Rollie Heath Is ACC Open Champ

he ACC's most prestigious and largest tournament was held on February 10–11 at the Sands Regency in Reno NV. Over 950 players gathered to compete for first place—and the \$10,000 prize that went along with this honor.

Competition was fierce in the qualifying round, and Life Master (One Star) Wayne Steinmetz (WI) showed why he is leading the Central Region this season when he posted the highest scorecard: 39 GPs. Wayne continued his winning ways deep into the playoffs, but had to settle for fifth place, when the eventual champion

knocked him out. The other quarterfinalists were Master Clay Collier (NE), Brad Behm (WI), and Mike McCammon (NV).

The semifinals saw two more challengers fall by the wayside: Ellen Lauer (ID) and Master Bob Gillette (CA). With the scene now set, the final match-up of the tournament featured Grand Master Henry Douglass (NC) taking on Life Master (One Star) Rollie Heath (OR).

That doesn't mean that I went farther in the playoffs and won more money than the previous year, but it does mean that I enjoy meeting friends from around the country and playing cribbage against some of the ACC's best players.

Stories about the various cribbage tournaments may be found elsewhere in this issue of Cribbage World, but here, in capsule form, is what happened in Reno last month:

- JPW/ACC Open Consolation—746 players, won by **Doris Sanders** (AB)
- JPW/ACC Open Main—964 players, won by Rollie Heath (OR)

While attendance in the ACC Open was down from last year, the 564 entrants playing in the TOC set a record for that tournament, which means that almost 40% of the 1,411 ACC members eligible to play in the TOC showed up in Reno. Wouldn't it be great if we could reach the 50% mark in 2008?

And there was plenty of action away from the cribbage boards. ACC members spent their fair share of time downstairs in the casino, the BOD worked through a heavy agenda, and the Grass Roots Board of Volunteers voted on several important matters.

But in the end, it is the cribbage that draws us to Reno, and—as always—the Sands Regency was the ideal host: not only do these friendly folks provide free playing space for all the tournaments and free meeting space for the BOD meeting, but they also provide coffee cake, coffee, and ice water throughout the entire weekend and put on sumptuous breakfast and lunch buffets at a very reasonable cost. In addition—and this is usually where cribbage players' ears perk up—they add \$15,000 to the prize fund.

What prize fund, you say? Well, in case you missed it, nearly one-quarter of a million dollars was awarded in prize money over the course of the weekend.

So, if you haven't done it already, mark your calendars now for February 8–10, 2008. I know that Scott, Peter, Rollie, and Doris will be there to defend their titles. And the Sands will welcome back them—and all ACC members—with a smile and a pile of cash.

I made the count 28 with the first Ace, and got a Go all around. The second Ace made a pair for 2 points, the third Ace a triple for 6 points, and the fourth Ace made a quad for 14 points—for a total pegging of 22! You could have heard the screaming and laughter a mile away.

It was a well-fought battle between these two worthy challengers, but in the end, West prevailed over East, and Rol-

Scott Buhrow Is Champion of Champions

Don't let anyone tell you that internet cribbage players don't know how to play real cribbage. Eleven players received invitations to the Tournament of Champions based on their internet play, and one of

them had a huge impact on the outcome of the tournament.

With a record-setting 564 players, the Tournament of Champions attracted nearly 40% of all eligible

ACC members. And of these 564 champions, Grand Master Don Patrin (MN) proved to be the best during Friday morning's qualifying round. Playoffs started in midafternoon, and in the final four matches of the day, four more champions were knocked out—quarterfinalists Life Master Douglas Henderson (WI), Keith Miller (NC), Grand Master Bill Christofferson (CO), and Master Patricia Upton (MN).

With the field narrowed to four contestants, the playoffs took a hiatus until Saturday afternoon. When they resumed, Scott Buhrow faced down **Kathy Atwood** (ID) in a 3-1 battle. And at the same time, **James Fanning** (CA) quickly fell 3-0 to his opponent: Warren Sondericker.

In what was perhaps the most entertaining match of the entire weekend, the final

match-up featured internet invitee Scott Buhrow (TN) taking on Life Master (Two Stars) Warren Sondericker (WI). Not only did Scott match Warren peg-for-peg on the cribbage board, but he also kept up with Warren in a highly enjoyable vocal sparring match, as each combatant traded verbal jabs, one-liners, and jokes with each other and with the audience of nearly one

hundred.

