# Chase Nails Feb. St. Croix Julian Tops 348 At MGM Hamilton Wins In St. Paul

The late winter months in the Central Region is a mecca for America's cribbage players. Many outstanding events are scheduled every year, and this year was no exception. Beginning with the February edition of the St. Croix Classic in Turtle Lake, WI, the pegging action was on! Next came the huge MGM Open in Green Bay hosting a whopping 348 players. And this event was followed the next weekend by the Capital City Open in St. Paul, MN.

Turtle Lake, WI, Feb. 20: Master Robert Chase, Minneapolis, came home the winner at the huge 178-player St. Croix Classic. His final match pitted him vs. Doug Munneke (MN) and his cards remained hot. He took home the bacon...and 196 MRP's. Munneke garnered 147 MRP's and a nice purse for his high finish. One-Star Duane Toll (WI) vaults to the top of the Central Region's MRP list with a 3rd place finish, followed by Wes Fales (MN) in 4th.

Bonnie Jennie (MN) smoked the field in the qualifying round with a superlative 41 18/22 +315 to easily take qualifying honors. Don Ernst (MN) took qualifying honors in the Consolation with 188/9 + 135.

Al Bailey (MN) won the 109-player Consolation, followed by Lyle Lund (MN), Grand Master Todd Schaefer (MN), and Diane Waite (MN) in 2-3-4. Schaefer's high finish keeps his All-American hopes alive, having topped 700 MRP's this cribbage season.

Green Bay, WI, Feb. 27: Three-time National Champion Bob Julian (Milwaukee) once again throws his hat into the annual MRP

race by winning the huge 348-player MGM Open. In besting the huge field, Julian took home 252 MRP's and vaults among the national MRP leaders. He stands at the 800 MRP mark for this cribbage year.

Mark Habighorst (WI) nailed down 2nd, and he garnered a bushel of MRP's as well...196! Daryl Halopka (WI) and Jerry DeMarse (MI) finished 3-4. Jim Porkorney (WI) won 17 of 22 games to take qualifying honors (38 GP's).

Newly-crowned Life Master Gene "Moose" Biegler (WI) won the 134-player Consolation. Jack L'Huillier (MI), Glen Gauthier (WI) and Chris Martin (MI) finished 2-3-4. Tim Salmen (WI) won 8 of 9 to take qualifying honors.

Directors Jerry Lemke, Bob Miller, and Tom Gallagher scheduled a full array of satellite events. Their doubles matches are the largest played in ACC action every year. The winners: Fri. The MGM Open continues to draw the largest crowd of the year (except for Grand Nationals) in the Central Region, and the Green Bay players just love their doubles, attested to by the huge Friday and Saturday night crowds.

St. Paul, MN, Mar. 5: Todd Schaefer's Capital City Open continues to draw large crowds, and this time around some 164 players were in action. When the smoke had cleared after two-days of spirited pegging, only Grand Master Ron Hamilton, Topeka, KS emerged unbeaten in the playoff round. Hamilton took home 196 MRP's and the top prize...and is knocking on the door for his Life Master rating as well.

George Costanzo (MN), Derald Feda (MN), and Tom Larson (MN) finished 2-3-4.

National front-runner One-Star Jesse Jarrell (CA) won the 134-player Consolation, edging Mark Wenzel (MN) in the final playoff match. Jack Dockter (MN) and Dick Neunsinger (MN) finished 3-4.

Director Schaefer reported a balmy 70 degrees in St. Paul on game day. This unprecedented heat-wave for Minnesota in early March can only be attributed to California's Jesse Jarrell opening his suitcase and letting the hot air out! Cribbage fever, catch it...and warm up!

**Jacobs Tops Willows** 

The Willows (CA) Elks Charity event was won by Dennis Jacobs, Chico, CA. In topping the large field (110 players), Jacobs copped the top prize and 147 MRP's. Charles Hakenson (CA) took home 2nd, followed by Herb Hollander (CA) and Craig Ross (CA) in 3-4.

