Ken Benson Tops 341 in Green Bay

Ken Benson, pegging out of Hastings, MI, came home the winner at the huge MGM Open in Green Bay, WI on February 28. In topping the 341-player field, Benson took home a whopping 252 MRP's...and the grand prize as well! Life Master Syl. Eulinski (IL) nailed 2nd...and 196 MRP's. Ron Selissen (WI) and Gary Schmidt (WI) took home 3rd and 4th. Both players hail from Green Bay. Harvey Rasmussen (MI) smoked the field in the qualifying round, scoring a nifty 39 GP's to easily take honors.

Joe L'Hullier (MI) won the 134-player Consolation, edging Life Master Pat Barrett (WI) in the final playoff match. Carol Habighorst (WI) and Stu Lawent (WI) took home 3-4. Co-Director Jerry Lemke (WI) won 8 of 9 in the qualifying round to take honors (17 GP's = 18 MRP's).

Barrett had a great weekend as he copped the High Rollers on Friday night, in addition to his high Consolation finish. But in Green Bay, doubles is the name of the game for the satellite events, and Daryl Kurian and Mike Snell teamed to win this huge event on Friday night. On Saturday, it was Mark Tanck and Kerry Fleming winning at doubles, with Grand Master Don Tofte taking home the singles win. Ron Koziol won the Last Chance event on Sunday.

With the large crowd, nine 28-hands were scored...but the big one was the 29 scored by Ken Rehm (WI) in the Consolation. The MGM awarded \$100, as did the ACC...for a nice \$200 bonus!

And, as usual, Jerry Lemke, Tom Gallagher, and Bob Miller ran a first class event...attested by yet another huge crowd. Green Bay is the place to play cribbage in February!

Sanctioned Tournaments

Are we getting too many sanctioned tournaments?

According to Bob McCabe, Secretary of Statistics, the ACC sanctioned 151 main tournaments last year, just about 3 every weekend, plus 134 consolations. The average number of players was 108.5 and 73.

Of course, the largest was the Joseph Petrus Wergin ACC Open in Reno with 1,024 participants, followed by the JPW/ACC Consolation at 800; the Grand National with 456, MGM at Green Bay (400); and Reno's Veteran's Day at 388. The smallest tournaments were a couple in Hawaii, each drawing 17 players.

Looking over the Tournament Trail in each month's Cribbage World, it seems like there's a tournament every month in Hawaii and Alaska. But there are so few crib players in those remote states that they've got to get together at every opportunity. Gotta keep those wahines and sourdoughs busy. Hawaii has 57 members and Alaska has 122.

Last year, my Roadrunner Classic Arizona State Championship drew 86 participants. This year...in what would have been its 6th year...I had only 29 entries one week before the proposed March 12-14 dates and had to call it off.

There are only 132 cribbage players hiding behind the cacti in AZ, so we've relied on players from California and other West Coast states to fill out the roster. With Cactus League spring training baseball underway at the same time, hotel rooms are at a premium and that affected our draw. I was already out-of-pocket \$129 for flyers, postage, and miscellaneous and couldn't risk ordering meals and other necessities with such a small turnout.

Are other tournament directors facing the same thing?

Officially, the minimum number to hold a sanctioned tournament is 16...but it hardly seems worthwhile to go to all that effort for so few. Also, our 3 Tournament Commissioners are no

longer required to abide by a 400-mile rule for tournaments on the same date.

Being health-restricted in my travels these days, I find that I can only make about 7-8 tournaments a year...3 in Reno, my World Championship in Quincy, CA, the Grand National (wherever it roams), perhaps the MGM in Green Bay (to get back to my home state at least once a year), and a couple in California. I'm sure others are having to make choices too, depending on distances, increasing airline fares, precious family time, etc.

The ACC was formed in 1979 with the intention "to promote cribbage tournaments for the benefit of the players rather than for the benefit of the promoters." With the 85% payback requirement and close monitoring by our tournament commissioners, I think we're accomplishing that goal.

Of course we always hear complaints about this or that tournament where the prize money doesn't seem to correspond to the income. My hat's off to the tournament directors who skimp and scrape to put on a respectable tournament...and the complainers ought to try it themselves before criticizing others.

Ron Hamilton, nomination chairman, tells me we have 33 nominees for the 25 seats of the ACC Board of Directors. 23 incumbents are seeking re-election. With each state limited to 4 directors, California is the only state where a hot contest will take place, with 8 candidates running, 3 being incumbents.

Balletwise, there are 4 nominess from Wisconsin, 3 each from Massachusetts, Oregon and Washington, 2 from Illinois and Minnesota, and 1 each from Arizona, Florida, Montana, North Dakota, Georgia, North Carolina, Indiana and Rhode Island...16 from the West, 10 from the Central region and 7 from the East.

