Illinois Open

Tom Edwards Sparkles

he spring edition of the semiannual Illinois Open in Crystal Lake IL went off without a hitch, thanks in no small part to the fine efforts of directors Marvin Lang and Dave Drew. Not only did they do their usual bang-up job, but the D'Andrea Banquet Hall puts out one of the best Saturday lunches of any tournament in the Midwest, if not in the nation.

In the 97-player main tournament, Master Cyril Schmidt (WI) was sizzling, with a 37/17 +240 scorecard. The ACC's MRP leader this year—Life Master (*) Wayne Steinmetz (WI)—was the second high qualifier, but couldn't quite make the finals and had to settle for third place, along with Brad Behm (WI). In the last match of the day, Tom Edwards (IL) was not fazed at all by the lofty status of Life Master (*) Jerry Gruber (MN), as he didn't lose a game to Jerry. The 147 MRPs that came with the win moved Tom very close to his Master ranking, with 1,955 MRPs lifetime.

Two players, Larry Collins (IL) and Brad Behm (WI), had identical scorecards in the qualifying round on Saturday: 31/14 +114. In another illustration of every point being important, Larry qualified in the eleventh spot on the basis of his 271 positive points, versus Brad's 264.

The 63-player consolation saw someone named Steinmetz again qualifying in second position, but this time it was Wayne's brother Steven Steinmetz (WI). Pete



My Deal by David Aiken



My good friend **Jeff Shimp** tells the story of how he was eating breakfast at the Mission Valley Inn in Raleigh NC before the start of the 1979 National Open Cribbage Tournament.

At a nearby table were several other people who had also come to Raleigh to play cribbage: Joe Wergin, Jim Arblaster, Nick Pond, Bob Immel, and Pete Danielson. Their animated discussion centered around forming a national organization to protect cribbage players from unscrupulous tournament directors and to bring consistency to the game. Unable to avoid hearing their conversation, Jeff followed them outside after breakfast, apologized for eavesdropping, and said that he wanted to be part of their group.

Jim Arblaster immediately stuck out his hand and responded: "Give me ten bucks. What's your name?"

That story both epitomizes and corroborates everything I've heard about Jim Arblaster. If Joe Wergin was known for his ideas, Jim was known for his action. When he came across a good idea, he moved quickly. Of course, that also meant that he ended up doing a lot of work in those

early days, and thus he became the first editor of *Cribbage World* in March 1980, a fact commemorated on the masthead on page 3 of every issue.

In the past the 25 Board members were the voting panel for all nominees for the ACC Hall of Fame, but this year every Board member was asked to select 3 ACC members to vote for the candidates, thus giving the Board a vote plus 75 members from across the U.S. and Canada a say in the matter. After tallying all of the votes I'm a proud to announce 100% participation (all 100 ballots were returned), and the panel selected one nominee, Roy Hofbauer, as the newest member of the ACC Hall of Fame. The representation of the voting panel is a true cross-section of players from around the U.S. and Canada and will be continued on a yearly basis. Thank you to all panel members for your efforts with this new undertaking.

Split Western Region in Half

Recently, there has been renewed interest in reapportionment of the regions of the ACC. tionate as well. For this reason alone, players out of the West tend to dominate the national MRP standings year after year. The suggestion to split the West Region into Northwest and Southwest Regions was met with little enthusiasm by the previous Board of Directors. Perhaps the new BOD will be able to look beyond the notion that "this is the way it's always been" and recognize the need for a realignment that makes real sense and promotes parity between the regions.

Twice a year cribbage players from up and down the Eastern Seaboard gather in Hampton Roads to take aim at each other. Located in the heart of southeastern Virginia and steeped in four hundred years of American history, this natural harbor on the James River is also a natural place to play cribbage.

In the November 2006 edition of this tournament, Master Matthew Easterbrook (VA) managed to be both high qualifier and champion. So he liked his odds in early March when he was again high qualifier, with 38/17 +244. Alas, he was unable to double dip this time and got knocked out in the semifinals. On the other hand, Grand Master Bruce Sattler (MD)—the Eastern Region's MRP

please make checks payable to Leukemia & Lymphoma Society leader—who had to play second fiddle to Matthew in November, pulled everything together this time and took first place in the 60-player event by beating tournament director Master Jack Howsare (VA) in the finals. Jack unofficially earned his Grand Master ranking with his fine performance here. The 2005 Rookie of the Year Mark Soule (ME) was the other semifinalist.