Director Carl Martens reported that Grand Master Bill Wakeman (CA) scored a 34 GP card (21 games) to take qualifying honors...and Les Kovach (CA) scored the only 28-hand of the event. No Consolation was scheduled.

### **Bussert Tops Port Orchard**

In a rare one-day event in the Northwest, Lonnie Bussert, Everett, WA came home the winner at the recent Port Orchard Open. With over 80 players in action, Bussert garnered 147 MRP's for the day's play. Ron Balmer (WA) is a newcomer to ACC play, and he is off to a great start, finishing 2nd, after a fine showing at the Washington Championship in January. Hazel Weichseldorfer (WA) and Grand Master Jim Hornbacher (WA) finished 3-4...and picked up 70 MRP's for the day's pegging.

Co-director Jim Merriman (WA) scored a nice 21 9/12 +159 to take qualifying honors.

Don Keuter (WA) won the Consolation, with the streaking Jim Waldorf (OR) in 2nd. Waldorf is a Master pegger and is in the hunt for honors this cribbage year. Master Roger Lueschow (WA) and Vonita Gill (WA) finished 3-4.

Director Barbara Merriman reported she was very pleased with the turnout. She signed on two new players for ACC action, and expressed sympathy for George Stanton (WA) for his 0-9 card in the Consolation. She also reported that Bob Witzdam (WA) scored the meet's only 28-hand.

Willie Thull Cops Sunnyside

Non-ACC members rarely win a sanctioned event but Willie Thull topped the recent Washington State Open, played at Sunnyside, WA on March 3-5. He copped the \$1,000 first place award, but passed up the 147 MRP's for the win as he is not an ACC member. But Patricia Rice from Greenacres, WA is a member and she took home 105 MRP's for finishing 2nd... and a nifty \$600 to boot. Walt Swearingen (WA) and Master Betty Capper (OR) came away 3-4.

The Main Event played to a record crowd of 106 players, as co-directors Linda Johnson and Toni Morrow pull out all stops to reward players for their play...and the word is getting around about their great paybacks and extra amenities. A well-stocked 24-hand table had ample prizes, as well as their raffle.

Jeanne Hofbauer (WA) is moving in on her Life Master by taking top-qualifying honors...a very nice 35 16/22 +224.

A sizeable Consolation saw Master Roger Lueschow (WA) take home the bacon, with Master Mike Rowe (AK) taking home 2nd.

At the St. Croix Classics' in Turtle Lake, WI, the Casino is very generous with added prize money. They pay \$25 for every 24-hand, \$250 for every 28-hand, and \$500 for a 29-hand. A Grand Slam is also rewarded.

Kyle Ecklund, Crystal Lake, IL, was playing in his very first tournament, and, of course, the field is full of experienced sharks. He did manage to win 4 games (of 9) in the Saturday Night Special. Normally, a 4/9 comes home empty-handed. But, no, Ecklund scored FIVE 24-hands...and picked up \$125. More than enough to pay for his weekend's pegging.

Director Alan Lindner has another St. Croix Classic coming up on March 31, April 1-2. This issue had already gone to press, but CW predicts another hot run of 24-hands will be reported. The February St. Croix event had some 264 24-hands scored...for a nifty \$6,600 bonus to the players.

Bruce Sattler, Baltimore, MD, had a special event. Not only did he take 2nd, but earned his Master rating as well. And he scored the meet's only 28-hand enroute to a fine weekend of pegging.

Master Russell Perkins (NC) and Danny Bennett (CA) finished 3-4.

Stanley Bochinski, pegging out of Tonawanda, NY, won 11 of 12 to earn high qualifying honors...and 45 MRP's.