Hoping to get out a larger vote than occurred in previous elections, the Board of Directors has authorized \$3,200 to send ballots by first class mail with a return envelope, rather than inserting it in *Cribbage World* as has been past practice.

Now make it worthwhile...be sure to vote!

Black & Blue Turns Green Darren Black Tops Winnemucca

Some 164 miles east of Reno on I-80 is the small gambling town of Winnemucca...and it is fast becoming a mecca for cribbage players. The Winners Casino sponsors this event (and adds \$1,000 to the prize fund)...and in the 4th annual it was Darren "Black & Blue" Black (Portland, OR) coming home the winner. In 1996, Black earned All-American team honors, but since that time he has admitted that he is "Black...and Blue" when it comes to cribbage. But not this time. Black is back on track with his winning ways as he nailed the 136 peggers enroute to his win (and \$1,400). In addition, he unofficially has earned Grand Master with the win.

John Holseth (OR) came close, but settled for 2nd...and 147 MRP's (and \$1,000+). Newly crowned Master Al Libby (CA) and Master Mary Herrmann (CA) finished 3-4. Helen Bolstad (CA) is nearing her Grand Master and continues a fine year by taking qualifying honors (35 16/22 +182).

John Bourgon (NV) qualified tops in the 109player Consolation and finished 2nd in the playoffs, but Jim Langley (CA), a newly crowned Grand Master continues to burn up the track and won the event. Rosemary Hendricks (WA) and Pamela Garey (CA) finished 3-4.

Henry Douglass Wins His Pool! Master Henry Douglass, Reidsville, NC, is famous for running his winner-take-all \$20 pool... and this time he kept his pool money in his own pocket! He won the 66-player Georgia Open. And he did it in style! He was also the top qualifier, posting 37 GP's in the 20-game round. Tim Schnabel (GA) finished 2nd, followed by Dave Foxwell (GA) and Patricia Goad (GA) in 3-4. Grand Master Ginny Danielski (WI) travels coast-to-coast to do her pegging, and she came away with the Consolation win in the 48-player event. Dave O'Neil (GA) scored a great 20 GP qualifying card to take honors...and finished 2nd. Charles Dolge (NC) and Life Master Frank Danielski (WI) took home 3-4. Danielski also scored a nice 18 GP card in the qualifying round. George Dean keeps 'em pegging in the deep south. He plans a repeat next January 14-16...mark your calendars.

Earle Remingtron Tops Shawn's Special. Master Earle Remington, pegging out of Cumberland, RI, won the 98-pegger Shawn's Special in Woonsocket, RI on February 28. He nipped Steve Brescia (MA) in the final playoff match to take home all the marbles. Medford Smith (MA) had the hot hand in the qualifying round, winning 10 of 12 games, and also came home 3rd in the playoffs. AI Giannotti (MA) took 4th. Master Dorothy Boreham (MA) won the 52-player Consolation, with Grand Master Joe Ramos (RI), Frank Corso (MA), and Master Frank Corrado (CT) in 2-3-4. Grand Master Peter Setian (MA) won 6 of 8 games (with 2 skunks) to take qualifying honors. Charlie Finley scored the meet's only 28-hand. Director Shawn Jordan plans on re-newing this event next February 13 (and Cribbage World thanks Jordan for an extra neat, typed, report!)

Sharlene Medeiros Tops Tri-Valley, Joins National MRP Race. Grand Master Sharlene Medeiros, Shrewsbury, MA, won the huge Tri-Valley Open in Medway, MA on February 14. In topping the 160-player field, Medeiros vaults to the top of the leaderboard in the Eastern Region...and throws her hat into the ring for the national championship for this cribbage year. She stands at nearly 800 MRP's for the year. Her final playoff match was with Marge Kennedy (RI). Kennedy settled for 2nd...and 147 MRP's. Master Barry Spadea (RI) took 3rd, and Cy Madrone from faraway California took home 4th. Master Robert Kaplan scored a great 23 GP card in the 12-game qualifying round to take honors. Tom Fiorini (MA) posted a 16 GP card in the 92-player Consolation to take qualifying honors and came home 2nd in the playoffs. Ray Tondorff (MA) won the event, with Warren Gallagher (MA) and Bill Wall (MA) in 3-4. Director Pat Llewellyn (running for the ACC's BOD) was amazed to see eight helpers show at 6 AM to help her set up the event ("All wonderful cribbage players") and reported that Bob Hayman and Bob Turcotte won the Saturday night doubles event. John Brennan (MA) scored the meet's only 28-hand. Llewellyn reported that the V. A. Hospital was donated \$320...and she will schedule this huge meet again next March 12.

