## Record Crowd in Green Bay **Grand National XI: Glenn Gauthier Tops 448 Deb Schisel Wins Consolation**

Glenn Gauthier, a pegger from nearby DePere, WI, took a hot run of cards and won the recent record-setting Grand National XI in Green Bay, WI. Some 448 peggers were on hand for this prestigious event, topping the crowd of 442 peggers that attended Grand National VIII in Prineville, OR (1989).

Gauthier edged Robert Kiley, Appleton, WI, in the final match for the championship. In addition to the \$3,000 first place prize, Glenn picked up a 28-hand in the playoffs as well.

Doug Page, Little Chute, WI, finished 3rd...and completed a sweep of the first three places by nearby Wisconsin players.

Syl Lulinski, a former Executive Vice-President of the ACC, received his Grand Master award on Saturday night...and proved the award is no fluke with a fine 4th place finish. Syl hails from LaGrange Park, Illinois.

Local Mark Vetter bested the huge field in the qualifying round with a fine 37 (17) +264 card (22 games). Usually with a crowd this large, a 40 or more tops the field, but as our ACC players gain experience (and skill), the scores are coming down...or this was a very tough cross-section of our membership.

Three ladies took top honors in the 244-pegger consolation event...and all three proved themselves on the tournament trail in 1992. Taking the crown was Deb Schisel, Mount Prospect, IL (12th in Central Region in 1992 with 575 MRP's), followed by Louine Lyda, Forest Grove, OR (9th in Western Region in 1992 with 731 MRP's) in 2nd. Joy Jerdee, Brooklyn Park, MN had a great run in Raleigh at the National Open, and continues her run by finishing 3rd (16th in Central Region in 1992 with 489 MRP's).

I first met Joe at the Wisconsin Championship Cribbage Tournament in Milwaukee in November of 1980. He sold me, along with many others, on the ACC that day. To my wife Sharon's chagrin, I became, and remain, an addict.

As a founding father, Joe was the sparkplug that took the ACC from a discussion among a dozen or so individuals at Raleigh in 1979 to an organization of more than 6,000 today.

Using his experience gained as a renowned tournament player of another card game (Skat), he was instrumental in the evolution of today's typical tournament format.

He, with an assist from Pat Crozier, developed the Grass Roots concept. He personally nurtured it through its formative years and passed a healthy organization along to Jerry Dickinson.

Joe's commitment to youth and cribbage in education programs is probably going to be his most important legacy to the ACC. The average age of our membership is certainly higher than the average age of most social organizations. The young are the ones we need to recruit to assure the continued advancement of organized cribbage. I am thankful that he has agreed to remain active in this area.

Joe, we will all miss you as our President. You were the first and, until now, the only President of the Congress. Your accomplishments were much more extensive than I could cover in this short column. We are grateful for what you have done and look forward to more from you in the future.

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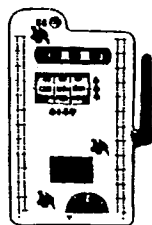
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## Grand National XI

The satellite events were captured by locals Pynenberg and Van Vreede (doubles: 208 teams), and the Friday high-rollers (56 players) went to Frank Lake, LaPine, OR. Frank's \$1,500 went a long way in paying for his trip east. Berlin, WI's Louis Kamps took the Saturday night event.

A highlight of the tourney was a 29-hand scored by Norman Lindman, Eagan, MN. This gem is only the 2nd of this cribbage year, and earns Louis \$100 from the American Cribbage Congress.

In addition to Champion Gauthier's 28-hand, four others were scored: Joe Ramos, Robert Sommer, Dave Olgren, and Don Prill nailed these 15,028 to 1 long shots.

Directors Tom Gallagher, Jerry Lembke, Bob Miller, and their staff did a great job managing the record crowd and all events proceeded smoothly. They presented outstanding top prizes...a grandfather's clock (floor model) for the grand prize, and a beautiful mantel clock for the consolation.

...On to Missoula, Montana for Grand National XII (September, 1993).

## A Hex on Grand Nationals?

Last year's Grand National in Fort Lauderdale, FL, had a site cancellation due to hotel renovations, and a bankruptcy of a chartered cruise ship, that caused director Harry Stoops much consternation.

