# Western Region Rolling Schleusner Takes Wine Valley Morgan Wins in Montana Golik Scores in Oregon

September and October in the Western Region are the busy pegging months, with tournaments scheduled weekly. Beginning with the Wine Valley Open in Napa, CA in late September, peggers have a weekly choice of events to attend during the fall season.

And Greg Schleusner, Truckee, CA's premier player, is playing to perfection and has taken the early MRP national lead by winning the 178-pegger Wine Valley Open, after beginning the season with an 8th place finish in late August in Portland (200 peggers).

Local LaDonna Govenor took home 2nd place, followed by Ted Herr (Auburn, CA), and Ron Morgan (Missoula, MT). Harold Sontag, Vacaville, CA took honors in the qualifying round with a fine 35 GP, (15/18) +191.

Director Jack Monroe once again had his wine and cheese tasting dinner, and plans to re-run this event next September.

#### Ron Morgan Wins in Montana, Then Bags Trophy Buck

Ron Morgan, Missoula, MT, is also on a roll and near the top in MRP's in the early going. After a fine 4th place finish at the Wine Valley Open, he came home and won the 11th Montana Championship. After receiving his trophy and \$900 winner's check, Ron rushed out to join his hunting companions...and promptly bagged a trophy buck!

Frank Lake, the LaPine, OR "high-roller" king decided to take some main event prizes for a change and finished 2nd. Joe Daniels, Libby, MT took 3rd, after getting by Gary Motley, the Grand Master from Gresham, OR. Gary finished 4th in this 123-pegger event.

Local Rex Paddock, the co-director of the upcoming 1993 Grand National, had the hot hand in the qualifying round...a nifty 37 GP's.

Walt Conell, Helena, MT, captured the 78pegger consolation title, edging Jason Hof-(continued on page 3)

#### **New Rule Book**

The new rule books, which will be issued in the near future, contain an important new feature. In the preamble, you will find a Code of Ethics. It is not meant to be all inclusive but it does list some of the more common forms of unacceptable behavior which are not specifically covered by the rules. Please read this section of the book and comply with the spirit as well as the letter of the Code and the rules.

At the Board of Directors meeting in Green Bay, the Board adopted a new Constitution for the ACC which, among other things, created a new standing committee on Ethics. This committee is empowered to investigate allegations of Ethics violations and to issue warnings and reprimands for relatively minor infractions. They will forward serious violations to the full Board for possible suspension or expulsion actions.

While we contemplate these unpleasant matters, let's keep in mind that, while violations are unpleasant, they are also relatively rare. 99% of our members are interested in the opportunity



to engage in competitive cribbage and having a good time in the process. The main responsibility of the Officers and Directors of the ACC is to provide the framework and organization that makes this possible.

If we all come to a weekend tournament or Grass Roots session with the goal of having a good time and with the thought that winning will make a good time better, rather than having winning as the primary goal, we will naturally behave as ladies and gentlemen and all of us will have a better time.

The ACC's new Constitution will be printed in December's issue as a centerfold. This issue has our ACC Open's entry form.

Portland's Eugene Wilkerson went home a winner by picking up the 126-pegger consolation event, edging Bob Herrmann, Bend, OR in the final match. Sylvia Hornbeck, Washougal, WA and George Mackie, Des Moines, WA finished 3rd and 4th.

Nevada's travelling king of cribbage, John Jantos (Carson City), won the high roller, and The O'Malley's (Bill and Bill Jr.) took the doubles crown. The O'Malley's are from Salem, as is winner Glenna Golik...keeping the bulk of the prize money home! Jason Hofbauer continued his fine run by taking the Saturday special, in addition to qualifying in the main event and finishing in the 9-16 bracket.

Louis Caccia, Newtonville, MA, captured the 166-pegger Massachusetts Open, played in Easton, MA September 20. Caccia, in winning, picked up a nifty 180 MRP's, in addition to a nice winner's purse, to put him among the MRP leaders for the 1993 season.

John Croce, Cranston, RI, came close, but had to settle for 2nd (and 169 MRP's). Two Massachusetts players finished 3rd and 4th...Brian McCoy (Cambridge), and Bob Kaplan (Randolph).

