Record Crowd

John Blowers Tops In Florida

John Blowers, a pegger from Casselberry, FL came away the winner at the record-breaking Jim Arblaster/Florida Open November 17. Blowers is a member of the local Grass Roots club, and by topping the field of 136 players came away with 170 MRPs (after qualifying 7th) and \$830.

Ken Cambell, a pegger from Modoc, SC, is the ACC's Historian...and he can add his name to cribbage history books with his 2nd place finish (and after qualifying 4th his MRP take was 168!). He garnered a nice \$700.

Chip Digiovanni, Deltona, FL, and Justin Gorman, Englewood, FL finished 3rd and 4th.

Curtis Lien, Davenport, FL, had the hot hand in the qualifying round, taking honors. He continued on to finish in the 9-16 bracket and earned a combined 93 MRP's.

"Snowbirds" warmed to the task in the 90-pegger Consolation. Doug Page, a Master pegger from Appleton, WI took home the marbles, followed by Roy Ellis, a pegger from Englewood, CO. Local Betty Schaeffer nailed 3rd, and Aggie Mikulsky, Sobieski, WI took 4th.

Director Paul Barnes had a full array of satellite events, beginning with Friday singles. With some 102 peggers kicking off this event, Jack Allison, Smyrna, GA began the weekend in grand style by winning (and taking home \$436). Saturday night had a fine crowd (90) and Jack Ledbetter, Hialeah, FL came away the winner (and \$474). Victor Struminger (Atlanta, GA) nailed the Last Chance.

In addition to these satellite events, Barnes also had a unique Grass Roots Challenge. GR 147 Port Charlotte, FLedged GR 22 Greater Orlando, FL by a combined score average of 24.62 to 22.74 (qualifying round scores).

Bruce Corson (FL), Neal Burkett (FL), and Roy Ellis (CO) played 28-hands, but no 29's showed.

Grass Roots Commissioner Eugene Mikulsky was on hand to "inspect" Florida cribbage, but his wife Aggie brought home the most "travel money."

Cribbage World awards director Barnes "Director of the Year" for his detailed (and easily read) tournament report. Barnes will be the director of Grand National XVII. This annual event will be played in Daytona Beach in September, 1998.

Cribbage Players Are Always Interested In Numbers

We're talking about 15-2s and 29s and best 3-out-of-5...not the 32-24-36 shemale variety.

Comes the wind-up of 1996 and the beginning of the new year 1997, we're at the halfway mark in our ACC '96-'97 fiscal and record-keeping year.

According to Membership Secretary Jeff Monroe, we're heading into the new calendar year with a paid membership of 6,620.

Californialeads with 1,305 members, Oregon is second with 645; Wisconsin has 614 members; Massachusetts, 432; and Washington, 407.

Grass Roots statistician Joe Ramos tells me we have 127 active Grass Roots clubs playing a regular schedule of weekly and bi-weekly games, with 3,000 cribbers participating in this nationwide local activity. There's another 100-plus Grass Roots clubs who have their programs "on ice" for various reasons, since Commissioner Gene Mikulsky has chartered 232 Grass Roots clubs all over the U.S.A.

The Grass Roots five Regional tournaments drew 1,419 participants and the Grass Roots National tournament topped that with 1,421 entrants, Ramos reports.

Statistician Bob McCabe gave me the following tournament data:

Tournament-wise, the four ACC Tournament Commissioners sanctioned 136 tournaments last year, drawing 15,570 players, an average of 114.5 persons in each tourney. There were also 120 Consolation tournaments, with 9,299 participating, an average of 77.5 per tourney.

The largest sanctioned tournament of the year was the Joseph Petrus Wergin Open in Reno, Nevada, which drew an all-time high of 1,020 players. The Consolation event played the same weekend drew 790 players, to win honors as the second largest tournament.

Other major tournaments included the MGM in Green Bay, WI, 440 players; Veteran's Day in Reno, NV, 394; the 25th Annual World Championship in Quincy, CA ("the granpappy of 'em all!), 372; and the Massachusetts Grand National, 342.