Ralph Heller Cherry Blossom King. Springfield, VA hosted the Cherry Blossom Classic on March 20...and Ralph Heller from Rockville, Maryland came away the winner. In besting the field of 64 players, Heller came away with 105 MRP's and the top prize. Jack Brown (VA), Dutch Gerlich (MD) and Steve Sattler (MD) finished 2-3-4. Paul Viano (VA) posted a nice 21 GP card in the 12-game qualifying round to take honors. Howard Terry (VA) won the Consolation (40 players), with Donna Soderholm (VA), Dorothy Biers (VA) and Donald Eastwood (NC) in 2-3-4. Kate McNemar posted a 16 GP card in the 8-game qualifying round to take the top spot. Director Philip Babcock reported David Sniegowski (VA) and Martin Heintzelman (MD) scored the meet's two 28-hands. He also reported that the Children's Hospital received a \$110.50 donation.

Grand Master Peter Setian Cops South Shore. Peter Setian, a Grand Master from Ludlow, MA nailed the large 136-player South Shore Open (Leo Horigan Memorial) on March 21. The win moves Setian among the national leaders in the MRP race, with over 600 in the bag this cribbage year. Master Frank Corrado (CT), Grand Master Bill Shoemaker (CT) and Richard Podlaski (MA) finished 2-3-4. Shoemaker was also top qualifier, winning 9 of 12. Master Earle Remington won 7 of 8 in the Consolation qualifying round, but Liborio Albanese (MA) came home the winner in the playoffs. Emily Medeiros (MA), Clovis Prendergast (MA) and Ed Cicone (MA) finished 2-3-4 in this 78-player event. Director Jim Ready reported a whopping six 28-hands were scored...and this match will be played again next March 26, 2000.

Central Region Summary...

Roberta Schweig Nails Mick Michaelis Classic: Master Roberta Schweig (IL) came home the winner at the recent Mick Michaelis Classic in Marinette, WI. In topping the field of 136 peggers, Schweig picked up yet aother 196 MRP's...and she is moving in on her Grand Master. Master Les Kvien (IL) nailed 2nd, with Doug Henderson (WI) and Don Patrin (MN) finishing 3-4. One-Star Warren Sondericker showed 'em how the pegging is done by taking qualifying honors, winning 17 of 22 to take honors. Another One-Star player...Duane Toll (WI)...took the 88-player Consolation...and the 63 MRP's vaults him to the 700+ mark for the year, and yet another run for All-American honors. Grand Master Wayne Steinmetz (WI) is also in the hunt, and the 45 MRP's for a 2nd place finish keep him in the national race as well (600+). Grand Master Todd Schaefer (MN) and Karen Boufiou (WI) finished 3-4. A side bar statistic from directors Aggie and Gene Mikulsky...the players played 6,320 games! Whew!

Diane Waite (MN) Wins \$1,200...and a Clock! The March issue of the St. Croix Classic saw Diane Waite, St. Paul, MN take home the bacon. In winning this 132-player event, she carted home 196 MRP's. a hefty first place prize and a trophy clock! Norman Mineau (MN) nailed 2nd. Two other Minnesotans finished 3-4...Scott Nordlund and Elmer Morlock. Master Darlene Johnson (MN), once again, put on a show in the qualifying round. This time around she posted a 39 18/22 card. After getting bumped in first round playoff action, Johnson enetered the Consolation...oops, a string of pearls (feast to famine). Dan Pluff won the 82-player Consolation, with Tom Beuchler (MN) taking home 2nd. Lloyd Kraft (WI) and Joel Ciriacks (WI) took 3-4. ACC/Grass Roots: Facts

About 3 months ago, the Grass Roots leadership sent a letter to Grass Roots members in which the leadership claimed that the ACC's Board of Directors "suddenly demands control" of the Grass Roots program. That claim is totally false, and here are some INDISPUTABLE FACTS. The ACC's BOD always has maintained control of the Grass Roots program (not suddenly), and this fact was reaffirmed by a vote of the 23 attending members at the October 1998 BOD meeting with no dissenting votes (and 17 of the attending members were Grass Roots members). What is particularly deceptive (and harmful) regarding the false claim of the Grass Roots leadership is that their leadership knows that claim is false.

The previous 3 Grass Roots manuals all had the following in them. "The Grass Roots program is the hometown component of the American Cribbage Congress...not a separate organization as some perceive it to be...". The ACC's BOD believes that's pretty clear and defining, yet it's missing from the Grass Roots recent revision of their manual.