Two pieces of free advice: (1) Have you ever missed a point and said, "It's just one point—it doesn't matter"? Don't try to convince Bruce Sattler of this. He and another player were tied with identical scorecards in Saturday's qualifying round: 27/12 +50. Bruce ended up qualifying because he had 6 more positive points. (2) The important thing is to qualify: Bruce was low qualifier, but because he qualified he gave himself a chance to win-and he took full advantage of this chance. Interestingly, Bruce won only 12 of 22 games on Saturday (when's the last time 27/12 qualified?), and then he won 12 of 15 games in his run to the championship.

In the 44-player consolation, Grand Master Jeff Raynes (NC) was high qualifier with 17/8 +96. Maynard King (PA) and Grand Master Russ Perkins (NC) finished in third place. Phil Vierela (NC) continued his love-hate affair with Virginia. For the second time in two months, he took second place in a Virginia tournament. Mike Midgette (NC) whittled him down to size at the January Virginia Cribbage Championship, and this time he fell victim to Life Master (★★) Phyllis Schmidt (MA), who picked up her 29th tournament win. With this win, Phyllis moved out of a tie with Life Master (★) James Langley (CA) and into third place all by herself in lifetime tournament wins.

- · enters all tournament results and member information
- makes sure that the club has certified judges

- sets up the room for play
- makes sure everyone follows the correct rotation
- straightens the room and dumps the trash
- and a myriad of other details

This month's sad tale by Patrick Barrett (Wisconsin Rapids WI)

I anticipated the January Carter Casino Tournament in Carter WI with great expectations, as I knew my cards were due to turn for the better after weeks of dreadful Grass Roots sessions. And sure enough, Saturday morning brought eight wins in the first ten games. At the lunch break I had 24 GPs, with eight games to go. "I have a shot

Reno is always fun—plenty of people, gambling, and great cribbage action. The 566-player Tournament of Champions set sail Friday, and my cards were cold early on. A surge of luck in games 9–15 gave me 18 GPs with one game to go. I

the cards can go bad—and bad they were. I won only one of the next seven games, leaving me with 26 GPs and one game to go. It was close, but I finally managed to win game 28 against my wily opponent by a single-digit margin.

Having helped tabulate at many tournaments, I knew a 28/13 +90 scorecard was 99% sure to make it to the playoff round. I watched cards come in from other tables: one at 40 GPs, several in the high 30s, and plenty of scores in the low 30s. But I was still confident that I was in, for hardly ever would a 28/13 not qualify with a group this size (about 140 players).

Bob McCabe, the head tabulator, looked at me across the table and said, "You might be on the bubble." My heart sank; "he's kidding," I thought—but he wasn't, as the low qualifier was 28/14. I was "king" of the bottom 75%, and no playoffs—the dread of anyone who has ever played this game. My weekend was

it." But winning was out of the question, as I was skunked. Sure enough, one game away—again. Only my brother Mike's run to the top 32 in the playoffs brightened my day.

In the JPW/ACC Open, over 950 players battled for the coveted playoff spots. Again, my cards were cool but I managed 14 GPs at the lunch break. As the qualifying ground on in the afternoon I was in trouble, but I then won the final three games to land on 27/13 +70. I needed to be in the top 241 players, but when the scores were all put into the computer program and sorted, I was in 243rd place. I missed by 13 plus points! "Not again," I thought as I left the room. Why me? Three tournaments in row I missed by one game or a few points—a true cribbage nightmare.

As with life, cribbage is a game of ups and downs. I sure hope the ups are on their way, as these downs are far to numerous to deal with lately!

on

Harold Sontag

On September 12, 2006, Harold Sontag did what he has done almost every Tues-

day since 1998—he played cribbage at his local Grass Roots club: River City Peggers (#162) in Carmichael CA. And while the 13/6 +88 scorecard he turned in that evening might not seem very impressive, those 13 points were enough to push Harold over 4,000 Grass Roots points lifetime and become the ACC's first

Grass Roots Gold Award winner.

