Record 456 in Wisconsin Dells

GN XVI: Pat Barrett

456 peggers from 31 states and Canada descended on Wisconsin Dells, WI in late September for Grand National XVI. Wisconsin Dells is a small resort town, and in September just about the only action around was the huge cribbage meet at the Holiday Inn.

And the action was hot and heavy. With the record crowd adding excitement to the air, the Main Event got off to a fast start. In game two, Douglas Anderson, a pegger from Madison, WI scored a 29-hand (he will receive \$100 from the ACC for this gem), and the crowd was off. Clay Collier, a 1990 Grand National winner, appeared on track to repeat. This Nebraska pegger topped the field in the qualifying round with a nice 37 18/22 +153 to take honors.

But when the long and arduous qualifying and playoff rounds were played to the finish, Director Patrick Barrett came away the grand winner! With all the distractions of managing this large crowd, winning the event is doubly amazing. The win was also doubly satisfying to Barrett, as he zipped to his Life Master rating (the ACC's 29th), in addition to leading the nation in MRP's in this year's early going.

Master Roy Banducci, Arroyo Grande, CA came close to grabbing all the marbles, but simply could not match Barrett's cards in the final match, falling 0-4. However, 2nd place is this large match garnered Banducci 196 MRP's and he is among the nation's leaders in the early going.

Grand Master Lloyd Kraft, Seymour, WI nailed 3rd, with Tony Sterzingea, Colby, WI in 4th.

A whopping 294 peggers played the Consolation, and veteran Master Charlie Ball, Everett, WA came away the winner. He took home some 108 MRP's. Master Larry Hassett, an ACC BOD member from Roseburg, OR took home 2nd, followed by Master George Johnson, Fitchburg, MA and Life Master Rit Alkas, Manchester, CT in 3rd and 4th.

Director Barrett had the usual satellite events and huge crowds attended every match. The winners:

The President's Column

Kudos to GN XVI

Writing this freshly from the record-breaking 16th Annual Grand National tournament at Wisconsin Dells Holiday Inn.

My congratulations to Pat and Linda Barrett, and the whole Barrett clan, for a really "Sweet 16" event. Good location, good accommodations, good attendance (an all-time high of 456 players!)...no complaints.

They really set a pattern for Paul Barnes, John Groz & company to match in next year's 17th Annual Grand National scheduled at Ramada Resorts Oceanfront in Daytona Beach on October 22-25, 1998. Mark it down in your calendar now.

During its Semi-annual meeting, the new ACC Board of Directors voted the 18th Annual Grand National to be held at the Riviera Casino/Hotel in Las Vegas, NV on September 10-12, 1999. Bob Julian is director, assisted by Bob Gromek, and Roy and Jeanne Hofbauer. Larry Hassett submitted an unsuccessful bid for the '99 event in Roseburg, OR.

Three newly elected directors were welcomed to the ACC Board: Annett Eiffert of Citrus Heights, CA; Sundae Webb, Pittsburg, CA; and a retread elected again, Lea Hornbeck, Washougal, WA.

"Sweet Ol' Bey" (S.O.B.) was elected President for the 5th year. Serving with me on the Executive Committee will be Syl Lulinski, executive vice-president; Paul Hatcher, vice president-policy; Joe Ramos, vice president-operations; and Jim Ready, executive member-at-large.

Chairmen of four standing committees were appointed by the Executive Committee: Rules, Syl Lulinski; Tournament Guidelines, George Bickford; Public Relations, Ev Bey; and Grass Roots Clubs, Gene Mikulsky, commissioner.

Besides Lulinski, the Rules Committee included Joe Bernard, Jeanne Hofbauer, Aggie Mikulsky and Cathy Perkins. They presented some 30 proposed rules changes (mostly language clarifications) which were adopted. The most improtant saw elimination of the controversial "pegging Out" rule (Paragraph VII, Section 10), replacing it with three actions which shall be considered equivalent to pegging out, winning the game: recording the game outcome on a scorecard; placing his/her peg in one of the game/record holes; or advancing a game/record peg.

These new rules will not go into effect until a revised Rules Book is published and distrubuted to the membership; expected about January 1, 1998. Meanwhile, the present Rules Book and the current "pegging out" requirements are still in effect.

