New Master Rating Point System

After two years of fine tuning, the American Cribbage Congress will be scoring their sanctioned tournaments under a new Master Rating Point system, effective August 1, 1997.

The late Ed Horigan championed a scoring system that would award equal points for equal difficulty, and after two years of manipulating numbers to insure players scoring equal numbers as in the past, the new "Modified Horigan" system was voted into place at the January (Reno) Board of Director's meeting.

Equal numbers of MRP's will be scored, but in a different manner. A player will score MRP's in the qualifying round based upon Game Points. Charts have been prepared to score points on typical one-day and two-day events. For example, in a two-day event (22 games), players scoring in the top 1/8 will be awarded MRP's. The scoring is by five-point increments, beginning with 27 GP's scoring 5, 28-10, 29-15, 30-20, 31-25, etc. In a typical one-day tournament with a 12-game qualifying round, the scoring begins with 15 Game Points scoring 5 MRP's, then 16-10, 17-15, 18-20, etc. Once again, only the top 1/8 score MRP's. Similar systems for Consolation events with three-point increments have also been prepared. Charts will be provided tournaments for posting, but once a player knows the system, no charts will be needed to figure your MRP's.

Playoff rounds are scored with emphasis placed on equal points for equal difficulty, regardless of size of tournament. Once again, a player will not need charts after familiarity is attained. All players will score 7 MRP's for qualifying (top 1/4), and from that point the scoring is 7 + 7...the second round losers will score 21 MRP's (7 + 14 = 21). The third round losers will score 42 MRP's, then 70, 105, 147, 196, 252, and finally 315 in a 513-1,024 tournament.

Byes count as wins, and no backward playoffs are awarded points. The scoring will be: 1-2-3-3-5-5-5-9-9-9-9-9-9-9-9-17-17-17, etc. A tournament director has the option in playing off 3-4, or 5-8, for example, for prize money or trophies, but MRP's will not be affected.

The smaller tournaments will benefit the most by the new system, and 2nd and 3rd round losers in larger tournaments will lose the most...but this, arguably, was precisely what was unfair about the old system.

Double Elimination events (such as the National Open) have scoring charts that equal the standard scoring. A unique new feature has the Double Elimination events now offering qualifying points (the top 1/8 finishers are all awarded an additional 30 MRP's). This alleviates the unfairness in *not* awarding qualifying points as in the past.

Charts are printed on pages 4 and 5 inside. Study the numbers. They apply to all-sized tournaments, and, once mastered, you will have no difficulty figuring your MRP's. And the ACC wagers you will like the over-all fairness and simplicity of this new system.

Odds of Scoring a Flush

Sir John Suckling, inventor of the game of cribbage, must have dipped too many times into the ale barrel while he was deciding the rule governing flushes.

It has always seemed to me that the noble Sir John got it backwards when he decreed a 4-card flush in the hand and a 5-card flush in the Crib.

I would think that the difficulty of obtaining a 4or 5-card flush in one's hand or the Crib would be reflected in the percentage of likelihood in catching either flush.

I posed the question to Russell Adams, University of Minnesota thinker and oddsmaker, at the recent Reno 4th of July tournament. He cogitated for a while and then pontificated: Odds of a 4-card flush in your hand, 1:50; odds of a 5-card flush in your hand, 1:200; odds of a 5-card flush in your Crib, 1:595.

Remember, you have some control over your hand, because you have the option of throwing 2 cards to the Crib, no matter whose. That's the easy one.

Counting a 5-card flush in your hand requires the luck of the draw in cutting or turning the fifth suit-matching card. Decidedly more difficult, regardless of whether you're the dealer or the pone.

Now we come to the most difficult one...each of the players must throw 2 same-suit cards into the Crib and then turn up the fifth matching suit card to complete the Crib flush. Very, very tough...a ratity!

Deciding to check further, I asked DeLynn Colvert, all-time top point scorer and Cribbage World editor, to give his estimate of the flush odds. His numbers differed from Adam's as follows: 4-card flush in your hand, 1:10; 5-card flush in your hand, 1:50; 5-card Crib flush, no guess (but when dealer throws two suit-matching cards, 1:17).

I'm sure other mathematical wizards out there in cribbageland can make a good case to confirm or differ with either or both of the above numbers.

If anybody has any ideas on this, or can come up with better figures, please send them to me.

