Directors Tom Gallagher and Bob Miller pulled Directors Gallagher and Miller had a full slate out all stops in reorganizing their 23rd annual of satellites. The winners: MGM Open in Green Bay, WI. First, they moved the site to the beautiful, huge Oneida Casino/ Radisson Hotel. Second, the promised perks for 24, 28, 29-hands, and grand slams had the playing hall humming with delight, as some 420 peggers from throughout the USA and Canada pegged for honors...and cash awards!

Master Ron Hirschman, Sr., Milwaukee, began the assault in the Main Event with a superlative 43 19/22 +388 in the qualifying round to smoke the field, tacking on yet another 85 MRP's to his lifetime ledger...and very nearly Grand Master as well. But after the playoffs had wound down, only Master Don Patrin, Roseville, MN remained standing. In taking the championship, Patrin garnered a whopping 252 MRP's, bragging rights, a sizeable winner's check, and he, too, is nearing his Grand Master. Life Master David Clemmey (MA) had a great event in finishing 2nd, as this stellar Eastern Region player added yet another 196MRP's and zips to the 9,200+range (lifetime). Master Tony Danihel (WI) took home 3rd, followed by perennial winner Wayne Steinmetz (WI) in 4th. With another 147 MRP's in the bank, Steinmetz, once again, joins the national race for honors.

Life Master Pat Barrett (WI) nailed the 210player Consolation...and 112 MRP's. Local Don Jahnke took home 2nd, followed by One-Star Bill Medeiros (MA) and local Scott Vanden Hoogen in the 3-4 slot.

\$202,275 In Perks (25 events) Emil Lubinski Cops 25th St. Croix Classic

Emil Lubinski earned his Grand Master this cribbage year and this Minneapolis pegger just keeps on rolling. This time around he nailed the 25th edition of the St. Croix Classic in Turtle Lake, WI. With a capacity 212 players in the field, Lubinksi netted \$1,600, the winner's trophy and a whopping 196 MRP's! His last match was a tough one as he had the streaking One Star Wayne Steinmetz (WI) to deal with. Lubinski, however, prevailed for the win. Steinmetz zipped to 871 MRP's with this high finish and is leading the Central Region. Joan Rein (MN) is getting ever-closer to her Life Master by finishing in the 3-4 slot with Master Ken Benson (MI). Diane Lundahl (MN) topped the Q field with a nice 37 17/22 +263 card.

Bill Neidlein (WI) won the 132-player Consolation, nipping One-Star Bob Julian (WI) in the final playoff match. Mike Jacka (MN) and Master Gary Haelfrisch (WI) finished 3-4. Grand Master John Hiland (WI) has been on a

roll lately, and topped the field to take home the Q prize (17 7/9 + 150).

One-Star Bob Julian (WI) had been mired in a deep slump this cribbage year, but he snapped out with a vengeance at the recent 6th Annual Minnesota Valentine Open played in St. Paul, MN on February 9. He won this 125-player event going away, taking home 147 MRP's, and he moves up the ladder in the Central Region with the win (500+). John White (MN) finished 2nd (105 MRP's) followed by Sharon Pederson (MN) and Bob Joslin (MN) in the 3-4 slot. David Stoa (MN) smoked the field in the qualifying round with a nifty 24 11/14 +138.

Dan Pluff (MN) nipped Master Alan Lindner (WI) in the final playoff match to take home the 70-player Consolation title. Pete Shelstad (MN) and Mark Fries (MN) finished 3-4. Shelstad was also the event's top qualifier (16 8/8 +99, grand slam). In an oddity (nothing new here) Shelstad was cajoled into playing to make the field even. Director Jerry Gruber was pleased with the crowd as his previous high for this event was 116 players, attesting to his skill at managing cribbage events. Gruber reported that Ken Johnson and Pete Shelstad both scored a 28-hand in the Main Event.

