Record Crowds In Reno

954: JPW/ACC OPEN 738: CONSOLATION 402: T. of CHAMPIONS

\$10,000 Purse (Del Tufo), \$8,035 Purse (Morse)

Tony Del Tufo Wins JPW/ACC Open Clair Morse Takes Tournament of Champions Emil Lubinski Wins Record (738) Consolation Event

Anthony Del Tufo, West Bridgewater, MA, outlasted a world's record crowd of 954 peggers to win the Joseph P. Wergin/ACC Open in Reno February 6...and picked up a whopping \$10,000, 612 Master Rating Points, and his Master rating! His MRP total for the current year is near the 1,000 mark...and he joins the race for national honors.

This win marks the second consecutive win by Massachusett's peggers in this event. Last year, David Clemmey (Mansfield, MA) topped some 862 players. The 1994 edition has set a new standard, however, topping the 900 mark for the first time in cribbage's history!

John Groz, Kissimmee, FL, finished 2nd, picked up a sizeable \$6,800, and some 434 MRP's to throw his hat into the 1994 MRP race. Leo Brady, Arlington, VA, nailed 3rd (and \$4,800). Syl Lulinski, La Grange Park, IL, very nearly duplicated his November win in Reno, but settled for 4th, \$3,500, and another 375 MRP's

to re-gain the national MRP lead, standing at nearly 1,130 (after qualifying 16th).

Willie Evans, Richland, WA, finished 5th (\$2,800) followed by Al Libby, Quincy, CA (\$2,100), Ervin Bentz, San Francisco, CA (\$1,500), and Jim Broadhurst, Medford, OR (\$1,040).

Texan John Ranne (Temple) had the hot hand in the qualifying round, scoring a great 39 19 +296 to take the \$1,300 high-Q prize.

A world's record Consolation event crowd (738 players) saw Emil Lubinski, Brooklyn Park, MN, take the title, \$2,700, and 251 MRP's. This event, despite being a consolation, was the 4th largest tournament in cribbage's history.

And with the record crowd came sizeable prizes. Steve Ihrig, Salem, OR, took home \$2,100 for 2nd, Bob Hanes, Huxley, IA won Continued on page 3.

Dave Ritchey Tops All-Stars

Western All-Stars Win, Break Tie

The Western Region fielded a steady team of winners to outlast the Eastern and Central squad at the recent preliminaries to the JPW/ACC Open in Reno February 3.


With Al Grantz, Kelso, WA, leading the way with a 10-6 card (2 skunks: 22 GPs), the Western team won going away winning 73 games with 6 skunks (152 GPs). The Eastern squad won 62 games with 4 skunks (128 GP's), followed by the Central team with 57 wins and 10 skunks (124 GPs).

The Westerners had steady play from all eight

players...their low man scoring 8-8.

In the individual scoring, Orange City, FL's Dave Ritchey copped honors with a 11-5 card. With Grantz taking 2nd, Gary Motley (10-6), Gresham, OR finished 3rd, followed by DeLynn Colvert (10-6), Missoula, MT in 4th.

This was the 4th annual All-Star event, and the score now stands: Western 2, Central 1, and Eastern 1. This year's winning score of 152 GP's was the lowest ever...attesting to the spirited competition.



\$1,500, and Edgar Bastedo, Lethbridge, Alberta took home a nifty \$1,040 for 4th place.

Dee Dries, Rochester, NY, nailed the 8th sanctioned 29-hand to be scored this cribbage year, and the first by the fair sex, taking \$100 home for this sanctioned gem.

Tournament of Champions

Clair Morse, Bend, OR, nailed the recordbreaking Tournament of Champions (402 peggers...old record: 380), edging Frank Hansbury, San Anselmo, CA, in the final match. Clair is inching up on his Master rating, but, alas, this event was by invite only, and no MRP's were awarded. The \$8,035 first prize certainly eased the pain of not receiving MRP's, however. Hansbury won a sizeable \$5,700 for his 2nd place effort.

Bill Campbell, Fort Walton Beach, FL, took home \$4,200 for finishing 3rd (and this will certainly be grist for his newspaper column, if he so chooses). Glenn Gauthier, DePere, WI, rounded out the final four, winning \$3,200.

Larry Williams, Sun Valley, NV, took honors in the 14-game qualifying round, picking up the \$1,050 top-Q prize.

The Tournament of Champions Consolation event drew 246 players, and the hot hand in the qualifying round belonged to Stan Babiec, N. Dartmouth, MA, and he took home the top-Q prize of \$870.

But the playoffs belonged to John Williams, Brooklyn Park, MN. The \$2,400 first-place prize wasn't quite as much as his 1993's 4th place \$3,300 Main Event finish...but John wasn't complaining! Paul Petit, Pawtucket, RI, finished 2nd and garnered \$1,850. Ray Grismer, Wallace, Idaho, took 3rd (and \$1,450), followed by 1988 All-American John Ryan, Jr., San Lorenzo, CA (\$1,100).