This year's Grand National site...the Midway Motor Inn...had a \$200,000 fire just three days before the tourney, much to the consternation of directors Gallagher, Lembke, and Miller. However, a massive cleanup effort on short notice kept the disruption to a minimum. Most players were unaware that a fire had occurred, as that wing of the facility was closed off.

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# ***Harry Kantas Cops Portland's Consolation*** **Winter or Summer...It's Ray Hanes!**

Winter or summer, Ray Hanes, the Master player from Walla Walla, WA, nails the crowd in Portland, OR. Last January Ray won the 169-pegger event in Portland...and this August he returned and won the 200-pegger summer event.

And with this win, Ray will move up from his lifetime 65th place with the 200 MRP's garnered. He will also move into the MRP lead in this fledgling 1993 cribbage season.

Veteran J. C. Turner, the Roseburg, OR king, not only finished 2nd, but also earned his Master rating in picking up some 188 MRP's. This is only the 2nd Master rating earned this cribbage year (the 125th in the ACC's history).

Another wily veteran, Al Grantz, Kelso, WA, repeated J. C.'s accomplishment and also earned his Master rating (no. 126) in finishing third, and earning 182 MRP's.

Local Brad Cordes finished a fine 4th in this large field of 200 players.

148 peggers stayed around for the consolation event. Harry Kantas, Beaverton, OR, has spent a lifetime figuring Grass Roots points and awards for his fellow Portland area players...but now they will have to figure his, as he won this event, and is off to a fine start in the 1993 MRP race. George Mackie, Des Moines, WA finished 2nd, followed by Gene Cecchini, Milwaukie, OR, and John O'Shea, Portland.

In the early bird events, Enid Foster (Bothell, WA) and Margaret Frederick (Portland) won the doubles. Lynn Gillespie, Richland, WA, took the "High Roller." Rollie Heath, Lincoln City, OR had a hard time holding off All-American Paul Hatcher, Salem, OR, in the Saturday night event...but he did! Louine Lyda is rarely denied in a sanctioned event, and this Forest Grove, OR player nailed the "Cry Baby" event.

Life Master DeLynn Colvert, Missoula, MT had his best qualifying card in years, as his 38 (18)+195 took honors, edging Aggie Mikulsky, Sobieski, WI (also turned a fine 38 GP card).

Wisconsin was well represented as Life Master Mick Michaelis was on hand. And Phyllis Schmidt, the Williamstown, MA, queen of cribbage made the long trek to Portland...and she seems intent on repeating her 1992 national championship.

Another Life Master--Jesse Jarrell, Pittsburg, CA-- is making an early MRP move by qualifying 9th and finishing 13th, and has earned a nifty nation-leading 256 MRP's this cribbage year.

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## **Tournament Changes, Late Notices**

The Crook County Lions Open in Prineville, Oregon has been changed from November 6-8 to November 13-15, in order to avoid a conflict with the Reno tournament.

Bob St. Yves promises a good meet with \$5 of the \$31.50 entry going to charity. Bob will have a Friday early bird, and a Saturday night special, along with the usual consolation event.

And don't forget the **Colorado Championship** in Englewood, Colorado October 31-November 1. Due to a mix-up, Cribbage World inadvertently omitted this event in "Tournament Trail." Director Dick Graham has a singles match on Saturday, Oct. 31, followed by the consolation match. On Sunday, November 1, a doubles event will be held. ## Paul Hatcher Breaks Jinx, Takes Blue Mountain Open

1991 All-American Paul Hatcher is a perennial winner, but in some 50 sanctioned tries had never won an event...until the recent Blue Mountain Open in La Grande, OR. He got the "monkey" off his back with a fine win in this 96-pegger event. In addition, this Salem, OR pegger is knocking on the door for his Master rating with the 111 MRP's earned, and begins the 1993 season in great fashion.

Gary Rose, a veteran pegger from Pasco, WA, came close, but had to settle for 2nd. Two other veteran peggers took 3rd and 4th: Bayard Lliteras, Coeur D'Alene, ID, and Bo Van Orsow, Redmond, OR. And Bayard earned his Master rating with his 3rd place finish.

