Top Ten Tournament Players in 2006–2007

All American Team

What does it take to be one of the top ten players in the ACC? Some people might argue that these players are just lucky or that they played in forty tournaments last year.

There is no doubt that luck plays a part in cribbage (thank goodness: if it were pure skill, most of us might as well throw away our pegs now). But the equation All American = forty tournaments is sometimes made partly out of jealousy. (Who wouldn't, after all, envy someone who spends three out of every four weekends playing the world's greatest card game?) When you realize that most of the All Americans have been on the list multiple years, you start to understand that skill plays a decisive role.

So what does it take to be one of the top ten players in the ACC?

- This year it took 1,207 MRPs to crack the top ten, while the national champion had 2,118 MRPs.
- These players have thirty All American appearances between them.
- This year the ten All Americans won a total of twenty-seven tournaments (eighteen main, nine consolation).
- Most of the All Americans have a cribbage mentor someone who has taken them under their wing and taught them the finer points of the game—and many of them have reciprocated in kind.

At the annual meeting of the ACC's board of directors in Portland ME in late September, the BOD voted to raise membership dues. Depending on your perspective, the increase is either modest ("*only* \$5") or excessive ("a *whopping* 50%"). What is not in dispute is that this is the first dues increase since 2001.

My Deal

For comparison, here are the current and future dues:

Since I voted for this increase, which becomes effective on January 1, 2008, perhaps my rationale for doing so is in order.

First, the ACC is losing money. The general fund has been in steady decline since 2001, and steps must be taken to check this slide.

Second, expenses are up across the board. The current budget not only underestimated CW expenses but also did not account for pre-paid dues and a drop in life membership dues because of the increased age requirement (now age 62). Even without considering these factors, the budget submitted by **Bob McCabe** and approved by the BOD projects a \$6,000 loss in the next fiscal year.

But despite these legitimate reasons, some people may wonder why the ACC

needs to raise dues when we have "so much money in the bank."

Perhaps a snapshot of our financial situation will clarify matters. As of July 1, 2007, the ACC had assets of \$130,454. Of this, \$53,536 belongs to the Grass Roots program and \$9,061 to the Junior program—and neither of these amounts can be used for general expenditures.

Our general fund thus shows a paper balance of \$67,857, but around \$8,000 is tied up in cash advances and minimum balances and another \$7,000 represents paid-in-advance dues. This leaves a liquid balance of \$52,730—which is not really a huge amount for a 7,000-member organization with annual expenses of \$140,000.

A final question relates to our status with the IRS: can we retain our tax-exempt status when we have a large bank balance? ACC Membership Secretary **Larry Hassett** brings proper perspective to this issue by noting that the IRS requires a minimum of \$250,000 in assets before tax-exempt organizations have to use the long form. Thus, in the overall scheme of things we are, in Larry's words, "small potatoes."

The bottom line is that ACC membership—even at "a whopping 50% increase"—remains a bargain. Where else can you find access to Tournament Trail, Grass Roots info, and internet play; earn awards in the ACC's three divisions; read about the cribbage exploits of you and your friends every month in *Cribbage* continued on next page

• The 2006–2007 All Americans have held only six 29-hands between them.


In addition to these generalities, CW also discovered some interesting individual characteristics during the interviews:

- Herschel Mack holds the record for most points scored and *not* making the All American team. In 2004–2005 he finished 11th with 1,431 MRPs. Any other year that many points would have earned him an All American berth.
- Jim Langley is the only former national champion on this year's list, having captured the top spot in 2001 and 2003.
- Erik Locke is the youngest player on the All American list this year, at only 23 years of age.
- Wayne Steinmetz was the only player outside the Western Region to earn a berth on the All American team.
- Elmer "Ras" Rasmussen eats, sleeps, and bleeds cribbage.
- Jim Crawford submitted a very nice picture of him drinking a piña colada at the beach.
- Jason Shumate had the best quotations: "I'd rather be handcuffed and mauled by a polar bear than play a woman when I need a game." And, "I dealt 29-hands to Harvey Honeycutt and to my father. Both were very impressed by my skills, and one of them even 'discovered the reason for my birth!'"
- Michael McCammon is a supervisor at a Reno gambling casino and supplies playing cards to clubs and tournaments all over the West and beyond.



Game On

CW presented a game situation to the All Americans so that the other 7,085 ACC members who didn't make the All American team could gain a little insight into how they make decisions. Here's the set-up:

Your opponent is in hole 117; you are the dealer in hole 115 and must peg out in order to win the game. You deal yourself A-3-4-6-9-J. What do you hold, and why?

Here's how our All Americans would hold this hand:

Despite this variation, the common goal to trap a small card or a 5. Thus, they try to keep 3-4-6 intact as long as possible. Another common theme is aggressive pegging: they take pairs and 15-2 in order to set themselves up for a final run of three plus a go.

All of the All Americans acknowledged that this is a hard game to win—but if we know anything about these players, it is that they win hard games. Herschel spoke for all of them when he said, "Realistically, I need great luck to win this game."







