Eastern Region Off and Running

Boulris Nails NE Inaugural

Bob Boulris, playing out of South Bellingham, MA began the 1997 cribbage season with a bang! He topped the sizeable field of 166 peggers at the New England Inaugural in Woonsocket, RI on August 11...and is also at the top of the Eastern Region's MRP list for the fledgling 1997 season.

Paul Musard (RI) came in 2nd, and is also off and running with a fine start for the new season. Ray McNulty (RI) and Master Charlie Finley (CT) finished 3rd and 4th.

Grand Master Emil Chrabaszcz (MA) topped the field in the qualifying round, as this perennial winner also begins the season in fine fashion.

Last year's National Champion, Bob Julian (WI), is off and running again, as this travelling pegger from Milwaukee qualified 4th and finished 25th to pick up a few more MRP's.

Robert Medeiros (MA) finished the 1996 season in 8th place in the Eastern Region (his entry into the National Open was two days late and was denied a chance to improve his finish), and begins the new season with a vengeance by qualifying 3rd and finishing 26th. His spouse. Emily, is off to a fine start also, with a nice 11th place finish.

Robert Kaplan (MA) took honors in the 106-pegger Consolation, edging Albina Farrish (RI) in the final match. Zeke Veradt (MA) and Joe Dyndur (RI) finished 3-4. Director Lee Norris (RI) took 6th.

Directors Lee Norris and Charles Burgess, Jr. ran a first class tournament with great paybacks...and even donated \$121 to the ACC's youth program. This duo plans on renewing this event again next August 10, 1997.

Hamilton Tops In Nebraska

Ron Hamilton recently moved to Topeka, Kansas from Minnesota. The new surroundings seem to be agreeing with Grand Master Hamilton as he nailed the Championship at the nearby Omaha Open on August 18.

Steve Herwig (IA), Grand Master Bob Hanes (IA), and Don Ernst (MN) finished 2-3-4. Ernst

took honors in the qualifying round of this 46pegger event.

Richard Nielsen (NE) not only won the Consolation but was also the top qualifier. Nielsen edged Grand Master Gerald Gruber (MN) in the final match. Tim Krawford (KS) and Bill MacQuarrie finished 3-4.

The President's Column

ACC Enforces Fair Play

During the 17 years of existence, the American Cribbage Congress has suspended or expelled 18 members for various breaches of conduct or unethical play.

These are instances of flagrant conduct contrary to established rules of ethics, in short ... cheating!

The game of cribbage, like all other competitions, is guided by certain regulations. For hundreds of years, the Book of Hoyle was the Bible that goverened play. Since the formation of the American Cribbage Congress in 1979, we have polished the regulations for tournament play, as published in the ACC Official Tournament Cribbage Rules (Jan. 1993).

All ACC members should have a copy of this publication, one being provided to every member when first published or when new members join. If not, one can be obtained from Secretary-Membership Jeff Monroe for the paltry sum of \$2.

The very first page of our Rules Book contains an important Preamble...the Code of Ethics.

It prefaces: "Cribbage is a pastime that provides social opportunities to display true sportsmanship and respect for others, without rancor, animosity, or overwhelming self-interest during competition."

It then goes on to list eight "unacceptable practices" considered as grounds for suspension or expulsion from the ACC, in short:

- 1- Marking cards
- 2- Stacking the deck
- 3- Secreting cards
- 4- Altering scorecards
- 5- Throwing a game or match
- 6- Unbecoming actions
- 7- Violation of rules
- 8- Detrimental actions

A review of past incidents leading to suspensions and or expulsions shows the following causes for complaint and action: altering scorecards, 6; stacking the deck, 5; over-pegging (hauling timber), 3; cheating, 2; leaving the tournament or failure to appear, 2.

Most sanctioned tournaments check all scorecards, closely matching them to uncover fraudulent marking or unauthorized changes.

Alerted to the possibility of a "mechanic" or a talented amateur manipulating the deck, most players are now intently watching the shuffles and riffles that occur. And, remember, trust everybody...but cut the cards!

