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First-Time Winner

Chris McComas Is ACC Champion

he 2006–2007 cribbage season is in the books, and Life Master Chris McComas (Kelso WA) secured his first national championship with a 571-point lead over his nearest competitor, Life Master Herschel Mack

(McKinleyville CA). Chris becomes the first new champion in four years, as Life Master (***) Duane Toll (Sutherlin OR)—who captured the championship in each of the last three years—finished far back in the pack in 42nd place with only 699 MRPs.



The Western Region dominated the All American team, by capturing nine of the ten available slots. Only the Central Region's Life Master (**) Wayne Steinmetz (Milwaukee WI) was able to crack the top ten, with a respectable 1,423 MRPs, which was good enough for fifth place nationwide. The highest rated Eastern Region player was Grand Master Bruce Sattler (Nottingham MD), who finished in 13th place with 1,085 MRPs.

Joining Chris on the All American team is his mentor and frequent traveling companion Life Master (★) Elmer George "Ras" Rasmussen, who finished in sixth place nationwide. Both Ras and Chris play Grass Roots cribbage at the Chehalis-Centralia Cribbage Club in

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My Deal by David Alken



In late July I played in the ACC's oldest and most prestigious cribbage tournament—the National Open Cribbage Tournament in Raleigh NC, directed by **Cathy Perkins**. This is one helluva a weekend and should be experienced at least once in a lifetime by every ACC member. But don't blame me if you get hooked.

Three years ago I attended my first NOCT, and on the way home I not only resolved to play next year but also began making plans to hold a similar tournament here in Michigan. The second edition of the Midwest Match Play will be held on January 18–20, 2008, in Muskegon MI.

To give you a sense of what you'll experience at the 35th annual NOCT next year on July 25–28, here's a summary of the 2007 NOCT (these totals don't count the hundreds of side games played in the hospitality room):

The heart of the NOCT is the hospitality room—where people hang out between matches (or when they've been eliminated), fortifying themselves for their next match (or drowning their sorrows after a tough loss). This year, denizens of the hospitality room consumed three kegs of beer, fifteen gallons of hard stuff, eight gallons of Jerry Gooden's homemade kaluha brew, three hams, three turkeys—to say nothing of the tomato sandwiches, barbeque, and assorted snacks furnished by Henry Douglass and the Reidsville Cribbage Club.

However you like your cribbage—singles, doubles, captains, six-handed, long matches—the hospitality room is the place to be. And you'll also find there a fair bit of Texas Hold-'em, Gin, and Pai Gow—the latter mainly in its Midwestern variant invented by ACC President Al Lindner and later named Al Gow by his buddies.

29 Board

Here is the official scoop on the origin of the cribbage board in the shape of a 29. The first 29 board was made by Edward M. Hirst (Burnaby BC) in 1953. He was a paraplegic and made the boards by hand in his wood shop. The design was registered in Canada (similar to a U.S.A. patent). Hirst died in 1960. In 1962 a Vancouver BC firm began producing commercial copies of the board that included a history of the board. Many other companies have made 29 boards since. Raggedy Andy

I would like to set the record straight on Raggedy Andy. Everyone recognizes the Raggedy Ann as A-A-6-7-8, which was given a nickname because of an oftenmissed 15 combination (A-A-6-7). Almost all players believe that the Raggedy Andy is 2-2-6-7-8, but there is no reason to give this hand a nickname, because there's nothing tricky about it. The actual Raggedy Andy is 2-2-5-6-7, which contains the same illusive 15 combination (2-2-5-6). This hand deserves its nickname for the same reason as Raggedy Ann, but I'm amazed at how many folks will argue with me. Roy Hofbauer and DeLynn Colvert agree with me, but I'd love to hear from other players who remember the origin of these nicknames.

Scorecard Errors

In a recent ACC tourney two similar events occurred on the same day and were handled differently. In both cases, all four players wrote the spread points in the win column; the winners claimed 2 GPs, while the losers marked an X. In the main tournament, the winner did not qualify as a result of this game being counted as a loss. Even when the loser told the director that he was the loser, the ruling stood. In the consolation the winner's card was accepted and no one was penalized. Bottom line: always double-check what your opponent writes on their scorecard-and if you're not satisfied with a ruling, call a Senior Judge before giving up in these situations.