Born in Illinois and raised in Wisconsin, Harold now lives in Dixon CA. It thus seems appropriate that he struck gold in Carmichael, which is only twenty-five crow miles from Sutter's Mill, where the gold that sparked the California Gold Rush was found in 1848.

A carpenter by trade, Harold learned to play cribbage in 1953. The competition, the drive to beat his opponent, drove him to excel at the game—and excel he did.


In his twenty years of Grass Roots play, he has had fifteen grand slams, a dozen or

so 28-hands, and one 29-hand. And he has been club champion ten times, five of them with the River City Peggers.

Lest anyone think that Harold can play only one tune, he is also a Grand Master on the ACC tournament circuit, with 4,984 MRPs and seven tournament wins under his ever-present cow-

boy hat. He and his wife form the ultimate cribbage power couple. Helene Sontag is a Silver Award winner in Grass Roots play (2,619 points), and she has earned her Master in ACC play (2,774 MRPs).

While we are going to see more Gold Award winners in the next few years (see list below), Harold will always be the first one to have reached this milestone. Congratulations to Harold and all the fine folks at the River City Peggers who pushed him to excel at the grand ol' game.

New Grass Roots Scoring System

Most of us haven't been playing Grass Roots cribbage for twenty years. However, those who have might remember the total chaos of Grass Roots points under the original system with gold points and red points based on a club size and other requirements. The system was changed in the mid-80s to the current point system to make it more equitable across the country and allow people to earn points on a more consistent basis.

However, a major flaw in the system became immediately obvious, since it was now possible to earn 12, 13, 14, or even 15 points at a weekly tournament but not get Grass Roots points due to the 20% rule and occasional skewing of the statistics due to small numbers of players. The designers of the current system decided that it was asking too much for players to undergo another major change in the system so quickly, and so they decided to defer this adjustment to a later date. That deferral has now been in effect for more than twenty years.

After much discussion, which included looking at the historical evolution of the Grass Roots scoring system and trying to come up with a system that would be consistent and fair, the Grass Roots Board of Volunteers voted at their Reno meeting to establish a fixed system for determining who will earn Grass Roots points at weekly meetings and in the GRRT/GRNT. This change will become effective in the 2007–2008 season, beginning September 1, 2007.

In order to remove all the confusion over who gets points and who doesn't—depending on the number of people present

and whether they are visitors or guests—a fixed standard for earning points has been established. Any club member who scores 12 or more game points will get the number of GPs scored, regardless of how many visitors or guests are in attendance. Thus, members will know instantly at the end of the evening if they earned points. The 20% rule that included visitors and ignored guests will disappear, and no other calculations will be necessary. This does not change the rule that visitors from other clubs cannot earn points. Also, the minimum number of members and visitors needed to have an official club tournament remains at six.

Some objections were raised to this new policy, because it seems to take away the policy of awarding points only to the top scorecards. However, examination of the standard distribution of points shows that 12-GP cards should get points. In comparison with sanctioned ACC tournaments, getting 12 GPs in Grass Roots play equates to a 29-GP card in a 22-game tournament, 13 GPs in Grass Roots equates to a 32-GP card, and 14 GPs equals a 34-GP card. Can you imagine not qualifying with a 32-GP or even a 34-GP card in a major sanctioned tournament? But this happened all the time in Grass Roots clubs, mainly due the statistics being skewed because of the smaller numbers.

Members who have occasionally received points in the past for 10-GP and 11-GP cards when the point distribution has been very skewed will no longer get those points. There have been very rare occasions when 11 GPs was the top card for a Grass Roots

meeting. Under the new scoring system, no one in the club will earn points for that session. However, historical data indicate that using a fixed standard of 12 GPs will add 3%–5% to the total Grass Roots points awarded in any given year to the club.

This change will also have impact on the two semiannual tournaments: the Grass Roots Regional Tournament and the Grass Roots National Tournament. In order to be consistent, 24 GPs or more scored in a GRRT or GRNT will automatically get those points when the tournaments are posted. Players in these tournaments will no longer have to wait until all the scores are in from around the region or country to know

if they will receive points. In the past 24s and 25s have sometimes been denied points, and 23s have sometimes gotten points. This new system will remove all the uncertainty.