Bernard Whitfield (NC), fresh from winning the Ed Horigan Memorial event two weeks earlier, came home the top qualifier in the 48-player Consolation. But when the playoff action was completed, only Howard Terry (VA) was left unbeaten. Loren Wakeling (VA), Phil Babcock (VA) and Master Jim Duresky (VA) finished 2-3-4.

# Synopsis Board of Directors Meeting Reno, February 3, 2000

All members present except Ramos (excused) & Eiffert (excused), Shimp late due to flight delay.

Minutes from last meeting approved.

Appreciation for past members given, welcome to new members expressed.

Wilson reviewed financial report. Excess monies from GN XVIII (Las Vegas) to be distributed at GN XIX (Eau Claire, WI) as part of prize fund. Wilson's projected budget approved.

Lindner reported on upcoming GN XIX at Eau Claire. Llewellyn noted to ask members to watch for conflict with religious holidays when scheduling events. GN XX (2001) discussed. No new information, but Barnes will keep tabs on event.

All-Star event discussed. BOD voted 15-8 to keep event at Reno in conjunction with TOC and JPW/ACC Open.

Ready will chair Rules Committee (replacing Lulinski), and Webb appointed chair of Publicity/Public Relations Committee.

Midweek tournaments discussed. Midweek tournaments approved and must be 2-day events, one per director per year. One per quarter per region (4 maximum per region) in different location from other event (double-header concept). All mid-week events must be approved by Regional Commissioners.

Hall of Fame balloting elected Ed Horigan (deceased) from Virginia. Eleven members considered for election.

Hatcher discussed Ethics Committee activities. Julian updated BOD on Jeff Monroe prosecution. Presently waiting for another court date. Monroe did not want to plead guilty to present charges in hopes of lowering amount of money taken to under \$50,000 in an attempt to lower the prosecution. Julian noted that allowing city of Napa, CA to prosecute will take longer, but that allows the ACC to NOT incur the expense of legal counsel. Julian complimented for his persistent actions.

Barrett moved to pay present Treasurer Wilson \$200/month, retroactive to October 1, 1999. Carried.

Colvert and Hassett discussed new procedures in mailing Cribbage World. By changing cover stock to more absorbent paper allows directly printing labels on CW. This eliminates tedious and costly printing and mailing of sticky-backed labels...a saving of about \$400 per month.

Mikulsky reported 144 active Grass Roots clubs, Audit has been completed with an increase of \$4,000 in the Treasury.

Barnes moved to disallow mandatory Q-Pools in sanctioned events. Motion defeated, general consensus was that it should be a director's decision.

Lulinski presented data to substantiate his motion to dissolve the Corporation of Grass Roots as of July 1, 2000 in an effort to unify the ACC and its Grass Roots organization. Motion passed 20-2, with one abstention Hatcher moved to have existing Grass Roots Manual be rescinded at the end of current GR season (May 31, 2000) and the prior GR Program Manual be reinstated subject to revisions at BOD meeting in Sept. 2000. Carried 13-8.

Lulinski moved that after current GR financial season, the GR will use the ACC Taxpayer ID# and will provide information for its account to the ACC Treasurer where it will be included on the ACC's financial report and tax returns. Carried 21-1 with one abstention. Lulinski moved with Hassett amending that the VP-Operations and Executive Member at Large jointly recommend an auditor to handle the respective operations of the Grass Roots. Appointment to be reviewed for approval by the Executive Committee and presented to the BOD meeting at the Sept. 2000 meeting. Appropriate reports must be presented to the ACC BOD at dates designated by ACC Treasurer.

Grand National XXI (2002) proposals presented. Lake Tahoe (Shumate) and Canyonville, OR (Hassett) discussed. Lake Tahoe awarded GN XXI (15-8).

Shimp moved to discontinue recertification of judges. Carried unanimously.

Hatchermoved to compensate three Regional Tournament Commissioners \$300/month effective Feb. 1, 2000. Carried 15-8. Julian moved to form adhoc committee to evaluate each position to come up with a fair hourly rate versus number of hours worked. Executive Board will then make recommendations and possibly adjust present compensations. Carried.