If we get enough reaction and can justify the possible change, I'll submit it to Syl Lulinski's Rules Committee for deep thinking.

Those flush counts have been in effect for more than 350 years, ever since Sir John invented the game 'way back in the early 1600's, so it's not likely that we'll ever see it changed.

Gaylord Matti, director of the Madison (WI) Masters Tournament, tells us that he had ACC founder Joseph Petrus Wergin out of the nursing care home as a non-playing guest at the recent Masters event. Everyone was glad to see Joe.

Walter McCallum of Yountville, CA knocked off the ACC brass in two consecutive matches at the Reno Independence Day tourney. He nullified a possible Consolation championship between Ye Olde Prexy (me) and Executive V-P Syl Lulinski by beating us two straighteach. You showed no respect, Walt, in walking off with first place!

Bill and Dorthalee Irons, directors of the Independence Day tournament and the Veteran's Day tournament at Reno every year, report that some \$50,000 has been donated to Veteran's charities due to these tourneys over the last 12 years.

Double Elimination Events

That National Open and a few other similar double-eliminaton events are played every year. They will be furnished scoring charts that offer MRP's that equal standard events. A typical National Open (256 players) will be scored as follows:

1 - 196 2 - 147 3 - 115 4 - 95 5-6 - 78 7-8 - 62 9-12 - 48 13-16 - 36 17-24 - 25 25-32 - 17 33-48 - 9

The top 1/8 (and ties) will score an additional 30 MRP's in lieu of qualifying MRP's. This will give the Double Elimination events MRP's equal to those in standard events.

Playoff Master Rating Points

The simplicity of the new system is evident in that all tournaments score MRP's in the same manner. All qualifiers score 7 MRP's. Byes count as wins. Progressive MRP's are earned with each round won on a 7 + 7 basis. For example, the second round scores 21 (7 + 14 = 21). Once you memorize the following numbers, a scoring chart will no longer be necessary to figure your MRP's:

Let's take a typical 128-player tournament. 32 players will qualify for the playoffs. The first round losers (16: 17-32) will score 7 MRP's. The second round losers (8: 9-16) will score 21 MRP's. The third round losers (4: 5-8) will score 42 MRP's. The two players tieing for 3rd will score 70 MRP's. 2nd place will score 105 MRP's, and 1st place will score 147 MRP's.

Larger tournaments have more playoff rounds and will score more MRP's. For example, a winner of a 256-player event will score 196 MRP's. The winner of a 512-player event will score 252 MRP's...and the largest tournament (513-1,024) winners will score 315 MRP's.

The simplicity is that all rounds won are awarded MRP's equally, regardless of size of tournament. This is the late Ed Horigan's legacy, as he championed this method of scoring.

Consolation MRP's

The Consolation event is scored in a similar manner as the Main Event. In the qualifying round, the top 1/8 will score MRP's based on Game Points as follows:

Charts are available for Consolation formats other than 9 games. Wall charts will be available to tournament directors for posting.

Consolation Playoffs

Consolation playoff rounds are scored in the same manner as the Main Event, except that each round won is scored on a 3 + 3 formula. All qualifiers will earn 3 MRP's. The 2nd round losers will earn 9 MRP's (3 + 6 = 9). Each round is scored:

3 - 9 - 18 - 30 - 45 - 63 -84- 108 -135

Scoring Summary

This new MRP system is scored in a slightly different manner, insofar as numbers of MRP's scored in the qualifying round and playoffs. The new system awards about 15% more points in the qualifying round... and about 15% less in the playoffs. The new system will award MRP's (within 2%) in the same aggregate amount as the old system. As stated earlier, the smaller tournaments will be the big winners, as they will now be on an equal footing with the larger ones; rewarding our ACC members with equal MRP's for equal difficulty.

Apologies To BOD Candidates

Central Region Format Heads West

The Central Region sports tournaments that offers players an "All-Events" contest. This format scores the Friday Early Bird (9 games) in conjunction with the Main Event qualifying round (22 games) and the Saturday Special (9 games). This event totals a 40-game match and is scored in the usual manner.

The Montana Championship match to be played October 3-5 in Missoula has decided to give this format a try. Instead of the Friday High Roller and Doubles matches, a 9-game Friday Early Bird will be part of the All-Events (40-game match) that parallels the Central Region's format.