Jim Gogolin, Idleyld Park, OR, had the hot hand in qualifying...a fine 38 GP's in the 20-game round.

Two veteran peggers slugged it out in the 76-pegger consolation. Dan Capper, Caldwell, ID nipped Master Bill Hill, Hermiston, OR for the title.

In the satellite events, Sylvia Hampton, Salem, OR, teamed with Ralph Reynolds, Prineville, OR to win the doubles event, and Jean Edwards, Roseburg, OR won the Saturday Special going away.

Rookie tournament director Charlotte Springer did a great job running her first tournament, and was ably assisted by Marvis Reynolds. The Eagles Lodge once again offered ample playing space, reasonable prices, and were great hosts.

## Synopsis

### ACC Board of Directors Meeting Raleigh, July 24, 1992

All members present except Cambell, Fingleton, Griffin, Pond, Sissel, Waldorf and Wergin.

Executive Vice-President Bob McCabe called meeting to order at 1 PM. A quorum was present.

William Wright, El Cajon, CA, welcomed to BOD (filling vacancy on BOD). Wright will serve until July 1993, unless otherwise reelected.

Expulsion hearing deferred until Green Bay meeting as requested by ACC member.

Minutes of January meeting approved.

Cribbage World editor reported CW on schedule, with new computer equipment purchased.

Ev Bey reported that we are out of rule books. After final changes, a reprint will be ordered (this fall).

A booklet for tournament guidelines, complete with playoff brackets was discussed.

Scott Kooistra proposed a new award category for MRP, following up on Syl Lulinski's earlier proposal. A Life Master would earn one star for 10,000 MRP's, and one star thereafter for each additional 5,000 MRP's. Passed.

ACC logo licensing agreement discussed. Executive committee given authority to grant requests to individuals who wish to sell merchandise with ACC logo (percentage of sales to ACC).

Many rule changes discussed. Those that were changed were: 72A, 69, 71A, 65A, 78, 54, 38A, 62, 76, 59, 77, 50B, 27A. These numbers are meaningless to our ACC members, as they refer to numbers assigned by rules committee.

Fred McGibney presented Treasurer's Report. Overbudget expenses of membership chairman were explained by noting the extra mailings and expenses with the new 800 phone number. Also noted: \$2 reduction in spouse's membership. New membership cards purchased this year instead of next year because of a reduced price for printing. About \$1,100 from that budget should have been included in promotion for fliers. Marketing also over budget due to bumper stickers and Grand National banner. Other

items not included was Hall of Fame expenses and legal fees regarding an expulsion. Treasurer's Report approved.

Membership chairman and Cribbage World editor voted \$100/month for equipment replacement, retroactive to January 1, 1992.

Fred McGibney noted the necessity of a backup Treasurer.

Code of Ethics discussed. One version approved as a preamble in the new rule book.

Ev Bey reported on Hall of Fame. All members have been located. DeLynn Colvert will have photos framed and matted for easy shipping, at a cost not to exceed \$25 each.

Scott Kooistra moved to approve a loan for his proposed plan to generate money for Cribadier General's program. Carried.

Jerry Dickinson discussed proposal for a new Constitution and By-Laws. Tabled until BOD meeting in Green Bay.

Phil Babcock reported on the publicity and promotion committee.

Ron Hamilton reported on the 1994 Grand National, to be voted on at the September BOD meeting.

George Webb asked for postponement until Green Bay meeting for items such as charity, cards, boards, stationery, Reno and Grand National meets. Webb also presented a motion that all sanctioned tournaments require membership in the ACC for participation, effective August 1, 1993. Carried with one nay vote.

Hall of Fame vote was taken. No one was inducted into the Hall this year.

Cathy Perkins appointed chairperson for the election committee, which will take place in Green Bay this September.

Joe Ramos moved to approve budget. Carried.

Jeff Shimp moved to adjourn. Carried.

Al Grantz, Kelso, WA. Al finished 3rd in the same Portland Open, adding 182 MRP's to his lifetime total...and reached the 2,000 MRP mark to earn his Master (no. 126). Al is also a veteran on the northwest circuit. Rarely making mistakes, he continues to pile up MRP's at every stop.