Bickford moved to approve the new updated Manual. Carried.

ACC member William Roderick (spectator) suggested the BOD say the pledge of allegiance at BOD meetings.

Meeting adjourned. Minutes recorded by Rein, Secretary.



Many of our members have asked for a monthly tip to help them with their play...or at least have a tidbit to chew on and debate which is the better way to play. I am kicking off this "Tip of the Month" column, but I hope that our better players will contribute tips that will help our membership in playing the grand old game with more finesse. I expect our authors (Dan Barlow, John Chambers, and others), One-Stars, and Life Masters to give us their methods of attaining their high honors.

I will begin this series with a tip on pegging when on 4th street. Playing "On" or playing "Off" is critical when the end game approaches. You are the dealer and are playing a 2-4-4-9. A king is cut.

Playing ON: You are dealing, needing 21 points to win the game. Your opponent is 28 points from winning. Your opponent leads a 9. Pairing a 9 is one of the most dangerous pairs in cribbage, but in this case, pair the 9 for a sure 2. Now you hope your opponent has the third 9! You want to score at all costs, to win the game with first count on the next deal, and, if he triples your 9, with the count at 27, your 4 makes "31" and two more. A trade of 4 for 6 at this point is to your advantage.

Playing OFF: You are dealing and need 34 points to win the game. Your opponent is at 33 points from winning, with first count. In this case, with a 9-lead, you lay off, playing the 4, hoping he will play a 2nd 9, with your scoring "31 for 4" with your 9. In this case you trade 4-0! And if he does not play a 2nd 9, you have at least played defense, which, with the board position, is to your advantage.

Remember, the average hand and crib, plus a hand with first count will talley about 26. Make your judgements as to whether you play defense or offense by this average. You want to win the game with first count being as close to the game hole as possible. If you cannot get within 10 (considering what you discarded, the cut card, your hand, and possible peg points) play defense (unless your opponent is surely going to win regardless of how you play...in this case, you must go all out to win with a long shot).

### Q-Pools!

Reference Edward Donahue's letter to March Cribbage World.

As a 20-year veteran of ACC cribbage tournaments nationwide I feel I can help you understand the Q-Pool frustration you encountered in Reno.

First of all "Q-Pool" is a slightly misleading brand which most veterans of cribbage now call the "side pool." Yes, you must qualify in order to place in the Q-Pool, but the original designation for this pool was to reward the upper crust of the qualifiers a modest sum for their qualifying day scorecard. This was to ensure that those who ranked the highest were guaranteed prize money even if their cards go sour early in the playoff rounds. Believe it or not certain tournaments did not even pay prize money or MRP's for first-round losers in the early years of the ACC! This has since stopped as far as I know due to complaints, as well as declining participation, gave the directors an idea of what may happen to their tournament if this persisted.

As of now, the standard Q-Pool payoff is 1 out of 8 in most of the tournaments I attend (10-15 per year). I feel a 27 GP card (22 games) is a possible qualifier at the majority of tournaments but certainly not worthy of any pool money, so to speak. If you are not satisfied with this system the best way to show it is not to participate, but beware of the day that the cribbage Gods smile down on you with a great card, and you'll be sorry!

Mystery!



For Want of Change

At a recent Board of Directors meeting our esteemed representatives voted to pay the Tournament Commisioners a monthly fee. This action fractures the definition of volunteerism which has survived for several years, thanks to the many who have given their time, energy, and in some cases funding to further the aims of the American Cribbage Congress.

Are we so steeped in the spend-spend philosophy, that we fail in what would surely benefit the general membership...a lowering of the sanctioning fee, an action long over-due.

Is this not the same BOD, through a total lack of responsibility, stood woefully by while monies in excess of \$50,000 were pilfered from our treasury? Should not this alleged light-fingered individual have been bonded? Infrequent, or non-existing audits failed to discover, what should have been obvious, that something was amiss. In any business, this would certainly amount to blatent irresponsibility!