George Bickford, National and Eastern Region Tournament Commissioner, heads the Tournament Guidelines committee, assisted by two other Tournament Commissioners, Joe Bernard, Central Region; and Roy Hofbauer, Western Region. Their proposed new compilation of Tournament Rules and Guidelines was approved, with changes, and will be distrubuted to all Tournament Directors.

My P. R. committee includes Bob Julian, Bill Cambpell, Phil Babcock and has been expanded to add Steve Sattler, publisher of the ACC's new web site home page on the World Wide Internet.

Paul Hatcher was re-elected chairman of the Ethics committee, which includes the 3 Tournament Commissioners, George Bickford, Joe Bernard and Roy Hofbauer, as well as Jim Ready, Martha Fingleton and Sundae Webb, two each from the Eastern and Central Regions and three representing the majority membership of the Western Region.

The American Cribbage Congress's annual Awards Banquet was held on Saturday night and well over 100 ACC members and their families were in attendance. Martha Fingleton was inducted into the Cribbage Hall of Fame, in addition to receiving her Life Master award. Two-Star, One-Star, Life master, Grand Master, and Master awards were presented, as well as 18 29-hand awards. President Ev Bey presented the President's Award to Ron Hamilton and National Grass Roots awards were also on tap. The closing ceremonies presented the top ten players from the 1997 season with their All-American awards. And, as usual, Martha Fingleton and Scott Kooistra were expert in their Master of Ceremony duties and the program ran smoothly.

Grand National XVI, under the expert guidance of Patrick Barrett and a bevy of helpers ran a first-class event. Next year's Grand National will be played in Daytona Beach, Florida, with Paul Barnes heading up the program. Barnes has a long history of running fine tournaments, and GN XVII should be a winner! The event will be played in October, instead of the usual Sepember dates. Mark vour calendars.

Unique Wine & Cheese Tasting Event Roger Wilson Tops 182 in Napa

Grand Master Roger Wilson zipped among the leaders in the National MRP race by winning the huge 16th Annual Wine Valley Open in Napa, CA September 20. This Colorado pegger scored 897 MRP's last year, narrowly missing a top ten spot, and is off and winging in the new year.

Russell Nelsen, another Grand Master pegging out of Scottsdale, AZ slugged it out with Wilson in the final playoff match, but Wilson prevailed. Nevertheless, Nelsen's 147 MRP's also places him among the leaders this fledgling cribbage year.

Bod Bodine and Mike Wiley both hail from Antioch, CA...and they tied for the 3rd spot. The MRP take? 105 MRP's each.

Jay Sorensen (CA) topped the field of 182 peggers in the qualifying round to take honors.

Scott Milo (CA) was smoking in the Consolation event as he scored 18 GP's in the 8-game event. Dave Thorne, Bill Pope, and Ratso Roderick (all California peggers) finished 2-3-4. Due to time limitations caused by the wine and cheese tasting, this event had no playoffs, and, as a consequence, was not sanctioned.

Richard Flatto (CA) teamed with Randal Blair (NM) to win the doubles event on Friday night.

Director Jack Monroe reported that this popular event hosted players from 8 states and continues to draw a large crowd. This year's event did not conflict with the Grand National, giving players a chance to play both events.

Rex Paddock Wins Montana Championship
Co-Director Rex Paddock stunned Bernie Saueressig (WA)
with three come-from behind wins on fourth street in the
final match to cop the 114-pegger Montana Championship
October 5th. Paddock has been a long-time co-director of
this annual match, and finally came home with the roses.

He had won two Consolation titles in the past, but the main

event had eluded his grasp.

1989 champ Ron Whyde (Helena) took 3rd, and a rare North Dakota player (Allan Stanek) captured 4th. Stanek also was high qualifier (38 GP's), bringing home an aggregate 130 MRP's.

Mike McDaniel (WA) continues to win the Consolation, having finished in the top four for four consecutive years. Betty Johnson (WA) took 2nd, with Jim Keeling (WA) and Jim Gogolin (OR) in 3rd and 4th.

Mabton, WA's Jack Moritzky finished 2nd at last year's Washington State Open, and this was just a warm up for the "big one!" He won the 180-pegger Longest Beach Open in Long Beach, WA on October 19. Moritzky is a veteran pegger in the Northwest and has had several near misses, but he cashed in one of the largest events played in this region. And enroute to his win, he scored a 28-hand to aid his winning effort.