Nimble fingers find a way to skip extra holes in the pegging process. Two or three holes overpegged here and there, three or four times a game, makes a 6 to 12 point difference, enough to win. Count the hands, watch the board and peg locations. And, whenever you're in doubt, call a pair of judges. Don't be intimidated.

If there's a problem with a particular player, be sure of your accusation and then contact the Ethics Committee, c/o Paul Hatcher, Chairman, 1691 Jory Hill Rd. S., Salem, OR 97306. (505) 364-4541. The 7-person Ethics Committee requires at least two letters of complaint before conducting its own investigation. If charges are substantiated, the Ethics Committee may hand down a suspension or refer expulsion to the Board of Directors, the final authority. In either case, the alleged violator is given the privilege of a closed-door hearing (open by his/her option) before the Board of Directors, after which a vote is taken to exonerate, suspend or expel.

Of the 18 previous breaches, 16 failed to appear for a Board hearing; 14 were expelled and 4 were suspended for periods of two to six months.

Remember, the honorable sport of cribbage is a game for Ladies and Gentlemen. By honoring all ACC rules, a player will have guidelines for good sportsmanship and fair play, resulting in an enjoyable experience for all participants.

Napa Meet On Schedule

Grand **National XV**

As Cribbage World goes to press, the American Cribbage Congress's 15th Grand National is all set to be played in Napa, CA, at the Fairgrounds.

This September 27-29 meet will also host the Annual Awards Banquet for ACC members who have earned awards during the 1996 season. The banquet will be unique as they will have wine and cheese tasting, complete with a souvenir wine goblet. A record 116 members will receive awards, with other awards for Grass Roots play also on the agenda.

Director Jeff Monroe reports everything is a "go" and is looking forward to hosting a memorable event, with upwards of 500 peggers in attendance.

In the Western Region, a team play satellite is popular, and Monroe will have this added feature for the players. Five players comprise a team, and is scored by Game Points only during the 22-game qualifying round.

Cribbage World will have a complete report in the November issue.

1997 Rings In New Master Rating Point System

At the Board of Directors Meeting in Napa, the new MRP system devised by Ed Horigan will be fine tuned for implementation. The last major obstacle was equalizing MRP's awarded to correspond to those awarded in past years. Members of the BOD have been studying this situation, and a new system should be implemented, beginning with all matches played as of August 1, 1996. National Statistician Bob McCabe is ready to update all tournaments played this cribbage year. This change has caused concern for many members who are opposed to change, but the BOD hopes that once in place, members will see that the system is fairer than the old, with MRP's awarded with equal points for equal difficulty, regardless of the size of the tournament. A bar chart in the back part of this issue may clarify the comparisons of the two systems. Cribbage World will present the new system in detail in the next issue

Miotke Takes MRP Lead

With the new MRP system at the ready, Darrel Miotke, Sublimity, OR, has zipped to the national MRP lead. His 2nd at the huge Portland Summer Open, followed by a first in Redmond has given him the lead. Other leaders are Bob Boulris, Larry Phifer, Jeff Monroe, and Russell Adams. Cribbage World should have MRP lists ready for the next issue.

Friday Play By Candlelight Larry Phifer Nails Peer Event

Forty One cribbage Masters with at least 2,000 MRP's (lifetime) competed in the 1996 PEER championship. Two made the final four, but Larry Phifer, Raleigh, NC, came out of the middle bracket to take home the title.

This New England Championship played in Auburn, MA has been given an exemption by the ACC to experiment with seating by lifetime rankings, and some 148 peggers were on hand for the event. Rookie Barbara Barbour (S. Windsor, CT) took advantage of the seating and qualified 10th, and worked her way to 5th place in the playoffs to pick up a bundle of MRP's to begin the new season.

Brian Heroux, the ACC's youngest Grand Master, finished 2nd, as this Woonsocket pegger is, once again, off and running to begin the new season. He is edging in on his Life Master (standing at 5,700 lifetime). Grand Master Henry DeLong piled up 884 MRP's last season, and this Woburn, MA pegger is continuing to pile up those MRP's by finishing 3rd. Maurice Bellemare, W. Springfield, MA, took 4th.