Six players competed in all twenty tourneys: Joan Rein, Norb Upton, Frank Trojan, Wally Miskowic, Larry Loupee, and Helen Railsback. Those participants were each given a \$20 bill and a framed certificate of appreciation.

The ever-meticulous Scott kept track of the money winnings of all players in the sanctioned events (main tournament, main Q-pool, consolation tournament, consolation Q-pool). The following list does not include satellite tournaments or side pools.

Tournament Tidbits

- ◆ Grand Master Harold Buckley (Spruce Grove AB) started playing cribbage when he was 11 years old, and finally—after 65 years of playing cribbage—he got a 29-hand. In the Time Passer at the Alberta Open, Harold picked up his first and only 29-hand (to date).
- ◆ Sprechen Sie Deutsch? You may not need to speak German to play in the Schaefer Shuffle in Slinger WI, but the two winners—Life Master Richard "Frosty" Frost in the main and Life Master James "Little Moose" Huser in the consola-

tion—both hail from Berlin WI (bystanders called this double win the "Berlin Blitz"). The up-and-coming Jeff Gardner (Fairborn OH) turned in a sizzling 41-GP card on Saturday.

- ◆ All in the family! At the recent Medford Cribbage Lions Tale, Life Master **Harvey Honeycutt** (Beatty OR) got his first sanctioned 29-hand, only fourteen days after his wife and world-record holder Master **Beverlee Honeycutt** held her *fourth* 29-hand.
- ◆ After agonizing over his 5-5-5-7-8-10 hand at the Truckee River Classic, Life Master Cy Madrone (Santa Barbara CA) finally threw 7-8 into his opponent's crib—and cut the case 5 for a 28-hand!
- ◆ Steve Hastie (Janesville CA) was blazing hot in Nevada during July. At the Topaz Lodge Open on July 4 he was high qualifier with 42 GPs, winner of All Events,

- and placed third in the main. At the Independence Day Classic in Reno three days later, he qualified and then ran all the way to the finals, where he took second place. Not a bad week!
- ◆At the Dennis Cousens Memorial in Portland ME on July 8, Life Master (★) Bill Medeiros (Thorndike MA) set an ACC record for a 14-game qualifying tournament when he turned in a 32/13 +284 scorecard. His wife Sharlene Medeiros holds the ACC records for highest score in a 22-game qualifying

tournament. Is this mere coincidence or because they play like the One Star Life Masters they are?

Life Master Todd Schaefer (Oakdale MN) won the consolation event at the Lewis & Clark Classic for the third

- time—this year squeaking out the deciding game by a single point against Life Master (*) Jerry Gruber (Minneapolis MN). For more on the history of this venerable tournament—which sadly came to an end this year—see page 11.
- ◆ The drought is over! Since November Andrew Hulcher (Richmond VA) has needed two measly MRPs to make Master. In the last hand of the last qualifying game of his last tournament in the 2006–2007 cribbage season, he finally made it. He had to win the ninth game of the National Open consolation to qualify, and this guaranteed him at least 4 MRPs (he lasted a couple of rounds)

Scorecards

The ACC's National Tournament Commissioner **George Bickford** writes with a reminder to all ACC members. When recording your scores on the scorecard, please use either blue or black ink. Red or green ink are not acceptable. and finished with 24 MRPs). At the rate of 24 MRPs every eight months, Andy should reach Grand Master sometime in the year 2062.

- ♦ Marc Leichtling (Cape Canaveral FL) is in his rookie year with the ACC, but has already held two 28-hands. When he got the first one at the Regency Lakes Open in Coconut Creek FL on May 6, he was so excited that he pegged it backward! In the opening round of the National Open in Raleigh NC on July 21, he redeemed himself when he received—and pegged in the standard direction—a 28-hand while playing tournament director Cathy Perkins (Bear Creek NC). Marc went on to win both the game and the match.
- ♦ At the start of the National Open in Raleigh NC, Sue Perkins (Bear Creek NC) had never earned an MRP, had played in only ten tournaments lifetime, and had not played in any tournament since the 2006 NOCT. And to top it off, she misses points (she admitted to a friend that she gets mugged in almost every game). But did these negatives

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have any bearing on the outcome of the tournament? Nope. Sue is now the proud owner of 226 MRPs and the 2007 NOCT championship trophy. Mother-in-law and tournament director **Cathy Perkins** said, "Goes to show you what I have always believed: anyone can beat anyone else on any given day! You've got to love the game. ACC cribbage—the great equalizer."

