Silver Anniversary Match Draws 372 MONROE WORLD CHAMP

Jeff Monroe, the ACC's Membership Secretary from Napa, CA came away the winner in the huge silver anniversary World's Championship match at Quincy, CA May 5. With the win came some 319 MRP's and a nifty \$3,000. Monroe, on a roll all year, put icing on this year's play and has zipped to the 1,200 MRP mark, keeping alive his chances for a national championship.

His final match pitted him against Nevada's Harvey Brotzman, but it was Monroe's day as he won the finals 3-1. Brotzman, nevertheless netted some \$2,000 and 283 MRP's.

Local Bob Dellinger finished 3rd, and, as usual, the Quincy peggers do quite well on their home turf. Don Brown, San Pedro, CA, finished 4th.

Jim Wilson, Chico, CA had the hot hand in the qualifying round picking up 18 wins and scoring 41 +311.

The Consolation drew 192 peggers, and Clair Morse, Bend, OR nailed this event. Darlene Carr, Santee, CA finished 2nd, followed by One Star Jesse Jarrell, Pittsburg, CA, and the streaking Jones Hom, Fairfield, CA in 3rd and 4th.

144 teams (288 players) kicked off this World Championship on Friday night, and Willie and Jo Evans from Richland, WA took home the bacon (\$800). The Saturday High Roller was won by none other than MRP leader Bob Julian, the Milwaukee King. He did not, however, pad his MRP score in the sanctioned events. Kathleen Von Bargen, Artois, CA, won the Saturday Special, and Jason Shumate Kings Beach, CA, won the Last Chance.

Hall of Fame Balloting

I'm sorry to report that, although we had six deserving candidates for the ACC Hall of Fame, none of them received enough votes to win induction. A 75% affirmative vote is required for approval.

With great effort, we had a fine 66.9% participation, with 178 ballots being returned by the 266 tournament directors, Grass Roots leaders and ACC board members who were eligible to vote for nominees suggested by the general membership.

However, the vote compilation showed the following disappointing individual results:

Joe Ramos, 119 votes, 66.9%
Jeff Shimp, 111 votes, 62.4%
Joe Seigle, 73 votes, 41%
Frank Zabrowski, 69 votes, 38.8%
Gene Biegler, 55 votes, 30.9%
Elbert Hargesheimer, 50 votes, 28.1%
None of the above, 4 votes, .2%

Pat Barrett, chairman of the Hall of Fame process, said he's frustrated by the fact that this system should but just doesn't elect any of our well-deserving members...a condition which has prevailed for the last two years.

He said: "I can't see this system being fair to the Congress any longer, so I am going to propose a new system at this year's board meeting in Napa."

It's obvious, with the time and money spent each year of this project, the ACC needs to overhaul this one way or another, in order to recognize deserving members and add to the 17 persons now enshrined in our Hall of Fame.

Huge Eastern Region Meet

Paul Gallagher Tops 200 At Rhode Island Open

Once again the Rhode Island Open drew a huge crowd as some 200 peggers played for the championship at the U.C.T. Hall in Johnston, RI April 28.

This time around Paul Gallagher, a Master pegger from Avon, MA came away the winner, picking up a nufty 208 MRP's in the process.

Life Master Larry Samet (MA) took 2nd...and has zipped over the 600 MRP mark for this cribbage year, and has an outside chance of earning yet another top ten award in 1996. Phil Martin (CT) nailed 3rd, and Bill Shoemaker (CT) took 4th (and qualified 8th). Shoemaker has topped 400 MRP's for the year and is closing in on his Grand Master.

Brian Heroux (RI) is at the top of the MRP list, and a fine 8th place finish netted another 141 MRP's, keeping his national title hopes alive.

Life Master Phyllis Schmidt (MA) nailed the top qualifying spot and is nearing the 8,000 MRP mark lifetime. She stands at no. 10, lifetime, on the ACC's roster.

Rit Alkas, last year's national champion, is at it again, as he topped the field in the 114pegger Consolation. The 60 MRP's earned puts Alkas at the 900 mark for the year, and is knocking on the door for yet another top ten spot. Life Master Harry Palmer (MA) took 2nd (and stands no. 9 lifetime). Bruce Sattler, the Baltimore whiz, who nailed both Consolations in Reno this February, continues his fine play and took 3rd. Jim McDonald (MA) was 4th.

Director Joe Ramos has a long history of directing huge tournaments, and this time around was no exception. He reports that some \$777.50 was donated to the M.D.A. charity. He also reports that next year's matches will be played April 27, 1997.

Dehel Nails Alaska Event

Local Louis Dehel nailed the recent Anchorage End of Season Singles event in Alaska. He not only was the top qualifier, but came away the winner in the playoffs as well. Raldo Estridge, Chugiak, AK, took 2nd. Local Chuck Beng won the Consolation. Director Mike Rowe keeps 'em pegging way up north!

