhostel* is a non-profit organization which lists places and events that would be of interest to elder travelers. Included are programs of education, tours, the learning of new skills, and many things that people enjoy. The address of the *Elderhostel* is 75 Federal St., Boston, MA 02110.

It is believed that the magazine was sent to me to spread the idea of sending brochures and other promotional material to the individual hostels. We shall follow through on this suggestion.

The TEXAS CONNECTION: the first major cribbage tournament was staged at Irving the first week of April with Captain Bill Byers at the helm. This columnist has always said that Texas is the sleeping giant and has thousands of cribbage players who should be flushed out.

The start of cribbage activity was made by Kay Muhm of Pharr when she applied for a Grass Roots Charter in the fall of 1990. Pharr is really far down the state. It is in the deep south. Captain Byers organized the club at Fort Worth last year, and the state tournament last month drew 41 players. BOD member Martha Fingleton assisted the committee with the tournament (and became the first lady Grand Master with a fine 2nd place finish). Jerry Allen, the statistician for Region VI of the Grass Roots Program was there also promoting cribbage club activity. Jerry believes that the Congress should join up with country music people in furthering the interests of both groups. We need to get television exposure and it can be done by our people in Texas.

Why should a street be named Nutmeg Lane? Well, anyways, a famous cribbage personality resides on that street and is working with other crib adicts to resurrect the drive for a commemorative stamp. About seven years ago, 22,000 names were signed on petitions and letters were written in support of our drive.

Phyllis Schmidt, the star of Nutmeg Lane in Williamstown, MA, requested information of how to approach the Post Office's Commemorative Committee. We passed on to her our experiences, especially that petitions do not carry much weight. Individual letters by the thousands are more effective. There are always a dozen or more groups seeking a commemorative stamp for their activity. Cribbage players must become lobbyists.

A letter was received from Fran Fountain, the 6th grade teacher of Germantown, MD, who has become a leader in classroom cribbage:

Dear Joe,

I was delighted to hear that you are working with 6th and 7th graders. That in itself is a challenge that I can testify to after 27 years in the classroom. The gap between ages isn't always one sided either-I'm often amazed at what they know, say, do, etc. I wished you lived closer so that you could join my class once in a while. They would love to meet "Uncle Joe" and so would I.

Included in this letter is a picture of the winners of our first cribbage tournament with their cherished pegs from you. They are asking for another tournament and will get it after spring break, probably in May.

I'm glad that you are promoting the youth program. I'd love to see a copy of your article after it's published. Another teacher and myself are trying to figure out a way of promoting cribbage at our school fair in May. I'll let you know if we come up with anything innovative or creative.

Pegging away and still waiting for a 28, Fran Fountain

Note: the school tournament was won by Mellisa Bates with her 9 for 9 score. Alicia Rodregez placed 2nd, also with 18 points, on a score of 8 wins and 2 skunks. Fran's request for an innovative or creative idea on staging crib at the school fair was sent to her by return mail. Basically, it was cribbage in a mall.

Frank Ornie Cops 15th Annual Northwest Open

The longestrunning tournament in the northwest is Rob Palmer's Northwest Open, and Frank Ornie, Forest Grove, OR took edition number 15, besting some 132 peggers. Ornie picked up some 140 MRP's to run his 1992 total to nearly 700, giving him a shot at the national championship. Ornie warmed to his task by also winning the Friday "time passer" event.

Beverlee Honeycutt has paid her dues the last few years on the "trail" and her cribbage expertise is starting to pay off as this Beatty, OR pegger finished a fine 2nd.

Two other peggers of the fair sex finished 3rd and 4th and both will move up a notch from their already top 100 positions in the Western Region. Dorothy Conroy, Forest Grove, OR took 3rd, and Louine Lyde, also from Forest Grove finished 4th. Forest Grove, OR peggers took 3 of the 4 top spots to put that city on the cribbage map!

Fabian Nelson, Salem, OR took honors in the qualifying round with a fine 36 GP's. Fabian is the tournament director of the Capital City Classic in Salem.

Gary Sand, Kennewick, WA took honors in the consolation event, edging Betty Capper in the final match. Betty hails from Hermiston, OR. Jim McNulty, Libby, MT finished 3rd, and Darrel Miotke, Aumsville, OR took 4th.