The monster crowds were well handled by an experienced staff of directors. Joan & Jim Rein, Scott Kooistra, Royand Jeanne Hofbauer, Barbara Woodward, and a host of volunteers

kept all events on schedule, and the Sands, once again, were wonderful hosts, supplying the players with coffee and cake during the long weekend of pegging. The record crowd of 954 may possibly be surpassed in 1995...but this tournament will have a cut-off of 1,024 in the future. The playoff boards can only handle this number...and the Sands are about at maximum at that number, also.

Life masters, Masters, 29-Hands, 28-Hands... Harry Palmer, Phyllis Schmidt Earn Life Master Cathy Perkins, Rex Paddock, Nicky Kniech, Willie Evans, Anthony Del Tufo Earn Master Dee Dries Scores 8th 29-Hand

Reno's huge match left the record books smoking! Two Life masters were earned (Harry Palmer, W. Springfield, MA, and Phyllis Schmidt, Williamstown, MA), and at least five players earned their Master rating: Catherine Perkins, Bear Creek, NC, Rex Paddock, Missoula, MT, Nicky Kniech, Brown Deer, WI, Willie Evans, Richland, WA, and Anthony Del Tufo, W. Bridgewater, MA. Dee Dries, Rochester, NY, scored the 8th 29-hand of this season. 28-hands? Too many to report. Cribbage World will attempt to get a list for next month's issue.

Anthony Del Tufo, the winner of the recordbreaking JPW/ACC Open was given a yeoman's task just getting to Reno. His first airline ticket was for the wrong day, and after a hassle getting this straightened out, he missed his connection in Newark, NJ, and after another hassle ended up in San Francisco. After another re-route, he finally made it to Reno. Oops, no luggage. After two nervous days, his luggage finally caught up with him, How he won this event with all this extra hassle is amazing! Being from Massachusetts has to be the answer...this state seems to have a lock on the championship!

Clarence Van Orsow, Culver, OR, won the recent Kah-Nee-Ta Open, but in Reno he dealt 28-hands in consecutuve matches to Frank Bodogh and Al McDonald. The Cribbage Gods are just getting even!

A third-round playoff match found Syl Lulinski and Joe Bernard toe-to-toe. These two Life Masters are in a heated MRP race this cribbage year, and when the match began, both were in a near tie in this year's race. Syl left Joe in the stinkhole to win the match...and this measly point may certainly prove to be a big one when this year's race winds down. Syl took home 375 MRP's, while Joe garnered "only" 158!

Harry Palmer, W. Springfield, MA, zipped through his first playoff round 3-0, and became only the 11th ACC player to earn Life Master. Perennial winner Phyllis Schmidt, Williamstown, MA, finished her first round match 3-1...but the one loss made the match last a little longer than Harry's...so she became only the 12th ACC player to earn Life Master.

Montana players left for Reno in balmy, spring-like weather...but when they arrived home, the weather was like their Reno cards...ice cold (11 below...with the wind howling!)

Frank Wurman, Philadelphia, PA, had two small antique boards in his pocket. These one-inch long boards had two tracks of 15-holes per side (four times around, please), and had a slide drawer holding pegs and dominoes! And one had a pipe stamper end for the gentlemen peggers that smoke a pipe! What next?

Last month's quiz had two players getting married in Reno...and their initials wereW. M. and S. S. Who are they? And did they get married? Indeed they did! The answer: William Medeiros and Sharlene Szaban from Shrewsbury, MA. They had a first-class wedding at a nearby chapel in Reno, and hosted a nifty reception at the Sands. William finished 2nd in the 1992 match (and won \$6,000), but this year, the distraction of the wedding (???) kept him (and Sharlene) out of the top four. Both are highly ranked players in the Eastern Region.

Denny Van Orsow, national MRP leader from Culver, OR, failed to qualify in the ACC Open by a fluke. Needing but one peg to win (and dealing) he held 3-5-6-7, and his opponent pegged seven to win, before Denny could get his "automatic" go! He now knows he should have held his king! This one-point loss kept him from the playoffs. Extraordinary bad luck, nevertheless!

Ed Horigan Wins Virginia Championship, Earns 172nd Master

Ed Horigan, Virginia Beach, VA nailed the 80-pegger Virginia State Championship, January 23, and became the 172nd ACC member to earn his Master Rating.

Phyllis Schmidt "Lights" Up Super Lite Classic

A sizeable crowd of 148 peggers were on hand for this one-day tournament, and 94 stayed on for the Consolation event.

John Rooney, Randolph, MA came close, but settled for 2nd, followed by Jim McDonald, Monson, MA, and Dave Dudzinski, Hamden, CT.

Bill Dumas, Mattapoisett, MA, held the hot hand in the qualifying round, and took top honors...and the top Q-pool prize.

Sharlene Szaban, Shrewsbury, MA, won the Consolation event going away...and this is the last time she will be reported as a "Szaban," as she recently was married to William Medieros at the Reno meet February 3. Robert Leikin, Longmeadow, MA took 2nd.