World Record Crowd Grass Rooters Play 1,728 Player Match Richard Kelliher Nails GR National Tournament

The ACC's National Grass Roots Program sponsors an annual National Grass Roots Championship...and this year's event saw Richard Kelliher, Mansfield, MA, win 16 of 18 games, scoring two skunks to win going away. He scored a whopping 34 Game Points to take home the top prize, and bragging rights as having won the largest cribbage tournament in history!

Barry Hansen, Wisconsin Rapids, WI, took 2nd with a nice 33 GP card (winning 14 games). Four players tied with 32 GP's (15 wins), and six other ACC members scored 32 GP's with 14 wins. Final scores of all players are on the national Internet program.

This year's event saw 1,728 players compete for honors...up from 1,520 in last year's match. And, of course, the prize money awarded was up. The \$11,240 awarded to the winners topped last year's \$9,090.

Prizes were also awarded for special achievement. 28-hands, 29-hands, and Grand Slams were given prizes...and some 22 players took home the bacon!

Four 29-hands were scored (up from only one last year): Riby Hoeft (CA), Kristina Rouse (WI), Harold McGuire (OR), and Timothy Morrissey (WA) scored these gems...and took home a \$100 bonus.

Six players scored Grand Slams (9/9): Kathy Thompson (MT), Pete Chamousis (CA), John Mixer (CA), Morris Schiffman (OR), Harvey Glass (CT) and Anne Oar (OR). These peggers earned a \$25 bonus.

Twelve players scored a 28-hand...and earned another \$25 bonus.

124 Grass Roots clubs participated in this mammoth event (up from 111 last year). GR 148, Kirkland, WA, had 51 players in the match...the largest crowd nationwide! GR 61, Green Bay, WI had 45 players and GR 162, Sacramento played 40 players.

Director Roger Wilson, Boulder, CO, did yeoman's work in organizing this huge meet. Just mailing the prizes (346 total) was a workload. The ACC doffs it's hat to Wilson (and other volunteers) that keep this great organization humming.

Grand Master Sundae Webb Tops Nugget Classic

With 110 peggers in attendance, Grand Master Sundae Webb, Antioch, CA, came away the winner at the recent Nugget Classic (Paradise, CA).

Frank Hansberry, San Anselmo, CA, finished 2nd in the spirited competition. Marilyn McGrew, Auburn, CA nailed down 3rd, and GN XV winner Mary Herrmann, Alamo, CA took 4th. Herrmann runs her MRP's to well over 600 this cribbage year with this high finish.

Roger King, a Master pegger from Santa Clara, took top honors in the qualifying round, and finished 9-16, earning an aggregate 66 MRP's. His year's totals are at the 900 mark...and gives King a shot at All-American honors.

64 peggers played the Consolation, and Mary K. Ryan, a Master pegger from San Lorenzo won the event. Darren Black, Portland, OR, finished 2nd...and is making a late-season MRP move. He is at the 800 mark for this season. Boyd McDonald, a Master pegger from Mountain View, CA, took 3rd, followed by local John Prehn in 4th. Prehn is a new member and is off to a fine start in sanctioned pegging.

Director Vern Kennebeck reported \$540 was donated to the Senior Center in Paradise. He also reports that this event will be played again next June 5-6-7, 1998.

Shawn Jordan Wins Granite State High Roller

The annual Granite State Classic is one of the ACC's unusual matches. The format is double-elimination, best 4 of 7, and comes with a "high roller" \$100 entry fee.

This time around, Shawn Jordan, Norwood, MA came away the winner, copping a sizeable top prize in this 52-pegger match.. His last match was with the streaking Brenda Palmer, the Eastern Region's MRP front-runner. Palmer hails from W. Springfield, MA. She took home some 65 MRP's, keeping her at the top of the national leaderboard for 1997.

Director (and Life Master) Al Miller took home the 3rd-place prize as this 15th-ranked (lifetime) ACC member continues his fine play. Phil Martin (Hartford) took 4th. Martin was a member of the 1996 Eastern Region All-Star team.

34 players stayed for the Consolation and Stan Bochinski, Tonawanda, NY, won going away. He nipped Sue Cousens, Windham, ME, in the final playoff match. Jeanne Biadasz (Blackstone, MA) and Donna LaFleur (Bristol, CT) finished 3rd and 4th.