Jim Langley, Red Bluff, CA, played steady cards to a 2nd place finish, followed by Pat Ward, Kirkland, WA, and Tom Berquist (WA) in 3rd and 4th.

Two-Star DeLynn Colvert (MT) had his best qualifying round ever, with a 38 (18) +183, to pull down top qualifying round honors.

126 peggers played the Consolation, and Adrian Levy (CA) missed his plane when he continued to roll through the playoffs. When he came away the winner, and realized he had missed his plane, he could care less! (Another pegger gave him a ride to the Portland Airport for a later flight). Ike Endicott (OR), Roger Lueschow (WA), and Bernie Saueressig (WA) nailed down 2-3-4.

The town council in Long Beach donated \$2,000 to the prize fund, and directors Arlene and Hal Halldorson, Jeanne and Roy Hofbauer dutifully divided the money to all events, and, indeed, this event had the best cash paybacks ever paid in this region.

Master Point Clarification

There has been some confusion about qualifying round Master Rating Points.

ONLY THE TOP ONE-EIGHTH SCORE MRP'S!

The confusion seems to be caused by the starting point 27-5. Rarely, if ever, will a 27 GP card score qualifying round MRP's. This arbitrary starting point was established to ensure our membership of scoring MRP's equal to those scored in years past. Normally, a 30 or 31 GP card will be required to earn those qualifying round points (in a 22-game session). In one-day events with 12 or 14-games, the starting point (15-5 in a 12-game round) will rarely score MRP's.

Remember: ONLY THE TOP 1/8TH!

The qualifying round played 12 games and three players posted a very nice 23 Game Point card (and that's worth 45 MRP's under the new scoring system): Harry Meneely (MA), Dwight Christiansen (CT). and Robert Medeiros (MA).

The Consolation played to 46 peggers and Elinor Breen (MA) came up with the roses. Betty Schaeffer (FL) nailed 2nd, followed by Shawn Jordan (MA) and Holli Umbriana (MA) tied for 3rd, Umbriana had a grand slam 7 for 7 in the qualifying round to take honors.

Some 16 teams played doubles, and Ann Somers teamed with Richard West and took away the top prize. Meneely score the event's only 28-hand.

Director David Clemmey reported the Heart Association received \$100 from the players...and Cribbage World gives Clemmey kudos for a very neat and precise Tournament Report.

You have not won the game if you have not scored 121 points. It is not scored, if it is not pegged. Let us stop nitpicking and get on to more important things, like being good sports throughout the game.



Bickford finished in the 33-48 bracket, just missing the bonus...and came away with only 25 MRP's.





Additions to Tournament of Champions Invite Criteria

Last month's CW listed the Invite Criteria for the upcoming Tournament of Champions (a meet by invite only) that will be played in Reno January 30, 1998.

The top 16 finishers from last year's TOC are automatically invited to the following year's match. In addition, the Consolation Champion has an invite to the following year's match.

Cease And Desist!

Any members or group using the ACC's Federal Taxpayer ID number for accounting purposes should immediately desist from this practice.

This follows a recommendation from Roger Wilson's annual audit.

No More Inserts!

The U. S. Postal Service's regulations for advertising continues to plague the ACC. Jeff Monroe, the ACC's postal contact, received a bill for some \$1,400 for inserts in the Northwestern section of the country. Earlier, in Missoula, these inserts were judged to be germaine to the ACC's operations and not considered advertising.

In discussing the problem at the recent BOD meeting, a decision was made to stop inserting flyers, effective January 1, 1998. Those tournament directors that wish to advertise their tournaments can do so by simply designing an ad that will be printed along with that month's Cribbage World (and will be received by the entire membership, not a single region). The cost is comparable. A full page ad (several examples are in this issue) for a tournament is \$72.25. A 1/3 page ad is \$29.75. This amount covers the cost of printing that page, and is a service provided by the ACC to tournament directors.

Las Vegas, Here We come!

Grand National XVIII will be played at the Riviera Hotel and Casino in Las Vegas in 1999.

The Board of Directors voted 18-5 in favor of this site at the recent Wisconsin meeting.

GNXVIII director Robert Gromek is an employee of the Riviera, and he promises a great meet. This Casino has ample facilities and hotel rooms to easily conduct this annual affair. And, of course, Las Vegas is a favorite gathering place for conventions...and is emphasizing family fun recently. A building boom continues to add unique (and astounding) architecture to the city.