Doris Perkins, Quincy, MA, continues her fine start for the new season by winning the sizeable 102-pegger consolation. The 60 MRP's, combined with the 180 she earned in winning the New England Inaugural in August, will keep her among the leaders nationwide in the MRP race. Jack Puleo (Mansfield, MA), Charles Finley (Enfield, CT) and Thomas Bridges (N. Quincy, MA) finished 2, 3, and 4.

The hot hand in the qualifying round was held by Bob Bousquet. This Palmer, MA pegger picked up some 60 MRP's by taking qualifying honors.

Tournament director Edward Donahue reported \$332 donated to the K of C Children's Fund...and this event will be played again next year in September.

Veteran Pete Paradis, Santa Maria, CA, picked up the marbles in the 44-pegger consolation.

## Jim Keeling to the Rescue



His opponent is but 8-points short of winning with first count (and holds enough to win the game with the cut card), while Burton needs 18 points to win. He holds 8-8-7-7. His opponent leads an 8, Burton pairs it for two. Then an ace for "25", and Burton adds his 2nd 8 for a "go" and another point. Then his opponent leads a 7! Wow! Burton jumps on for two more (5 total, needing 13 more to win). His luck holds! His opponent plays the 3rd 7! Now it's just a simple "28 for 12, and one for the go...13 and game!"

# Robert Einhorn Appointed Director of Senior Judges

Robert B. Einhorn, Melrose Park, PA, has been appointed Director of the Senior Judges.

The appointment was announced by Ev Bey, Vice President-Policy, with concurrence of the Executive Committee.

Einhorn succeeds Cathy Perkins, Bear Creek, NC, who has assumed the position of Rules Committee chairwoman and Director of Research & Development.

The Senior Judges program was instituted in 1991, allowing a maximum of eight qualified judges in each ACC region to be appointed to that position. They each serve 3-year appointments and may be reappointed.

At present, there are 19 Senior Judges, all being appointed in June, 1992. They include six each from the Eastern and Central Regions and seven from the Western Region, as follows:

Eastern: Einhorn, Perkins, Al Miller (Testing Examiner), George Bickford, Bob Gombatz and Phyllis Schmidt.

Central: Jeff Shimp (Judge Commissioner), Scott Kooistra (Executive Vice President), Joan Rein (General Secretary), Ron Hamilton, Don Tofte, and Martha Fingleton (Executive Member-at-Large and Tournament Commissioner).

Western: Bob McCabe (President), Frank Zabrowski (former Testing Examiner and originator of Senior Judge program), Dick Cornwell (former Rules Committee chairman), DeLynn Colvert, Roy Hofbauer (Western Commissioner), Betty Johnson, and Gene Sissel.

A Senior Judge must be a member in good standing with the ACC, currently certified as a Judge and have extensive experience as a tournament judge. For consideration of appointment, a Senior Judge must be nominated by an ACC Director or a Tournament Director.

The qualification of a candidate for a Senior Judge appointment is evaluated by the Director of Senior Judges (Einhorn) and the Testing Examiner (Miller) and then submitted to the Commissioner of Judges (Shimp) for final approval or rejection.

Senior Judges are experienced, qualified ACC judges who have shown an outstanding ability to analyze situations and come to a fair and reasonable solution, making judgmental decisions that are not presently covered by the ACC rules.

Senior Judges are expected to share their offbeat judgmental problems with fellow Senior Judges, through the Director of Senior Judges, and together seek a mutually satidfactory solution that can be used as a guide for future decisions and possible ACC rules changes.

Einhorn anticipates coordinating an on-going forum for the judgmental decisions confronted by the Senior Judges, exchanging opinions and views on these knotty confrontations.

# 1993 Grand National Date Approved

Missoula, MT-The Village Red Lion Inn, in concurrence with directors DeLynn Colvert and Rex Paddock, has approved the dates for the 1993 Grand National, to be played in Missoula, Montana. Play will begin with an "early-bird" match Friday, September 24, 1993, and conclude with playoffs, consolation, and a "last chance" event on Sunday the 26th. For reservations, call 1-800 547-8010 (say "cribbage"). This four-star convention center will offer rooms to cribbage players for \$52 single, \$58 double... a sizeable reduction from their standard rates.