A new, faster computer has been obtained for Statistician Bob McCabe and will be installed with the new tabulation software right after the Board of Directors meeting in Reno, NV, January 30, when a final decision is to be made on the revised Master Point system.

Helen Railsback Tops Jesse James Open

Helen Railsback, a newly crowned Grand Master from Syracuse, NE, copped the recent Jesse James Open in Northfield, MN. In topping the 104-pegger field, Railsback took home a nice bundle of MRP's (145 total, after qualifying 6th) and a sizeable cash prize.

Newly crowned Life Master Russell Adams. the Minneapolis professor, came close, but was mesmerized by Railsback's multitude of peg combinations (see story, this issue), and settled for 2nd. His 109 MRP's earned have propelled him into the national MRP race for this cribbage year. He has topped the 500 mark and is among the leaders.

Robert Chase from nearby Crystal, MN took 3rd, and the travelling Master pegger from Colorado...Roger Wilson...took 4th.

Chase was also top qualifier (34 16 +96) and took home a combined 139 MRP's.

Todd Schaefer (MN) nailed 8 for 9 in the Consolation qualifying round to take honors (and finished 5th in the playoffs), but Les Kvien, Minneapolis, came away the champion in this 52-pegger event. Nicky Kniech (WI) nailed 2nd, followed by two ACC All-Stars in 3rd and 4th...Bob Julian and Joe Bernard. Julian is 11th all-time and Bernard ranks 4th all-time.

John Worley nailed the 1987 National Open...and he came close in this event as well. This Burlington, NC pegger finished a nufty 2nd this time around...and picked up some 105 MRP's (after qualifying 7th)

Loren Wakeling from nearby Sterling, VA finished 3rd, and 1992 National Champion Phyllis Schmidt, Williamstown, MA took 4th. Schmidt qualified 3rd and took home an even 100 MRP's.

Larry Phifer, Raleigh, NC, had the hot hand in the qualifying round, and a 9-16 finished garnered some 41 MRP's.

29-hand number six for this cribbage year made Richard Kerr \$100 richer. The ACC pays any bonafide member \$100 for this 216,580 to 1 rarity. Kerr hails from Newtown, PA.

Joyce Bryant from nearby Jarrettsville won the 60-pegger Consolation. Richard "Chaz" Meniak (NY), Marvin Lewis (VA), and Kate McNemar (DC) finished 2-3-4.

Director Steven Sattler plans on renewing this event again next November 7-8-9. Mark your calendars.

Bruce Wridge 1-1 in Oregon

Bruce Wridge continues his winning ways as this Portland, OR pegger has won yet another sanctioned event. Beginning last February with his \$10,000 win in Reno, Wridge has had many fine tournament performances the past few months. This time around he qualified first, and then captured the playoffs as well in winning the 66-pegger Prineville Lions Open in Prineville, OR. Peggers finishing 2-3-4 were Clair Morse (OR), Doug Brown (WA), and George Rasmussen (WA). Jerry Blackman from nearby Bend won the 48-pegger Consolation. Rod Schott (WA), Susan Chambers (OR), and Margery Clark (OR) finished 2-3-4. Director Bob St. Yves will play this event again next November.

29-Hand In Doubles

Dave Proctor, E. Longmeadow, reports that a young lady scored a 29-hand in doubles...and that's with ONLY FIVE CARDS! Proctor reports he will buy her a special board as a Christmas present! This match pits One-Star Mick Michaelis, Marinette, WI vs. Brian Heroux, the ACC's youngest Grand Master from Woonsocket, RI. Michaelis, a Hall of Famer, won this National Long Match play last year. This match...and the finals should be exciting, as all three players are highly ranked and very experienced.

Spokane War Zone Draws 38 Eldon Schwilke Tops In Washington

Eldon Schwilke, pegging on his home turf, ripped through the 38-pegger crowd at the recent Christmas Tournament in Spokane, WA. In this one-day event (a rarity in the Northwest), Schwilke won 12 of 14 games, scoring a top-qualifying 26+153. His hot streak continued on into the playoffs and he came away with the championship. Schwilke, hampered by multiple sclerosis, employs a helper to deal the cards, but his play remains on a high level as he decimated the crowd.

