

41 Members Running For Election

American Cribbage Congress Elections

Every two years the American Cribbage Congress elects a new Board of Directors. This two-year term begins September 1, 1993, and will run for two years (cribbage years 1994 and 1995).

This Board consists of 25 members, elected by members of the American Cribbage Congress. ACC bylaws allows no more than four members from any one state to serve on this Board. This year's election has some 41 members nationwide running for this office.

Those elected will take office at the BOD meeting at this year's Grand National in Missoula. This BOD meeting is scheduled for Friday, September 24.

Members are asked to carefully weigh the abilities of

all candidates, as those elected will represent you and the ACC membership for the next two years.

Election Procedures

This issue has a Voting Centerfold, complete with a cut-out postcard for our member's convenience. Our married couple members will receive an additional ballot (inserted and stapled). These ballots are pre-addressed to the ACC's Election Chairman, Rich Maringer, 1212 Huxley, Madison, WI 53704. If any members wish to keep their vote more confidential, they may insert their ballot in an envelope and mail to Maringer.

All 41 candidates have a nomination biography published in proximity to the voting postcard in this issue. Pick your candidates carefully, and vote for no more than the limit allowed.

All ballots must be postmarked no later than July 1, 1993.

4th Street Terrorists Winners Again Wayne Glashan Wins World Championship Iris Fuller Consolation Winner

Concord, CA's 4th Street Terrorists are aptly named, as once again, they have come up winners. Wayne Glashan, Pittsburg, CA, topped the 246 peggers to claim the World Championship, \$1,400, and 256 MRP's, at Quincy CA's 22nd annual event. Another 4th Street Terrorists...Sundae Webb...took 2nd (and \$850). The 246 MRP's earned will vault Sundae over the 600 MRP mark for this cribbage year, giving her a shot at top ten honors.

Cy Madrone, Santa Barbara, CA took 3rd (\$550), and Jim Hartle, San Jose, CA4th (\$450).

Once again, Russell Nelson, Phoenix, AZ, came away as top qualifier. Russell set an all-time high mark of 44 GP's in Reno...and continues his hot qualifying scores.

Master pegger Iris Fuller, the veteran pegger from Denver, CO, nailed the 120-pegger consolation event, edging rookie Jason Severson, Chico, CA, in the final match. Jason's 2nd place finish is a great start for his tournament career. Les Lawrence, Magalia, CA, finished 3rd, and Rich Burns, San Leandro, CA, took 4th.

The satellite events: Friday doubles-Elizabeth Rice, James Hartle (San Jose, CA); Cry-baby-Bill Urlevich, Seattle, WA; High-roller-Dean Deniz, Nevada City, NV; Kozlowski Memorial Award (high Nevadan)- John Jantos, Carson City, NV.

This World Championship event is the longest running sanctioned tournament on the west coast. Founded some 22 years ago by Ev Bey and other Quincy Rotary Club members, this event has spawned organized cribbage in the western USA. Attested by the 246 peggers, this event is still going strong...and paid out some \$15,000 in prize money.

The Quincy Rotary Club has long funded community charitable causes with a portion of the entry fees.

Last year's winner of this event...founder Ev Bey...was roasted this time around, as he was wheeled into the arena on a portable throne, regally garbed in robes and crown.

Co-chairmen for this event are Mike Taborski and Dan Smith...and they conducted a first-class tournament. Number 23, same time, same place, next year! Mark your calendars!

Rex Paddock Breaks Jinx, Wins Hermiston Open

Rex Paddock, co-director of the upcoming Grand National XII, has been on the tournament trail for the past ten years...and despite winning many satellite events, consolations, and high finishes in main events...he has never won a sanctioned event. That is, until the recent 8th Annual Greater Hermiston Open, in Hermiston, OR.

This Missoula, MT, pegger had quite a weekend, as he qualified high, was a member of the first place team in the team event, and continued on to edge all 136 peggers in the main event.

Another veteran Master pegger, Al Grantz, Kelso, WA, finished 2nd, and is no stranger to high finishes, and took yet another 2nd. Roger Lueschow, Maple Valley, WA, had a fine tournament, taking 3rd. Local Bill Jones took 4th, continuing his usual high finishes.

Jack Moritzky, Nabton, WA nailed the 96pegger consolation, edging Donna Hassett, Salem, OR in the final match. Ernie Standard, Island City, OR, took 3rd and local Denny Edwards finished 4th.

The hot hand in the qualifying round was held by Ed Edwards, Boise, ID. Ed teamed with Joe Dunn (Boise) to win the doubles event to complete a fine weekend. The high-roller event was won by Ray Hanes. This Walla Walla, WA pegger continues his fine run.

As usual, directors Ken and Betty Capper ran a first class event, complete with their usual calcutta, and Saturday banquet. Ken's trophies are always unusual, and highlight his tournaments.

Ace-Ace-Ace-Three = 15?

Ray Hanes and Jan Foster were pegging in the high-roller event in Hermiston, and the play went ace-ace-ace for "twelve" (four of a kind). The next card played was a three and the count went "15 for two." Play continued with neither player recognizing the error.

Bill Dettman Tops Village Inn Open

Local Bill Dettman topped the field of 84 peggers at the recent Village Inn Open in White Bear Lake, MN, edging John Hartman, St. Paul, MN, in the final match. Bill Cook, Rhinelander, WI took qualifying honors.