# Cribbage In Schools Program

The Board of Directors recently voted \$3,000 for the *Cribbage In Schools Program*, to be administered by Karl W. Grube, Whitmore Lake, Michigan.

Grube is off and running by proposing that this \$3,000 can be matched or exceeded by donations from local businesses (or school districts) located in Grass Roots club communities. Grube is also trying to obtain discounts from US Playing Card Company, Carom-Drueke Company, and other businesses who can benefit from this promotion.

During the first year, each Grass Roots club sponsors two teachers in their community by soliciting \$50 donations from local businesses or their school district. The ACC will provide \$50 matching money (via Grube). Grube will provide "Educator Certification Materials" to help certify teachers...and to get the ball rolling, recruting will only be in locations where Grass Roots clubs are available to give a hand. According to Grube, the ACC's goal is to make the Cribbage in Schools Program self-supporting within 36 months.

#### 1st year goal

30 new certified teachers @ \$50 certification. The ACC, local businesses, or school districts share first year costs of certifying the initial 30 teachers.

#### 2nd year goal

30 certified teachers x 2 teacher recruits = 60 newly certified teachers. Local businesses, school districts, and ACC funds of \$50/teacher certifies 60 new teachers.

#### 3rd year goal

60 certified teachers x 2 teacher recruits = 120 newly certified teachers. Program costs are self-sufficient through sponsors.

Jason Hofbauer is a teenager from Washougal, WA...and his parents are Jeanne and Roy Hofbauer. Jeanne and Roy are perennial winners (Roy is a 2time All-American, and Jeanne finished 13th in 1990). They must be teaching Jason their "magic" at home, as he has been on a roll lately. In Montana he finished 2nd in the 78pegger consolation, won the Saturday special in Salem, OR, after qualifying and finishing in the 9-16 bracket in the main event (of 178 peggers)! While on this roll, he waxed your editor (a Life Master) and the President of the ACC (a Grand Master).

His concerns are about players who purposely announce a false count (for advantage), overpegging "packing wood," taking or giving a crib (at an opportune time), "stealing" games in a playoff (by NOT writing down the score, and adding, or subtracting a game), and playing "mind" games (stalling, talking, etc.). Larry states that a player should always call a judge when in doubt about a play. But, in concluding his letter, he says "There are only a few players that pull these stunts. Most players are thoughtful and courteous and are a joy to be around."

Most players are totally honest, but a word to the wise...be alert, and call a judge when in doubt!

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# Letters to the editor ....

# Hey, I Want to Watch!

I believe that blocking off the area where the play-offs are being held, as was done recently at the Grand National in Green Bay, is a negative for cribbage. As long as spectators are quiet and orderly, they should be allowed to watch the play from a short distance. Watching play is a plus for cribbage.

# Rare Hand!

Years ago I had what I think is a very unusual hand. I call it a "straight 11." I was dealt Q-J-10-9 of clubs and two other cards, which I tossed to the crib. The starter was the king of clubs, so the hand counted 11. The "straight 11"...Q-J-10-9 plus starter king (same suit) is a higher counting hand than any other that does not have either a 15 or a pair. I don't include hands of the same five cards but with the Q-J-10- or 9 as the starter...the king as starter makes the hand a little more special, since, you might say, the king rules the deck.

I thought the "straight 11" might be almost as rare as the 29-hand, so I contacted Bruce Bowman, the author of CRIBBAGE MAS-TER for IBM PC computers, and asked him to calculate the odds of getting one. He says that your chances of getting a "29" are 1 in 216,580, and for a "28" it is about 1 in 15,028. He calculated the odds for a "straight 11" as 1 in 115,308. A "28" is therefore about eight times more common and a "29" is only about twice as rare. In his calculation, Bruce accounted for the half dozen situations (not counting board position) in which you would break up the Q-J-10-9, for example, when your other cards are the right 8-7 and it's your opponent's crib. ## **Optional Scoring Method**

During the past few years when I've functioned as a tournament director we've used a different game points scoring format from those you mentioned in your recent publication. As preferred by most tournament entrants we've had them draw for opponents games scheduling, but that doesn't mean the competition is equal for all entrants...that is impossible to accomplish, even if the opponent scheduling is predetermined before the tournament. Unfortunately, "the luck of the draw" too often necessitates some entrants to have to play most of their games against tough players, while others might play most of their games against very weak opponents.

