

Hurricane Ivan; 15 English Players **GN XXIII: Crawford**

With Hurricane Ivan and a tough contingent of English players on hand, Grand National XXIII in Atlanta proved to be an event to remember. And it was for newly crowned Master Jim Crawford, pegging out of Mountain View, CA. Fresh from induction to the All-American team (2004: 1,373 MRP's) and receiving his Master award at the Awards Banquet, Crawford qualified high (322 players) and roared home the winner. He scored yet another 282 MRP's (aggregate), running his talley to an astounding 676 MRP's in six week's play this fledgling cribbage year. Floridian Lindsay Peever took home 2nd (and 196 MRP's). Two Grand Masters from Wisconsin finished in the 3-4 bracket...Tony Danihel and Jim Huser. In the qualifying round Paul Batterson (CT) was smoking, posting a great 41 17/22 +298 card (75 MRP's).

Some 216 peggers played the Consolation and it was Life Master Dwight Christiansen (CT) running the table, qualifying tops (198/9+111) and winning the playoffs as well. Master Jim Lunder (FL) finished 2nd, followed by Four-Star DeLynn Colvert (MT) and A. J. Tasker (NV) in the 3-4 slot.

Directors Gene Bradshaw, David O'Neil and Bobby Stuart had a full slate of satellite events on tap, including some 15 English players (see story this issue). The satellites even included a duplicate match, a true test of cribbage skills.

Of course, this is the Grand National curse at work once again, as many GN's have experienced unusual problems as well.

The Awards banquet was well-attended, and awards galore were handed out for successful 2004 play. Two-Star Duane Toll (OR) was the star of the show, having scored a record 2,473 MRP's during the past season. On to GN XXIV in Lincoln City, OR next September!

Sir John Suckling Special: 5-card Game Featuring English Players Vs. Yanks

On Thursday night at 7 PM in Atlanta some 116 players, including 15 from Salisbury, England sat down to a unique game of cribbage. The game consists of five cards dealt, discarding two to the crib, and pegging with the remaining three cards. The count in pegging goes up to and including 31 one time only. This game is played in England, and, of course, the 15 English players were heavy favorites. However, the Yanks held their own, holding the English squad to four winners. The best performance was Adrian Parslow's 2nd place finish. Ian Turner finished high, as did Rose Gaulton and Iane Arnott.

Cribbage World interviewed Jane Arnott. She related the entire 15 players were from Salisbury where cribbage is played by 36 teams, 6 to a team in their area in home and away matches. They play every Monday and have three leagues. Arnott said that in her entire life she had not been more than 100 miles from her birthplace...and the trip to Atlanta was a great joy for her! In fact, all 15 Englishmen were on hand at the Awards Banquet, and they certainly seemed to enjoy themselves. Director O'Neil gave each a custom cribbage board to take home as a memento of the event. O'Neil has a return match scheduled April 27-May 2, 2005. See flyer, this issue.

We would like to thank all of the ACC cribbage players and our guests from England who attended the Grand National XXIII cribbage tournament in Atlanta on September 16 - 19. 





Fetchel's total of 669 IRPs (Internet Rating Points) in 50 tournaments is a remarkable accomplishment, giving him a 180 point margin of victory over his nearest competitor. By comparison, the range between 2nd and 10th Place was only 163 points. It was in April that Mike made his move, beginning the month in Third Place, but winning three tournaments and reaching the Finals in a fourth to assume the lead he never relinquished.

Our 2004 All-Internet team presents an interesting geographic mix, with two Canadians and a distribution of players from the Mountain, Central and Eastern time zones. Curiously absent were West Coast players, who make up the largest group of Grass Roots and Tournament Trail participants. This may be due in part to the early start time for our Monday evening tournaments, but it is also a reflection of the ability of ACC Internet Cribbage to reach players who don't have as much opportunity for sanctioned over-the-board play. Note the presence of players from places such as Kentucky, Saskatchewan, Wyoming, New Mexico and Iowa, none of which hosted more than one Tournament Trail event last season.

In all, 209 ACC members participated in our abbreviated first season (which ran from February 12 to July 31), with 169 earning IRPs. The top 10% of these (17 finishers in all) will receive invitations to the 2005 ACC Tournament of Champions. There were a total of 66 online events, including twelve double elimination events that count as multiple tournaments. These attracted over 5000 total participants (members and nonmembers), for an average of more than 75 per event — a huge number by Internet standards!

Our 2004-5 season will be a full year of exciting competition. It's already underway, and we're adding new member-only events in the longer and more challenging formats, such as double elimination. Single elimination tournaments will continue to be open to both members and non-members, as this has proven to be a great way to help publicize the ACC and expand its membership.

Rule of the month review:

Improperly Touching the Pegs: A two point penalty is assessed against a player who (a) Touches an opponent's peg or (b) Touches the player's own peg when there is no score to peg, except after receiving the opponent's approval to tighten a loose peg or has notified the opponent that the player intends to correct an overpegged score.

Judges Exams: For those of you intending to take the judges exam, Al Miller has provided instructions that the exam is now based on the new August 2004 Rulebook.

2003-2004 Season Information:

During the previous Grass Roots season, there were thirty-nine 29 hands, four hundred-five 28 hands and one hundred ninety-four Grand Slam Scorecards. Trophies were presented to the top two players in each of the three divisions at a total cost of \$300.00.