Gerald Baird from nearby Post Falls, Idaho, finishd 2nd, as he, too, was unable to cope with Schwilke's long run. Local Gil Johnson, nearing his Grand Master rating, finished 3rd. Keith Forrest, Stevensville, MT took 4th.

No Consolation was played but the director Don Bain had two satellite events. The winners were Mike Haggerty, Missoula, MT, and Bruce Gentry, Kennewick, WA.

Spokane resembled a war zone as an ice and wind storm a week earlier had decimated the landscape. Trees were down over a wide area, and many were denuded of limbs. Electrical power was still off in surrounding areas, as many power poles were snapped and lines down for miles at a stretch. The local Eagles Lodge was without cable TV, as that line was down, also. This situation keep many peggers at "home by the fire." Those that showed were dedicated peggers, attested to by the low qualifying score...two 16's qualified (with a 14-game card!)

Hermiston, OR is Peggers "Safe Haven"

For the second time in ACC history, Hermiston, OR has come to the aid of a director in need of a place to play... after a scheduled event was abruptly cancelled.

In 1982, the late Joe Nelson had his Washington Championship in Pasco, WA cancelled at a late date by an over-zealous local sheriff, and he was forced to play in Hermiston (some 30 miles away).

This time around, Bob Brumley had his Washington State Open in Sunnyside cancelled at the last moment...and he, too, had to make a quick change. He opted for the Eagles Lodge in Hermiston, and the show went on!

Rasmussen "Off and Running"

George "Ras" Rasmussen is a newly appointed Regional Commissioner (Region II), and this Chehalis, WA pegger is off and running with his new job.

He is also club director of the Chehalis-Centralia Grass Roots club in Western Washington, and this up-and-coming club has already signed on 21 new members for the American Cribbage Congress.

Skunk Bank Broken in Florida Paul Barnes is club director of GR #22 in Winter Garden, FL.

This club pays \$25 for a 28-hand and \$100 for a 29-hand. On November 14th, with 26 players in attendance, the bank was broken!

First, Bill Sams scores a 28-hand for a nice \$25! Shortly thereafter, Betty Schaeffer plays that elusive 29-hand...\$100! Russ Fisher, not to be outdone, then scores another 28-hand and collects his \$25.

Director Dick Ogden reports this event will be played again next March or April, and they may possibly schedule a 3-day event.

This 3-time All-American recently qualified 11th and finished in the 9-16 bracket at the River City Open in Sacramento, CA, and, unofficially, has earned the ACC's 24th Life Master award. Statistician Bob McCabe will confirm the numbers in next month's issue.

Hatcher is a member of the ACC's Board of Directors and puts in yoeman's effort with the Ethics Committee, and recently has been diligently working on the new MRP system. A retired budget officer (State of Oregon) makes him a natural with working with numbers. His analysis of cribbage numbers has paid off with a whopping 6,000+ MRP's in the last six years.

Late Release...Perkins Tops Connecticut Yankee

"Cribbage Boards Are Scoring Big With Collectors"

With that headline, the January issue of "Today's Collector" magazine described the hobby of collecting cribbage boards.

Writer Anne Gilbert introduced her article: "Cribbage, an always popular game, reached its peak in the 1970s. It was considered trendy to replace expensive chess sets with even pricier cribbage boards..."


Cribbage World wonders where that information came from? The ACC was founded in 1979, and has been flourishing into the 1980s and 1990s.

At any rate, she reported that inlaid English boards are considered choice. They consist of hundreds of tiny pieces that form different scenes. Advertising motifs are hot items, too. Boards advertising Coca Cola (before WWII) and others are very collectible.

Gilbert also wrote about the "Push-down and pull-up" boards made in the early part of the 20th Century (these have been described in *Cribbage World*). She also claims that the Bakelite boards made in the 1920's are more highly prized than Celluloid boards dating back to the mid-1800s.

She closed her article by saying, "Save the box whenever possible."

Gulp! Russell Adams Out \$100?

