# **Gerard Charette Tops New England Inaugural**

August 1 began the American Cribbage Congress's 17th season, and Gerard Charette, Cumberland, RI, topped the first event played in the Eastern Region this new year...the New England Inaugural.

Some 158 peggers were in attendance, and many seasoned players began the new season scoring bundles of MRP's. Grand Master Emil Chrabaszcz (Ware, MA) qualified 10th and finished 2nd to begin the new season as one of the National MRP leaders. Grand Master David Clemmey (Mansfield, MA) is also off and running with a 3rd place finish (qualified 7th). Both players scored a total of 182 MRP's.

Marge Kennedy, playing out of Riverside, RI, finished 4th.

Ken Patenaude, Cumberland, RI, had the hot hand in leading the qualifying round. 1995 National Champion Rit Alkas qualified 4th, and finished 14th to begin the season where he left off last year...scoring MRP's at every stop (this time an even 100).

Phil Martin (E. Hartford, CT) topped 92 peggers in the Consolation event. Charles Burgess, Jr. (E. Greenwich, RI), James Cundy

(W. Warwick, RI), and Gloria Dyndur (Woonsocket, RI) finished 2-3-4.

Marion Quackenbush, Lawrenceville, PA, qualified 14th and finished 7th, picking up 131 MRP's...and her Master rating...the first of the 1996 season!

Joyce Vanelli, Quincy, MA, and Bruce Corson, Hobe Sound, FL scored that rare 28-hand in sanctioned play.

Lee Norris, with help from Charles Burgess and Ford Jewer, once again conducted a well-run event...and the 1996 season is off and running!

# Al Schaefer Tops 201 In Wisconsin

Al Schaefer finished the 1995 season with 999 MRP's...and earned a spot on the All-Central Regional team. And with the new cribbage year barely a month old Schaefer has roared out of the blocks and taken the National MRP lead by winning the huge Wisconsin Dells Classic. First place earned some \$1,500 and 220 MRP's!

Ed Ristom, a Texan from El Paso has been seen nationwide on the boards...and this time around he finished 2nd...his highest finish ever! The 207 MRP's and the cool \$1,000 also place Ristom at the head of the pack in the early going. Rich Hefty and Harry Langman, two Wisconsin peggers, finished 3rd and 4th, earning sizeable purses and MRP's.

Norbert Kneich nailed the Yankton Classic and continues his winning ways by putting together a great 38 19 +339 qualifying card to take honors.

Frank Danielski, the Appleton "Bomber" continues to pile up the MRP's as this Master pegger took the 130-pegger Consolation. Ray Hansen (Des Moines, IA), Emil Lubinski (Brooklyn Park, MN), and Kevin Bremmer (Wisconsin Rapids, WI) finished 2-3-4.

In the Main event finals, Schaefer topped Ristom 4-2 in the best of 7. Al led 3-2 when Ed, needing 23 points with first count to win, held a 4-4-5-5. A queen was cut to end the match. Schaefer proclaimed this was his "First big tournament win" and now he will be forced to go to the Grand National, as he had told friends he wouldn't go unless he won the Dells Classic.

# Western Region Wrapup

The 1996 season is off and running and the Western Region is setting a fast pace, with numerous tournaments being played in August, September, and October. 1996 may prove to be yet another banner year for the American Cribbage Congress.

Chief Solano, Fairfield, CA, Aug. 12: Anne Sheeran (Pittsburg, CA) came away the winner in this 40-pegger event, edging Robert Christopher (Oakland, CA) in the final playoff match. Al Wigger (Cupertino, CA) and Truey Miller (Fremont, CA) finished 3rd and 4th.

