New England Humming

Palmer, Caccia, Gombatz, Schmidt Score Wins

With the 1995 cribbage year rapidly coming to a close (July 31 completes pegging action for the year), the pace in the New England area is picking up! Several sizeable tournaments have been played the past two months, as players scramble for those coveted MRP's and national honors...and the many other intangible rewards.

Blackstone Valley, April 8-9: Harry Palmer, a Life Master from West Springfield, MA, is making a late-season run for MRP honors by taking the 154-pegger tourney. Another fine pegger, Henry DeLong, a Master pegger from Woburn, MA took 2nd. Romolo Piccanda (Mansfield MA) and Beverly Jones (Newburyport, MA) finished 3rd and 4th. Tom Scott, Fiskville, RI, nailed the 94-pegger Consolation. Linda Wood, Marlboro, MA scored the 9th 29-hand of the season and picked up \$100 from the ACC for this gem. Director Brian Heroux plans on renewing this event next April 14, 1996.

Ocean State Classic, May 7: Lou Caccia, a Master pegger from Newtonville, MA, has zipped over the 700 MRP mark for the year by winning the sizeable (196 peggers) Ocean State Classic. George Edge, W. Warwick, RI finished 2nd (and garnered 188 MRP's). Rookie Robert Medeiros, on an out-

standing run all season, has reached the 1,300 mark with a 3rd place finish...and is well within reach of earning a spot on the All-American team in his first season of organized pegging. Stan Tkaczuk, Wareham, MA, took 4th...and 172 MRP's. Paul Gallagher, a Master pegger from Avon, MA captured the 112-pegger Consolation. Author John Chambers managed this huge inaugural event in fine style and plans on a re-match next May 5, 1996.

Connecticut Championship, May 21:

Bob Gombatz, Raleigh, NC continues his torrid play this cribbage year and has roared into the 1,400 MRP stratosphere in winning the 118-pegger Connecticut Championship (after qualifying 6th). Susan Cousens, Windham, ME grabbed 2nd (and 109 MRP's). Cindy Veradt, Taunton, MA won the 74-pegger Consolation. Director Bill Shoemaker plans a rematch next May 19, 1996.

Tri-State Open, May 28: Life Master Phyllis Schmidt, Williamstown, MA, keeps her hat in the All-American race by winning the 68-pegger Tri-State Open, and reaching 1,000 MRP's for this cribbage year. Frank Corrada, E. Hartford, CT, finished 2nd. Joyce Vanelli, Quincy, MA took the 38-pegger Consolation. Director George Cote will play this match again next May 19.

The President's Column

Mick Elected to Hall of Fame

Congratulations to Robert "Mick" Michaelis, just elected as the 17th member of the ACC's Hall of Fame.

The Marinette, WI, flash well deserves the honor. He's a steady contender, sporting a Life Master One-Star award, and a credit to the grand ol' game.

According to Pat Barrett, chairman of the Hall of Fame balloting, Mick received 118 votes out of the 134 counted...an 88% approval.

A total of 234 ballots was mailed to Board members, tournament and Grass Roots directors, with 142 being voted (8 ineligible) for a disappointing 58% vote return. All I can say is everybody who was entitled to vote had their opportunity and we got a good cross-section representation nevertheless.

The other nominee on the ballot, Joe Seigle, drew some 67 votes...50%. A 75% nod is required for approval to the Hall of Fame. Better luck next time, Joe.

Assisting Barrett with the vote count were his brother, Mike, and Duaine Jacobs, all ACC Judges.

Mick joins 16 others who have previously been elected to the ACC Hall of Fame.

In 1982, Sir John Suckling, credited with inventing the game of cribbage in Norfolk County, England, was the first Hall of Famer. Others elected that year were Joseph Petrus Wergin, out first ACC President, of Madison, WI; the late Jim Arblaster, first ACC Secretary, Kissimmee, FL; the late Nick Pond, director of the National Open at Raleigh, NC.

The following year, 1983, in recognition of my sponsorship of the World Championship tournament at Quincy, CA, and fostering ACC growth in the West, I was so honored. By the way, next year will be the 25th Anniversary of

the World Championship and a BIG whoop-dedo is being planned. Don't miss it...the first weekend in May, 1996.

In 1985, we chose the late cribbage author G. Douglas Anderson of Halifax, Nova Scotia as the sixth Hall of Famer. Two more were admitted in 1987...Bob Madsen, our second secretary, of Niles, IL, and the late Rasty Rasmussen, Iowa state tournament director for many years, of Anamosa, IA.