Warren's quest to become the first Grand Slam winner in ACC history—that is, the first person to win the ACC's four most prestigious tourna-

ments: Grand National, JPW/ACC Open, National Open Cribbage Tournament, and the Tournament of Champions—fell a few points short, as Scott prevailed in the fifth and deciding game of the match. Youth triumphed over experience—la jeunesse defeated le vieux monsieur.

Director Joan Rein (MN) reported that Rick Allen (VA) scored an elusive 29-hand, and three players scored 28-hands: Frederick Brown (NC), Brad Denend (WA), and a player whose name unfortunately slipped through the administrative crack. If this player will make himself or herself know to Joan Rein, CW will print the name next month.

Doris Sanders Takes Consolation

The second largest cribbage tournament in the world is the consolation tournament held in conjunction with the JPW/

ACC Open Reno in each February. And this year, 746 players who didn't make the cut in the main tournament played nine games on Sunday morning for the right to

be called Consolation Champion.

Life Master Bernie Nelson (OR) turned in the highest qualifying card, and then 187 entrants started working their way through the playoffs. By time the quarterfinals were reached, all but eight were gone, and in this round four more dropped out: Kenneth Roberts (MA), Mark Breneman (MN), Dave Yaeger (MO), and Susan Sirianni (CA).

Things heated up in the semifinals, as Doris Sanders (AB) knocked out Peter Jackson (CA), and Master Fred White

(HI) dispatched Master **Ray Hansen** (IA). The finals would thus pit an Albertan against a Hawaiian.

Fred took the first game, but Doris fought back gamely and took control of the match by winning games 2 and 3. With the right cards and skilful play, Doris won

the deciding game—and the match, the champion-ship trophy, and a fistful of MRPs.

So how did Doris get ready for the JPW/ACC Open Consolation? By

winning the consolation tournament at the Canadian New Year's Special in Edmonton the previous month. So look out, director **Dwayne Pankiw**. A whole slew of ACC members might flock northward next January as a warm-up for Reno!

Eastern All-Stars Shine

The Eastern Region All-Star Team, lead by captain Larry Phifer (NC), captured the 17th Annual All-Star Tournament on Thursday before the Big Event in Reno.

The Central Region, lead by Life Master (★★) Warren Sondericker (WI), jumped to an early lead in the first round of play and hung on through three rounds. But in the final round, the Eastern team came roaring back to claim the championship with 147 GPs, versus 137 GPs for the Central Region and 119 for the Western, which was captained by Life Master $(\star\star\star)$ Duane Toll (OR).

Prophetically sporting lapel pins that read "ACC East #1," the Eastern Region now has a 7-5-5 overall lead in this annual series, thanks to stellar play by these team members:

On an individual basis, Life Master (★★) Bob Julian (WI) set a new record in the All-Star Tournament with a 29/13 +205. Phyllis Schmidt turned in the second best scorecard, Life Master (★) Jim Langley (CA) was third, and Warren Sondericker was fourth.

Luck ran out for two players: this is the first time the Central Region has not won with Life Master (*) Syl Lulinski (IL) on the team. And Master Bob Bartosh (CA) had a run of bad cards that wouldn't stop until he had lost his first nine games.

Despite icy roads and falling snow, 172 players entered the main tournament. And Grand Master Roger Lueschow (WA) proved to be the best of the best on Saturday when he turned in a 39/17 +232 scorecard. The semifinals featured two in-state players—Grand Master Chris McComas (WA) and Mike Murphy (WA)—versus

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two out-of-state players: Master Graeme Gossett (OR) and Life Master Jones Hom (CA). The home-state lads had to settle for third, while Graeme picked up 196 MRPs when he got the best of Jones in the finals.

The consolation also hit triple digits, with exactly 100 players. Grand Master Lea Hornbeck (WA) turned in an astonishing 21/8 +179 scorecard. For those of you keeping score at home, this means that Lea had five skunks after losing the first game. That's a card of a lifetime! Meanwhile none of the consolation semifinalists were masters—yet—but if they keep playing like they did at this tournament it won't take long for any of them to reach this level. Jeff Olson (WA) beat Rick Pierce (OR) in the finals, with Hal Lamon (WA) and Ted Nelson (WA) placing third.

Jerry Goedert Captures Carter

The Carter Cribbage Classic is a perennial favorite for tournament players in the Central Region, but if you want to play in this tournament next year, it might be wise to move to Wisconsin first. At this mid-January tournament, the four semifinalists in both the main and consolation, as well as the high qualifiers in both tournaments, hailed from the Badger State—with the lone exception of Les Kvien, who from all accounts is an honorary Badger, given that he lives just across the state line in northern Illinois and plays a great many tournaments in Wisconsin.