Edmonton Sweetheart Open Dale Bjork Wins In Canada

It was all Alberta players taking home the top spots at the recent Edmonton Sweetheart Open on February 15. Dale Bjork came home the winner in this 38-player event. He edged Leeson Ruff in the final playoff match and garnered 105 MRP's for the win. Herb Schaar and Lewis Skidmore finished 3-4. Schaar also topped the field in the qualifying round, winning 9 of 12 (20 9/12 +141).

With 30 peggers in action in the Consolation, it was Rob Voysey taking the final playoff match over Chris Unguran. Shawn Smith and Bud Kessler finished 3-4. Darren Saik won 6 of 7 to take Q honors (16 6/7 +77).

Director Doris Sanders reported an uneventful match with no 28's or 29's.



He needed 24 to win with first count, and Doctor is nearly out with the crib hand. Julian picked up a 4-4-6-6! You guessed it...he cut the five for the game. Slump over!

5-5 Great Discard to Your Crib?

According to Ras Ramussen (WA) the best throw of a 5-5 to your own crib is not as common as one might think. He has compiled the 91 possible discards and finds that the 5-5 throw ranks as no. 45 in frequency, and occurs less than 1% of the time. Ras surmises that it often requires giving up too much of the hand potential to risk this discard.

Cards Stacked In Internet Play?

Many players have complained that the deck is stacked against them in internet play. Steve Bain (WA) has made a study of this complaint, and his results show that in head-to-head games (live) the games are played in 9.068 deals, but in internet play the games average 9.030 deals, and that the starter card appears to be evenly distributed, with the most frequent cuts being Queens, 4's, and Kings in that order. This is a very small difference, with the sample base not fully studied.

Steve reports that he will continue his data analysis and when he has reached 1,000 games, will give the ACC an update.

As Region IV Statistician I work in the website every day and have noticed how well the system is running. Why is it working so well? One of the main reasons is because your club directors and club statisticians are putting in a lot of hard work to make sure your scores are put into the website correctly. Our site has progressed extremely well over the past eighteen months since it was created. As problems were detected, they were promptly fixed. New re-

ports have been added and your club statisticians can now download and print all of those reports within an hour of entering their tournament results.

How are you doing this season? You are not a Club Director or Club Statistician, but you'd like to know a little more about standings, rules and other stuff, right? Go to the Grass Roots website http://www.accgrassroots.org. Single click on American Cribbage Congress Grass Roots and save it to "favorites." Single click on "Members Only." Click on "Go to Member Center." Click on any button on the left. There is a wealth of information you may look at. If you click on "Member Statistics" you can find reports that tell how you are doing in your club, in your region or in your division. This is easy to find and is a "read-only" part of our website. Have a look!

GRASS ROOTS REGIONAL TOURNA-MENT (GRRT)

A Bad Hair Day!! Mary Munns (ID 327) belongs to the Boise Peggers -Club 202. Mary received a 28 hand but was unable to count it since her opponent had already pegged out. All is not lost, as Mary will still receive a 28 Hand Award from Grass Roots and her club will present her with a wall plaque utilizing the actual cards that made up the hand. Next time you're having a run of bad luck, think of Mary! The cards are hot and the tempers are not at the Chehalis-Centralia Cribbage Club #232. On December 19, 2002 Dick Winslow scored a 21/9+171 followed by George "Ras" mussen with a 20/9/158. Two Grand Slams on a single night is not that rare in this group as that has happened on two other occasions since 1996. This was the first time that a 20-gamepoint scorecard has finished in second place. Ras tells us that a Grand Slam is scored once in each 12,457 deals in their club. That's once in each 1,298 games played. During the 1996-1997 season Hal Benfield, Ras and Virginia Rasmussen all started game nine with eight wins each with 27 players present. A crib flush occurs once in each 686 deals Four of a kind not to include the starter card occurs once in 719 deals. A 22-point hand is scored once per 1,557 deals.