62 peggers played the Consolation and Sharlene Medeiros, Shrewsbury, MA topped the action. Medeiros finished 11th last year (nationwide), narrowly missing the All-American team by a scant 18 MRP's. Fred McGibney, the ACC's treasurer from S. Burlington, VT took 2nd, after qualifying first. Larry Harmon, Burlington, VT finished 3rd, followed by Merv Morris, a Canadian from Ontario.

Director Joe Seigle reported a unique Friday night game. Torrential rains and a downed utility pole put out the lights and the match was played by candlelight. The management produces some 100 candles and the game went on...to be won by Pat Llewellyn (MA). The Saturday doubles were won by Peter & L. M. Setian (MA).

Seigle reports that 21% of the top players qualified, 28% of the middle level, and 30% of the lowest level made the grade. 11% of the games were by skunks.

Unique Board Made In Salem, OR

Chuck Hoffman, Salem OR, has constructed a unique cribbage board. He has three long tracks hinged at one end, that will fan out for the players in any angle. Cribbage World wonders how many board-styles have been concocted over the years? Ken Capper is now sporting a best-selling board attached to a hobby-horse...and another with a guitar motif. What next?

Russ Adams Tops Belle City

Russell Adams, the pegging professor from Minneapolis took home the championship at the recent Belle City Classic in Appleton, August 25. In besting the 120 peggers, Life Master Adams is off and running (again). He posted some 784 MRP's last season and finished 10th in the Central Region. His final playoff match was a tough one with Bob Julian, Milwaukee. Julian won the 1996 National Championship.

Two stellar players finished 3rd and 4th. Local Doug Page finished 3rd (and is moving in on his Grand Master with nearly 3,900 MRP's in the bag), and Master Harry Langman (Appleton) finished 4th.

The top qualiifier was Grand Master John Hiland, West Allis, WI (35 16 +225).

Laura Lui, Racine, WI copped the 80-pegger Consolation, with Richard Frost, a Master pegger from Berlin, WI in 2nd. Local Frank Danielski is knocking on the door for his Grand Master, and may have made the grade with a 3rd place finish. Jean Cervantes, Green bay, WI took 4th. Life Master Jim McManus, Milwaukee took qualifying honors with a nice 19 8 +183, and is very close to earning his One Star (10,000 MRP's).

His custom pegs were well down the track, and for some reason only the cribbage gods know, he pegged a 7-point count with stock pegs from the starting block. Mickow refused to allow him to recount his 7-points with his own pegs! Senior Judge...help!

Miotke Hot In Oregon

Darrel Miotke, Sublimity, OR, is tearing up the track as the ACC begins the 1997 season. Fresh from a solid 2nd place finish at the 171-pegger Portland Summer Open, Miotke continues his tear by winning the Redmond Senior Center Benefit. And to top that, he also qualified first in this 76-pegger event. The back-to-back high finishes place this two-time All-American at the top of the field in the early going in the 1997 season.

George Rasmussen, Chehalis, WA posted some 724 MRP's last season, and he begins the new season with a 2nd place finish. Darren Black, Portland, OR, very nearly won the National Championship last year, and he continues his winning ways by finishing 3rd. Edwin Park, Roseburg, OR took 4th.

Rod Schott, Richland, WA nailed the 58-pegger Consolation. Eileen Shine, Bend, OR finished 2nd, followed by local Paul Nolz and Ray Rangila, Madras, OR in 3-4.



New MRP System Offers Less?

Just a note about my first experience under the new MRP system. At the New England Inaugural (8-11-96) I qualified 31st and played on to the top 8, finishing 5th-8th. Under the newly proposed MRP system, I was disappointed to find out that I would only receive 80 MRP's. This came as a complete shock! As a friend of mine placed in the 5-8 position in a similar size tournament last year (166 vs 170) and received 131 MRP's!!

That's 50 less MRP's, nearly 39% less??

In fact, the 80 MRP's under the new plan, is less than the person placing 16th at that tournament. Because the 9-16 finalists were awarded 84 MRP's.

I realize that the new MRP system is being revised at this time and my MRP's may change. But, I can't help but wonder why the ACC would not do a comparative study before implementing any new proposal.

Also, I am concerned about how many more tournaments I will have to attend to acheive Master, compared to those already at that level?