Directors Jim Law and Charlie Finley reported an increase of 20 peggers from last year's event...attesting to a well-run tournament. This event is scheduled for a repeat performance again next year.


Consolation Events Will Add MRP's For Qualifying Round

At the recent BOD meeting in Reno, members voted to give Consolation event qualifying round winners MRP's. The ratio of MRP's will be 1/3 of the eventual winners points, i. e., the winner receives 60 MRP's, then the top qualifier will receive 20 MRP's, and so on down the list of winners. The overall ratio will remain 1 in 8 receiving MRP's in both the qualifying round and the playoff round.

This new procedure will take effect beginning next cribbage year...August 1, 1994. The BOD also voted to cap MRP's at 572 for any event. New MRP lists will be published soon covering these changes to take effect August 1, 1994.

Polish Cribbage... Little Known Rules

With due respect to Sir John Suckling, I have unquestionable proof that cribbage originated in Poland in a Kielbasa smokehouse. Over the years, several changes have occured, some subtle, some outright criminal, as to forever change the intent of the game.

Firstly, let's deal with the name change. It was not originally called cribbage. It was aptly named "wryptokvek." which translated, means literally, this game s---s!, a title that I'm sure you've heard more than once if you are a serious tournament player.

Now about those rule changes. Originally, if you held a matching pair of any ten value cards and the "pzzzt" (pone) held the other pair, all four cards could be in play during the pegging process, i. e., pzzzt leads a Q, you Q for 2, he Q's for 6, now you Q for 12, plus a go. That's why there are four cards of each denomination...a fact lost over the years.

Another rule change prohibits the player to either side of you to slip you a needed card in exchange for a drink or a small cash advance. Strategically placed mirrors are also a thing of the past. I could go on and on about how the original game has been diluted to its present state, but I guess that's called progress.

What is the consecutive skunks accomplished in tournament play, if you happen to know? Thanks for your organization's good work.

Mac enclosed a scorecard that showed winning 7 of 9, with, indeed, 5 skunks for a total of 18 (7) +184. Not bad! However, Leo Might, Missoula, MT, won 7 of 7...and all by skunks during the 1984 season. 21 (7) +273! Wow! 47,000,000 to 1 odds (roughly). Ed.

What Are The Odds?

From time to time you publish in Cribbage World the odds on various occurrences in the world of cribbage.

I have one for your mathematical genius to compute: On Nov. 17, 1993, at a meeting of the Sonora GR club, I held a 28-hand, and that same evening I had a Grand Slam (9 for 9).

I would appreciate if someone could figure those events occurring during one GR session.

The odds of receiving a 28-hand on any one deal is 15,028 to 1. Playing nine games (approx. 90 hands, not counting crib hands) makes the odds at about 167 to one during a 9-game match. Winning nine straight games is 512 to 1 (skill levels being equal). However, once you are dealt a 28-hand, the odds drop quickly to roughly 300 or so to 1 (a 28-hand improves your odds greatly of winning that game!). Now combining these two events (167 x 300), we come up with about 50,100 to 1 odds! Keep pegging! Russell Adams, check this out! Ed.

Oops...Picking Up The Front Peg

I have noticed both from some comments in CW and from conversations with other judges that the poorest understood irregularity at cribbage occurs when a player inadvertently picks up his front peg. There are three possibilities, the first two of which rarely cause any adjudication problems: 1) he pegs backward, in which case the pegs remain; 2) before releasing the peg, the player realizes his error, in which case he simply loses his last pegged score (in the terminology of the rule book, it becomes "peg in hand", i. e., the situation is no different from that of a player who has picked up the correct peg).

The third situation is where errors abound: the player places his peg where it would have gone had he picked up the correct peg and then releases his hand. In essence, this player has committed two offenses: he picked up the wrong peg and he mispegged. Once the logic of this is apparent, so is the rule: by picking up his front peg he forfeited his prior score; by placing the peg in a hole he was not at that very moment entitled to place it in, he has overpegged (even possibly a false claim of game, if he places the peg in the out hole) and shall be penalized accordingly. It is wrong to say, as has been said in these very pages, that because the player could have placed his (other) peg in the same hole that there is no penalty for overpegging. The fact is that by picking up his front peg, he instantly forfeited his right to place the peg in that hole, so by doing so, he has overpegged. Many judges and almost all players seem to feel that all of this is unfair and too harsh a penalty for such an inadvertent play, and they may be correct; however, the rules could scarcely be clearer as to the proper ruling.

David Warheit Livermore, CA

Warheit is a lawyer, and certainly has an argument for overpegging...but, if a player is at hole 100, scores 10 and places his front peg in hole 110 (inadvertently), has he, indeed, overpegged? If so, the penalty is doubled, according to Warheit's interpretation, as he loses the amount of his last peg (his back peg now becomes his front peg, and he rescores his 10 points from the back peg)...and his opponent is awarded the amount of overpeg. I don't think this is the intent of the "pegging with the front peg" rule. This should be clarified ASAP! Ed.