Also, about 3 years ago, one of the officers of the ACC...one of the Grass Roots leaders...prepared and distributed an organizational structure of the ACC wherein it listed the ACC's Vice-President Operations as the ACC officer in charge of the Grass Roots program. In addition, the ACC's Constitution for many years has stated that the Grass Roots Committee is one of the six standing committees of the ACC's BOD. The ACC's Constitution states that the Grass Roots National Commissioner is appointed annually by the ACC's Executive Committee.

President Ev Bey, with the concurrence of the ACC's Executive Committee, approved the appointment of Gene Mikulsky as Grass Roots National Commissioner (recommended by Jerry Dickinson). The Executive Committee also approved the appointment of Gene in 1998. These appointments were in accordance with Article VII of the ACC's Constitution.

As stated previously, Grass Roots, ever since its inception by Joe Wergin, has been under the wing of the ACC. Normal everyday operations are handled by the National Grass Roots Commissioner and other volunteers. From the beginning of the Grass Roots program, the ACC's BOD minutes show that Grass Roots matters have routinely come before the ACC's BOD for action. The following are just a few examples:

-One of the leaders of the Grass Roots program is the one who proposed (a motion) during the February 1993 ACC's BOD meeting...that required all Grass Roots players to be members of the ACC (motion carried).

-At various ACC BOD meetings, the BOD discussed and approved criteria which determined the Grass Roots members who would be granted invitations to the ACC's Tournament of Champions.

At the ACC's BOD meeting of September 1993, a member of the ACC's BOD (a Grass Roots member) amended a motion and by doing so the new motion would require the Grass Roots program to publish a financial report annually in the *Cribbage World* (motion carried).

Hopefully, this article assists in clarifying much of the information regarding the Grass Roots program of the ACC. It's essential that the ACC remains unified. The course that some members of the Grass Roots leadership have been taking is divisive, is not condoned by the ACC's BOD, and will not be tolerated.

ACC Rules Concerning Cross Checking Discrepancies

- 1- The disadvantage is ALWAYS to the apparent qualifier.
- 2- No one should leave the crosschecking area, in an attempt to correct discrepancies by speaking with the two people involved. The guidelines below should always be used.
- 3- If the disagreement is on the spread, the LOWER spread is accepted.
- 4- If the spread is marked on only one card, accept the spread.
- 5- If both cards reflect a win. Change both cards to losses. With 0 GP and the lesser of spread points.
- 6- If the qualifier's card reads GP 3, SP +31 and the non-qualifier's reads GP 0, SP -30, change the qualifier's card to GP 2, SP +30.
- 7- "No harm, no foul." Qualifier says he/she won by 16, the non-qualifier shows minus 26. The 16 stands.
- 8- The double error. Both cards have qualified, card-1 reads 2 GP, +20, and card-2 reads 0 GP, -10. In this case card-1 is adjusted to +10, and card-2 is adjusted to -20. Both cards suffer.
- 9- If something is adjusted, make sure Game Points are adjusted if necessary.
- 10-If a mistake is found that alters qualifying position, the Tournament Director should personally advise the player(s) as soon as possible...with the scorecard evidence.

She must have a special board to see the holes, being legally blind, but she holds her own with the best! And the many players who are in wheel chairs...many of them the best the ACC has to offer when it comes to playing the grand old game!

And lately, we have a new member by the name of Bryan Bordenik. Bryan signed on when he saw the ACC's county-fair booth in Washington (organized by "Ras" Rasmussen). He has been earning his MRP's via the qualifying round route (and 2 of 3 playoffs)...but in three matches that he has qualified that had best 3 of 5 playoffs, he has lost all 3 by the score of 0-3! What next!

Walter Pilgrim Wants Confirmation Walter Pilgrim (CA) is a new member of the ACC, and he qualified for the playoffs at the River City Open in Sacramento. This event was listed in "Tournament Results" on page 23, showing Pilgrim finishing 5th, earning 70 MRP's.

He wants to know if this listing is hearsay...or official. In addition, he was a high qualifier at the Willows Open, but the director could not tell him how many MRP's he had earned. (Too complicated, according to the director).

For all our members, old and new...the listing in the back of Cribbage World is official! Pilgrim earned 70 MRP's for finishing 5th (of 132 players). As for the qualifying round at the Willows (a 21game round), figuring MRP's is very simple. Look at the ACC's chart for a 21-game round, and compare your GP's to the chart. If you finished in the top 1/8 (in this case: 128 players = 16 players earning MRP's), you have earned MRP's. Pilgrim didn't give Cribbage World his GP total, but an example would be a 30 GP score. The chart shows that would earn 25 MRP's (31 GP's would be 30 MRP's, 32 GP's would be 35 MRP's, etc.) All sanctioned tournaments should have a chart posted on the wall so all players can figure their MRP's. And once you know the system, no charts are needed.