Life Master (One Star) Bob McCabe (WI) turned in a sizzling 40-GP scorecard worth 70 MRPs during Saturday's 137-player main tournament, but he couldn't get out of the semifinals on Sunday. Joining him in the 3-4 slot was Master Carl Schroeder (WI). Master Jerry Goedert (WI) took advantage of Emil Den Dekker (WI) in the finals and claimed the championship and 196 MRPs.

In the 74-player consolation, Life Master Doug Page (WI) did it all: he was both the high qualifier (17 GPs) and the champion. Life Master Les Kvien (IL) nearly claimed his ninth tournament win, but fell a few pegs short. Grand Master Max Steplyk (WI) and Life Master Lloyd Kraft (WI) rounded out the final four.

The sixteenth edition of the Virginia Cribbage Championships seemed to have a little bit of everything—except the elusive 29-hand! Bill Smith (VA) opened the action with a Grand Slam in the Friday night event. Smith's 21/10+194 card topped the field of 56 and a fine effort by Grand Master Russ Perkins (NC), who also turned in a Grand Slam.

In Saturday's 73-player main event, tournament director Rick Allen (VA) posted a 37/18 +191 to best the field. Although seven of the nineteen qualifiers were from the home club in Richmond, the championship match was to be an all North Carolina affair. Mike Midgette (NC) swept Phil Vierela (NC) to take home the win and collect 147 MRPs. Master Bob Moore (VA) and Sue Devlin (RI) rounded out the top four.

The Grand Slam action continued Saturday night as Clyde Royce (VA) turned in a 19/9 +152 card in the 28-player Old Dominion Special. Over in the High Rollers event, Master Bob Milk (VA) bested the field of 12 high-caliber peggers with a 16/8 +114 card.

A field of 50 hopeful peggers turned out for the consolation event, but in the finals it was the top two qualifiers—Life Master Larry Phifer (NC) and Maynard King (PA)—who decided the eventual champion. In a close match, King prevailed 3-2 to post the win. Life Master Roland Hall (VT) and Zack Widener (NC) completed the final four.

The team competition was won by Mike Midgette (NC), Marvin Lewis (VA), and Bruce Sattler (MD). Sanctioned 28-hands

were recorded by **Bob Milk** (VA) and **Fran Ward** (NC).

Needless to say a good time was had by all, and the Richmond Cribbage Club plans to host this event again on January 11–13, 2008.

Sue Schenk Matches All Comers in Midwest

In what will hopefully become an annual tradition, the First Annual Midwest Match Play was held in Grand Rapids MI in January. This double-elimination match-play tournament featured 41 hopefuls from five states vying for the first-place trophy and prize money.

ACC MEMBERSHIP REPORT CARD

According to the Encyclopedia Britannica "In the United States cribbage is played by more than 10 million people, principally across the northern states from New England to the Pacific, and the game has remained popular in Canada as well. In Great Britain one to two million players compete in nationwide leagues, to which might be added a comparable number of casual players."

If the Encyclopedia Britannica is half right about either statement, membership in the ACC should be much higher than our current 7,099.

How are we doing on ACC membership? We should at least keep up with population growth. Below is my version of our membership report card by state. It does not consider where the gains and losses are within each state; but provides rough ideas about our progress. States with less than seven players were excluded. Canada is not separated by province because I do not have that information for 1997. The ACC membership figures for 1997 are from the September 1997 *Cribbage World*. The January 2007 figures were provided by Larry Hassett. Population growth figures are not included here and they came from the U.S. Census which showed that all states except North Dakota and Louisiana increased population in the last nine years.

In my report card, states with fewer players over ten years get an F. States that had player increases but did not keep up with population growth get a D. States that kept up with population increases but did not add one percent per year get a C. States that kept up with population increases and added over one percent per year but less than two percent get a B. States that kept up with population increases and added two percent per year get an A. Half of the states received an F—giving us a VERY POOR REPORT CARD overall.

We need to do more than play cribbage. If you or your club is not doing membership promotion on a recurring basis, that is likely part of the problem. Unfortunately it appears that for finding members, no one has found a method that works in all areas. Since membership work seems to be most successful when done by individuals at local levels, a specific nationwide plan may not work. No one is saying that membership promotion is easy or simple. Normally things worth doing are not easy. We each need to find out what works in our area and do it. Many organizations use a significant portion of their budget for advertising. Maybe the ACC or Grass Roots clubs should too. Before pushing that, we may need to find out where and what advertising works.