Redmond Senior Center Benefit, Redmond, OR, Aug. 20: Some 84 peggers played for the title and Master Jack Holt (Portland, OR), on a roll lately, nailed the win. Dean Link (Corvallis, OR), Ike Endicott (Bend. OR), and Diane Harvey (Albany, OR) finished 2-3-4. Grand Master Roy Hofbauer (Washougal, WA) won the 56-pegger Consolation. Clair Morse (Bend, OR), One-Star Jesse Jarrell (Pittsburg, CA), and Wendell Rush (Baker City, OR) finshed 2nd, 3rd and 4th. Ray Lebow, Bend, OR, scored a great 40 19 +284 in the Main qualifying round. The satellites: Timepasser; Lucille Endicott (OR), Doubles; B. Sauersessig & P. True (WA); High Rollers; Dean Link (OR), Saturday Night; Paul Calhoun (OR). The Senior Center received some \$1,320 from sales and charities.

7th Annual Redwood Classic, Santa Rosa, CA, Aug. 27: A sizeable crowd of 104 peggers played this event and Clyde Ross, a Master pegger from Grass Valley, CA took home the marbles. Three other Californians finshed 2-3-4: Charles Sladek, Len Goldman, and Annett Eiffert. Amelee Killion, San Luis Obispo, CA took the 64-pegger Consolation. Mel Ashley, Marina, CA, finished 2nd. Mac McGuigan, Concord, CA took qualifying honors. Director Joe Schalich plans on renewing this event again next August.

Blue Mountain Open, LaGrande, OR, Sept. 10: Newly-crowned Grand Master Ken Cochlin, Kennewick, WA won this event in 1994...and repeats in 1995 to begin the season on a high note. Paul Nolz, Redmond, OR, finished 2nd. Master Bernie Nelson, Pacific City, OR is nearing his Grand Master with a 3rd place finish. And George Rasmussen, Chehalis, WA is nearly at the 2,000 mark for

his Master's by taking 4th. Keith Forrest, a Master pegger from Montana nailed 6 skunks enroute to a high-qualifying score of 38 GP's. Betty Johnson, (Spokane, WA) fresh from scoring the season's first 29-hand, is on a streak by taking the 69-pegger Consolation. John Thibodeau, Elgin, OR, finished 2nd, followed by tournament co-director Ralph Reynolds in 3rd, and Sean Daniels, Imbler, OR, in 4th (Daniels is the pegger listed in the Guinness Book of Records for scoring five 29-hands (see page 2). The satellites: High Roller: Greg Van Metre (OR), Doubles; Lee Gandy & Sean Daniels (OR); Saturday Night; Eva Moritzky (WA) (husband Jack took 2nd to hog all the Q prizes). Cry baby; Jan Williamson (OR).

First Annual Lake Tahoe Challenge, Kings Beach, CA, Sept. 10: Plumas Stokes had his weekend as he not only scored the ACC's third 29-hand of the season, but with this added boost, went on and captured the title in this 77-pegger inaugural. Ted Pilecki, a newcomer from Martinez, CA, has only been playing since last July, but he roared to a 2nd place finish...aided by a 28-hand! Mike Wiley, Antioch, CA, took 3rd, followed by Brian Riches from Reno. Riches was also the high qualifier. Howard Fraga, Windsor, CA, nailed the Consolation and Jason Shumate, Kings Beach, CA, the 18-year-old son of co-director Jack Shumate, took 2nd. 3rd and 4th went to Les DuBose (Alturas, CA) and Adrian Levy (Lafayette, CA). The satellites: Friday Doubles; Dorothy & Nick Maximov (CA); High Rollers; Chris Quigley (CA); Tahoe Basin Open (Sunday); Sundae Webb-Wiley (CA). This event was played at the handsome N. Tahoe Recreation Center, and directors John Hassenplug and Jack Shumate are off with a well-run tourney in this inaugural event. The players took home beautiful redwood burl cribbage boards as trophies made by Clyde Ross of Alta Sierra, CA. Jones Hom (CA) and Jack Shumate scored 28-hands (in addition to the one scored by Pilecki). Life Master One-Star Jesse Jarrell provided a colorful microphone as he once again MC'd the event. The Concord "4th Street Terrorists" scored in event after event ... and their club members lived up to their name! Directors Hassenplug and Shumate were pleased with this first event in Lake Tahoe, and are planning a re-match again next September. Mark your calendars.

