Independence Day Open Draws 314

Clyde Ross **Takes Honors** In Reno

Clyde Ross, playing out of Grass Valley, CA, zipped to the championship at the recent Independence Day Open in Reno. Summer in Reno is "cribbage time" for Ross...as he also won the 1993 Reno July match. Ross took home \$1,800 and 287 MRP's in besting the crowd of 314 peggers. In addition to his pegging skills, Ross also makes exquisite cribbage boards, many of which have been given as trophies at recent tournaments.

Another pegger who does well in Reno in July is Otmar Borchard, Scio, Oregon. This time around he took home 2nd money. In 1991 he nailed the 200-pegger Consolation event.

Jack Brown was a long way from his Annandale, VA home, but he paid for his trip with a nice 3rd place finish. Walter Olsen, Atascadero, CA, took home 4th place.

Dale Kochenburg (CA) took honors in the qualifying round with a nice 38 (17) +294...and a sizeable "O' prize.

The Consolation drew a huge crowd (214) and rookie Barry Rabson, Laguna Hills, CA, came away the winner in his first sanctioned event. Kathleen Hahn. 1,520

Medford, OR, came close, but had to settle for 2nd. Grand Master Syl Lulinski, LaGrange Park, IL, finished 3rd and is at the 800 MRP mark for this cribbage year. George Petievich, Nevada City, CA, took 4th. Petievich is a newly crowned Master pegger.

A bevy of top-ranked players from throughout the USA were on hand for this match as the 1996 cribbage season is winding down and those coveted MRP's are being chased by the frontrunners. Only Jeff Monroe (CA)(11-12th), Darren Black (OR)(17-32), and Syl Lulinski (IL) could break through and score sizeable amounts, keeping the MRP race up for grabs.

Directing a Tournament

There are some 300, more or less, men (and women) out there in cribbage-land to whom the American Cribbage Congress owe a big round of thanks.

These are the volunteer directors of the ACC-sanctioned tournaments you-all participate in over 12 months of the year, as well as the directors of the various Grass Roots clubs scattered throughout the U.S.

Without their interest and dedication to the grand ol' game, we wouldn't enjoy the camaraderie and friendly competition of structured tournament play and/or local club involvement.

Somebody has to do it, somebody has to take the lead in organizing a tournament or directing a club, tending to the nitty-gritty that is required to present a successful, on-going program.

First, a proper playing venue must be found...hopefully at no cost, but these deals are fast disappearing. Next, submit a sanctioning application to your Regional Tournament Commissioner to qualify your date. Then, a mailing list must be compiled...using names and addresses available from Membership Secretary Jeff Monroe on an area, national or statewide basis; a printed piece, flyer or brochure must be prepared, covering all vital information (including motel/hotel info); address labels must be attached and the finished product handed over to the Post Office for what we assume is reliable delivery.

Meanwhile, out-of-pocket costs mount ...acquire cribbage boards; buy (or beg) playing cards; provide scorecards; arrange for early AM coffee and donuts, catered lunches and dinners (if required by lack of other facilities); line up assistants and helpers to register participants, cross-check scorecards, maintaining scoring records and verify the top 25% of players for the play-off seeding charts.

ACC mandates an 85% payback on the main and consolation tournaments. With the payback percentage limitations in effect, it's up to the director to spread the dollars in an equitable manner among the winning players. Grass Roots clubs have their own individual arrangement for prize funding, depending on their expenses of operation.

Obviously, to enhance a tournament, additional competition and opportunity for more prize

winning are added...Q Pools, partnerships and team options, special "24" awards and other innovations. And in Grass Roots play, there's recognition for "Grand Slams" and even for that depressing "String of Pearls."

It's not finished when the tournament or regular club play is finished...there's still the report to be completed and sent to the Tournament Commissioner or Grass Roots Regional Statistician.

And it's still not over...all the equipment and supplies must be stored away until the next event.