Bayard Lliteras, Coeur D'Alene, Idaho. Bayard recently finished 3rd at the Blue Mountain Open (96 peggers) and earned a nifty 93 MRP's to reach the 2,000 MP plateau...and the 127th Master. Bayard has had many top finishes in the northwest and is especially on his game in playoff matches.

## Michelle Park Scores "29"

The Snake River Open's tournament director Michelle Park (twin Falls, Idaho) scored the ACC's first 29-hand of the 1993 season at the recent Blue Mountain Open in LaGrande, OR. This gem was dealt in the very first hand of a playoff game...and the crowd of onlookers let out a barrage of shrieks and cheers startling the entire room of peggers.

Michelle will receive \$100 from the ACC for this sanctioned "29."



## **Tournament Directors: Check Your Boards**

Pegger Boyd McDonald, Mountain View, CA writes concerning tournaments that use poorly drilled boards, poorly marked boards (arrows), and holes drilled into dark knots.

Boyd states that one of his Grass Roots members recently lost an important playoff game because of a poorly marked, dark-colored board.

Tournament directors: check your boards and replace boards that may cause players difficulty. A white, or light-colored board works best. In the northwest, a popular board is one that has the last 15 holes or so tapered into a common winner's hole. This makes the board asymmetrical, thereby making pegging backwards a little less likely. Also, ONE winner's hole is sufficient.

Players: when starting a game, make SURE you know which is the proper direction. Even a dark board is no excuse for pegging backwards. Be alert!

## **Better Late Than Never (In fact, late IS BETTER!)**

Quincy, CA Grass Roots club 111 has a skunk bucket...and the bucket pays a bonus for any 28 or 29-hands scored in league play.

In last year's play, no one scored a 28 or 29 until the 12th month...and then Gene Norman collected \$72.44 for a 29-hand scored August 6. Almost as good as a sanctioned 29!

Laurie Logan, club 111's director, gave CW this tidbit...and reported that "old reliable" Nick Ayoob (ranked 125th nationally with 1,945 MRP's) took the club's championship last year, nipping Kaley Erickson for that honor.

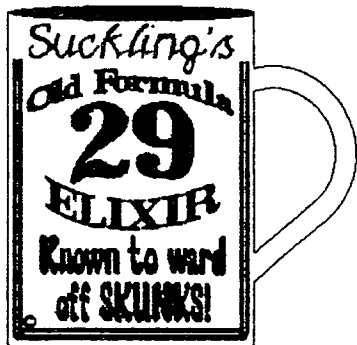

## No Skunks, Please

Here is my 2 cents (or 2 points) worth in the discussion of the use of skunks in cribbage competition. Cribbage has two faces and is played by two kinds of players. It is a gambling game, invented for that purpose. It is the best 2 or 4 handed money game I have found. But, it also can be played with no bets with just as much enjoyment.

I believe that almost all the players who enjoy gambling in cribbage are in the ACC, play in grass roots and tournaments, and in private games that are now a familiar side show at many events. On the other hand, there are many people who would never think of waging a substantial sum on cribbage or any other card game. They have been playing cribbage at the kitchen table for many years. Thousands of these players have yet to hear of the ACC, the grass roots program, or sanctioned tournaments. The future growth of the Congress and its activities lies with the nongambling cribbage player.

The double or lesser penalty for a skunk is a gambling concept. I assume that the purpose of a tournament or a grass roots match is to determine who is the best player, not the luckiest. The use of a skunk penalty tends to work against the better player when a short swing of cards favors the less skilled. There is no real difference in skill in most instances between scoring 90 or 91 points.

The use of a skunk penalty in match game competition is particularly destructive of good competition. Sooner or later the nongambler will become discouraged with the skunk and leave the tournament circuit.

Cribbage without skunks is a friendlier game that still requires good skills to manage the ebb and flow of the cards.

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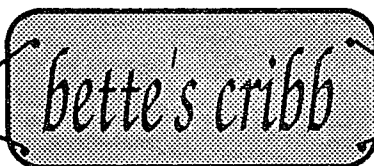
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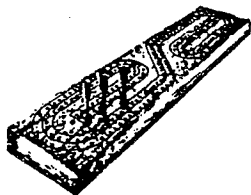