◆ Both Master Joy Shimp and Life Master Jeff Shimp (Grand Haven MI) qualified in the consolation of the Granite City Classic in St. Cloud MN. And as luck (or skill) would have it, they met in the championship round. In the deciding game, Jeff was pone, needing only 2 pegs; after he conveniently cut a Jack for Joy, that left her also needing 2 holes. When she couldn't pair his opening card, Jeff paired her response for his 12th lifetime win. This turn of events gave Jeff 527 MRPs for the year, while Joy moved to 508. If the cards had fallen slightly different, Joy would have come out ahead of Jeff in the yearly standings.

The issue of splitting the Western Region has been around for a few years now, and some prominent ACC members are calling for further consideration of this concept. In view of the importance of this for the future of the ACC, CW presents a forum of letters received on this topic in the past month.

Should the Western Region Be Split?

In the July *CW*, Roger Wilson suggested in a letter to the editor that the ACC's single governing body should resemble the U.S. Senate rather than the House of Representatives because that was more representative of all ACC members.

I agree with Roger that ACC members deserve the best representation possible from their elected directors. I have always thought of the ACC directors as internal ambassadors of our game, with a great part of their value being their participation on the tournament trail. In this light, the representation of the ACC needs to be where our membership is. If this makes the BOD more like the House of Representatives, so be it. Since we have only the one governing body, and thus no built-in checks and balances, let us fashion something that at least serves our needs.

When I brought my proposal for proportional representation to the ACC board in 2003, a subcommittee was formed and a great deal of good information was revealed that validated four regions with six representatives per region plus one additional (perhaps Canadian) representative. Membership distribution today remains virtually the same.

Currently the Western Region has 50% of the membership, more than 90 tournaments, and ten directors, while the Central Region, with only 24.4% of the member-

ship and 28 tournaments, is represented by eight directors. Interestingly enough, the Eastern Region, with slightly more members than the Central (25.6%), hosts half again as many tournaments (41), but has only seven directors.

Today, the population of California is growing at a rate projected to bring an 80% increase within twenty years. With proportional representation in place, we will be much better able to adapt and accommodate the anticipated growth of the ACC in the West. Four years have passed since this proposal was presented to the board. It is time to take another look at realigning our organization to better serve our members today and in the future.

We believe that splitting the ACC into four regions is not in the best interests of the organization. The BOD formed a Restructuring Committee with members from all three regions to study this suggestion a few years ago. There were two basic ideas of how to restructure the regions: one was to split the Western region into two regions, the Northwest and the Southwest; the other was to totally restructure all the regions with different boundaries to create four completely new regions. After a year of work, the committee brought back a

recommendation to not implement any division at all. We still think this is sound reasoning and will outline some of the reasons:

- It would be a costly endeavor. The costs would include changing all of the organizations materials and computer software. It would mean funding another tournament commissioner, plus his/her necessary equipment and expenses.
- Organizationally, it is much easier to deal with an odd number, because whenever there are decisions to be made, there can never be a deadlock; there will always be a majority.
- At this time there is a "geographical barrier" of states that do not have any or hardly any tournaments that separate the three regions. For the most part, this keeps tournament attendance from pulling from one region into another. This would not be the case if the regions were realigned, especially in the West.
- Right now the West has a larger percentage of the ACC membership, but who is to say that this will not change. Are we going to keep realigning the regions every time it does? Also, the ACC membership has been holding steady at around 7,000 for almost ten years now. It would make more sense to wait until there is significant growth of the membership to implement realignment.
- ACC policy states that the BOD can have up to ten members from each region. A restructuring would probably modify this somewhat. However, splitting the Western Region would make it possible for the West to have an overwhelming majority of the BOD, as it would have two regions instead of one.
- There are two BOD meetings each year.

One is always held in conjunction with the ACC/JPW tournament in Reno; the other at the Grand National tournament, which rotates yearly between the three regions. If a fourth region was added in the West, it would place an undue burden of travel time and expense on both the Central and Eastern BOD members and tournament participants. In a four-year rotation, this would mean six meetings (and major tournaments) in the West, one in the Central, and one in the East.

There are certainly more considerations than we have listed, and we are willing to discuss all issues regarding this topic in depth (in person or by phone). We want the ACC to continue to thrive as an organization and not be divided because of regional differences or individual preferences.