I believe that we should set a goal to double overall ACC membership within the next ten years. I am forming a group to discuss, collect, and disburse ideas about membership promotion. For now we will call the group "Double by Year 2016." At this time, the group will have no official ACC status and will be only an advisory group. I will provide our information to any ACC member, Grass Roots club, or other ACC group that wants options on promoting membership. Initially

we would collect and disburse information. Later the group might test advertising ideas or lobby the ACC to take certain actions.

You must be an ACC member to participate. Our primary method of communication will be email. I am hoping to hear from at least one person, in each state and province, who could participate in discussion and promotion. Also I am looking for additional people with specific skills and backgrounds. If you have ideas (pro or con) about this, had good or bad experiences with membership, know about setting up a nonprofit group, know about advertising, could help gather statistics, could help write and rewrite information guides, can manage the receipt and distribution of email, or just want to be involved; I need your help. To learn more, send an email to me at norm.crib@adelphia.net. I will send you a questionnaire to find what part you want to play.

HALL FAME

Joseph Petrus Wergin

If you type "Joseph P. Wergin" into the Google search engine on your computer, you will see numerous pages with topics like "Discard Averages in the Real World" and "How to Analyze Cards," which are the titles of two books written by the cardplaying enthusiast whose name is known to cribbage players across the country.

But the first topic on the list is "ACC Hall of Fame." How fitting for a man, a legend in his time, who is the undisputed founding father of the American Cribbage Congress and the first living person elected to the ACC's Hall of Fame, the greatest honor bestowed by this organization.


Joe was born in Madison WI in 1910 into a card-playing family. By the age of 13 he was playing at card parties and in local tournaments. Being a natural player and promoter, he soon became president of the North American Skat League, traveling to Germany to compete in international tournaments. Hoyle made him a consultant for skat and sheepshead as well, stating that "skat is not played according to Hoyle, but according to Wergin."


Outside of his card-playing prowess, Joe was an author, teacher, real estate developer, postmaster, and politician. In the mid-70s he turned his attention to cribbage and revolutionized the game with a round-robin method of cribbage qualification. He wrote *How to Win at Cribbage* in 1980, and players who bought it were soon winning "the Wergin way."

Soon afterward, he called together the greatest cribbage minds in the United States and formed the American Cribbage Congress. Joe served as the first ACC president, from 1979 to 1992. He was instrumental in developing the rules of the game, the Master Rating Point system we now use,

and his self-proclaimed greatest contribution: Grass Roots clubs.

Joe believed in developing young minds with math, so cribbage was the





perfect game: runs and pairs and 15-2 were his way of getting youth to "think

while they have fun." His life and travels revolved around cribbage, and Joe set out to develop and promote cribbage tournaments around the United States, thus making the ACC what it is today. His motto was "Think Big," and he lived his life every day with that in mind.

Joe "the Fox" Wergin passed away in 2005 at the age of 95. Players now stack up thousands of MRPs under his system, a system in which he himself didn't quite reach Master level, finishing at 1,728 points lifetime. Joe's life will not be remembered by points or wins, but by the ideas he brought to life and implemented into the ACC. Joe's name lives on to this day in the title of the world's largest cribbage tournament, the JPW/ACC Open in Reno, when 1000+ gather annually in February under his name. Wouldn't Joe be proud if he could see what the ACC and the JPW Open has developed into today!

Roy Hofbauer Enters HOF

At the February BOD meeting, Patrick Barrett, chairman of the Hall of Fame Voting Committee, announced that Roy Hofbauer (Washougal WA) had been elected to the ACC's Hall of Fame.

An ACC/Grass Roots member since 1985, Roy has an impressive list of cribbage credentials: 12,435 lifetime MRPs, with a Life Master (One Star) ranking; 15 tournament wins; and Silver Award in Grass Roots play, with 3,290 points.

The list of Roy's contributions to the ACC is even more remarkable:

- BOD member since 1989
- Western Region Tournament Commissioner since 1990
- Senior Judge

- director/co-director of two Grand National tournaments
- director of many tournaments, including the ACC Open since 1993
- member of Ethics Committee

Roy's dedication and service to the ACC was acknowledged when he received the

1999 President's Award.
Roy will be formally inducted into the HOF at the September Awards
Banquet in Portland
ME.


Joe Cover

Cribbage Boards for Troops

The November 11 Albuquerque Journal carried a story about National Guard troops from many parts of the country being deployed to the Forward Operating Base (FOB) in Deming NM. The initial contingent of troops was from Arkansas, Georgia, New Jersey, New Mexico, and West Virginia. Other states will send guard members to the FOB as needed, and eventually troops from twenty-seven states will rotate into the Deming FOB.