Sylvia Sutton Tops George Florentine Memorial

Sylvia Sutton, Burbank, CA nipped top qualifier Len Wahlig (HI) for the title at the recent 52pegger George Florentine Memorial in Pomona, CA. John Dawes (CA) not only qualified first in the Consolation but won the event in the playoffs. Director Ron Guidotti plans on renewing this match next April 19.

New Master Rating System August 1

Scott Kooistra, the ACC's Executive Vice-President has been busily conducting a poll of BOD members concerning the new MRP system. As we go to press Scott reports that 14 BOD members voted to implement the system, but modify the numbers to equal those of the old system. 11 BOD members voted to implement the new system as voted in Reno in February.

The plan of action is for the new system to take effect August 1 as we begin our new cribbage year. The 12 or so tournaments that will be played before the next BOD meeting in Napa, CA (Sept. 27) will have a "hold" put on the MRP reports.

National Statistician Bob McCabe will modify these reports to coincide with the BOD's action in Napa, and posting of the MRP's will take place after the BOD's action.

At this time it appears very likely that the new system will parallel the old system, insofar as total number of MRP's awarded. Ed Horigan, author of the new system, has been busy compiling new charts that BOD members can analyze before the Napa BOD meeting. Hopefully, a fair and equitable system can be quickly worked out.


Director Marlene Lazachek plans on re-newing this event again next April 18-20, 1997.



Discarding Tips

George "Ras" Rasmussen

A comparison of these discard options to your own crib provide an interesting and widely unexpected result. The 5-6 averages 6.76, while the 5-K has a lower average of 6.72. These averages are based on recorded discards. The 5-6 has been discarded 486 times and the 5-K has been deposited to my own crib 1,428 times. It should be noted that only the 5-5,2-3, and 5-J attain a higher average.

When viewing the 5-6 and 5-K in a broad sense, they are very similar with the 5-6 showing a slight advantage.

How can the 5-6 have a higher average than the 5-K given the above figures? The 5-6 to your own crib provides connecting cards for opponents discard of 7-K, 7-Q, 7-10, 7-J, 4-K, 4-Q, 4-10, and 4-J and works reasonably well with 10-point discards.

Also, what happens in "3-7" column and "8-11" column more than compensates for the 5-6 tendency to produce a larger number of two-point cribs. The 5-K often tallies 4 or 6 points while the 5-6 predominantly totals 5 or 7 points. The same advantage appears in the "8-11" range, with the 5-6 frequently attaining 8 points while the 5-6 is commonly at 9 points. Have you noted that the 5-6 is 35% more likely to produce a crib of 12-15 points?

By the way, the 5-6 does even better when compared to the 5-Q or 5-10. Either of these discard choices is excellent. Give the 5-6 greater consideration and you will benefit by that choice. When comparing these two, it's easy to forget that the 5-6 is also worth a minimum of two points in your crib.

Master Point Controversy

All I've been reading about in the last few issues of CW is the dissatisfaction of the MRP issuance as it is now set up. Allow me to put in my two cents worth.

First, and foremost, and this is not sour grapes, as I am not one who qualifies tournament after tournament, because at the rate I accumulate points, I should get my Master's by the year 2025, when I will be 104, so we, at least, got that out of the way.

My bone of contention is that in any tournament, the main idea is to qualify, and the top 25% who do qualify should be so rewarded. They, who do qualify, have proven themselves to have been, on that day, the best players of the day and thus should be acknowledged. Now, I don't advocate the abolishment of the consolation round, far from it, as it keeps the players around, and in the tournament spirit allows them competition and compensation. But, the consolation round is for non-qualifiers, also-rans, (or losers, to be exact) and I can't see why a player would get more points in a consolation match than a qualifier in the top tournament of the day. After all, he (or she) is given two chances to score, where the qualifier has just one. If you want to give points to the top four finishers of the consolation (let's say for an arbitrary figure, 5-3-2-1), fine, as long as it doesn't exceed the lowest scorer of the qualifying round. If it means giving each of the qualifiers at least five points, so be it, but that can be decided. I just feel honored and special, and he (or she) knowing that he (or she) was the better player, on that day, and to see a non-qualifier get more MRP's than they did, to me seems unfair and ludicrous. It kind of takes the joy out of qualifying, don't you think?

Critic of New MRP System

At the recent BOD meeting in Reno, a vote was taken to change the current MRP tables effective Aug. 1,1996. The new system was championed as being fairer with the point allocation close to the same as before. I beg to differ with this analysis.

Using my MRP totals since using the current charts I've found quite a difference in totals from year to year:

1991: 771/510 -34%; 1992: 255/213 -16%; 1993: 636/385 - 39%; 1994: 349/288 -17%; 1995: 612/479 -22%; 1996: 745/592 -21%. Overall: 3,368/2,467 -27%. Qualifying: -40%; Playoffs (Main) -27%; Consolation -12%.