In 1989, we elected three more: Nelson Ira Pendergast of Albany, NY, known for his efforts in promoting cribbage in VA hospitals; Syl Lulinski, longtime executive vice-president, of LaGrange Park, IL; and author, *Cribbage World* editor and Life Master One-Star DeLynn Colvert, Missoula, MT.

1990 saw two more ACC veterans elevated to the Hall of Fame: past-president Bob McCabe of Milwaukee, WI, and executive vice-president Scott Kooistra, of Yankton, SD.

In 1991, we elected Jerry Dickinson, Grass Roots Commissioner, of Mt. Horeb, WI, and Dale Munroe, former *Cribbage World* editor, of Collinsville, CT.

The last Hall of Famer elected in 1993 was Joan Rein, longtime scretary of the ACC, the first woman to receive the honor.

Come to the Grand National XIV at Plymouth, MA on September 22-24 to see Mick inducted. Our gallery of Hall of Fame pictures will be on display.

I've been out of tournament action recently, spending the entire month of May on a belated honeymoon in France, Germany, Switzerland and England. Stopped at many a pub, brauhaus and bistro, but didn't find any cribbage players during my travels.

Visited the National Portrait Gallery in London, where I found a portrait of Sir John Suckling. Ordered a copy for our archives, for which I expect Treasurer Fred McGibney to reimburse me 27-pounds 50-pence (about \$40). Any chance of writing off the whole trip for accomplishing that mission?

Railsback, Schweig, Adams **Hot In Central Region**

Hawkeye Classic, May 7: Newly crowned Grand Master Buzz Railsback, Syracuse, NE drove a few miles east and nailed the 117-pegger Hawkeye Classic, adding yet another feather in his cap. Jim Rein, Carver, MN, picked up some 109 MRP's in finishing 2nd...and is moving in on his Grand Master (needing but 400 more MRP's). Nebraskan William MacQuarrie took 3rd, and Life Master Jim McManus, Milwaukee, finished 4th, Joe Brown (Carol Stream, IL) won the 76-pegger Consolation. Gene Mikulsky scored his first ever 29-hand on Friday night...one day too soon for the ACC's \$100 for a sanctioned gem. And, another sad (?) story, director Larry Loupee scored an 18 GP Grand Slam in the Saturday Special, only to finish 2nd to Ray Warner's (Madison, WI) 22 GP Slam!

Potawatomi Peggers Pow Wow, May 14: It was ladies day in St. Joseph, MI on May 14 as Roberta Schweig, a newly crowned Master pegger from Illinois took the crown, with Lucille Simpson, Lewiston, NY taking 2nd...and knocking on the door for her Master rating (1,900+ MRP's). Jerry Gruber, a Grand Master from Minneapolis, took 3rd and is having a fine year on the boards, having scored 600+ MRP's this cribbage year. New member David Babcock, Jackson, MI, took 4th. Another member of the fair sex, Sue Schenk, Wyoming, MI, zipped to the 48-pegger Consolation title. Director Jeff Shimp plans on renewing this event next May 17-19, 1996.

Menominee Casino/MGM Open, June 4: Director Bob Miller and the regular MGM crew (Tom Gallagher and Jerry Lemke) organized a new event at the Menominee Casino, and some 154 peggers signed on for this inaugural. Four of the top peggers from the Central Region copped the main event: Grand Master Russell Adams (Minneapolis) won going away, followed by Master Doug Page (Appleton), Ken Rehm (Appleton), and Al Schaefer (Milwaukee). In finishing 4th, Schaefer has taken the MRP lead in the Central Region for this cribbage year...standing at a nifty 999! Green Bay's premier pegger, Willard Peters, captured the 94-pegger Consolation. Les Kvien, Waite Park, MN, is having a fine year, and by finishing 2nd, moves into the Central Region's top 10 (and has garnered some 750+ MRP's for the year).

On third street, his opponent scores big and takes the lead! But not to worry, his opponent takes a dive and McCabe re-gains the lead.

McCabe is dealing from 17 points, and his opponent needs 14 to win, with first count. Luck smiles on McCabe, as his opponent scores only 8 points, standing 6 short of winning. Now McCabe counts his hand and crib. Godawful! A 2-hand and a zip crib, and only one peg!