GNXVIII promises to be a memorable event.

Entry Deadline: Jan. 26, 6 PM ACC Open Limited to 1,024 Players

The upcoming ACC Open will be limited to the first 1,024 players. This match will be played January 31 and February 1, 1998 at the Sands in Reno.

Entry forms are in this issue's centerfold. Director's Roy & Jeanne Hofbauer, and Scott Kooistra recommend that those players who have procrastination problems will be well advised to resist that temptation...and enter early!

This match promises to be the premier event of the cribbage season. The host facility (The Sands) is adding \$3,500 to the prize fund, and the top prize in recent years has been \$10,000!

A preliminary match (on Friday, January 30) is the annual Tournament of Champions, This match is by invite only, and players qualifying for this event will receive an invitation by mail from director Joan Rein.

Another unique match will be played on Thursday evening, January 29. This is the annual All-Star match. The top eight players from each Region (1997 season) will be pitted against the top eight players from other Regions (a 16-game match). The December issue of Cribbage World will have details.

Charles Rapoza, Gene Sissel Earn Grand Master



Grass Roots Players Slighted?

Kudo's are in order for your continued excellence in putting together Cribbage World as well as your (and the BOD and many others) efforts in not only promoting the game, but making necessary changes within the game. Thank you.

Now, let's continue the progression towards fairness. Keep in mind one important fact...Grass Roots is the foundation. Week after week, thousands of people all across the nation play 9 games, tournament style, in a competitive, friendly environment. Hence, Master Points, under the new system, should be awarded. Why should people who cannot afford to travel great distances be unfairly discriminated against receiving MRP's?

Tournaments are great, provided you have the money. Cash prizes and the MRP's are nice for those who afford it. However, there is no difference as to scoring or playing in a tournament than that of grass roots. Yes, you may play 16 or so games to qualify and then play in the playoffs. Still, format is the same, you keep track of your wins and the points. Why should this have more value than grass roots? You are providing the cash incentive and a plaque as the value and rightly so for those who are able to travel. You play just as hard in grass roots and basically have the playoffs within those 9 games as players vying for the top 20%.

Concerning the so called grass roots tournament...why declare to even have one? One? Translation: Those who are unable to attend tournaments only receive one chance for MRP's by playing in the GR tournament, while, again, those fortunate enough to be able to afford to travel can enter many more tournaments. NOT FAIR. The title of #1 player in the east or west or wherever has little value as it does not reflect the populace of cribbage players. It only has value to those "select" few who are fortunate enough to participate in ACC events.

This leads me to the BOD. When we vote, I would venture to say that a majority of people only know those who are on the ballot through reading Cribbage World. We really don't know much about these people and their willingness to better the game for the whole and not a few. I am sure that these members and players such as yourself who have the opportunity to enter numerous tournaments and enjoy the benefits of vying for those coveted MRP's and cash prizes would never want to see grass roots incorporated into the MRP's. It would open the entire nation of players and would no longer be a select few winning all the MRP's. That, my friend, is unfair! Imagine how exciting it would be for everyone to have an opportunity to compete nationally for MRP's and a national ranking. Does this not generate more interest and enthusiasm while increasing more support for the grass roots which in turn supports the

overall success of the ACC? You can still have your national this and national that tournaments so those select few can feel good about getting their name in a magazine and being called the best. They were, perhaps for that day in that tournament.

I am sure your argument at this point is that the ACC has made a distinction between the tournaments and grass roots and both receive their just rewards. Again, not true. Nearly the entire magazine is dedicated to tournaments (and that's fine to make people aware) with little attention being given to grass roots. And, once again, the majority of peggers will never have the chance to compete on a national level with those select few!

Let's open if for everyone, everywhere. Let's be democratic as well and put this to a vote for the polulace to decide, not the BOD. Let the Board modify, implement and present the proposal and then put it to a vote. Put it in the magazine and while we're at that, put the peg out rule to a vote as well. All in the name of progress and betterment of the game.

If this matter ever goes to the BOD, or for that matter, past you, I sincerely hope it is presented fairly and makes it to those who really matter...the thousands of players who support the ACC every week. If the BOD can get past the "select" few mentality and accept national fairness, then let's move forward.