The American Cribbage Congress is a static organization. Membership numbers are static, and only one new board member was added in the last election with a very small total vote count. Change in such organizations is characterized by resistance, seen as an intrusion, a challenge to a static power structure, and an "if it ain't broke don't fix it" mentality. These attitudes are the real problem and symptoms of a deeper disease.

Organizations which look to the future in a positive way are in a constant state of reorganization. Government entities, business enterprises, and other organizations redesign/reorganize to meet membership needs, sales volumes, clients' service needs, and regional imbalances—often

Running a Cribbage Tournament

BY PHYLLIS SCHMIDT

My one-day tournament in West Springfield MA has twelve games in the main and eight in the consolation. Here what I do to prepare for it.

Secure a hall, handicap accessible if possible. Make sure the hall seats the participants comfortably.

Get a sanctioning-request form from the tournament commissioner in your region.

Prepare an entry form/flyer, which must be approved along with the sanctioning request before you can proceed any further. Include space on the entry form for both the entry fee and optional Q-pool. Not everyone pays the Q-pool early, but about 70% of my entrants do. It makes it easier for me and cuts down on the Q-pool line on the morning of the tournament.

Once the entry form is approved, I make copies for distribution. Be sure to send an electronic version of your flyer to the ACC webmaster Diane Waite (webmaster@cribbage.org) to post on the internet. This is one of the best tools we have to advertise, and it help people decide if this is an event they would like to attend.

Prior to your tournament, bring your flyers to each tournament you attend. There is usually a table set up for future tournament forms, and people will pick up those they can attend.

Now sit back and wait for some entries to come in; it will be a little slow in the beginning, but as the closing date nears things will pick up. As I receive the entries I log them into the computer with name and

amount paid, with or without the Q-pool. My co-director makes the same list on a writing pad in case something happens to the computer. I also make scorecard labels with name, state, and ACC number.

I keep a list of the things to bring the day of the tournament:

- ACC banner
- scorecards for main event with the name of the entrant and Q-pool stamped if paid in advance (bring extra scorecards in case of an emergency)
- numbers to draw for random seating and table numbers
- list of entrants in alphabetical order to record the seat number drawn
- Q-pool stamp for those paying at the door
- playing cards—jumbo index if possible
- playoff charts for main and consolation
- forms for main and consolation prize lists (I have lists covering about ten different entry amounts)
- pens
- used playing cards for early arrivals who like to play prior to the start of the tournament
- consolation tournament scorecards, name labels, and list to record the seat number drawn
- trophies for main and consolation

If you know of a person or group or people who should be recognized for their volunteer work, contact Tom Lewis at tomlewis@spinn.net. Every month Tom volunteers to edit the Volunteers Column and the Grass Roots Corner.

- cash for prepaid Q-pools and position prizes; I pay positions 1–8 by check (bring checkbook)
- a copy of my entry form (in case any questions come up)
- participants' original entry forms
- qualifying and playoff MRP sheet (main and consolation tournament)

After everyone is seated at the tournament, I ask two players from each table to cross-check the scorecards for accuracy after the completion of the qualifying round. I welcome everyone, name the head judge, and ask the judges to stand. I announce upcoming tournaments, how many players are on hand, how many will qualify, and the number of byes. I also announce how many players are in the Q-pool. During this time my co-director is posting the prize list and MRP sheets. Now let the games begin.

The twelve games are completed by noon, and then the scorecard checkers verify each score of 15 GPs and higher. Checked scorecards from each table are placed in two piles, good and bad. We recheck each pile to verify that all 15-GP cards and up are in the good pile and that no qualifying cards got left out (very important!). The qualifiers are put in numerical order: GPs, games won, and spread

points. I count out the amount needed to qualify and announce the bottom qualifier. Anyone under that score can start to sign up for the consolation tournament, which is held in the afternoon with the same procedure and rules.

The pairings charts are prepared, and after lunch we start the playoff round.

The scorecards are then checked to see how many qualifiers are in the Q-pool. The total Q-pool money is divided and distributed accordingly. I always pay back 100% on Q-pools.

During the playoff rounds we pick up unused boards and playing cards and clear the tables.

As each person is eliminated in the playoff round they receive their prize money.

The following day I complete the tournament reports and mail them to the tournament commissioner, along with the ACC fee and receipts for expenses. Don't put off submitting your report, it is very important to do things in a timely matter. Now I put everything away and anxiously wait for my tournament results to appear in *Cribbage World*.