Another 29 hand in Albuquerque, NM! On August 14th David Morse scored a 29 hand while playing in Club 271s summer session. This summer the club has had two 29 hands and two 28 hands. 50% of the can is paid for a 29 and 25% is paid for a 28 hand or a Grand Slam scorecard. Even though the club collects 25 cents per skunk and adds \$10 per tournament until the can reaches \$200, there is not much money left in it for the next winner to collect!

Atlanta: Mattie and Gene Bradshaw recently celebrated their forty-third wedding anniversary. How? By holding a cribbage tournament, of course! Not any old tournament but a "British Rules" tournament. So, they reserved a hotel ballroom and invited all the members of the Atlanta area Grass Roots Clubs 144, 74, and 119, to come get in a little practice prior to the John Suckling satellite tournament, which was held on Thursday, before the Grand National. Eighteen players, plus four non-playing

spouses, showed up for the festive event. When it was over, Bobby Stuart walked away as winner. As usual, there were bonuses for special hands. Bobby held a "mystery" envelope for highest hand, a fifteen pointer, and a very high hand for British Cribbage, but Judy Gallagher matched that, and held it to the end of play. She hesitated to open it, as some had told her it contained the hotel bill. But, instead, she found a twenty-dollar bill. Gene and Mattie thanked everyone for attending and encouraged them to enter the John Suckling at GNXXIII.

Club 119 in Marietta, GA has \$5 bonus hands during play. The number of the bonuses depends on the number of players and the rewarding hands (or cribs) are generally selected by the Director, sometimes suggested by the players when the Director is in a good mood. In this particular scenario one \$5 bonus would go to the last player getting a 19point hand or crib. They refer to it as a "floater", being passed from one player to another. They have done this before using a 24-point hand as a "floater" with it only passing through 2-3 people in a nine game tournament. In this case, out of 12 players, there were 38 claims for the dishonor or "Envelope of Shame" as it were. 31 were tallied as crib 19s, 7 were hands. Two players claimed it 5 times. One player recorded 3 of his 4 19's as being in the hand, that player being Master ranked Bobby Stuart! (The club says "This is no "rub it in", Bobby, just a reminder that those with status are part human after all!") Try it in your club for some extra fun.

News from Club 309 in Kelowna, BC. One of the great benefits of the Grass Roots program is the opportunity to play at tournaments hosted by other clubs, and competing using the same rules against many fine players outside of one's own club. So it was, a few months after 9/11, that Lorna and Gerry Klein left Kelowna, British Columbia, by car for Betty Johnson's tournament in Spokane, 5 hours away. There had been several terrorist alerts following the attacks, and they knew

security at the border crossing to the U.S.A. could be tight. The fastest route was through a small, quiet, border crossing. But they were not too worried, as they probably did not fit the profile of terrorists. The day of travel, however, there was a fresh alert, and they were more or less prepared for a delay at the border, and possible denial of entry to the U.S. by nervous officials. As they came up to the U.S. Customs and Immigration post, they were a little apprehensive, as not only were there the normal two border guards, but also a tall, stern, very fit, ready to react, all business looking soldier with a close haircut, dressed in camouflage, carrying a mean looking gun, all barrel and bullets. Cribbage may be a universal activity!

News from Club 227 in Laguna Woods, CA During the summer 2004 season, The Orange County Cribbage Club "went to the races." They recorded everyone's score for six consecutive meetings and added up the best five scorecards for each player. The club donated \$1 per player per meeting into a special "races" pool. First place paid 50%, second place paid 30% and third place paid 20%. Club Director Paul Yellon suggests that other Club Directors take note as "this is a great attraction and reward for regular players who attend during the off season and it doesn't cost them to enter the race!" Paul is indebted to Boyd McDonald of Club 48 for bringing the "races" to his attention.

Consecutive GR Championships Continued: Chib #274, Sweet Onion Peggers had a consecutive champion two years in a row. John Hensley was their 2nd year and 3rd year champion. He finished 2nd to Dave Bosley last year. So in three of four years, he's either won it or finished in 2nd place.



News from RAS of the Chehalis-Centralia Cribbage Club RULES! RULES! RULES!

Don't like to emphasize rules that much. First ingredient in success is to have fun. New rulebook is out and there are a few changes. Noticed two situations entirely similar this past week in play that bother me a great deal. In both cases, the player put the cards quickly back in the deck. In one case, the player claimed had too many cards and quickly shuffled them into the deck. In the other case, the player scored four points on a two hand and mixed that hand quickly into the deck. This is a most serious rules violation. Only a false claim of game has a more severe penalty. In neither case did their opponent say a word. It is the responsibility of the player to

show those cards to opponent clearly. Most frequently they are laid on top of the crib board for the examination of the other player. How else can you know they have too many cards? They might have picked up a zero hand and want another deal. Don't give it to them! How do you know they have four points once they quickly put the cards into the deck? If this is observed in play, your opponent is to sustain a ten-point backward penalty. If they are only three pegs into the board, their pegs are removed from the board, placed in the starter holes, and their opponent gets the balance of the penalty by moving forward seven holes. It is very important that we stop this practice. If it happens in your game, I expect you to challenge your opponent in a mild manner. If not resolved properly, call for a judge. Big winner of this past week was Mary Herring of Napavine as she scored 16/7/132 to claim top spot, add 16 points to her lifetime total and move towards that coveted Bronze Award with 842 lifetime. Mary lost only one game by a single point. With three members over 800 in the wings, our club could add three Bronze Awards before the end of this season, and bring total earned in this group to 12. Pretty solid for a club that started in 1996-1997. RAS followed closely with 16/7/ 118. Believe that moves me into #7 in total Grass Roots Cribbage program with 3008. Not bad for a kid who joined ACC in 1990.