The final hand is dealt. McCabe is dealt an A-6-9-9-Q-K. Needing 14 to win, it looks grim. His opponent needs but 6! He discards the Q-K, and a 10 is cut! A 6-point hand! McCabe needs 8 pegs to win! He leads a 9. His opponent pairs the 9! What a break! McCabe quickly triples up for 6 pegs. His opponent plays a 3 for "30." McCabe's ace scores 2 for "31!" Wow! 8 pegs! A winner!!

His opponent is 4 from game, and holds two cards. McCabe holds a lone 6. You guessed it, he leads a 7, McCabe plays his 6...and his opponent plays an 8...for a run of 3 and a "go" for 4...and game!

Alas, into the Consolation sign-up line! But wait! McCabe qualified for the Consolation playoffs! Oops! He was bumped in the first round playoffs.

Back to work!

School Cribbage Humming

On April 20th, I received my 70th request for a manual on how to teach cribbage to classrooms of kids! This tells me that cribbage players are realizing the value of teaching our next generation this wonderful game, and that a youth movement is definitely on. If you are one of the several cribbers out there who has gone into the classroom, or organized a youth tournament, I encourage you to write up your experience and share it with fellow readers of *Cribbage World*.

Lately, I have had quite a few willing teachers contact me about equipment needs. For this, I have three possible solutions: 1) borrow equipment from your local grass roots club, 2) survey the group you are about to work with, you may be pleasantly surprised by how many of them have boards and cards they can bring from home, or 3) I have arranged a deal with a local craftsman, and he will make tournament style longboards with metal pegs (plastic ones tend to break off rather easily) for only \$10 a board plus \$1 per board for shipping and handling (minimum: 5 boards).

Cribadier General Update

On Jan. 15, I sent a letter to the BOD in which I announced my intention to resign as National Director of the Cribadier Generals Program, effective August 1, 1995. Since this announcement did not show up in the minutes of the BOD meeting in Reno, I should like this format to do so in order that everyone in the ACC membership knows.

In the four years since the late ACC Hall of Famer, Jim Arblaster, passed the Cribadier Generals Program on to me, some very good things have happened: 1) The CG Honor Roll to the program has increased by 116 members from 235 to 351; 2) when the CG Program was passed to me, the program had close to \$300. Today, the program is endowed with over \$1,100 thanks, to a large extent, to a very successful fundraiser, for which I am extremely grateful to all who participated in it, and to Emil Chrabaszcz, director of the Eastern States Championship, who has made a donation to the CG Program for the last three years and plans to do so again this year; 3) seven junior tournaments have been held and one new classroom cribbage program has started.

As this program passes from my direction, I look for bigger things to come especially in the classrooms of schools across the country. Dan Zeisler, a teacher in Sonora, CA, has shared his thoughts about teaching children to play cribbage in a couple of letters to CW, and has put together an excellent classroom lesson plan for teachers and non-teachers alike. Now that Dan has laid the groundwork for teaching cribbage in the classroom, I would encourage as many ACC members as possible to offer classroom instruction or start an after-school cribbage club. For as many benefits that we adults now enjoy in organized cribbage activities... tournaments, grass roots, awards, and recognition in a first-class publication ...teaching cribbage to children in the schools is the very least we can do to perpetuate the ACC and this great game in the family unit into the next generation.

In closing, I should like to thank Scott Kooistra for his cooperation and his very able representation of the CG Program during the ACC BOD meetings. I enjoyed working with Scott, a true gentleman of the highest order.

Finally, I would like to thank everyone who supported the CG Program during my tenure as National Director for your generous contributions and your volunteer efforts in the classroom and in the conduct of junior tournaments, May your cribbage days be many, enjoyable, and successful.





Friendly Game Rule?

My opponent was 8 holes out with back peg behind front peg. Opponent had the 8-count, picked up both pegs at the same time, put both pegs at the end of the board and claimed the game. Question was raised about picking up both pegs at the same time. Judge that saw the opponent pick up the pegs refused to judge. Two other judges ruled "This is a friendly game, your opponent won."

What is the official ruling? Also Rule VIII, Section 4a, should apply and judges should not refuse their services.

Gordon Brown Roseville, CA Gordon, you are certainly correct that this was a violation of the rules. Rule VIII, Sec. 4a (2): Removing both pegs, either to place in the starter holes or to retrieve personallyowned pegs, the player is considered to have falsely claimed the game.