It takes a lot of volunteers and a few key people to run a smooth tournament. Fortunately I have a plenty of both.

Everything You've Always Wanted to Know about Cribbage (But Were Afraid to Ask)

In July this column examined MRPs (Master Rating Points), and last month GRPs (Grass Roots Points) fell under the Cribbage 101 microscope. So now we turn to IRPs—Internet Rating Points—which are awarded for sanctioned play in the ACC's third division:

online cribbage tour-

Ironing Out IRPs

haps a reminder is necessary: the IRP system does not interact with MRPs or GRPs. Points earned online have nothing to do with points earned at weekend tournaments or in local clubs. The three systems are totally separate, and points do

not cross from one system to the other.

After you've earned

IRPs in several tournaments they start to add up, and 2,000 lifetime IRPs brings you to the rank of eMaster. IRPs basically follow the same pattern as MRPs, and here is how many IRPs are needed to reach each award level:

The ACC sponsors three types of online tournaments: single elimination, double elimination, and round robin (or mixed). In the elimination tournaments, you earn IRPs by making it to the third round. Obviously, the farther you go, the more IRPs you earn. IRPs in a round-robin event are a bit more complicated, but again, the longer you last, the more IRPs you accumulate. For detailed info about how IRPs work, go to cribbage.org and click on "Internet Cribbage" in the left column and then click on "Internet Rating Points (IRPs)" in the right column.

In the 2006–2007 season, over two hundred online tournaments were conducted, and when the season wound down on July 31, Tom Langford (*yanknshank29*) topped the field with 714 IRPs. (A full wrap-up of the internet season is found on the facing page.) Internet champions from previous years were Mike Fetchel, Mark Van Dyke, and John Schafer.

Other News

We are working with another site for expansion of the ACC internet cribbage program. The utilization of an additional site provides the ACC with increased exposure to the internet cribbage community. Once the site completes the requested improvements, we will post the information both in *Cribbage World* and on the ACC website.

Long Match

If a single cribbage game is a sprint to hole 121, then a long match is a marathon. Generally composed of at least 18 games, a long match requires motivation, skill, and endurance.

The long match concept was developed a dozen years ago by Larry Samet (Wellesley MA) on the theory that playing 20 or 40 or 60 games would remove much of the luck element from the game and allow skillful players to rise to the top. Long matches require that the winner have at least a two-game lead after a predetermined minimum number of games. In addition, long matches typically score a skunk as 4 GPs and a win as 3 GPs, thus devaluing the skunk (i.e., it takes three wins to make up for one loss, instead of two wins as in standard ACC scoring).


Larry is proud of having come up with this 4+3 scoring system, but it came back to bite him a few years ago when he skunked **Dwight Christiansen** (Stratford

CT) seven times in a single match, yet still lost the match!

While no empirical evidence can prove conclusively that one player is better than another, a long match probably comes closest. This format gives you the opportunity to evaluate your opponent's playing skills, determine how they play certain hands, modify your own play in response to their play—and do all this with a high level of consistency over the course of many games.

Given this, it is no wonder that players like Wayne Steinmetz (Milwaukee WI), Warren Sondericker (Milwaukee WI), and Rob Medeiros (Dorchester MA) consistently find themselves at the top of long match playoff brackets. And the man whom many think was the greatest cribbage player of all time, Mick Michaelis (who died 1998), won the National Long Match twice in its early years.

Today, at least six organized long



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matches are played annually around the country, as the format continues to gain popularity. If you would like to play in one of the existing long matches, contact one of the tournament directors listed below and they'll add you to their waiting list if

they don't have a current opening. And if you'd like to start a new long match, any of these tournament directors would be happy to give advice.

So, sign up for a long match, take a deep breath, and shuffle the cards.

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

the same game. Is there an odds guru out there who can calculate how frequently this might occur? *submitted by Ras*



It's time for serious thinking on this. It's time for the BOD to recognize that there are folks in the wings to assist. Whatever product emerges will benefit from involving the members in the development and implementation. Don't pigeonhole this issue in an "in-house" committee. In so doing, you will tell the membership that you favor the status-quo regardless of the merit in change. And the membership is likely to accept a product in which they had an active role in planning and design. We must act as though the future is of more importance than a fading past.