Jeff and Mike Braukman, Hillsboro, OR waxed the field in the early bird doubles. Perennial winner Roy Hofbauer (Washougal, WA) took the hi-roller event, and *Cribbage World* editor DeLynn Colvert (Missoula, MT) won the Saturday night special. Pat McNulty, Libby, MT went home a winner by taking the last chance event.

Director Rob Palmer, as usual, ran a firstclass event, with able assistance from Betty Sissel and Marvis Reynolds.

First Texas Tournament Produces First Lady Grand Master

Martha Fingleton Earns Grand Master

Martha Fingleton from Greenfield, WI finished 2nd at the recent Texas Lone Star Roundup and becomes the first player of the fair sex to earn a Grand Master rating. By earning over 4,000 MRP's she becomes the 17th Grand Master in the 13-year history of the ACC

This was a tournament of firsts, as this was also the first sanctioned tournament in Texas.

Martha has had many high finishes in recent years and she was also the first woman to earn a Master rating. She is a kingpin in the operation of the ACC, serving as National Tournament Commissioner.

Tom Tobin Nails Cape Cod Cranberry Clash George Blessing Wins South Shore Classic

Cape Cod Cranberry Clash

Tom Tobin, Cumberland, RI nailed the Cape Cod Cranberry Clash March 1 in Wareham, MA, besting some 136 peggers. His final match was with Maurice Ramsey, Avon, MA. Rosemary Barrows, Wrentham, MA finished a fine 3rd, and Larry Cornell, Pawtucket, RI took 4th.

Charlie Finley, Enfield, CT has been on a roll this cribbage year...and took honors in the qualifying round.

ACC Director Joe Ramos captured the consolation crown, besting a field of 104 players. Bob Kaplan, Randolph, MA took 2nd, followed by Pat Frattallone, S. Windsor, CT in 3rd, and Bill Seymour, Warwick, RI, 4th.

Sargent Lombard, Westwood, MA scored the only 28-hand. No 29 hands were scored.

John Marani, Quincy, MA finished in the 9-16 bracket, picking up another 48 MRP's to run this year's total to the 500+range. Charlie Finley, Enfield, CT also finished in the 9-16 bracket, and stands at 400+ MRP's for the year.

Director Jim Clemmey reports \$136 was donated to the Boston Children's Hospital by the player's generosity...and this tournament will be played again next year on February 28.

South Shore Classic

194 peggers were on hand for George Webb's South Shore Classic March 22 in Rockland, MA...and George Blessing came away the winner. George is a perennial winner from Naragansett, RI. Judy Collier from nearby Abington, MA took 2nd and a nifty 188 MRP's. Lou Petosa, Bristol, CT finished 3rd, followed by Mary Agee, Somerville, MA.

The hot hand in the qualifying round was held by Tony Angelosanto, the Brockton, MA bomber...and he garnered a nifty 67 MRP's for the effort.

Perennial winner Rit Alkas, the Manchester, CT pegging king, took consolation honors, and some 100 MRP's to add to his sizeable total for this cribbage year. He now stands in the 500+ range. Louis Caccia, Newtonville, MA finished 2nd, with Edward Ciccone, Braintree, MA, and Napolean Soars, Wareham, MA taking 3rd and 4th.

Tournament director George Webb reports he paid out \$291 too much (forgetting the sanctioning fee). If any players who played in this tournament wish to mail George \$1.50, he may be easy on you next year!

Bruce Corson, Brenda Palmer, and Marjorie Pistone all scored 28 hands. Alas, no 29's were reported.

In finishing 2nd, ROY Hofbauer picked up a nifty 169 MRP's, coupled with another 40 from the qualifying round putting him into the national MRP lead for this cribbage year.

Local Ken Cochlin finished 3rd and keeps his fine run for this cribbage year alive. Jim Hartung, another local did likewise with his 4th place finish. All top four players are on a roll this year, and their streaks continue.

Neva Richmond, Gresham, OR turned in the top qualifying card...a nice 38 GP gem.

Jeanne Hofbauer kept their clan's banner flying high by taking the consolation crown. Jeanne and Roy also were members of the winning team in the team event ...with able assistance from Bernie Nelson's fine 37 GP effort.