Many times we've heard players bitching about the amount of payback. We hear rumbles that the directors are making a bundle out of the operation. We challenge both of these statements.

Hidden expenses that the players never know about can eat into the available prize-purse. Hall rental is becoming more and more of an expense item that must be accomodated. Many tournaments get free use of hotel public rooms, depending on rental of a certain number of rooms or contracting for a meal or two. However, we know of several that are forced to pay \$800 and \$1,200 per day for Fairground facilities, the only adequate space in the community. It's pretty hard to spread that kind of outlay over 200-300 players...figuring to about \$4-\$10 each.

Take our recent Arizona Roadrunner tournament, for example. As an experiment, we took 15% off the top on all events...Main, Q-Pool, Consolation, Friday Early Bird, Saturday Special, and the Last Chance. As a result, we came out \$300 in the hole, exactly the amount of the Elks Hall rental! And we still heard gripes about the prize paybacks. Next year, we're going to have to figure out how to recoup our loss and still break even.

Give the directors a break...they're doing it because of their love for the game. Quit complaining about money-grubing tournament directors and Grass Roots leaders; nobody's making a fortune for all their work.

Finally, if you have to cancel out of a tournament at the last minute, please call and notify the director. It's only common courtesy. Show your appreciation...express your thanks for a well-run tournament, and offer to help your Grass Roots Director.



Helen Railsback, the Nebraska Queen of Cribbage, qualified 33rd, and rolled on to a 16th place at the Reno match, picking up 178 MRP's...and the ACC's 63rd Grand Master award. Railsback is a very competitive pegger and is noted for her controversial extra large"six-shooter" pegs.

Her husband, Buzz, is also a Grand Master, and this veteran pair are seen far and wide on the cribbage trail.

Record 1,520 Grass Rooters Play National Tournament Mark Liebermann Cops Title By Winning 17 of 18

Mark Liebermann, playing out of Club 100 (Napa, CA), posted a great 38 (17/18) +300 to top a record field of 1,520 peggers in the recent National Grass Roots Tournament. This 76-year old pegger resides at the Veteran's Home in Yountville, CA and according to National GR Commissioner Eugene Mikulsky, he was one happy camper! He made several calls to Mikulsky to see if he was still in first place. The win came with a \$500 prize and another \$25 for the afternoon 9/9 Grand Slam. (His score card is reproduced to the right).

Jesse Jarrell, Pittsburg, CA, scored a 35 GP card, winning 16 of 18 games for 2nd place and \$400. Jarrell (Club 54) is one of five ACC One-Star players and continues his winning ways.

James Bouschor (Club 80), Juneau, AK nailed 3rd by winning 15 games (34 GP's) and took home \$300 for the 3rd place finish. Harold Davis (Club 219), Colebrook, NH, also won 15 games (32 GP's) and won \$200 for finishing 4th. Alta Roberts (Club 96), Rapid City, SD, scored 32 (14) and won \$100 for the 5th place finish.

Eleven players scored 31 GP's and received \$75. The are: Al Libby (111), Quincy, CA; Karl Bremmer (120), Wisconsin Rapids, WI; Tom Larson (67), Parkway Valley, MN; Ken Richmond (77), Gresham, OR; Donald McIntee (53), Mesa, AZ; Lea Hornbeck (28), Portland, OR; Bruce Pearce (223), Yreka, CA; Walt Conell (25), Helena, MT; Bob Gillete (100), Napa, CA; Dave Clemmey (81), Mansfield, MA; and Edgar Bastedo (24), Mesa, AZ.

Ron Hirschman, Sr. (6), Milwaukee, WI scored the only 29 hand. There were 15 28 hands scored and 5 Grand Slams were posted.

295 players shared in the prize money. 393 players received Grass Roots Rating Points, and players from 111 clubs participated in the largest cribbage tournament ever played! Tournaments were held in 81 cities throughout the United States. Green Bay, WI Club 61 fielded 50 players to lead the nation. Madison, WI (1) and Parkway Valley, MN (67) had 30 participants. This year's event topped the 1995 edition by 99 players.

