George Johnson Gets \$100 Christmas Gift

George Edge Takes Holiday Classic

The recent Holiday Classic in Woonsocket, RI, kicked off the holiday season by awarding George Johnson (Fitchburg, MA) \$100 for the 11th 29-hand scored this cribbage season.

And George Edge was awarded the grand prize and 212 MRP's for qualifying 11th and finishing 1st in the sizeable 166-pegger event.

Other peggers in the holiday mood were John Rooney (Randolph, MA), Barry Spadea (Riverside, RI), and 1995 National Champion Rit Alkas (Manchester, CT). These three peggers finished 2-3-4.

Local Paul LaBreche topped the field in the qualifying round, but Rit Alkas qualified 3rd and with his 4th place finish, has once again thrown his hat into the national MRP race (400+). Brian Heroux, another local pegger, qualified 6th, and with a 9-16 finish, has zipped to the 570+ mark for the year.

In addition to Johnson's 29-hand, Joan Morrison (Weymouth, MA) scored TWO 28 hands...the only 28's scored by the crowd.

Donna LaFleur (Bristol, CT) won the 94pegger Consolation, nipping Robert Medeiros (Quincy, MA) in the final match. Charles Burgess, in finishing 3rd, tops 500 MRP's for this season. He hails from E. Greenwich, RI. Kick Hobbs, Norwood, MA, took 4th. Gloria Dyndur continues to direct the ACC's largest December tournament, and will renew this event again next December 15.

George Mackie Wins In Portland

George Mackie, a newly crowned Master pegger from Des Moines, WA took on some 146 players at the recent Portland Winter Open...and came away the winner. And with the win came a bundle of MRP's and \$850.

Rob Anderson, a 16-year old rookie from Lynwood, WA, very nearly surprised the field with a near win, but had to settle for 2nd, falling to Mackie in a close tussel.

Clarence Van Orsow also received his Master rating last year, and this Culver, OR pegger finished 3rd. Bryce McClain, another pegger from Lynwood, took 4th.

Another Van Orsow (Ray) finished in the 9-16 bracket, and earned the 57th Grand Master awarded by the ACC. Ray was a member of the 1992 All-American team, and continues to pile up those MRP's.

Ken Cochlin, Kennewick, WA, had the top qualifying score...a nifty 37 (18) +183...and picked up 53 MRP's for the effort. Cochlin is leading the Western Region and is near the 700 MRP mark for this cribbage year. He earned his Grand Master last year and is nearing the 5,000 mark (lifetime).

Susan Chambers, Corvallis, OR, nailed the 112-pegger Consolation, followed by Jerry Hearsum, Cove, OR, in 2nd. Louis Primc (Marysville, WA) and Chris Kim (Corvallis, OR) took 3rd and 4th.

Bill Shirland, Denver, CO, came within a whisker of qualifying in the Main and Consolation, and with one last chance, grabbed the Last Chance event.

One-Star DeLynn Colvert, Missoula, MT won the Friday Time Passer. Paul Hatcher, a Grand Master from Salem, OR took the High Roller. The Doubles event was won by Paul Hirschmann (OR) and Robert Wintersteen (OR). The Saturday Special went to Dave Gilkeson (Winchester, OR).

Directors Dorothy Mickow and Jeanne Hofbauer ran another first-class tournament, and this winter in Portland was blessed with spring-like weather.





Discarding Tips

George "Ras" Rasmussen

A question often asked by many players is a king-10 or a king-9 the better discard to an opponent's crib? I have recorded 2,999 actual king-10 and 2,004 king-9 discards. Based on this empirical data, I have discovered that these two discards are the only ones that average less than 4.0 points.

Which is better? When looking at these discard options in the broadest parameters, they are very similar. There is little difference between the K-10 and the K-9 when viewed in this manner:

7 or fewer points 8 or more points K-10 = 86.022% K-10 = 13.978% K-9 = 88.374% K-9 = 11.626%

When looking at these two discard options in a more definitive manner, there are distinct differences. The K-10 discard produces a high percentage of zero cribs, far more than ony other discard choice and nearly twice as many as the K-9. However, the K-10 is slightly more likely to produce 8-points or more in the opponent's crib.

In addition, the K-10 is more than twice as likely to total 12 points or more. Note that in 65 cases, the K-10 has added up to more than 12 points...and in 11 cribs the total was 16 points or more! And the K-10 may surprise you with a 20-point crib! Even so, the chances of the K-10 producing 16 points are less than 1/3 of 1% with 11 actual occurrences in 2,999 discards.