We don't believe good players should be rewarded for skunking weaker playing opponents, nor do we believe that novices losing a lot of games by skunk should receive the same game points as a good player losing a game by one peg point. In an attempt to offset that possibility we award game points as follows: the game winner scores 2 game points, the loser scores 1 game point, or zero on a loss by a skunk. This game points format generally should produce more equal opponent games scheduling to the playoffs.

# Desirable Playing Practices

I would like to recommend for players' consideration, practices that are polite and show consideration for your opponent, that tend to expedite play, and conform to the rules. Many players use perhaps 80% of these practices but a few manage only about half. Hopefully, a hightened awareness of the implications of our habits will lead to favorable changes.

To highlight the Rules requirements, the symbol (R) will be used after required practices.

Shuffle. At least 3 shuffles are required (R). Most players expose the bottom card between interleaving-type shuffles. A subsequent over-and-under shuffle or cut, when properly held, will change the bottom card so that neither player has knowledge of it.

Cut-before-deal. The board is the best place to offer the cut, with the long card dimension across the board width. The long board that is most commonly used is slightly wider than the deck and this makes picking the pack up less easy when placed along the board length. Placing the top packet on the table instead of on the board is an inconvenience on an unpadded table; often the pack must be slid off the table to retrieve it. It is faster to place the top packet on the board before the dealer picks up the bottom packet rather than after, but check that the correct packet is placed on top.

Dealing. Pone is allowed only to block cards from sliding off the table and is prohibited from pawing at his cards as they are dealt, even though he doesn't pick them up. The pone's hands/arms should be positioned so as to give plenty of room for the cards to land; 6" is too little, 12" is adequate.

Placement of pack. The most common practice is to put the pack on the board after dealing. However, in view of the possibility of losing your crib if it ends up on the wrong side of the board and play starts (see Rule VId) it is much preferable to place it on the dealer's side as a clear indication of who dealt.

Discard to crib. No recommendations seem needed here. Almost all players now seem to be aware that you may NOT retrieve (to look at or change) your discards unless only your cards are on the wrong side (R).

Cut for starter. Don't touch the pack until all four cards are in the crib (R). Cut four cards minimum, leave at least four (R). Don't look at bottom card of top packet (R). After turning the starter, if the pack is on the board (instead of the dealer's side), see that it's

placed behind the pegs of both players, or far ahead of them.

Play of the cards. Sing out the count distinctly; there is a high noise level at tournaments. Overlap your played card so that the sequence can be seen and all are exposed (R). When your opponent scores points and starts to peg them, don't play your next card or say "Go" until the pegging is completed. After you've said "Go," don't play your next card until you're certain your opponent has finished (pegged a Go or 31); the opponent might play two or three cards and peg after each.

Counting hand/crib. You needn't count your hand aloud. If you do it may interfere with your opponent's counting process rather than hasten his confirmation of your score. Pone states total hand count and pegs it while cards are still exposed (R). Pone can pick up or mix his hand ONL Y after the dealer states acceptance or starts counting/pegging the dealer's hand (R). After the dealer pegs, the hand is placed face up on the pone's side but NOT on top of the starter. Pone can mix dealer's hand to show acceptance, then dealer is allowed to count the crib (R). After pegging crib, it too is placed face up on pone's side (R). The starter must be kept separated from the hands and crib until the crib count is accepted by the pone; a penalty can be imposed if you mix the starter with other cards (R).

End of play at a position. Before moving to another position, replace the pegs in the starting holes, put the deck on the board, and remove everything you brought to the position.