In the November issue of Cribbage World, Russell Adams and George Bright answered the quiz: "What is the most points a player can score in one deal?"

They came up with 78. A dealer would hold 3-3-4-4-5-5, and the non-dealer would hold 3-3-4-4-5-J. The dealer discards the pair of 5's, and the non-dealer discards the 5-J. The starter card would be a 5 that matched the jack for a 29-crib. With pegging four-of-a-kind twice, and a "go", the dealer would score 29 pegs, score a 20 hand and a 29 crib for the total 78 points.

Russell Adams was so sure his answer was the best, he offered any ACC player \$100 if they could top that score.

Oops, David Shifflett, Monterey, CA, faxed CW a description of a 79-point hand. "Both players hold 3-3-4-4-5-5, and both players discard 5-5. The starter is a jack, giving the dealer an additional TWO POINTS! The dealer will peg 31, score a 20-hand, and a 28-crib for a nifty 79!"

CW made a quick telephone call to Russell Adams, and reported this 79 hand! Russell mulled this over, and asked for Mr. Shifflett's address...as he would mail him the \$100.

Two days later (Thanksgiving Day), CW's editor received a phone call from Warren Sondericker in Milwaukee. He said Russell Adams was there for Thanksgiving dinner...and he was bemoaning his lost \$100. However, Martha Fingleton had piped up, "Russell, you are a turkey! That's no 79-hand! With the jack cut, the dealer's hand is 3-3-4-4-J...only FOUR POINTS! The hand totals 31 + 4 + 28 = 63! No \$100!"

So Russell, instead of being the turkey on turkey day, heartily enjoyed eating his Thanksgiving turkey!

CW's advice to Dave is to "Keep pegging!"

And with this reprieve, Adams will give any ACC member \$20 if they can beat his 48-point total score for the non-dealer. His 48-point hand: non-dealer holds 4-4-5-5, and cuts a 6 for 24. The dealer holds 4-4-5-K. Non-dealer leads 5, dealer pairs 5, non-dealer triples 5 for 15 (for 8), dealer plays a 4 for "19." Non-dealer pairs 4 for "23." Dealer triples 4 for "27." Non-dealer plays 4th 4 for "31 for 14!" Non-dealer scores a total 24-total pegs. 24 + 24 = 48. Beat that and win \$20 from Adams. Adams will pay the first winner only...he's a little nervous!

Shifflett Wants "Realistic" Best Hand Score

Far from being dismayed by his lost \$100, David Shifflett comes up with his own quiz: "What is the most points that can be scored by a player making a realistic discard?"

He comes up with a "realistic" 70!

Dealer holds 4-4-5-5-6, and throws 4-4 to his own crib (debatable, put perhaps logical). The non-dealer holds 4-5-7-9-10-J), and throws the 4-7, keeping the 5-9-10-J (logical).

The pegging goes 10-(5)-5-(5-5-6) with dealer pegging 23 points, and with a 4 cut for the starter, scores 23-hand and 24-crib for a nifty 70! And it's logical!

11-Year Old Player Wants \$100, Too! Adam Deane scores 86-points!

An 11-year old player from Fairfax, VA demands \$100 from Russell Adams for beating his 78-point total hand! Adam Deane claims Adams said nothing about how many players were involved...and he sits down three players for a 3-player game...and the dealer scores 86 points!

Dealer: 3-3-4-4-5 Pone 1: A-3-4-7-5 Pone 2: 2-3-4-9-5

All three players discard 5's. The dealer dealt crib a jack. The cut 5 matched the jack for a 29-crib.

The pegging: A-2-3 (dealer for "3")-3-3-3 (dealer for "14")-4-4 (dealer for "6") -"go," "go,"-4 (dealer for "14"). Dealer scores 37 peg points, a 20-hand and a 29-crib for a total 86 points!

Cribbage World contacted Russell Adams and he says "No Way! The contest was for a standard two-player hand!"

Sorry Adam...but keep pegging!

I've heard that cribbage is 80% luck and 20% skill. Assuming this is true, I sure do give a bundle of credibility to that 20% which is skill related. I say this because I see the same names making the playoffs in most every tournament I attend.