Rick Springer (Summerville, OR) took 2nd in the consolation, followed by Bob Brumley (Sunnyside, WA) and DeLynn Colvert, Missoula. MT.

A sizeable crowd of 76 teams pegged for the doubles crown, with Pat Ward and Ray Dolan taking home the \$1,000 and the trophies.

The Saturday Hi-roller event was captured by Grand National Champ Harvey Honeycutt, Beatty, OR, and the satellite event was won by Dorothy Conroy, Forest Grove, OR, edging Betty Johnson, Spokane, WA for that title.

Directors Willie and Jo Evans conducted a first class tournament, complete with many extra prizes and trophies.

Frank Symons Earns Master Rating

Frank Symons came into Richland, WA needing but 11 Master Rating Points to earn the 113th Master award from the ACC...and with a fine 5-8 finish in the 164-pegger event easily went over the 2,000 MRP plateau to garner this honor.

Frank is a perennial winner on the northwest circuit...and when he teams with brothers Marty and Phil, along with the Van Orsow clan in the northwest's team events, they are unbeatable. Frank hails from Madras. OR.

Bob McCabe Closing In On Life Master

Lynn Gillespie, Kennewick, WA travelled to Missoula, MT with three of his pegging pals to play in the Montana Open...and the four of them agreed to pool any winnings. Not a wise move by Lynn, as he won the 121-pegger event going away, winning the \$1,000 championship prize! His pool-pals won a few bucks, too, but the split cost Gillespie well over \$500 (but he has three good friends).

Gillespie had to win the hard way, as his final match was with Grand Master Bob McCabe, the ACC's Executive Vice-President and Chief Statistician. Having the deal with the score at 3-3 gave Gillespie the edge to win the match 4-3. McCabe, from Provo, Utah, earned some 130 Master Points and is knocking on the door for his Life Master rating.

Morris Schiffman, Portland, OR took 3rd place, and coupled with his fine 8th place finish at the huge ACC Open in Reno, will move up in the Western Region's MRP race. Bayard Lliteras, Coeur D'Alene, Idaho, a perennial winner in Montana, took 4th.

Marion Quackenbush made a long, long trek to Montana from Lawrenceville, PA...and almost paid for her trip by winning the 76-pegger consolation, edging local Milo Roinstad for the title. Tournament co-director Rex Paddock finished 3rd, and Tana Conell, Helena, MT, finished 4th.

Jim & Joyce Keeling, Spokane, WA won the 61-team doubles event. Tom Lingenfelter, Helena, MT won the Saturday special and the Eastern Region's 1991 champion, John Schuch went home a winner by taking the Last Chance event. John was also a long way from his New London, CT home.

The host facility, the Joker's Wild, will soon be one of the Northwest's finest playing areas, as a plush full basement, complete with an elevator is nearing completion. The floor plan will easily seat 200 players in two twin areas allowing for smoking and non-smoking competition. Players, when entering this mesmerizing state of play, accept without question (or checking) their opponent's hand value, fail to check if their opponent is pegging accurately, and, finally, sign their opponent's score card without checking (and this signing is for your OWN protection).

A long session of 22-games will tire the best of players and concentration will wane. This is especially true as players get older. An unethical player will steal a game or two from players they detect have lost their concentration.

The American Cribbage Congress's membership is 99.9% honest, but these sharpies who take advantage of this "mesmerized state of mind" have been spotted on the cribbage trail...and some are highly ranked. Keep your mind on the game...and if the pace set by your opponent is a little too fast, don't hesitate to slow it down a bit for your own protection.


Disneyland? No...Cribbage! Cindy Johnson Scores Rare Double at the Greater Orlando Open


Director Ron Hamilton once again ran a first-class tournament. Ron has his "hat in the ring" to host the 1994 Grand National in St. Paul.

With a twinkle in his eye, Willie says "tough luck...this card is forfeited!" After a few moments, letting Tom and Gary suffer a bit, Willie relented and with other player's help, they reconstructed this \$800 card!

Scoring Variety?