John McCready Takes Hockomock

John McCready, surviving a scare in the 5-8 round, wenton to claim the 106-pegger Hockomock Classic played in Foxboro, MA June 23. His final match with John Brennan (Milton, MA) was a close one, but McCready (Revere, MA) prevailed 3-2. He survived his 5-8 match, being down 0-2 to Frank Reddy (Winthrop, MA), but came back with three wins to advance.

The 3rd and 4th place playoffs had a unique match as Sharlene Medeiros was matched with husband Bill Medeiros, a tough-pegging duo from Shrewsbury, MA. This time around, Bill prevailed. However, Sharlene picked up 100 MRP's for qualifying 12th and finishing 4th, and has topped the 900 mark for the year, giving her a shot at playing for the Eastern Region's All-Star team in Reno next January.

Charles Rapoza, Brockton, MA, had the hot hand in the qualifying round to take honors.

George Bickford, W. Springfield, MA, came from nowhere in the final Consolation match to nip Irving Torrey, Mansfield, MA, for the 66-pegger title. Bickford scored three consecutive huge hands to win at the wire. Al Dinwoodie (CT) and Sue Turcotte (RI) finished 3rd and 4th.

Director David Clemmey will schedule this match once again next June 22, 1997.

Frank Corrado Wins Granite State High Roller

Al Miller runs a unique "High Roller" format for his annual Granite State Classic. A \$100 entry and best 4 of 7 (double elimination) matches makes each game a little more tense. This time around, Frank Corrado, E. Hartford, CT, came away the winner. Two weeks earlier, Richard West (Attleboro, MA) had won the Connecticut Championship, and came close once again, but had to settle for 2nd. Paul Cormier (Marlboro, MA) took 3rd, followed by Lucille Simpson (Lewiston, NY) in 4th.

George Webb (Halifax, MA) nailed the 32-pegger Consolation, edging Brain Heroux (Woonsocket, RI) for the title. Heroux picked up only 21 MRP's, but he is in a heated race for honors this cribbage year and every MRP counts! Bob Gombatz (Raleigh, NC) finished 3rd (after qualifying 1st) and scored some 19 MRP's to keep pace with Heroux. Cindy Veradt (MA) finished 4th.

Madison Masters Classic XVIII Tom Maresh Tops 131

Racine's Tom Maresh, after qualifying 4th, continued on and claimed one of the oldest running tournaments in the USA...the 18th Madison Masters Classic. In the 17th edition of this match, Maresh finished 2nd. Being one year older and a little bit wiser paid off with the championship.

John Syftestad (WI) finished 2nd in this huge match and picked up 170 MRP's (after qualifying 3rd). Andrew Veith (WVA) nailed 3rd, followed by Ray Hansen (IA) in 4th.

Jerry Gruber, Minneapolis, took highqualifying honors with a 33 GP card, attesting to the bevy of slick peggers attending this match.

Rosemary Daun (WI) has been close to winning a sanctioned event and she finally prevailed by winning the 76-pegger Consolation. She edged Sylvia Swett (IL) for the title. Two BOD members finished 3rd and 4th...Jeff Shimp (MI) and Jerry Dickinson (WI).

And in an unusual finish, Monica Marchand, another local pegger, qualified 2nd...and finished 2nd.

Maurina Boughton (Rochester) edged Hal Mueller, a pegger from Canada for 3rd place. Mueller finished 4th.

Local Norm Boughton nipped Joe Angelo (Buffalo, NY) for the Consolation win. Director Jack Marchand keeps 'em pegging in NY!

Mickey Budin Wants To Know What's Going On Here?

Mickey Budin is a new ACC member from Bloomfield, CT, and he has been baffled by CW's abbreviations, such as "MRP's," "GP's," "38 18 +243." etc.

CW apologizes to Mickey (and our other new members) for this "gobbledegook."