With that and \$32 for 1st place, Wayne gladly bought the club a round at CK Diggs restaurant with his \$330 winnings. (Wayne also came in 2nd in the Region VI GRRT!) Way to go Wayne!

Dennis "Buzz" Koehler (WI 2647) of Club 120 is a relative newcomer to Grass Roots cribbage but he learns quickly. He topped all 27 players to become the 17th different winner in 23 weeks of play. His super16/8/+133 was only one loss away from a rare Grand Slam. His loss came at the hands of past club champ Jerome Tork (WI 71) in game 5. An oddity occurred in weeks 23 and 24 in this club. Buzz Koehler won 8 games and lost 1 game to Jerome Tork. The following week Jerome won 8 games and lost 1 game to Buzz. Both players placed first one week apart and can't wait to play each other again!

Exchange of Ideas between GR Clubs

Local Grass Roots Clubs are free to determine the amount of the local entry fees, how much is to be retained for club expenses, and how much will become the prize fund. Dennis Misenar, Club Director of the Alberta Peggers Club 293 is going to compile information on a CD about how the different clubs operate. Please email him information about your club at albertapegs@telusplanet.net This data will be available to all of our Grass Roots Clubs to learn from and will be used as a primary tool to generate ideas for starting new clubs. The items Dennis would like club directors to email him are: scorecards, spreadsheets, pay schedules, prize funds and Q pools, table rotations and ideas on how to bring in and retain new members to the clubs. How is your club organized? How many members do you have? Who sets up the tables? How do you advertise? Send him your ideas such as flyers, information to promote cribbage or any other forms or pictures. Please be certain to include your club number, if you use windows or mac and programs you use such as windows works, word, excel, etc.

Dennis has taken on a very large task, so let's send him what he needs to compile a project that will certainly benefit Grass Roots Cribbage!!.....Tom

<u>Don Kunz of Club 202</u> provides a good example of what Dennis is looking for. They have an incentive program that pays

50% of the pot for a grand slam (and they enlarge the scorecard and have it framed) A 28 hand wins 50% of the pot and the actual cards are used to make a plaque for presentation to the lucky player. A 29 hand is awarded 75% of the pot, which makes sure the pot is never depleted. That also gets a plaque. They also give part of the skunk pot away for a flush in the crib or a 23 hand. The playing fee is \$9 and \$1 goes into the incentive pot, \$1 goes into the club operating funds, \$1 to the bartender on duty and the remainder is paid out during that evening.

Club 271 in Albuquerque, NM Charges a \$2 playing fee and an optional \$3 to get into the side pot. The side pot pays \$10 for high hand, 50%, 30% and 20% of the balance go to the three best scorecards. All players pay 25 cents for a skunk. 50% of the skunk can is paid for a 29 hand and 25% of the can for a 28 hand or a Grand Slam score card. The club adds \$10 a week to the skunk can until the can reaches a minimum of \$200. \$5 is paid for four of a kind in the hand and \$10 if it's in the crib. (This does NOT include the cut card) Crib flushes used to be paid \$5, but there were too many of them and were depleting the funds! The \$2 per player playing fee pays for all club expenses including a catered lunch for GRRT and GRNT participants. It also pays all or a percentage of the GRNT \$11 entry fee based on the amount of tournaments played prior to the GRNT. This encourages GRNT participation in a big way.

A Ramp for Pat

Grass Roots Cribbage is all about cribbage, however, things often take place with our Grass Roots clubs that are not always related to cribbage. Club 269 in Susanville. CA has a woman who recently suffered a broken leg. She has a compound fracture and will be in a wheel chair for quite some time. The members of Club 269 got together on a weekend and built her a ramp from the front door to the sidewalk. They designed the ramp and got the job done quickly and efficiently. Grass Roots is about cribbage but there are three more C's that also fit. Compassion, Caring and Community. The entire club is quite proud of their endeavors and needless to say, Pat is very happy.