With rather annoying regularity these pages are sullied by complaints that skunks count too much, that skunks are won by luck, and that the ACC should attempt to emphasis the skill factor in our favorite game, not the luck factor. I say, rot. There is no more luck in winning a skunk than there is to win a single game; in fact, it is rather simple to demonstrate the opposite: just look at the records ofthe best players to see what their percentage of games won by skunk is compared to league averages. As for the argument that, regardless of luck, skunks should be valued less (or not at all), this ignores the variety that various rules introduce into the game. I for one, am not pleased at what I am seeing lately, which is virtually every tournament scored the same way (3, 2, 0, with games won as the first tie breaker). How about 4, 2, 0 or even 4, 2, 0, -1? Why not pegging points as the first tie breaker?

The American Contract Bridge League organizes probably at least 20 different types of events, with some tournaments containing virtually every type (Men's Pairs and Teams, Women's Pairs and Teams, Mixed Pairs and Teams; match points, IMPs, boarda-match, Victory Points, etc.). This variety has contributed greatly to the success of the ACBL; variety will do the same to the ACC.

Many of our ACC sanctioned tournaments do, indeed, offer some variety. The National Open, for example, offers double elimination, double wins for a skunk. Other sanctioned tournaments offer a variety of formats, including 4-3-0 and 1-0 scoring. However, an informal survey in the northwest indicate that players are more comfortable with the standard 3-2-0 format.


Be Easy On Tournament Directors



New Rule Changes

At the ACC's Board of Director's meeting (Raleigh, NC) August 26, 1991, several rule changes were adopted. These rule changes will be published in *Cribbage World* in a form that will allow members who have Rule Books to simply cut and paste these changes in their books. These changes will be effective June 1, 1992.

Members are instructed to clip out the Rules changes and insert them in the proper position in their Rule Book, deleting the corresponding changed Rule(s). Rules, Sections, and Sub-Paragraphs that are not affected below, remain unchanged. The current Rule Book changes include:

Additional Rule changes will be in next month's issue.

RULE VIII, Section 8-a, b & c, (middle of page 20, insert the following three new paragraphs.)

- a. If a player records points by advancing the opponent's peg or pegs, he/she loses these points and the opponent keeps them. There is no additional penalty for touching the opponent's pegs.
- b. If he/she notices the error before releasing the opponent's peg, he/she may return that peg to the proper place and then record the points with his/her own peg. In this case however, the opponent is awarded two (2) penalty points. (See Rule VIII Section 6-a.)
- c. If the player records points by mistakenly moving the opponent's peg in the wrong direction, the peg shall be returned to its proper hole and the non-offender shall score two (2) penalty points. (See Rule VIII, Section 6-a.) The offending player forfeits the points of the play, Hand, or Crib in question.

RULE IX title only, (top of page 21, insert the following change):

RULE IX. COUNTING AND RECORDING HAND AND CRIB SCORES

RULE IX, Section 4-a, (top of page 22, insert the following new language):

a. If a player mixes his/her Hand with the Crib or Pack before it is counted and pegged, and before the opponent has confirmed the count (See Rule IX, Section 2), the player forfeits the count of the Hand.

RULE IX, Section 4-c (third paragraph on top of page 22, insert the following new language):

c. If the Pone commits the offense, the Pone is penalized two (2) points and the Dealer is permitted to retrieve the Crib and count and peg its value. If there is disagreement on the cards, summon a Judge.

This completes Cribbage World's clip & paste Rules changes. RULE X, Section 2-c, (top of page 23, insert the following new language):

c. The Dealer's failure to score two (2) points for turning a Jack as the Starter Card.

RULE X, Section 4-b (middle of page 23, insert the following new language):

b. Muggins shall not be called during the showing, counting, and pegging of a Hand or Crib. It is in effect when the peg is released.

RULE X, Section 4-f, (bottom of page 23, insert the following new language):

f. After calling Muggins, the caller shall point out the overlooked or underpegged points to the opponent, and the latter shall agree that he/she has underpegged the correct score. If the players fail to agree, a Judge shall be summoned.

RULE XI, Section 1-b, (second paragraph at the top of page 24, insert the following new language):

b. Note that moving a front peg backward to correct for improperly pegged points is not considered as a penalty, but as a correction.

RULE XI, Section 3, (middle of page 24, insert the following new language):

Section 3. No Penalty On a Penalty

Under no condition shall a penalty be inflicted due to an error in calling or pegging a penalty.