An explanation:

MRP's: Master Rating Points (these points are scored in sanctioned events. The top 1 in 8 will score points in the qualifying round and playoff round. The Main Event and Consolation award points. For example, in an 80-player tournament, 10 players will earn MRP's...in the qualifying round and the playoffs. The Consolation awards points in the same manner, but in lesser amounts. A MRP chart should be available for all players at a sanctioned tournament.

GP's: Game Points. ACC scoring awards 2 Game Points for a win, and 3 Game Points for a skunk win. Scoring also entails marking down your Spread Points...the points you win or lose by.

38 18 + 243: This abbreviation indicates that a player had scored 38 Game Points, had won 18 games (of a typical 22 game qualifying round) and his total Spread Points were +243.

The American Cribbage Congress has an awards system:

Master: 2,000 MRP's (lifetime) Grand Master: 4,000 (lifetime) Life Master: 6,000 (lifetime)

One-Star: 10,000; Two-Stars: 15,000; Three-

Stars: 20,000, etc.

Every cribbage year (August 1 thru July 31) a tally is made of player's MRP's earned and the top ten are named to the All-American Team.

In addition, any 29-hand scored in a sanctioned event will receive \$100 from the ACC (Main or Consolation).

And, of course, your \$10 membership covers Cribbage World magazine, maintaining a running talley of your MRP's (lifetime and yearly), and a membership card (complete with your membership number and your MRP's at the end of the latest cribbage year).

The ACC also sponsors a Grass Roots program, complete with another rating system. Check with your local director for information about this program.

\$10,000 Reno Winner Rolling...Again!

Bruce Wridge Nails Spokane Open

Bruce Wridge, the ACC's grand prize winner (\$10,000) in Reno this February still has his touch. He won the recent Greater Spokane Valley Open...and another \$800!

His final match was with the nation's MRP leader, Bob Julian (WI). Julian, in taking 2nd, tacked on another 100 MRP's to his nation-leading talley, and has zipped to some 1,627 (unofficial) points for the year and is in the "catbird's seat" for yet another national championship.

Clyde Ross (CA) had a fine tourney as he came in 3rd...and also won the High Roller event to more than pay for his trip from Grass Valley. Tim Clemenson, a local pegger playing in his first sanctioned event, nailed 4th.

The 96 peggers were mostly veteran peggers, however, and Tom Lingenfelter (MT) scored the high qualifying card with only 33 (16) +74...a score indicating the overall skill in the field.

Jim Hornbacher (WA) has been trying to shake his "bridesmaid" image...and he succeeded in grand style as he won the 62-pegger Consolation going away, nailing Todd Malmgren 3-0 in the final match. Malmgren is a newly crowned Master from Clackamas, OR. Jim Gogolin (OR) is steadily pegging his way to a fine season by finishing 3rd and is nearing the 700 MRP mark for this season. Roger Lueschow (WA) is nearing his Master rating by taking 4th.

Jack Moritzky (WA) kicked off the weekend by taking the Time Passer with a grand slam 7/7 16. Bruce Gentry (WA) teamed with Jim Gogolin to take the doubles. Richard Larson (OR) won the Saturday Special, and Margaret Pagliaro (co-director) won the Last Chance.

Carol Mullerlerle, Sandra Pagliaro, Louis Pagliaro, Don Bain, and Margaret Pagliaro all worked hard in administering a well-run tourney...and the host Eagles club served reasonable meals and drinks.

Michaelis 4 For 9 In South Dakota

Players from 17 states attending the 9th Annual Lewis & Clark Open in Yankton, South Dakota were treated to a cribbage rarity. Mick Michaelis, a One-Star Hall of Famer from Marinette, WI, won for the fourth time (of the 9 played). And with the win came a nice \$2,000 and 180 MRP's. His 1996 totals are well over 1,000 and gives him a shot at his 8th All-American award. Never has a player dominated a tournament such as this in the history of the ACC. His road to the championship was a tough one, as he had matches with One-Star Scott Kooistra (Yankton), Life Master Duane Toll (WI), and the streaking Sue Edwards (CO).