Next year's pegging in this format will come with added Master Points. All double-elimination matches (National Open in Raleigh, NC and others) will offer the top 1/8 finishers 30 MRP's (in lieu of qualifying points) in addition to the normal playoff MRP's. In this 52-player match, for example, the top 9 players (and ties) would score an additional 30 MRP's. In this match, 9 thru 12 are tied, so 12 players would score the 30 MRP's. This new format answers criticism that double-elimination matches do not offer qualifying points. The "30" number is the average number scored by players in the standard qualifying round matches.

Paul Barnes Given Back Pat







In our Montana events, we advertise "96% cash paybacks in all events" and we invite your analysis! As for the Q-Pool paybacks, this should also be advertised before play. Most Western Region events pay 1 in 8 (whereas 1 in 4 qualify). Hang in there, most ACC events are played fair and square ... and the ACC's BOD is working hard to get all events on the right track! Ed.

Cribbage Pegs

Boyd McDonald, Mountain View, CA, recently sat near a pegger who played with outlandishly tall pegs, that caused several players to complain. McDonald proposes that the rules be changed as follows:

1) Pegs may not be more than two inches long.
2) Pegs must be basically straight and symmetrical along the length and must be equal to or less than 5/16 of an inch in any cross-sectional diameter.

Mix The Cards

I have an addition to Joe Wergin's saying "Trust everyone but cut the cards." How about: "Trust everyone but mix the cards well." Some dealers are lazy shufflers or lack good manual dexterity and unfortunately there is the possibility of it being done in a purposeful manner. There are situations where a quick shuffle could be advantageous to the dealer, i. e., the dealer is 35 holes out, the pone is 25 holes out. The advantages are: 1) parts of the deck are in multiple runs, pairs, 3 of a kind, from the previous hands. This can result in larger than normal hands. 2) It is more difficult for the pone to throw defensively in the crib from like cards. 3) It makes it difficult for the pone to lead into like cards.

I have a self-test for players: arrange the suits in order from ace to king. Put the red suits next to each other and add the black ones on top. Do your normal shuffling and turn the cards over to see how many cards are still grouped in a row. If there are a lot, maybe you could try a different combination of mixing or do it a little more.

I would like to mention that the following procedure is encouraged by the ACC to speed play and allow ample mixing time. The pone, after pegging his hand, can and should set the starter card aside and begin to mix the remaining cards as the dealer is counting his hands.

When I reshuffle, I am not questioning my opponents integrity so I hope they are not offended. I am only ensuring that we have a deck of randomly mixed cards. I encourage others to do the same. Any comments?

Yes Bob, I would like to add my sad results from re-shuffling my opponent's deal. Recently, I was playing a very nice lady in a playoff match, and she was having difficulty mixing the cards. She simply was unable to mixthem very well, and I reshuffled on two occasions. This, of course, irritated her, and I was accused of upsetting her greatly. This was not my intent, as I simpy wanted a good shuffle. In my opinion, no matter how tactfully you try to handle a reshuffle, you run the risk of offending your opponent. King Solomon, where are you? Ed.

Two items for what they're worth! First: Solution for the pegging out controversy...use this rule only in tournaments employing the Muggins rule. It falls in the same category! Both sides have cogent arguments but I hope the ACC BOD recognizes the need to NOT discourage new members in Grass Roots and tournament play.

Peg Out Rule

I fully support the pegging out rule. For the same reason(s), other rules need to be dropped and/or changed! If a person underpegs their hand, they should be allowed to correct their mistake (new players tend to be nervous). If your opponent picks up their front peg instead of their back peg, for heavens sake, do not penalize them, allow them to put it back. If a person starts to peg backwards, you need to stop them and put the pegs where they belong. A player got so excited about getting a 29-hand, they pegged it backwards. This is not right, they earned the points and should get them! If a person overpegs, they should move back, but why should you get penalty points? They may lose the game and get upset, besides, you are enforcing the rules to your advantage! Why should a player be penalized 15 points if they mistakenly peg out when they don't have enough points? This is not fair! If a person forgets to peg a hand or crib, their opponent should remind them and let them peg those points. The point, the argument against the pegging out rule can be applied to a lot of our rules.

There are several reasons for rules, the most obvious is to define a level of acceptable behavior and a means of punishing transgressors. Altough rare, we do have some bad apples in our ranks. I view the pegging out rule as a means to help identify the unscrupulous player, who is trying to steal a game.



Unnecessary crowding is a very common practice. If you have the extra space, use it!