10 Card Cribbage??

Cribbage like most card games has many variations. Iris Fletcher of Club 23 in Den-

ver, CO tells us about 10-card cribbage! This is a doubles game in which the dealer deals ten cards to herself and ten cards to the player on her left. Each of these players keep four cards for themselves, give their partner four cards, and toss two in the crib! Talk about having to plan ahead!

Iris and Sue Edwards were playing Don Christensen and Butch Ehrich in a recent game. Don was dealing from 5 points out and Iris & Sue were about 23 away. Sue told Iris she needed a 20 hand so Iris said OK. Don then dealt her four 5s. Butch had small cards, so the ladies did all the pegging and won the game! To make matters worse for the guys, this was a money game

Club 110 in Hawaii was playing their GR. Tournament #24 on February 21*. Mary Jane Esera started off the night getting skunked by Roy Wong, then won 8 straight to take first with an 18/8 scorecard. Fred White scored a 16/7 to take second. Roy finished with a 15/6 ending third, but with only 11 players, he did not qualify for any GR rating points! Rather a large disparity that evening! Kathy Esposito (HI 163) finished with a String of Pearls contributing to the nice scorecards that Mary Jane, Fred and Roy finished with. All was not lost however. Since there were an odd number of players, Kathy filled in and won her 10th game against Charlie Rogers (HI 182) so at least the night was not a complete loss for her!

Now that's hard to take. A 15 scorecard that gets no points?

Club 156 in Sunnyside, WA provides good incentives for new members! At the Washington Sate Open, Larry and Marilee Arnold from Zillah, WA were in the casino to play some cards and noticed the cribbage tournament in progress. Master Roland Hall (CA) scored well at the Mesa, AZ Roadrunner and he held the top spot (unofficially) for one week, and the next week Three-Star DeLynn Colvert (MT) regained the lead with a strong Consolation effort at the River City Open in Sacramento, CA. And so if goes, the lead seems to change week by week, One-Star Wayne Steinmetz (WI) had a strong showing at the MGM in Green Bay, One-Star

Bob Julian (WI) is back in the hunt as well as One-Star Duane Toll (WI). Life Master Ras Rasmussen (WA) is lurking but a stone's throw back, as is Master Cres Fernandez (CA). In the Eastern Region, Two-Star Harry Palmer has been lighting up the board with wins and high finishes lately, as well as Keith Widener (NC). And Life Master David Clemmey (MA) has also been tearing up the track, scoring well at the MGM, and some top finishes in Eastern Region action lately. Life Master Bob Sommer's championship in Reno keeps him in the race also. Law of Averages:

It has been one year since Dwight Christiansen presented Jim McDonald's findings based on 8,976 games in alternating deal tournaments that first dealer has a 56.4% average chance of winning a game. This finding supports the editor's (De Lynn Colvert) result in his excellent book "play Winning Cribbage" that the first dealer has a 56% advantage based on "charting thousands of games, and hundreds of thousands of hands". Non-first dealer's average win rate is 44%

These numbers are AVERAGES, but how should they be interpreted? If everyone had the same skill level, then on average, everyone should qualify 25% of the time. BUT, we know that some some players qualify over 62% of the time, while most of us less than 25% of the time. This means that the 56% average is a base line and that a player's first deal advantage should be adjusted by a skill factor. The adjustment for the top players would be about +10% which would result in a win rate of 56+10 = 66% of games after winning the cut and 44+10=54% after losing the cut.

What is your skill factor? Do what De Lynn did. Keep track of every cut you won or lost and record your game win or loss. After about 100 games (or five 22-game tournaments), divide your "first deal" wins by your "first deal" total games and subtract 0.56. This difference is your skill factor adjustment. If it is negative, it's time to improve your game.

The more games you play, the more accurate your adjustment relative to 56% will be -30 tournaments or about 500 games would be ideal. If you are really ambitious or curious, keep a moving average based on your last 30 tournaments.