Ron learned to play cribbage over fifty years ago at the Plumas Club in Quincy CA, where, Ron says, "the lessons were not free, but well worth it!" His favorite tournament is the JPW/ACC Open,

where he and his wife, Laurie, are Paymasters and Board Monitors. The highlight of Ron's playing career (so far, that is) came in 2001 when he won Grand National XX in

Hall of Fame Nominations

The ACC's Hall of Fame was established in 1982 to recognize members who excelled in playing the grand old game and/ or contributed to the advancement of the American Cribbage Congress. Each year, the ACC membership is invited to nominate candidates worthy of inclusion in the HOF. Here are the nominating criteria:

- 1. Nominations must be submitted in writing to the chairperson of the Hall of Fame Committee.
- 2. An individual nominated for the Hall of Fame must meet the following *mandatory* criteria. He/she must . . .
 - a. be a member in good standing of the ACC for seven consecutive years or have been a member in good standing for a minimum of five consecutive years until death intervened.
 - b. have displayed and complied with the rules of ethical play.
 - c. have displayed and complied with the standards of good sportsmanship.
- 3. In addition, to be eligible for nomination, a candidate is required to meet at least three of the following criteria. He/she must have . . .
 - a. promoted the game of cribbage and/or served the ACC by specific acts of accomplishment as specified in the nominating letter.
 - b. established his/her expertise by being rated a Master player or higher.
 - c. established his/her expertise by being rated a Bronze Award recipient or higher in the Grass Roots program.
 - d. served as a tournament director of an ACC sanctioned tournament for

a minimum of five years.

- e. served as a Grass Roots club director for a minimum of five years.
- f. served as a member of the board of directors of the ACC for a minimum of four years.
- 4. Any exceptions to or exemptions from the above criteria must be initiated by a current member of the board of directors.

The call for HOF nominations appears annually in the November *Cribbage World*. Nominations must be submitted in writing and postmarked no later than December 15.

The HOF chairperson will review all letters of nomination for compliance with the nominating criteria and



mail copies of each letter to the HOF voting panel (composed of twenty-five BOD members plus three panel members selected by each one). The voting panel will review the nominations and return their ballots to the HOF chairperson. The ballots will be counted in Reno prior to the February BOD meeting.

Nominees must receive 75% or more positive votes to be elected to the HOF. Induction into the HOF will take place at the Grand National Tournament.

To date, only two non-Americans have been inducted into the ACC's Hall of Fame. Our patron saint, **Sir John Suckling**, obviously never set foot in America, and **G. Douglas Anderson**, the subject of this month's HOF sketch, was a native of Canada. Do you know what other unique trait these two fellow HOF members share?

If Suckling was a renaissance jack of all trades (see February 2007 CW), then Anderson was his twentieth-century counterpart—but his many and varied interests were somewhat more practical:

- an electrical engineer and career executive at the Nova Scotia Light and Power Company
- a military officer who during World War II worked secretly on merchant and naval ships and subsequently was awarded the Order of the British Empire for "meritorious service to the Royal Navy and the Royal Canadian Navy"
- an active participant in community affairs and wildlife conservative
- author of the first modern-era book about cribbage


Douglas grew up in picturesque Nova

Scotia, where in the midst of all the beautiful scenery he fell in love with the game of cribbage. After seeing many games end in conflict because there was no authoritative set of rules and regulations, he set about to remedy this situation.

After amassing a wealth of historical information and mathematical data about the game, in 1971 he published *All about Cribbage*, which explored the history of the game, playing sequence, strategy, variations on two-handed cribbage, statistics and odds, terminology, and rules of play. Almost immediately, his book was recognized worldwide as *the* official reference book on the game.

When Nick Pond (who would later become a member of the ACC's Hall of Fame, class of 1982), started the National Open Cribbage Tournament in Raleigh NC, he naturally invited Douglas to come south and serve as head judge.

Douglas would sit at a raised table (he didn't play in the tournament), and disputants would carry their cards, board, and problems to him for resolution. For two years he held court in Raleigh, but eventually he came up with an absolutely



marvelous idea: judgment by peers. This simple suggestion grew into our present-day system of judges, whereby qualified ACC members make judgments about abnormal situations based on the ACC's rule book.

While a few of Anderson's rules have fallen by the wayside (e.g., "the player who cuts the highest card wins the cut and has first deal"; "the opponent must discard for the crib first"), many current ACC rules derive directly from Anderson's book and still echo similar phraseology or concepts

more than thirty-five years later, as seen in the table below.

Given the far-reaching influence of Anderson and his book, it is no wonder that Nick Pond sponsored Douglas for induction into the HOF in 1985. Unfortunately, Douglas had passed away in 1976 before the formation of the ACC. His widow, Beatrice, and son, David, attended the 1985 Grand National tournament and awards banquet in Denver CO to accept this posthumous award.



So what else do Suckling and Anderson have in common? They are the only HOF inductees to have never played in an ACC-sanctioned tournament or earned an MRP!

ACC Rule Book

Rule 3.1.b. When cutting for the first deal of a game, the first player shall remove no less than four cards and not more than half the pack.

Rule 2.2–3. The pone has the right to shuffle the pack once per deal. The dealer has the right to make the last shuffle.

Rule 9.5. No aid from an individual or from the use of any material may be used to assist in determining scoring while pegging or counting the hands or crib.


Rule 2. When cutting for deal, the first to cut should remove at least the top four cards; but he should not remove more than half the pack.

Rule 4. All players have the right to shuffle the cards, but the dealer has the right to do so last.

Rule 37. Spectators of the game shall not in any way assist either player or interfere in any way with the progress of the game. We wish to thank the following members who have made donations to the Junior Program. STat of the Month

Intrigued by the August "Stat of the Month," **Bruce Bowman** (Ann Arbor MI), creator of Cribbage Master (see ad at bottom of facing page), researched per capita membership for all states and provinces. He obtained ACC membership numbers from Membership Secretary Larry Hassett (current as of August 2, 2007). He then pulled population data (current as of July 1, 2006) from the internet (his sources were factfinder.census.gov and statcan.ca) and calculated per capita membership numbers for all U.S. states and Canadian provinces, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico. The accompanying table presents these 65 geographical regions in order of their per capita rank (number of ACC members per 1,000,000 population). By way of comparison, the top five states by membership rank are California, Oregon, Washington, Wisconsin, and Massachusetts.