Here is a rundown of the numbers for your perusal:

King-10:	0	1-2	3-7	8-11	12-15	16 or more
3.776 Avg.	483	895	1,202	354	54	11
2,999 discards	16.1%	29.8%	40.1%	11.8%	1.8%	0.36%
King-9: 3.903 Avg. 2.004 discards	175 8.7%	599 29.9%	997 49.8%	214 10.7%	19 0.95%	0 0%

Do you need to blank your opponent's crib? The K-10 would be the choice! What about board position? Would the risk of 12-20 points motivate a K-9 (which in my experience has never produced more than 12 points). The choice is a personal one and is often decided by personal bias. In any case, either choice is excellent, as no other discard option averages less than 4.0 points.

[&]quot;Ras" has been compiling discard numbers for some years now. I feel that his empirical data is superior to data generated by computers, as his data considers human biases. However, the computer-generated data closely parallels Ras's findings. The computer puts a K-10 discard at 3.8 average, and a K-9 at 4.0. Cribbage World plans on publishing more of Ras's Tips...if he will part with this information! Ed.

Manchester man is the national cribbage champ

Since he became the national cribbage champion,

Rit Alkas says, he can't win.

"I've noticed people are a little more exuberant when they play me," Alkas says, laughing. "They say, 'Oh, you're the champion. You must be good.' It makes them happier when they beat you. And if they lose, so what? They lost to the champ.

"I can't win, and they can't lose."



Alkas, of Manchester, shrugs and laughs. In truth, he admits, he has trouble putting into words how it felt to win this year's National Open Championship in Raleigh, N.C., to finish with the top ranking in the 6,000-member American Cribbage Congress. The victory was worth a \$3,000 prize. "It was great," he said. "There isn't any feeling like it."

Friends and opponents in Alkas' Hartford cribbage club, mean**a** Alkas while, say they couldn't be happier to have the champi-

on in their midst. "He's a real good player and a nice guy," said Phil

Martin, president of Metro No. 26, Hartford's "grassroots" chapter of the American Cribbage Congress. "We're all happy for him and proud of him."

Such camaraderie is common in cribbage, a social

game that has been popular for centuries.

Virtually unchanged since it was invented in the 17th century, the basic rules of the game are simple. Two, three or four players try to build high-scoring hands and then win additional points — called "pegs" — by playing their cards against each other. A two-handed game, to 121 pegs, takes about 20 minutes to play.

Alkas, 65, a part-time courier, figures he's been playing cribbage for about 55 years. His father first taught him when he was about 10.

He says he won about \$6,500 in 1994-95, an exceptional total considering his yearly winnings usually are about \$2,000.

"It's a wonderful game," Alkas said. "It's not only luck; there's a lot of skill to it."

Now semiretired, Alkas and his wife, Mimi, have made the game their life. On weekends, they pack up their motor home and drive to tournaments throughout the country -- as many as 30 each year. Rit plays; Mimi officiates.

"I love it — it has given us a new lease on life," she said. "Almost every weekend, we're at tournaments. I can't tell you how many friends we've made. It's like a second family out there, all over the country. It has just been wonderful."

Five-Card Cribbage

When Sir John Suckling invented the game of cribbage in the 1600's, only five cards were dealt to each player. The game, over the years, evolved into our present six-card game, especially in the USA.

However, the five-card game is still played in England, and is preferred by many players.

This is basically the differences from our present ACC game:

Deal five cards to each player.

Discard two cards to form a crib hand. This leaves you with only three cards in your hand!

You peg as in six-card cribbage, except once "31" (or less) is reached, pegging stops! Remaining card (or cards) are unplayed.

Count your three-card hand (plus starter card).

Count your four-card crib (plus starter card).

Peg to 61 points. Game over!

And that's why most old cribbage boards have only 60 holes!

Last year I started teaching 30 9th-12th grade special education students crib as part of their math class. Their disabilities in math made many uneasy counting. They started noticing 15's, pairs, etc. and totaling points which made their confidence grow, and those who once said, "I don't like cards" are now asking "Can we play crib?"

Many students with social problems found they were included in partner playing or as a third. Memory capabilities seem to improve as the months went by. They noticed the subtilties of crib which sharpened other problem areas normally difficult for children with learning disabilities.

Some started teaching friends and siblings or playing with other relatives. Keeping tally of the wins for each player during the year allowed the top scoring student to take home a new crib board and deck of cards. Many of the students made crib boards in the shop class I teach. A mini-tournament was held at the end of the year party with a \$10, \$7, \$5, and four \$1 prizes. The overall social aspect, math skills and components, cooperative competition will be continued as part of my class program. The students now love to play against me and my assistant, also playing as partners. These special students have one of their first experiences at winning, thanks to cribbage!