48 peggers stayed around for the consolation, and Jim Pfluger took the crown, edging Tracy Radosevich, Medford, WI in the final match.

The satellite events were captured by two Appleton, WI, peggers: Bob Loch (Friday early bird), and Ginny Danielski (last chance).

Director Ron Hamilton was pleased with the turnout, despite a late date change, and apologizes for any inconvenience caused by this date change. Grand National XIII will be played in St. Paul, and director Hamilton is simply getting used to any emergencies than may come his way next year.

Duane Toll, Gary Motley Make MRP Move Ed Lawrence Tops 196 at Oregon Coast Classic Bud Ferrigno Takes Consolation, Saturday Special

The weekend was a wet one in Lincoln City, OR, but when the sun came out, it shined brightly on Edward Lawrence, as he claimed the Oregon Coast Classic title, \$1,200 and 200 MRP's! His final match was a tough one, as he edged Arlene Halldorson, Long Beach, WA, 4-3 to claim the championship. Arlene finished 2nd.

Two premier players...Life Master Duane Toll (Kenosha, WI) and Grand Master Gary Motley (Gresham, OR) slugged it out for 3rd and 4th, with Duane coming away the winner. Both players scored sizeable MRP's (182 & 172) and join the 1993 MRP race for the roses. Toll stands at nearly 900 for the year, while Gary is near the top with 1,040 (unofficial).

Bud Ferrigno, the Canby, OR, king of cribbage won the consolation...and the Saturday night special, to go home a winner! Denny Van Orsow, Culver, OR, has been coming close lately, but had to settle for 2nd in the consolation. Susan Powell, Albany, OR took 3rd, and Tim Hutsell, Crescent City, CA took 4th.

Lea Hornbeck has been tearing up the track lately...and with a 3rd place qualifying score (and 61 MRP's) becomes the 150th ACC player to earn Master (scoring 2,000 MRP's lifetime). This Washougal, WA, player was top qualifier and champion of the recent Northwest Open.

The Friday night events were won by Harold Schmelzer, White City, OR (high roller), and Earnest Gregory (Siletz, OR) teamed with Walt Howell (Toledo, OR) to take the doubles. The cry baby event was won by Nancy Lorenz, Salem, OR.

Director's Jeanne & Roy Hofbauer, Bernie Nelson, and Rollie Heath ran a first class tournament, attested to by the increased crowd from last year. And as usual, Marvis Reynolds added her expertise to keep all events on track.

Vignettes From Lincoln City

The Oregon Coast Classic in Lincoln City attracted players from throughout the United States. Ford Jewer and Lee Norris from Rhode Island were spotted pegging away, as well as New Yorker Lucille Simpson. Duane Toll and Deb Schisel, from Kenosha, WI, made a short weekend vacation to the coast...and they went home a winner!

And when these visitors to Northwest play sat down to play Glenna Golik, champion of last year's Capital City Classic in Salem, OR, they were given a clue to her skill if they were observant. She wears a set of cribbage pegs for ear rings! A play that made bystanders chuckle: pone holds 3-3-4-5 with a 8 cut...and scores 12 (instead of 14). Then the dealer lays down a 1-2-6-7 (with the 8 cut) and scores 7 (instead of 9). The pone snickers and teases the dealer, pointing out that he really had 9! The dealer was a little more polite, and did not retaliate!

Duane Toll, the Kenosha, WI, Life Master, was quoted as saying (after he had cashed on three teams in the team events): "We don't play team events back east...but I like them!" It's a lot more fun when you win!

Robert Smith Scores 29 Betty Schaeffer Takes the Gold In Florida

Kissimmee's Betty Schaeffer lead an assault by Floridians and won the recent Gold Coast Spring Classic in Miami Springs, FL. Betty took on the field and came away the winner in this 70-pegger event, edging another Floridian in the final match...John Dolan from Sebastian.

Russell Cook, Punta Gorda, FL, finished 3rd, and Marvin Lang, Woodstock, IL, took 4th. Marvin was a long way from home, but with the 49 MRP's continues a fine season, nearing the 500 MRP mark.

Jackie Depizol, Winter Springs, FL, captured the 48-pegger consolation, getting by local Joe Daesch in the final match.

A highlight of this tournament was a 29-hand scored by Robert Smith. This was only the 12th 29 scored this cribbage year, and will reward Robert with \$100 from the ACC, and a framed award at this year's Grand National in Missoula, MT this September.

Two 28-hands were scored...Rueben Greenblatt from Spring Hill, FL hit this nifty hand...and 25 minutes later Walter Collins, also from Spring Hill picked up another. They both drove to the tournament together.

The American Cribbage Congress is on a roll. Membership stands at 6,665, with sanctioned tournament play at an all-time high. Record numbers of tournaments are being scheduled, and 1993 looks like a banner year.

California leads the way in memberships with a whopping 1,264, followed by Oregon with 726. Wisconsin sports 645 members.

President Bob McCabe left Utah to return to Wisconsin...and Utah is now in the lurch with zero members, joining Mississippi as the only states with no members. We have one lonesome member in Alabama.

Players are scoring record numbers of Master Points, attesting to the popularity of the game. Last year, any player scoring 285 MRP's made the top 50 in their Region, and received an invite to the Tournament of Champions. Writing or phoning the editor of *Cribbage World* complicates the ACC's procedures, as *Cribbage World* must have approval from a Regional Commissioner before publishing the upcoming tournament in "Tournament Trail."