The biggest advantage of this fixed point system is that it will automatically allow people to know if they got points at any given session and will enable them to keep track of their own points better. This will make record keeping much easier and make points earned totally consistent regardless of how many players are at a club. Small numbers of players will no long skew the results, either positively or negatively. The fixed point system will be fairer for all players across North America.

The Grass Roots Regional Tournament for the 2006–2007 season is now complete. Thanks go to our four Regional Grass Roots Commissioners, who conducted a GRRT in their region: Roger Wilson, Dave O'Neil, Patrick Ward, and Marlene Lazachek.

Each is a volunteer and spent many hours compiling the information to make their tournaments function properly. They put together and mailed a letter of instruction to all Grass Roots clubs, opened bank accounts to deposit the entry fees, and set up space on the Grass Roots website for clubs to enter their results. They tracked the entries that club directors entered and made any needed corrections. Every odd-numbered year the ACC holds elections for its 25-member Board of Directors. The two-year term of office begins September 1, 2007, and runs through August 31, 2009. When you are finished voting, write in the large box at lower right the total number of votes cast, cut on the dotted line, add appropriate postage (24° in the U.S.), and drop the self-addressed postcard into the mail.

Ballots must be received by May 31.

David Aiken (Ada MI): editor of Cribbage World. A native of Washington State, I now live in Michigan with my wife and two teenage daughters, where I am a freelance editor of nonfiction manuscripts for university presses and a bookseller specializing in antiquarian books. I would also like to see certain longstanding legal questions tackled and resolved on a state-by-state basis. It is my belief that the ACC BOD needs to take a more pro-active role in these areas. If elected I will work hard to make a positive impact for the sake of all ACC members, regardless of age or location.

James W. Arblaster

When those ten cribbagephiles met on that now-famous Friday morning breakfast in Raleigh NC in August 1979, Jim Arblaster was present. That day marked the birth of the American Cribbage Congress, but Jim's involvement in organized cribbage goes back much further.

As a 25-year Army veteran, his love for cribbage followed him from base to base. At his last assignment, Ft. Knox KY, he engineered the Ft. Knox Cribbage League. As a Sergeant Major, he put the resources of his office to good use; he developed an unusual and unique type of scoring system for the league and published his newsletter with stats during each season of play. After retirement from the Army, Jim and his wife, Marlyne, settled in Kissimmee FL.

He still had a hunger for organized cribbage. He and a handful of others from the South were charter members of the International Cribbage Association, a California-based organization that started up in 1977. With the ICA failing to make advances into the Midwest and East, Joe Wergin called the 1979 organizational meeting, and the rest is history. Jim's dream for "big-time" organized cribbage

had become a reality, and for four years he was the real workhorse of the ACC.

Jim was appointed the first ACC Secretary, and in this all-encompassing job his biggest task was editor of the newsletter. Naming it was easy: since he lived near Walt Disney World, where everything was named "world," he naturally named the publication *Cribbage World*. His computer/printer was an IBM Selectric ball typewriter. He got the first issue off in March 1980; it was free for a couple of months and was available at all the tournaments.

Jim's mission was to convince readers that the newly formed ACC had a product to offer. The dues were cheap, and the major products were tournament sanctioning and recognition of achievers in these tournaments by awarding rating points. Jim was at the forefront in developing guidelines for tournament directors, and he chaired the committee that created the first ACC rating system in 1980, a system that worked well in those early years but had little resemblance to today's system. And by his side was Marlyne; for several days each month she made her contribution by affixing postage stamps and ad-



dress labels to the ever increasing number of newsletters.

Jim added spice to cribbage by recognizing an annual All American Team and helping to create the Hall of Fame in 1982

to honor the superlatives of cribbage. Jim also founded the Honorable Order of Cribadier Generals, a name he patterned after an Army society; donations aided the ACC youth program, and the contributors received official engraved certificates.

As a tournament director, Jim organized his Florida Cribbage Association's (FCA) first tournament, the Florida Open Cribbage Tournament, in the fall of 1979. He added a spring event in 1981. FCA also maintained a seasonal newsletter. Out of the Orlando Elks Cribbage Club he cofounded the Greater Orlando Cribbage Club (now Grass Roots Club 22) in 1985 and published a periodic newsletter.

Thanks to visionaries like Joe Wergin and Jim Arblaster, along with loyal ACC BOD members and dedicated tournament directors and other cribbage enthusiasts across the continent, the American Cribbage Congress is today at the zenith of card-playing organizations.