These MRP's were earned at 37 different tournaments, which had an attendance of: Less than 128 (14); 129-256 (9); more than 256 (14).

As the above figures show, I would recieve less MRP's every year. Some ACC members have stated that this new system is "fairer." My question to them is "Fairer to Whom?"

With less points awarded per season, it will be harder to earn MRP's than in previous years. Every member who has participated the last few years will have benefited from the older system, with new members at a disadvantage from a historical perspective. The result will be a division of the "have's vs. the have nots." Suggestions have been made to recompute the MRP's from the beginning. Could you imagine a player being asked to give their Master award back?

While no MRP system is perfect, I think this decision was made without full analysis of current and future ramifications. I would hope the membership will let the BOD know that this vote is unacceptable in it's current form and that without a major revision to make the MRP system fair for all ACC members, the new system should not be implemented.

The ACC's BOD is currently addressing Jeff's complaints of lesser MRP's being awarded under the new system. Incidentally, Jeff's huge win at the recent World Championship garnered him some 319 MRP's. The new system would have awarded him 360! Players, under the new system, will be awarded more points for winning, not the 2nd round winners who currently score the bulk of the MRP's! Ed.

Peer Play

It is with great interest that I have read various comments on peer tournaments. Bringing in new membership is the ACC's greatest challenge. Peer tournaments will allow new players the opportunity to compete and not feel intimidated or hustled by the more skilled. As a past duplicate bridge addict, the ACBL utilized two forms of tournaments to address this matter.

First is the flighted tournaments. In this setting, all players are entered into a contest of only their peer group. There are 3 groups. Flight A, B, & C. Each flight is assigned a master point scale that all players must fall into. For instance C is 0-300 MP's. MP are awarded for the winners of the C game. B is 300-1,000 MP and A is 1,000 and above.

The games are all run the same. The awarding of MP is slightly different from what one would expect. The A player MP award is at full value. The B player MP award is at a reduced vale (say 80%) since the B players are not playing againsit better players. The C MP player award is at a further reduced rate (say 60%). This works very well. The ACC could easily adapt this type of format and also award the other prizes on a perecentage basis as described above.

The 2nd type tournament is the Stratified tournament. There are 3 classes of entries. A, B, and C just like above, with MP limitations and awards like above. All players play against one another. There are winners in each class, as above, but in addition, a player can move up in class if their score warrants. Their MP and prize award would be in the highest flight possible. But one could not go down to receive awards. The way to avoid having all the experts eliminating one another is to have seeded table positions. For instance, with a 100-player tournament with 4 tables, the experts would be evenly divided among the 4 tables and evenly spaced at each table. All tables are balanced as much as possible with the same number of A, B, C players at each table. This format has its obvious advantages, with few drawbacks.

It is quite apparent from reading all the letter to the editor articles, that the ACC is going through some growing pains. As a relatively new member (4 years), it appears that the ACC administration is composed of mainly dedicated members who loved the game and want to devote time and effort to give back the game and ACC. I benefit from all this effort as do all ACC members and each of you have our gratitude. But, with all due respect to the many volunteers who devote their time and energy, isn't it time for the ACC to consider contracting or hiring a professional, full time administrative staff to manage the affairs and growing pains we are now experiencing?

Cribbage Board History

In my research on board styles, I recently began to document information about streets and their styles. I found that Joespeh Petrus Wergin had copyrighted the traditional long board style in 1979, according to information found in his book, How to Win at Cribbage. He states that the board was developed by "officials of the Masters Classic" I wrote Joe recently, but, as he was unable to reply, his sister confirmed the information for me.

Now, in the interest of the pursuit, I would like more information about the "M" shaped track, as designed by DeLynn Colvert. Could you provide me with information on when he originally provided the design and why it varied from the common tournament board? I suspect that it is a matter of change in style, one which is pleasing to the eye, in addition to providing a common game or winner's hole. This is only an assumption, however, and I am curious!

The "S" style board has been in existence since the 1940's, but I still don't know if Lowe was the first to design it. The search continues.

I have determined that the original once-around style track board may well be one called "Saves Argument," for which a patent was applied on 2/6/39 by S. Eddy. Other early once-around boards do not seem to pre-date it.

All this research has prompted me to become curious about when the game play to 121 points became commonly accepted! There are no 19th century boards or early 20th century boards pictured in the CBCS archives with 120 holes, so that leads me to deduct that game play of 60 points probably remained popular until the early 20th century, at least. I am not, however, going to add that question to my list of things to research. Too much on the list already!

Bette, Colvert's "M" board was designed to help eliminate pegging backwards problems, as the asymmetrical design reinforced which way pegging should take place. In addition, only one winner's hole should be on the board. This design was introduced in 1983 at the Montana Championship matches. 