Surely, a lowering of the sanctioning fee would be more a judicial action than expending funds to pay Tournament Commissioners. If these individuals are in need, I'm sure there are volunteers available to replace them, or assist them.

Common sense reasoning, apparently not in abundance, has vividly shown that long-term Board positions, do not, in most cases, reflect the opinions of the general membership. There appears to be a total lack of communication between Board meetings and the general membership.

It is obvious, that there is ample room for improvement. Changes are in order.

George Webb Avon, MA George, you certainly make some good points concerning the BOD's naive trusting of individuals handling large (or small) sums of money. But now that the cat is out of the bag, action has responsibly been taken to insure that this does not happen again. Annual audits of all areas of the ACC's operations, bonding of individuals involved in handling monies, and increased awareness of temptations that beset individuals where money is involved, has been legislated. An audit did, indeed, catch a \$10,000 discrepancy of the individual you mention, and an accounting was demanded. Unfortunately, before a second surprise audit on the premises, major embezzlement had taken place. This will not happen again!

But getting to your major point, the compensation of Tournament Commissioners, I feel the BOD did NOT act irresponsibly in this matter. A quick look at Tournament Trail, this issue, shows how enormously the ACC has grown since you were Eastern Region Commissioner some 10 years ago. The ACC is approaching some 200 events per year, and each event entails scheduling of events, several mailings of documents to and from each event, collecting fees, mailing banners, and the myriad details that go with administering this growing program. Volunteerism sounds great, but I doubt if any sane person would long continue on the job, considering the ever-increasing work-load.

In fact, the ACC now compensates 7 jobs. The three Commissioners, the Secretary of Memberships, the National Statistician, Cribbage World Editor, and the Treasurer. As Cribbage World Editor, I work closely with this group, and can only say that the compensation may barely reach the minimum wage level. This, of course, does NOT include the furnishing of office space free of charge (Cribbage World takes two rooms away from the editor's living space, for example).

We have come a long way in the ACC's 20-year history. In the early days of volunteerism, Cribbage World was usually an 4 to 8 page typewritten publication, listing perhaps a dozen tournaments. A look at last month's issue (36 pages) clearly demonstrates the huge increase in the workloads of all aspects of the organization.

I agree with you, George, changes are in order! And the BOD works diligently, through democratic action, to keep up with the changes! Ed.

A Plea For More Courteous Play

My opponent in Reno outdid himself in fast play, picking up each hand and crib to read it himself and thrusting it across to me as fast as possible. He even put his crib down covering his hand on my side of the board as I was still checking his hand point count. I asked him to conform to the ACC rules: The hand/crib are to be face up on the counter's side of the board while the count is made and counter is to peg before passing the cards over. He reluctantly slowed down enough to allow me to readily check his counts. I think that a less experienced player not familiar with the rules might well have been intimidated into not checking his point counts. Why? Because he made it so difficult by not giving me the opportunities called for by the rules.

This and other experiences lead me to make the following suggestions aimed at more courteous play:

- 1- Fast players: please slow down and give slower opponents a fair chance to check your count. Obey the rules if that is the only way you can see to slow yourself down.
- 2-New/slower players: be aware that you have the right to ask your opponent to put his/her hand/crib on the table face-up on his/her side so that you can count it with them and while they are pegging.

I know that slow play is a continuing problem at tournaments. However, I do not see pressuring your opponent by fast play is a legitimate tactic to help solve that problem if you are not following the rules which requires that you give your opponent time/opportunity to check your counts.

Boyd McDonald Mountain View, CA

Boyd is absolutely correct about this rule. Unfortunately, many experienced players speed up their game by showing, tossing, and pegging. If you are playing a new player, or one who obviously is having trouble keeping up with your counting, please slow down, and, as Boyd says, be courteous! Ed.