The exception, of course, is when a player has a physical problem preventing them from shuffling or dealing.

Changes to Grass Roots Points System— Effective next season (9/1/07) Grass Roots points will no longer be calculated on the top 20% plus ties. The method has been simplified: scorecards with 12 game points and above will always get points; 11 GPs and below will not. For the 18-game GRRT and GRNT tournaments, 24s and above will get points, and 23s and below will not. See story on page 16.

End of the Grass Roots Season—Club directors and statisticians should take the following actions in April: (1) make sure everyone on your club roster who is listed as a member has paid both their ACC and GR fees. If you have players who have earned GR points this season, they will lose those points if their fees have not been paid by the end of the 2006–2007 GR season. (2) Do you have players on your roster who have not or will not play by 5/31/2007? If so, bring up that player's record and click Remove. (3) Make sure you have submitted award certifications to your Regional Statistician for all players (members and visitors) who have played in your club and scored a 28- or 29-hand or a Grand Slam scorecard. (4) All GR members who have ACC numbers expiring in April or May should renew them immediately. Please don't wait until the end of May to renew because it will cause your club's May tournaments

to not be finalized until 3–4 weeks after you mail your ACC renewal in.

Have Board, Will Travel—the February 2007 Cribbage World carried a story on page 17 about my quest for a 29-shaped cribbage board for a man in Albuquerque. Here's how it turned out: a 29-shaped board was made in China and then shipped to Canada to a retail sales outlet. Pages 9–10 reported recent tournament wins by Eleanor Leander (Mansfield Senior Citizens Tournament), Joseph DeAngelo (Western New York Open), Bob Radeke (East Tennessee Open), Bob Cashion (Sontag Classic), Jerry Siefkens (Great Plains Classic), and Bill Carder (Doc Matthews Classic).

The back page reported that Wisconsin was the #1 state in the ACC, with more than twice the members (385) of second-place Massachusetts. Rounding out the top five were Minnesota, Florida, and California. In 1982 Racine WI captured the top spot among cities (97 members), with Lincoln NE at #2, followed by Saint Paul MN, Milwaukee WI, and Dedham MA. Today's top five states and

MRP Reduction Program

By unanimous vote of the ACC's Board of Directors at their semiannual meeting in Reno NV in February, all Master Rating Points (MRPs) will be reset to zero as of August 1, 2007. MRPs will continue to accumulate throughout the remainder of the current cribbage year, but at the stroke of midnight on July 31, 2007, all MRPs will be erased from the record books, and all ACC members will be on equal footing.

While the MRP program has been modified several times during the 28-year history of the ACC, this is the most drastic revision to date. In a news release dated 4-1-07, ACC President Alan Lindner (WI) indicated that the unprecedented move was undertaken in the spirit of fair play and true gamesmanship. Said Lindner: "The ACC is all about having fun, and right now the only people having fun are DeLynn Colvert and Duane Toll."

In recent years, the disparity between the MRP leader—Life Master (***) DeLynn Colvert (MT), who currently has 28,902 MRPs—and the lowest ranked players has grown to a deep chasm. This move will reestablish parity in the ACC and give hope to thousands of ACC members not named DeLynn.

The second-place MRP holder, Life Master (***) Duane Toll (OR), was ecstatic when he heard the news about the MRP diet plan. He said: "Now I'll have a chance to catch De-Lynn while he's still alive." Colvert responded: "Just let him try!"

Elsewhere in the ACC, both the organization's statistician Bob McCabe (WI) and webmaster Diane Waite (MN) went on record in support of the new MRP program, as it will greatly reduce their workload for the next few years. In addition, *Cribbage World* Editor David Aiken (MI) reports that this measure will save up to 1,500 keystrokes in each monthly issue by not having to type all those parenthetical stars after DeLynn's (***) and Duane's (***) names. At the current rate of 0.01¢ per star, this means that the ACC will save approximately \$4.01 annually.

This ACC innovation is already reverberating throughout the world of sports and games. The PGA has created an internal committee to investigate whether a similar program would benefit the millions of golfers not named Tiger. Other sports organizations are also reportedly considering similar parity programs, but no further details were available at press time.