Their mission is to police the southern border of the United States until the U.S. Border Patrol can maintain border security with its own personnel. Located thirty-five miles north of the Mexican border, Deming is a very small town and is rather isolated, being sixty miles from Las Cruces and one hundred miles from El Paso.

After reading that article, my thoughts were these: These men and women are going to be away from home for a long time, doing a somewhat thankless job. They are going to have a lot of free time on their hands, so wouldn't it be nice if they could spend some of their off-duty time playing cribbage? Let's get them some cribbage boards so they can play some cribbage!

I contacted other members of the ACC Board of Directors, requesting approval to purchase thirty new cribbage boards at an approximate cost of \$500 (a local Indian casino would provide a case of almost new playing cards).

While waiting for BOD approval, I received much support for this project. Many ACC members offered to donate money to help pay for the boards, including a club director who offered \$100!

The next offer came from Alan Lindner, President of the ACC. Alan said that Jerome Tork (Wisconsin Rapids WI) would donate the boards he made for Grand National 25. Alan paid to have each board engraved with "American Cribbage Congress" and "www.cribbage.org," and he shipped them to me in less than a month. Alan also donated pegs and twenty ACC rule books. Talk about great support!

On January 7 I gave the boards and cards to a National Guard representative, who took them to the Deming FOB.

It is the hope of the ACC that those guard members who play cribbage will have plenty of time to teach others how to play this great game. And I have no doubt that when these National Guard troops rotate back home, they will keep playing cribbage and perhaps join existing Grass Roots clubs, start a new club, or look for ACC tournaments to participate in. All things considered, this is a winwin situation for the American Cribbage Congress.

Reno Update

At the Reno BOD meeting, Tom Lewis reported his efforts in sending cribbage boards to our troops. Peggy Scalley (Sun Valley NV) and BOD member Valerie Sumner (Reno NV) were appointed to collect funds to continue this project.

Paul Hatcher (Salem OR) offered to match all BOD contributions up to \$2,500, and so BOD members immediately contributed \$1,000 to this worthy cause. Before the weekend was over, other players at the TOC and ACC Open contributed \$1,700—with more promised.

That's a lot of cribbage boards!

Hall of Fame

Early on, the ACC foresaw the need to recognize members who excelled in playing the grand old game and/or who contributed to the success of the ACC in administrative ways.

A nominee must receive 75% or more of the votes to be elected into the HOF. 

Years Ago in the ACC

The cover story in the March 1982 Cribbage World was a lighthearted discussion of prize money, comparing the leading money-winner in cribbage, **Arnold Crews** of Jacksonville FL, who pulled in \$2,326, to top players in other sports, including boxing's Sugar Ray Leonard (\$12 mil-


lion), tennis star Björn Borg (\$2 million), and hockey's

Wayne Gretzsky (\$1 million). In 1982 two tournaments—the National Open Cribbage Tournament in Raleigh NC and the First Annual Grand National in Milwaukee—were projected to have total prize funds of \$10,000.

While cribbage hasn't (yet) approached the million-dollar mark, we can be thankful that things have improved, for in 2007 many tournaments—even midsize ones—will top the \$10,000 figure in total prize money. And first prize at the JPW/ACC Open, just concluded in Reno last month, was \$10,000. All told, nearly a quarter million dollars were paid out to cribbage players in Reno. We have indeed come a long way, baby!

A page 5 story mentioned the hope for a commemorative stamp dedicated to 350 years of cribbage. Jack Wunderlich (then, as now, living in Lincoln NE) spearheaded a drive to submit the application and signature petitions to the Postal Service. Joe Wergin, DeLynn Colvert, Jim Arblaster, and many others backed the idea, but unfortunately the U.S.P.S. was not receptive. With the 400th anniversary of Sir John Suckling's birth rapidly approaching in 2009, perhaps it is time to revive this idea. Anyone out there in Cribbage Land willing to organize a new drive for a cribbage stamp?

Page 10 reported tournament wins by **George Burwell** (Gateway to the Worlds), **Bob Palmer** (Oregon State Champion), and **Ervin Patrin** (Crystal Lake).