His last match with Toll was a close one, but Michaelis prevailed 3-2. Toll, nevertheless, took home \$1,300 for 2nd...and with other winnings, had a \$2,000 weekend.

Jim Rein, Carver, MN, finished 3rd, and is within reach of the top ten in his Central Region for this cribbage year. He pocketed some \$900 for this effort. Sue Edwards, Denver, CO, is also continuing a stellar season with a 4th place finish. Her 2nd at the huge ACC Open in Reno in February, combined with the 150 MRP's earned in Yankton will certainly give her a shot as "Rookie of the Year."

Jiggs Hebberecht (SD) soared to a 38 (17) +239 to easily take qualifying honors in this 172-pegger event.

Shad Breeling, Omaha, NE. nailed the Saturday night game, propelling him to a tie with Earl Fox, Spring Lake, MN, in the All-Events competition. Both players posted 61 GP's in the 40-game match.

Luis DuPuis, Aurora, CO, nailed the ACC's 18th 29-hand of this cribbage season...and sets a new season record for 29's. 17 29's were scored in 1991 and 1993. DuPuis will receive a cool \$100 from the ACC for this gem.

Players came from far and wide to participate in this 9th annual event. His paybacks were excellent and *prominently posted before play*. Grass Roots Winds Down 1995-1996 Season

Grass Roots Statistician Joe Ramos has compiled end-of-season statistics for the Grass Roots Program (1995-1996 Season). The following pages list the accomplishments of our ACC peggers. Club Champions are listed, Life Time Grass Roots Points, and Divisional Standings.

Ramos reports that some 3,681 players enjoyed playing this past season (a new record), with 31 states have active clubs. California leads the way with 29 clubs, followed by Oregon with 16.

Club 29 from Englewood, Florida, directed by Paul Howard, has the most members with 85. Club 61, directed by Eugene and Aggie Mikulsky, have the highest average players per night with 57.

Season highlights: 58 players reached the Bronze Level (1,000 rating points). 30 players scored that elusive 29 hand. 168 Grand Slams were recorded (winning all 9 games in one session) and a whopping 355 28 hands were scored.. Joe extends congratulations to all award winners.

Gallagher Tops Villager

Paul Gallagher, Avon, MA, nailed the 98-pegger Villager Open on June 9. The event was played at the beautiful "Sturbridge Isle" in Sturbridge, MA. His final match pitted him with Bill Cooper, Marlboro, MA. Elinor Breen (Avon, MA) finished 3rd, followed by the streaking Dick West (Attelboro, MA) in 4th.

Robert Gillete (And Others) Register Complaints

Cribbage World routinely receives mail from ACC members complaining about tournament paybacks, and a recent letter from Robert Gillete, Rodeo, CA deserves comment.

A few tournaments every year publish misleading flyers, insofar as their paybacks are concerned. This, of course, causes hard feeling from the players as they feel they have been "conned" into participating.

Tournament Directors should publish forthright and honest statements concerning their tournaments. Statements like" \$1,000 added" mean very little unless they are specific. Added to what? "100% payback minus expenses" is another statement that means very little...or how about "100% payback, cash and trophies." How much are the trophies? "Lunch included." How much is the lunch? In short, be specific

about your paybacks and your expenses. And if you are running a tourney that benefits a charity, spell out the charity and the amount that will be deducted

We all know that sanctioning a tournament entails a lot of work, and many expenses. But misleading flyers, and less than advertised paybacks certainly leave bad feelings among our players.

In summary, be as honest and forthright as possible with your tournament information, In the long run, you will earn the player's respect...and they will return again next year!

Remember, the ACC requires at least 85% be paid back to players in player's benefits (unless specified as a charity). Let's keep the ACC humming...be honest with the players!