Robert "Mick" Michaelis was elected into the Cribbage Hall of Fame in the spring of 1995. This Marinette, Wisconsin pegger has earned well over 10,000 Master Rating Points and has earned his Life Master, One-Star. With consistent, year-in, year-out high finishes, he has earned All-American honors seven times, and is currently ranked 2nd (lifetime) in the American Cribbage Congress. In addition to his excellence on the boards, he has been a long-time tournament director of sanctioned events, having hosted his Tri-Cities Open in Marinette. He has also served ably on the ACC's Board of Directors. His sportsmanship is outstanding, win or lose...and the honor of being elected to the Cribbage Hall of Fame is well deserved.

### New "19" Game?

We base our hopes on the cut card each hand, so why not take a chance on getting a dead hand and scoring 19 as a result. How often would the cut card be something that would ruin the chance for the dead hand, and the player would end up with a run of 3 or 15-2, instead of 19? It's a chance to take, just like going for a 29 hand. Comments?

On the other hand, it may be a pleasant variation...and would certainly be a hilarious game! I should get my pals to play me a few games....lord knows, I get way more than my share of those "19" hands (just kidding!). Ed.

#### **Quiz Detailed**

Cedric Larson's quiz (Aug. CW) caught my eye. I used Discard Query option of Cribbage Master to determine which of the 13 blank holdings has the best potential for scoring. The true answer depends on what two cards were tossed to the crib since neither of those cards can be turned as the starter. For each of the deals I assumed that you tossed two kings to the crib. (In no instance, however, would that be a good toss if you were striving to maximize the score for your hand.) Cribbage Master agrees with Cedric: the 5-2-3-6 is the best of the hands with an average of 4.30 and the 5-A-2-4 is second best with 3.91. The worst two are 5-2-7-9 and 5-3-8-9 with 3.04 and 3.09, respectively. All results are summarized:

5-A-2-4 = 3.91 5-A-2-6 = 3.70 5-A-3-8 = 3.13 5-A-4-7 = 3.78 5-A-4-8 = 3.74 5-2-3-6 = 4.30 5-2-3-9 = 3.65 5-2-4-7 = 3.43 5-2-7-9 = 3.04 5-3-6-8 = 3.35 5-3-8-9 = 3.09 5-4-7-9 = 3.17 5-4-8-9 = 3.39

By the way, ACBL bridge tournaments have something like Peer Tournaments. These events are called "Flighted" events. Normally there are three flights of approximately equal size. The "A" flight has the highest-ranked players, the "B" flight is in the middle, and the "C" flight is the lowest level. Usually, "A" is 750+ master points, "B" is 300-749, and "C" is 0-300. There are also "Stratified" events. These are ones in which all strats (A, B, C) play three sets of winners. More master points are given for placing in "A" than "B," and master points for "B" are more than "C". In stratified events a "C" who does well can place in "B". A "B" who does well can place in "A."

In regards to Wava Stevens "interesting" viewpoint: 3 of a kind = 6 points is a derived count; it is worth six because it contains 3 unique pairs! Keeping that inmind, and recognizing that Wava's 4 sixes must be in one hand in order to be counted as four of a kind, I'll answer her little quiz:

6H, 6D, 6S, = 6 (Yes, 6)

6H, 6D, 6C = 6 (No, H/D pair was counted already) 6H 6S, 6C = 6 (No, H/S & H/C previously counted) 6D, 6S, 6C = 6 (No, all three pairs counted before)

Wava's viewpoint would suggest that a 5 card run should count as 9, because:

9,T,J = 3 (yes or no), T, J, Q = 3 (yes or no), J, Q. K = 3 (yes or no), and 3+3+3=9.

Kind of silly, isn't it? (Although I'd like to get a J5555 for 41!)