I am sure that there are many more, like myself, who have read all the letters, pro and con, about the new Master Point System. And who will not take notice or become concerned until it affects them...up close and personal.

Larry Fitzgerald Conventry, RI Larry, your concerns about MRP's equaling the old system are certainly valid ones. The BOD is addressing this issue at their meeting in Napa. CW went to press before a decision was made but next month's issue will clarify the very muddy water.

The new system corrected, in my opinion, a glaring unfair awarding of MRP's. In short, the old system awarded points based on the size of a tournament, and in a haphazard sequence. For example, let's take your 170-person tourney. The old system awards MRP's in this manner, beginning with the first playoff match: 0-12-72-47-18-10-11. As you can see, the third match is where the bulk of the MRP's are won (72). The championship (final match) awards a mere 11 MRP's! Wow! The champion earns 11 MRP's in that final match. The 8 players who get bumped in the 9-16 round earn 72! It doesn't take a genius to figure that this is simply not fair!

The new system awards points in a more logical sequence, based on difficulty, regardless of the size of a tournament. Perhaps a simple chart will illustrate the comparisons of the 2 systems:



The new system awards points in an even, logical progression, with each match rewarded with a slightly higher ratio...if cribbage is a game of skill, the rewards should increase with each successive match won.



(On average, each match is progressively more difficult)

Ratso Flush?

Let me set the records straight, for years, all thru the great U.S. of A., I've heard about that I've got a Ratso-O-Flush! Ladies and gentlemen, you haven't had a Ratso-O-Flush, and most likely never will! First you had to play a Grass Roots in Napa, CA, then playing the great Jeff Monroe. It is Jeff's crib. He deals me a king of hearts, ace of diamonds, and a O-10-9 and 7 of spades! I kick the king of hearts and ace of diamonds into Jeff's crib. Now, mind you, Jeff is crib and is 20 points out. Plumas Aaron Stokes



I am relatively new at tournament cribbage, having played in only 13 GR games last year and in only one sanctioned event. It is from this "Beginners" viewpoint that I would like to address the topic of peer play.

As a beginner, I enjoy playing with the highly skilled opponents and consider it a good learning experience. With the variety of skill levels found in my opponents, I am challenged in some games and I can at least hold my own most of the time. I don't expect or desire a special category at ACC events. If all I ever play against are other beginners, how will my play ever improve? Yes, I was intimidated before playing in my first ACC event. Although I didn't qualify, I felt a sense of accomplishment having been able to play against some excellent competitors. I would not have had the same feeling of accomplishment playing against newcomers.

For newcomers, the GR program is an excellent place to start. Players not only improve their skills but build their confidence in their game. We began the new GR season last week and had several new players and guests. The guests and new players soundly beat our best players and our club champion finished with one of the worst scorecards of the evening. If we had divided the group into "peer play" the beginners would have been denied the pleasure of beating more experienced players. Since many of our best players were beat, do they now become beginners?

How would a beginner be distinguished from a player who has more experience? Some newcomers are superb players and some experienced players aren't that great. How do you take a lucky run of cards into consideration? What guidelines would be fair for everyone?

I believe a blind draw is the only fair way to play. As a newer member, I would be offended if I had to play in a "beginner" category. I play not only to have fun, but to improve my game. Don't make me or other beginners feel like 2nd class players by making a special category for us.

Joe Nelson

Joe died Wednesday, August 27 at a burn center in Portland, OR, after suffering fatal burns in a bizarre event at a card-lock gas station in Prineville. In February, 1982, Joe organized the first Oregon Cribbage Championship at the County Fairgrounds in Prineville. This event grew into one of the major cribbage attractions in the west, peaking at 342 players in 1987 and 1988. In September, 1989, Joe hosted Grand National VIII with a then record crowd of 448 players in attendance. Played in a county fair barn, many players to this day believe this was the best Grand National ever. Joe's innovative leadership in organized cribbage will be sorely missed. His craftsmanship in producing trophy cribbage boards was appreciated by many tournament directors who used them for awards. Players nationwide who have earned these boards will long covet the award. The Pacific Northwest remains a stronghold of organized cribbage, with much of the credit belonging to Joe Nelson.