However, over the years many players have become "sloppy" and, when a game is obvioulsy won, do stupid things such as your example. And judges hate to rule a false claim of game, when the game was clearly won. Nevertheless, I feel you have a strong case of inappropriate action taken by judges.

Everyone...be careful around the winner's hole! Ed.

New Scoring Format?

Playing ACC tournament cribbage for some 7 years now, I have come across players complaining once in a while about the scoring format. I have been tossing around an idea for quite sometime now, and would like to hear your feedback. I have shared my idea on score changing with many players now, and all have agrred to my plan. I would like to see the 3-point play stay in effect for skunks, as the 2point awards for wins. So what is my change? I really believe more people would come to enjoy the game more, if 1-point would be awarded to players who lose their games by 9 holes or less. All single digit losses would be awarded 1 point. This would provide the player (for example) the non-dealer, who may have played a near perfect game, who came up with 1-2-3 and a few more points short, to be given some type of reward. I see a great deal of frustration from players, who lose a game by 9 or 5 or less points. Players would feel better about their game if they lose a squeeker and yet still get to salvage something out of a tough loss.

The winner would still enjoy the 2 points earned. Look at a player who qualifies with a 28 (2 skunk sheet) compared to the player who did not qualify with a 27 point sheet and also lost 3, 4, 5, even 6 games by 9 or 5 holes or less. I've been giving you both scenarios (9 or 5) because I myself have not even decided on whether or not the losers should be given the 1 point if they lose by 5 or less, or 9 or less? At any rate, the max. limit would be 9 points, with the loser earning one game point.

With my way, this would also give some benefit to those players who may have lost a lot of opening cuts (with the non-dealer being at a nine point deficit). Losing a game by 15, 20, 25 points is acceptable. The player who lose by 5 or less are upset. And why discourage those individuals who lose a lot of close ones! In the end, the top 25% still would qualify...so I say, let's make losing a little more acceptable!

Tim, this is an interesting idea, but I feel that our present system of tie-breakers addresses rewarding close losses...as this minimizes your minus spread points (third tie-breaker). If it ain't broken...don't fix it! Ed.



Readers Say Four of a Kind is 12 Points!

Wava Stevens claimed 4 of a kind should be scored as 24 points (May CW). This has drawn a response from many readers as follows:

"...If the point values were as Stevens proposes then in actuality each pair will have been counted twice. There are exactly six distinct pairs within any four of a kind, hence the 12-point value...Which reminds me, I have seen license plate 5-5555 in Laramie, WY...which would have to be scored as 40 points!" "4 of a kind should only be 12 points. The basics show a pair is 2 points. That means 3 of a kind is 6 points (3 pairs). 4 of a kind is 12 points because there are 6 pairs." Rodney Campoviano, Lincoln, RI.

With one short month to play in the American Cribbage Congress's 1995 season, the annual Master Point race is up for grabs. In one of the most heated races in the ACC's history, some 25 (or more) players have a shot at taking the national title.

Bob Gombatz, Raleigh, NC, travelled north to Connecticut and took their annual champion-ship on May 21, and has taken a slight MRP lead nationally (1,375). In his first year of organized pegging, Robert Medeiros, Quincy, MA, has zipped to the 1,300 mark...and took a nifty 3rd place May 7 in Pawtucket, RI's Ocean State Classic (196 peggers). Stephen Reynolds, Concord, CA, is nipping at the leader's heels, standing at 1,247.

From that point on, the race is really up for grabs. In the Eastern Region, George Bickford (1,106), Larry Samet (1,085), David Clemmey (1,061), Rit Alkas (1,028), and Brian Heroux (1,021) have all topped the 1,000 mark. Harry Palmer has made a big move upwards lately,

and this Life Master remains in the hunt. Another Life Master...Phyllis Schmidt..won the Tri-State Open May 28 and is near the 1,000 mark. Ed Horigan and Robert Drukman have topped 900 MRP's.

Out west, **DeLynn Colvert**, **Paul Hatcher**, and **Greg Schleusner** have outside chances of making the top ten.

In the Central Region, Alan Schaefer, has zipped into the lead in that region with 999 MRP's. Defending National Champion Bob Julian is at the 900 mark, as is Deb Schisel and Patrick Barrett. Doug Page, Kenneth Capodagli, and newly inducted Hall of Famer Robert "Mick" Michaelis have cracked the 800 mark.