Discarding Tips

George "Ras" Rasmussen

Does it seem that two cards to your opponent's crib have greater value than the same cards to your own crib? Some blame the "cribbage gods" and others attribute this to Murphy's Law. "I don't get any cuts" may be another explanation. Beyond those possibilities, a pattern emerges which suggests that any discard choice produces more points on the other side of the board. Is it possible that the tendency to "salt" your own crib and "balk" your opponent's crib is the major contributor to this imbalance? Discarding bias skews mathematical probability and random possibilities in the composition of the crib. Although this influence is apparent in the value of all discard choices, it is most apparent with the 8-8 discard option. Let's take a look at what happens when this identical pair is placed on opposite sides of the board:

Note that I have recorded 1,271 discards of the 8-8 to my own crib. My opponent has been the recipient of this pair in 182 recorded instances. By the way, I am not planning on throwing this pair more frequently to increase the recorded data base. Perhaps you can do this for me and tell me the results!

This pair looks very similar in the 3-7 column and the 8-11 category. Note that the 8-8 to your own crib produces 7 points or less nearly 80% of the time. Note that this pair to your own crib tallies 2 points 27.3% of the time while your opponent will score 2 points 14.3% of the time (approx. 1 of 4 to your own crib, and 1 of 7 to your opponent's crib). In the 12-16 point category, approx. 1 in 10 cribs are reflected for the dealer and 1 in 4 show up in this column for your opponent. And in the 20+ column, the pair of 8's is nearly 10 times more likely to benefit the opponent's crib. Some discards to pone's crib produce a moan. This is a double-moan discard!

Why does this pair fail in so many instances to your own crib? Of the 46 discard possibilities which average less than 5 points, 33 do not benefit this pair (10-K, 9-K, 6-K, 6-Q, 9-Q, A-Q, 6-10, A-K, 4-K, A-9, 3-K, 4-Q, 6-J, 2-K, 4-9, Q-K, 2-9, A-10, 3-Q, 4-10, 2-10, 2-Q, 3-10, 10-Q, J-K, 2-J, 3-J, 2-6, 3-6, 9-J, A-J, A-3 and 4-6). So perhaps a blessing from the "cribbage god" is what makes this crib since not much seems to on the dealer's side of the board. Better go for the "lucky cut!"

MRP Debate Continues

(Reference Monroe's June CW letter.)
Jeff asked the question concerning the new MRP system, "Fairer to Whom?" Here is a situation that happens with the present MRP system: Player A is in a 216-player torunament and qualifies 54th (last qualifier). He wins two matches and finishes in the 9-16 group and receives 121 MRP's. Player B is in a 80-player match and qualifies 20th (last qualifier). Player B wins 5 matches and wins the tournament! Player B receives 87 MRP's. IS THIS FAIR?!

Under the new system player A would receive less points (50), and player B would receive more (180). As anyone can see, the present MRP system is slanted toward the number of players and the new system is designed around performance. Performance based awarding of Master Points is the only FAIR way for everyone in the ACC.

It is my understanding that the recommendation of giving some MRP's to everyone that qualifies and is eliminated in the first round be dropped from the new system. I think this is something that should stay, whether it be 1,5 or 10 points. Pick a number, but to get zero is absurd.

The other area of concern that I have with the present system is that of qualifying points. My suggestion is give the number of qualifying points it takes to qualify to all qualifiers. To make it a fair playing field, 22-game qualifiers get actual number of points; 20-game qualifiers get number of points times 1.1; and 12-game qualifiers get points times 1.83. This would eliminate all qualifying tables and again be fair to everyone.

I hope the BOD will keep the new system based on performance and let the old system stay dead where it should be. The BOD hopefully will not do with this issue what it did with the issue of players in tournaments being required to be members of the ACC. As everyone knows that issue was like a tennis match, back and forth, for 2 years. Change is hard for a lot of people to accept, but there comes a time when change is needed and that time is now for the MRP system.
